Dist. 45 offers free screenings on Nov. 2; appointments required

School District 45 will conduct free developmental screenings for children on Monday, Nov. 2. Children must be 3 years of age by the date of the screening. They should live in the district, but not be currently enrolled in kindergarten.

Appointments are necessary for the free screenings. Parents who suspect their child has a disability can make an appointment by calling Sharon Mallin at the District 45 office at 630-516-7318.

The screening process identifies how the child is currently developing. Assessed areas include: speech and language, vision and hearing, motor skills and cognitive development.

The screening is conducted by professional school staff in a variety of pleasant playroom situations.

Each screening takes approximately 60 to 120 minutes. Screening results are shared with parents.

Village board passes resolutions urging state not to reduce funding

The Villa Park Village Board unanimously approved two resolutions during Monday's meeting urging Illinois Gov. Bruce Rauner and the state's general assembly to "protect full funding" of Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) and Local Government Distributive Fund (LGDF)

Villa Park Village Manager Rich Keehner referred to the current budget impasse in Springfield during Monday's meeting. He said Rauner's proposal of a 50-percent reduction in LGDF revenue would cost the village about \$1.1 million.

Municipalities including Villa Park currently receive 8 percent of total state income tax collections. Rauner has proposed that municipalities receive 4 percent of those collections. According to the Illinois Municipal League (IML), municipalities receive \$97 per person from the LGDF. Villa Park, with a population of about 22,000, reportedly received about \$2.1 million in LGDF revenues during Municipal Fiscal Year 2015 (May of 2014 to April of 2015). Keehner said that if Rauner's proposal is enacted, the village's LGDF revenue, which was expected to be about \$2.2 million in the current fiscal year, will be cut in half to \$1.1 million.

In discussion of motor fuel tax revenues Keehner said the proposed reduction in funding from that source would cost the village \$540,000. He said the loss of that revenue, which is collected by the state and redistributed to local municipalities, would have a significant impact on road construction and maintenance.

Keehner said the village's resolutions would be passed on to the IML, which would relay the information to state government leaders. Villa Park Village President Deborah Bullwinkel added that several Illinois municipalities have enacted similar resolutions to protest a potential reduction in MFT and LGDF funding.

Villa Park's unlimited fall leaf disposal continues through the end of November

Yard waste stickers will not be required through Dec. 4

The Village of Villa Park's fall leaf collection program will allow residents to dispose of an unlimited number of Kraft paper bags of leaves without affixing yard waste disposal stickers.

The program will be in effect during a seven-week period that began last week (the week of Monday, Oct. 19) and ends the week of Nov. 30 to Dec. 4.

Brush must be tied in bundles no longer than 4 feet and not larger than 18 inches in will be accepted.

Yard waste stickers are not required for the disposal of brush bundles. Since all brush and yard waste are transported to a composting facility for processing, plastic bags may not be used. Residents should use only biodegradable twine or string for binding brush.

It is unlawful to deposit yard waste of any kind into public streets.

Villa Park sets its Halloween trick-or-treating hours; 3-7 p.m.

The Villa Park Village Board has adopted Saturday, Oct. 31, from 3-7 p.m. as the official hours for Halloween trick-ortreating. All local schools have been notified of the hours and will be encouraging their students to comply with the trick-or-treat hours. In addition, Villa Park Police Chief Robert Pavelchik stated that additional police personnel will be available to assist residents during the four-hour trick-or-treating period. Pavelchik encourages parents to make sure that their children trickor-treat only during those hours.

Chief Pavelchik recommends that parents take a few simple steps to help ensure their children's safety during Halloween.

· Young children should be accompanied by a responsible adult. No child should ever

trick-or-treat alone. Children should walk only in well-lighted areas and avoid backyards, alleys, empty lots and parks.

- · Make sure that any masks that are worn do not block a child's vision. They should be able to see well both in front and to each side.
- · Children who trick-or-treat after dark should carry flashlights and use reflective tape on their costumes.
- · Parents of older children should know the routes they are planning to take and set a time for kids to be home. It is strongly recommended that children go out in groups rather than by themselves.
- · Review the contents of all treats. Remove any suspicious treats. If any treats show signs of possible tampering, call the police department at 630-834-7447.



Losses end playoff hopes for Rams and Warriors

The Glenbard East football team's 2015 season ended with a 42-27 loss to Bartlett in Friday's Upstate Eight Valley Conference game in Lombard. Each team entered the game needing a win to qualify for the IHSA playoffs. The visiting Hawks, who rushed for 308 yards in the first half, scored the game's first three touchdowns to take a 21-0 lead early in the second quarter. The Rams struck for two touchdowns before halftime-an 11-yard pass from senior quarterback Phil Abruzino to senior Zach Walsh and a 1-yard run by junior Devonta Owens. Bartlett held a 28-14 halftime lead.

The Rams cut the Hawks' lead to 28-21 on Abruzino's 13-yard TD pass to senior Karon Keves with about four minutes left in the third quarter. The Hawks then scored two touchdowns in the next three minutes on a 47-yard pass and a 42-yard interception return. Bartlett (5-4) made three more interceptions during the game

'We didn't make enough plays to get where we needed to go," said Glenbard East coach John Walters, whose team lost its last four games and finished the season with a record of 4-5. "We had five losses, all to good football teams. Something bad happened in all of those games. If you give good teams too many opportunities, they're going to beat you.'

All five teams that beat Glenbard East this season (Glenbard North, South Elgin, Geneva, West Aurora and Bartlett) qualified for the playoffs.

The Warriors needed to win Friday's regular-season finale at Leyden to win the West Suburban Gold Conference championship and earn a trip to the playoffs. The Eagles, however, played the role of the spoiler, beating Willowbrook 16-7.





ACT vs. PARCC: Which test shows if high schoolers are ready for college?

Divergent results from two tests measuring how prepared Illinois students are for college are causing much consternation among suburban educators.

Results from the ACT college entrance exam (https://www.act.org/) -- a long-standing measure of college readiness -- show roughly 46 percent of students statewide are meeting standards for college-level rigor in English, reading, mathematics and science, according to Illinois School Report Card (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/) data released today.

In comparison, partial results from the state's new standardized test that debuted in spring -- Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (http://www.parcconline.org/) or PARCC -- show less than one-third of students are meeting college-readiness standards.

Partial PARCC results released last month show roughly 70 percent of Illinois students tested online did not meet expectations in math and English language arts/literacy. Roughly 75 percent of all test takers statewide took the test online.

"PARCC says more kids are failing. ACT says the opposite, and that's the most stringent standard we have seen," said Scott Helton, superintendent of DuPage High School District 88 (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php? district=DuPage+HSD+88%2C+Dupage+County&dist-ID=190220880160000&district-name=DuPage+HSD+88#mainpge), whose Addison Trail (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-name=190220880160001#mainpge)and Willowbrook (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-

name=190220880160002#mainpge) high schools came close to the state's average ACT composite score of 20.5. "Is it really (a crisis) or is it just manufactured?"

College-readiness measures

While there are differences between the tests, both the PARCC and the ACT purport to show the percentage of students who are "college ready."

The disconnect between the two test results is confusing, yet not entirely unexpected as state education officials have been warning student scores will be low in this first year of a new test.

Performance levels and proficiency thresholds for PARCC are aligned with the more rigorous Common Core State Standards. (http://www.isbe.net/common_core/) Yet, some educators say the bar has been set too high.

PARCC assessments -- which replace the Illinois Standards Achievement Test (https://illinoisreportcard.com/State.aspx? source=Trends&source2=ISAT&Stateid=IL) and Prairie State Achievement Exam,

(https://illinoisreportcard.com/State.aspx?source=Trends&source2=PSAE&Stateid=IL) and which ultimately is expected to supplant the ACT -- are aimed at giving teachers, schools, students and parents better information about whether students are on track for college and careers. Statewide third- through 10th-graders took the tests -- designed to assess how students apply critical thinking to real-world issues and mastery of content.

Yet the test is "not fulfilling its promise," said Rita Fischer, assistant superintendent of curriculum and instruction for Libertyville-Vernon Hills High School District 128 (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?district=CHSD+128% 2C+Lake+County&dist-ID=340491280160000&district-name=CHSD+128#mainpge), which has among the highest ACT composite scores in the suburbs -- higher than 25.

"In practice," she said, "the results are coming much too late to inform instruction."

ACT, SAT or PARCC?

For the first time, Illinois juniors were not required to take the ACT exam this year, even though the state funded the test. Since 2001, the state has provided funding for the ACT exam, but with the current budget crisis, future funding is up in the air.

State education officials are assessing whether to keep the test or go with its competitor, the SAT college admission exam (https://sat.collegeboard.org/home) offered by College Board, which is debuting a new test next year.

The estimated cost of a contract with a testing company is \$6.8 million per year for a three-year term.

"We did seek bids for a college-entrance exam and are currently evaluating those bids," said Laine Evans, Illinois State Board of Education spokeswoman. "It is the intention of ISBE to fund a college-entrance exam, if the necessary assessment funding is provided for Fiscal Year 2016."

Suburban superintendents say ACT has worked well as a college entrance exam, and some districts are considering funding the test themselves.

"I budgeted to keep administering the ACT, even if the state does not, because at the end of the day, if you ask a college what matters to them, PARCC doesn't matter to them," said Fred Heid, superintendent of Algonquin-based Community Unit District 300 (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?district=CUSD+300%2C+Kane+County&dist-ID=310453000260000&district-name=CUSD+300#mainpge). "ACT and SAT are true indicators of college readiness to the extent possible, so we remain committed to that."

The district's two high schools -- Hampshire (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-name=310453000260003#mainpge) and Jacobs (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-name=310453000260004#mainpge) in Algonquin -- exceed the state's average ACT score, while the third -- Dundee-Crown (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-name=310453000260002#mainpge) in Carpentersville -- falls below but is "closing the gap" with supports and interventions, Heid said.

District 300's PARCC scores were not included in the partial results released earlier because the district administered only paper tests.

Heid isn't putting much stock into them because he believes the results are skewed.

"You are telling me that across the entire state not a single high school student exceeded statewide expectations in math? That's not possible," he said. "I don't think it provides a realistic picture of what students are actually capable of doing. It's going to be a baseline that will measure future performance, but it will have no impact on our district."

It's unclear when complete district- and school-level PARCC scores will be released. The state has promised to get them to the districts by December, yet there is no set timeline, officials said.

Too much testing?

Educators say ACT is only one external measure of college readiness. Most school districts use multiple measures, including student performance in locally designed classroom tests and AP exams, to provide a complete picture of whether students are on track for college.

For now, ACT and PARCC results cannot be compared because they test different groups of high schoolers, said Mary Fergus, spokeswoman for Elgin Area School District U-46 (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?district=SD+U-46%2C+Kane+County&dist-ID=310450460220000&district-name=SD+U-46#mainpge), the state's second-largest school district. Its five high schools -- Elgin (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-name=310450460220002), Bartlett (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-name=310450460220004), Streamwood (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-name=310450460220003) and South Elgin (http://reportcards.dailyherald.com/index.php?id-name=310450460220005) -- scored between 17 and 21 on the ACT.

"They are two different tests," Fergus said. "I think they are both useful. Over time we may be able to draw some parallels or use it as a point of comparison, but I think it's too soon right now."

Some educators are calling for eliminating PARCC assessments for high schoolers because the test is affecting instructional time and scheduling during junior year when students already are taking ACT and Advanced Placement exams.

"We need to limit the amount of instructional time that is lost to assessment," said Fischer, echoing sentiments in the Obama administration's new education plan that says testing should take up no more than 2 percent of instructional time. "We would like to see a college-entrance exam serve as the sole measure of high school accountability."
