# ComEd warns its customers to watch out for scam artists

ComEd issued a recent news release reminding the public to beware of people who pose as utility workers and target the utility's customers through door-to-door visits and phone calls.

"With the door-to-door scams, someone impersonating a utility worker will visit customers' homes looking to get personal and/or account information, and in some cases enter into the customer's home," stated the release. "Variations of the phone scam include stories that the customer's billing cycle has changed and payment is needed immediately; the account is past due and immediate payment is required to avoid disconnection of service; or the customer's previous payments were not accepted or processed. In those cases, the scammers instruct customers to buy a prepaid credit card and direct them to call back with the personal identification number (PIN)."

ComEd senior vice president of external affairs Fidel Marquez stated in the release that ComEd wants to raise awareness of scam artists who target customers:

"If customers are ever unsure about the authenticity of a utility worker at their door or over the phone, they should contact ComEd or the police immediately," stated Marquez.

The release reminded ComEd customers

that representatives from the company always carry proper identification and never ask customers for cash or personal financial information

Anyone who believes he or she has been a target of a door-to-door or phone scam is advised to call the Illinois Attorney General's office toll free at 800-386-5438 or visit the attorney general's Web site www.illinoisattorneygeneral.gov and click on the link "Protecting Consumers."

The release from ComBd offered some precautions to customers regarding scams.

The tips include:

 Never provide personal information to anyone initiating contact with you who claims to be a utility representative or asks you to send money to another person or entity other than your local utility providers.

 Always ask to see a company photo ID before allowing any utility worker into your home or business

 When in doubt, check it out. Be skeptical of people wearing clothing with old or defaced company logos. If you have any doubts, ask to see a company photo ID.

 Never make payment for services to anyone coming to the door.

Customers who have concerns about the status of their account can contact ComEd at 800-EDISON1.

# Instant classic! Broncos rally to win a snowy semi

The Montini football program has piled up 32 playoff victories in the last seven seasons. Those post-season wins have included several fourth-quarter comebacks and memorable finishes. The bizarre weather conditions and stunning comeback in the Broncos' latest playoff victory—Saturday afternoon's 35-27 triumph over Prairie Ridge—added another chapter to the recent history of the program's post-season success.

"The greatest comeback in Montini football history," said Broncos head coach Chris Andriano in describing the contest during his post-game comments. "That was an unbelievable finish to a great game."

Playing in the midst of a snowstorm that covered the field during the first half, Montini battled a formidable Prairie Ridge team in Saturday's IHSA Class 6A semifinal game in Lombard. The snow that arrived during the morning had been cleared from the field about an hour before the 1 p.m. kickoff. But another blast of snow soon arrived, causing the first half to be played in near whiteout conditions. An army of shovelers, as well as a snow plow, worked to try to make the field playable, not to mention visible.

The snow let up in the second half, upgrading conditions from miserable to terrible. Aside from the weather, Montini had another problem—stopping Prairie Ridge and its potent running attack. The Wolves produced a long touchdown drive late in the second quarter and added a two-point conversion run to take a 14-13 halftime lead. Prairie Ridge scored two more touchdowns in the third quarter to build a 27-13 lead with 12 minutes to play.


Facing its first loss of the season and the end of its string of trips to a state championship game, Montini outscored the Wolves 22-0 in the final quarter. Prairie Ridge drove inside the Broncos' 10-yard line during the final minute, but the Montini defense stopped the Wolves on a fourth-down play to lock up its 35-27 win.

The victory launched the unbeaten Broncos (13-0) into this Saturday's IHSA Class 6A championship game. Montini will tangle with Crete-Monee (11-2) in the title tilt at Northern Illinois University's Huskie Stadium. The two teams have one common opponent this season—Prairie Ridge. The Wolves defeated Crete-Monee 52-33 on Oct. 23.

The Broncos are making their seventh straight trip to an IHSA state title game. Montini won four consecutive Class 5A championships from 2009-12. The Broncos lost the 2013 and 2014 Class 5A title games to Springfield's Sacred Heart-Griffin. Crete-Monce knocked Sacred Heart-Griffin out of this year's Class 6A playoffs, beating the previously unbeaten Cyclones 38-35 in the quarterfinal round on Nov. 14.

Montini has steamrolled most of its competition during the 2015 season, winning its last 10 games by an average of 34.5 points. The Broncos aren't just unaccustomed to trailing by 14 points. They're not even used to allowing 14 points in a single game. Montini entered the semifinal with four shutout victories this season. The team allowed eight or fewer points in five other wins. Despite the string of blowouts, Andriano insisted each week that the Broncos would be tested during their quest for a state title.

"That's the best team we've played all

year;" Andriano said of the Wolves after Saturday's battle. "Both teams really stepped up today."

Senior quarterback Justin Blake gave the Broncos an early lead when he ran about 50 yards for a touchdown on the team's first offensive play of the game. Sophomore Michael Cooney made the extra-point kick as the snow fell to give Montini an early 7-0 lead.

Prairie Ridge (11-2) responded by returning the ensuing kickoff about 80 yards for a touchdown. The Wolves' conversion kick failed, leaving Montini with a 7-6 lead.

Junior Prince Walker scored

Montini's second touchdown of the day on a short run with under two minutes left in the first quarter. Walker dropped the ball to the ground on his scoring run, which took place in some of the most miserable conditions of the game. He picked the ball up off the snow and dove across the goal line. Cooney's extra-point kick sailed wide of the left upright.

Prairie Ridge scored the only points of the second quarter on a long drive that ended with a short touchdown run with 38.2 seconds left in the opening half. A successful run on the two-point conversion attempt

A touchdown run moments later pushed the Wolves' lead to 20-13. Montini then stopped Prairie Ridge's try for a two-point run.

The Wolves stopped the Broncos on downs at the Montini 30-yard line on the next series. Prairie Ridge took possession of the ball and scored on a short run with about seven seconds left in the third quarter. The extrapoint kick pushed the visiting team's lead to 27-13.

The snowstorm made passing the football nearly impossible in the first half. Montini's passing game finally came to life on the last play of the third quarter-a gain of about 40 yards on a long pass from Blake to junior Mitch West, who made a diving catch while falling into the snow.

The teams switched directions for the fourth quarter, which began with Blake's 40-yard touchdown pass to senior Tyler Millikan, who caught a short pass in the middle of the field and raced into the end zone. Walker added a two-point conversion run to cut Prairie Ridge's lead to 27-21 with 11:53 to play.

Montini senior linebacker Jake Kapp provided a huge play on the Wolves' next offensive series. Kapp reached with his right hand to tip a pitchout from the quarterback to a running back. Kapp then picked up the loose ball and rumbled about 50 yards for a touchdown that tied the score at 27-27. Cooney's extra-point kick completed a 15-0 Montini burst in under three minutes and gave the Broncos a 28-27 lead with 9:05 left in

"I saw him [the quarterback] about to pitch the ball; I just stuck out my said Kapp of the play. "It dropped right in front of me. I just turned and scooped and scored."

"Scoop and score; we work on it

every week in practice," said Andriano in referring to Kapp's game-changing play.

The Montini defense rose to the occasion on the Wolves' next drive. The Broncos stopped Prairie Ridge short of a first down on a fourth-and three running play. Montini took possession around its own 40-yard line with under seven minutes to play.

Walker broke free for a run of about 35 yards on the Broncos' first play of the ensuing drive. Blake ran about 10 yards for a touchdown a short time later to extend the Montini lead to 34-27 with 4:42 remaining. Cooney's extra-point kick closed out the scoring.

Prairie Ridge could have tied the

game with a late touchdown drive and a successful two-point conversion. The Wolves started their last drive of the day at their own 27-yard line and pushed the ball deep into Montini territory. A completed pass moved the ball to around the 12-yard line. Moments later, Kapp rushed the quarterback on a passing play and knocked the ball loose. The Wolves recovered the ball near the 19-yard line with about 30 seconds to play. Following a run of about 10 yards, the Wolves faced a fourth-and-seven play from the 9-yard line. Prairie Ridge completed a short pass, but junior Brendan Rauer tackled the receiver about five yards short of the first down to end the drive.

Illinois motorists should be reminded that a new law took effect Jan. 1, 2012 requiring everyone, no matter the age or seating position, to wear a seat belt. Children are required to ride in a car seat or booster seat until at least age 8.

"For those people who already buckle up every time, thank you," said Saran. "For them, this campaign serves as a reminder. But for those people who still don't buckle up for whatever reason, I want to say this: buckling your seat belt is one of the simplest, safest things you'll ever do."



# Addison Trail boys basketball team looking to build off success

Blazers deep with talent on heels of 15-win season

Winning has been part of the fabric of the Addison Trail boys basketball team in recent times.

The Blazers are coming off a 2014-2015 season where they won 15 games. And numerous players on this year's roster were on a sophomore team that won 19 games.

"Our seniors have had success throughout their careers here," said ninth-year Addison Trail coach Brendan Lyons, who noted last year's team also won two tournament titles. "Their winning approach they have brought throughout the offseason has permeated the

entire program. A lot of our success this year will depend on how quickly many juniors can make the adjustment to the varsity level. As a whole, they are a skilled and hard-working group but will need to adjust quickly to the speed of the varsity game in our conference."

While the Blazers did graduate key players Jaavion Bradley (all-conference), Matt Gontarek (all-tournament in two events) and current Aquinas College player Taylor White (all-conference and a tournament MVP honor), they do return seniors Eric Grygo (6-5, power forward) and Nick Conrad (5-10, point guard). Both Grygo and Conrad started last year

Other key contributors include seniors Ryan Zygow-

icz (6-2, shooting guard), Zach Novak (6-5, small forward) and Mike Tkaczyk (6-3, power forward) along with juniors Jack Kalbas (6-0, shooting guard), Colton Noel (6-5, power forward), Michael Williams (6-4, small forward) and Stevan Jones (6-2, small forward).

"We're very similar to last year's group, but we're a little bit bigger," said Lyons. "We have a bunch of hard-working kids. This senior group has had success for four years and they bring that mentality into everything they do."

Lyons said last year's success will have the Blazers squarely on their opponents' radar this season. "The difference is where we may have snuck up on people last season, this time they are going to be ready for

us," he said.

Lyons added one key thing being stressed in early-season practices is consistency. "If we are consistent night in and night out we will be in good shape because we have the energy and the effort," he said. I'm also impressed with the intelligence of this team. We will be able to execute well. The key is going to be consistency. I'm confident with this group that we're not going to have any real high-highs and then have low-lows. I really like the approach these guys take. Now that we are starting to play games we will see if that becomes a reality.'

Grygo, Conrad, Zygowicz, Novak and Kalbas all started games at various times last year. Grygo led the team in rebounding, while Kalbas was tops in 3-point shooting. "Nick and Eric saw a lot of time and those other three guys saw plenty of action as well," said Lyons. "They all started at different points in time. I like what those five bring to the table. Mike Tkaczyk is another senior who will help us. We will have more size than many of the Addison Trail teams of recent past and I anticipate depth being a strength for us throughout the season. For the group, I'm looking for that consistency on

both ends of the floor. Jack and Ryan can shoot the ball and I feel Eric and Zach (Novak) give us a nice inside-out presence. We're going to lean on these experienced guys early and we expect the juniors will be able to contribute as well."

Lyons feels the West Suburban Conference Gold Division will be competitive once again this season. "We feel we can be competitive at the top end of the conference," he said. "If we play the way we are capable of playing and things fall the way like I think they will we have a chance to find ourselves at the top. That's a long way away. We know we have a long road ahead of us, but the expectations have been raised the last few years."

Addison Trail opened the season in the Elmwood Park tournament earlier this week. The Blazers won that tournament last year.

"We would like to repeat there as champions," he said.

The Blazers are then off until Dec. 6 when they open WSC Gold play against District 88 neighbor Willowbrook.

"We have a nice break between the tournament and that game," said Lyons. "We'll use that time to fine-tune some things and see where we are at."

It's a little slower now which means I have to take it out faster. I've learned how to, and I quote, 'swim like an animal.'

Haake throws plenty of credit toward AT-Willowbrook coach Paul Anderson for her improvement.

"He is, by far, the best coach I've ever had," she said. "I've learned so much on this team already. I've learned about the little things, which I wasn't good at. He's taught me about the little things. Mr. Anderson is awesome.'

Haake also is thankful for the support she's received from the older AT-Willowbrook swimmers. She qualified for state on the 200 relay team with seniors Melissa Johnston and Meghan Koterba and junior Annalise Morrone.





# Special Olympics athletes get a shopping spree at Yorktown

Alejandro Bueno is a great runner, a hardworking basketball player and a silent leader.

Those are just a few of the reasons why his coaches nominated him to be the recipient of a \$100 Finish Line (http://www.finishline.com/) shopping spree.

The Addison Trail High School senior was one of six Special Olympics athletes invited Tuesday to pick out whatever they wanted in the Yorktown Center store in Lombard.

"We were really excited because he's one of those students who never asks for anything, he never wants for anything," said Melissa Morales, a special-education teacher and coach who accompanied Bueno.

"I think the fact that he has this opportunity to be treated like a celebrity is good for him, it boosts his confidence," she said

Bueno and the other athletes were greeted with cheers, high-fives, ringing cowbells and a barrage of photographs before being paired with store employees who served as their personal shoppers.

He walked out of the store with a new pair of Air Jordans, a blue sweatshirt, some socks and a Bulls winter hat.

"They're extremely excited," said store manager Osvaldo Martir. "They're just like any other athlete: they win, they get excited. They have the same type of feelings we have. It's great to see the expression on their face, just like you would with anyone else who wins something"

Shelley Chenoweth, director of corporate partnerships for <u>Special Olympics Illinois</u>, said Finish Line has sponsored shopping sprees for the past three years.

Special Olympics employees sort through the nominations to select recipients.

"The athletes have an amazing time picking out shoes," she said.

"Many of them don't have a pair of shoes, or only have one pair of shoes, that they can participate in Special Olympics with and getting a new pair of shoes is something they've never had before, so it means a lot to them," she said.

On the other side of the store, Michelle Coleman showed off her new purple shoes.

She said she will use them to play bocce and floor hockey with Special Olympics.

Like Bueno, Coleman was described as a quiet person who does a lot for her team without being asked.

"We have an athlete who is very difficult, and she will partner up with him in bocce. It keeps him in line, helps him stay focused and I really appreciate that," said Kathryn Thomas, a special recreation coordinator who works with Coleman at Veterans Park District in Northlake.

Other athletes who participated in the shopping spree were Dennis Fones from the Downers Grove District 99 transitional program; Tori Miller from Lyons Township High School; Davis Russ, also of Veterans Park District; and Ailyn Olas Coaga from Hester Junior High in Franklin Park.

"Our athletes don't always get recognition ... so it's nice when a group like this recognizes them and is kind to them," Thomas said.

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
