## Juvenile charged as an adult following shooting in Villa Park

A Villa Park teenager was charged as an adult after he allegedly shot two unarmed men on the 900 block of West North Avenue last week

Bruce Berner age 16, was arrested shortly after police responded to a call of shots fired at the North Avenue Townhomes on Nov 24. Bernier was charged with two counts of aggravated battery with a firearm, a Class X felony. He is being held at the DuPage County Jail on a \$1 million bond Hzs next court appearance is scheduled for Dec 21.

According to information provided by the Villa Park Police Department and the DuPage County State's Attorney's Office Villa Park police responded to a report of shots fired at 913 W North Ave. at about 9 12 p.m.

According to Villa Park Detective Sgt. Bill when points arrived at the scene to find two man. — a 19-year-old and a 21-year-old—who had sustained gun-inot wounds. One of the men had reportedly been shot once in the leg, while the other had been shot twoe in the leg and once in the abdomen Villa Park parametical transported both victims to separate hospitals. The victim who had been shot in the abdomen was transported to Advocate Good Samaritim Hospital in Downers Grove. The other victim was taken to Elmhurst Memorial Hospital Both victims are expected to recover from their unmes

Lyons, who was one of the Villa Park officers to respond to the scene, sad several witnesses observed the sheeting, which took place outside near the rear parking lot of the complex Police spoke with witnesses and the victims. Minutes later, police an ested Berrier in its apartment at 901 W. North Ave, without incident According to Lyons, police recovered a handgun from Berrier's residence. He said police are awaiting ballistics tests to determine if that weapon was used in the shooting of the two victims, who are both Addison residents.

Witnesses reportedly heard five shots during the incident, which Lyons said police were treating as gang-related Lyons said Monday that the relationship between Bernes, who turns 17 on Dec 28, and the two victums is nuclear

Shortly after responding to the scene, Villa Park police requested assistance from tactical officers from the Addison, Einhunst and Lombard police departments, as well as the DuPage County Steriff's Office. The DuPage County Forenses Investigative Unit also responded to assist in collecting evidence for the investigation of the incident.

The shooting of a 21-year-old Villa Park man, which occurred on the same block on Nov 1, also remains under investigation.

"We got up big from the getgo," said Addison Trail coach Brendan Lyons. "It was good for an opening game. Everybody played a lot and guys got some good reps against live competition."

Addison Trail led 37-4 at

halftime thanks to a 29-0 run at one point.

The Blazers then recorded a 65-25 victory over Chicago Northtown Academy. "It was similar to the first game. We got up big and we played hard to the end," said Lyons. "The guys off the bench gave us some really good energy."

Addison Trail wrapped things up with a 63-41 win over host Elmwood Park. "We were down 10-3 at the start of the game." Lyons noted. "That was good for us. We had some good looks on offense, but we couldn't convert. The good thing is our guys didn't bat an eye."

Addison Trail led 38-20 at halftime and then used a 10-0 run to start the third quarter to pull further away. "We came out in the third quarter and never looked back," said Lyons. "I thought our energy was very good in all three

games. We saw a lot of positives on both ends of the floor that we can build on. We also saw some things that we know we definitely can get better at. I thought our depth was great. We had guys rotating into the games who gave us good energy and good minutes."

Addison Trail used its size as an advantage in the three games. "We had a lot more size than our opponents," said Lyons. "From a half-court sense, we had a lot of offensive rebounds. We had something like 15 offensive rebounds against Elmwood Park. That gave us a lot of second-chance points in the half court and then we used a full-court press to help jump-start the offense."

Lyons said that pressure defense came into play in the win against Little Village. "We went to a full-court man-to-man press and that forced them to play fast and that led to some

turnovers," he said.

Eric Grygo and Nick Conrad were named to the all-tournament team at Elmwood Park Eric scored in double digits in two of the games and had 12 points and 12 rebounds in the game against Northtown Academy. Making the alltournament team was well-deserved," said Lyons. "Nick knocked down some shots for us. He does all the things you need to have done from your point guard position. I think assists-to-turnover ratio was like 6-1 going into the last game. He was very steady for us throughout the tournament, He does exactly what we need him to do. Both Eric and Nick are senior captains and both were deserving of the award."

Lyons also cited strong play from Zach Novak and Colton Noel. "We were able to get a lot of second-chance points inside," said Lyons. Lyons said the team is working hard to build on the momentum from the tournament win.

"I told the guys we won three games, we won a tournament championships, a lot of guys got playing time and we came out of it healthy," he said. "We talked about having high expectations. It was a nice start. It was nice for the guys to see that success and see we have the potential to get to where we want to be and where we need to be. I told them to enjoy it and then let's focus on the next game."

That next game is Saturday at home at 6 p.m. against District 88 neighbor Willowbrook.

"They beat us twice last year in two highly contested games that had great atmospheres," said Lyons. "It was two competitive teams last year and I expect the same thing this year. We are expecting a battle (Saturday)."

Koulogeorgas had 20 points against Elgin, including 18 in the first half. "We shot the ball fairly well in the tournament," said Schader. "We were tied 21-21 in the first half against Lane Tech and had six 3-pointers. The problem was we couldn't get the ball inside. If we can get the rebounding down we are going to be fine. We started to get better defensively in other aspects."

Pham is another player who enjoyed a strong tournament. "Alyssa played really well," said Schader. "She ran the point for the most part and took care of the ball. She scored and dished and did a lot of positive things for us."
