Bill to keep weapons from harmful individuals clears House Committee More legal resources to prevent gun violence may curb suicides

SPRINGFIELD — State Rep. Kathleen Willis (D-Addison) passed legislation through a House Committee this week that would provide more legal resources to prevent gun violence perpetrated by individuals who possess firearms and pose a threat to the safety of themselves and others.

"This legislation is a common sense measure that will protect law enforcement, com-

House Bill 3160 creates a process whereby a relative or loved one may request from the court that when an individual who is shown to demonstrate sufficient evidence they pose a threat to themselves or another person, his or her firearms will be seized. Further, a restriction will be placed on his or

Strong pitching aiding Willowbrook baseball team in early going

Warriors tackle tough early-season schedule

Right out of the gates, the Willowbrook baseball team has encountered numerous quality opponents.

The Warriors were 2-4 through their first six non-conference games. Willowbrook defeated Naperville North and Maine West and lost to Glenbard South, Glenbard East, Batavia and Oak Park-River Forest.

"Oak Park is the best team I've seen in my time coaching," said Willowbrook coach Vic Wisner. "We were up on them 5-4 in the sixth inning. They are a really good team that is very well-coached. Batavia is ranked No. 10 (by one suburban daily newspaper) and we were up on them 1-0 in the sixth inning."

Willowbrook lost 3-1 to Batavia and also dropped a 3-2 game to Glenbard

East.

"Last year we won nine one-run games," said Wisner. "This year a little luck is falling on the other side."

Still, Wisner is seeing plenty of things he likes in the early going.

"We are able to manufacture runs," he said. "We're swinging the bats well. Oak Park had a kid throwing that had given up one hit all year. We had seven or eight hits against him. We were putting together really good at-bats. Our thing is we haven't been able to hold on in these low-scoring games."

Wisner enjoys playing tough teams at the start of the season.

"The way we look at it, playing this many top teams right away toughens us up and gets us ready for the conference season and the postseason," he said. "We have faced some top-line pitching. It's only going to help us down the road."

Willowbrook also has benefitted from strong pitching. "Pitching was going to be a strong point for us," he said. "We've had some real good

pitching so far. Our thing is we're not getting that timely hit. We're getting seven, eight and nine hits a game, but instead of scoring three runs in an inning, we're scoring one. It happens. We'll get those timely hits. We hit the ball and have great at-bats and go deep into counts. The hits are going to fall because we are getting good swings."

On the mound, Cam Zunkel has been a standout, as has Matt Pizur.

"Cam has looked great on the mound and in the field," said Wisner. "He's a returning all-conference player. Matt Pizur has pitched well for us and has hit very well."

TJ Geritano also has played well thus far. "TJ has had a strong two weeks for us," said Wisner.

Willowbrook is scheduled to host Hinsdale Central today and will face Morton on the road Saturday in a West Suburban Conference Gold Division doubleheader. The following weekend the Warriors start an important league series with preseason conference favorite Hinsdale South.

Bison competed in Tennessee over spring break

Numerous Fenton softball players were off to hot starts at the plate through the team's first nine games.

Alex Stoklosa was leading the team with a .429 batting average. Diana Pikul was hitting .409, while Rose Riley was batting .389.

"Alex has stood out so far this season," said Fenton coach Dave Mello. "It's great to see her leading the team in both average and on-base percentage. She has done most of her damage with two strikes."

Riley was leading the team with nine RBI, while Ellie Wassmann, Jenna Geraci and Pikul each had five RBI.

"Our best attribute at the plate so far this season is that each and every batter is battling regardless of the score," said Mello. "We've had some of our best at-

bats late in the game."

Freshman Payton Pugliese leads the team's pitching staff in ERA.

"Our pitchers are focusing on throwing strikes early in the count and getting ahead of hitters," said Mello. "We are falling behind in the count too often and that is leading to way too many walks."

Riley has been a standout as well in the field. "Rose has made two diving catches as well as a couple other really nice plays," said Mello. "She is very quick to get the ball back into the infield when it is hit to her. We are still making too many errors, but have really shown a lot of promise in practice. The girls have been making some nice defensive plays."

Over spring break, Fenton competed in the Southern Warrior Classic in Murfreesboro, Tenn. Fenton played Independence (Tenn.), White House Heritage (Tenn.), Stewart's Creel (Tenn.) and Lancaster (Ohio). Timothy also dropped a recent 10-0 decision to Chicago Resurrection.

"We have played some good teams in Illinois and then ran into some very good teams in Tennessee," said Mello. "The trip to Tennessee was a lot of fun because it gave everyone the chance to experience out-of-state competition and then enjoy time together off the field. We were able to conclude the trip with a nice team night of dinner and sight-seeing in Nashville."

Mello noted after the team returned from the trip, it endured a stretch of five games being cancelled by weather in a six-game span.

Mello added the cancellations have brought about a two-week practice period. "We only had two weeks of practice at the beginning of the season before our first game so this will be like a new start to the season," he said. "I am excited to see how we do when Mother Nature allows us to play again."

Fenton had games scheduled this week with Illiana Christian, St. Edward, Fenwick, IC Catholic Prep (today in Elmhurst) and Addison Trail (at home Friday).

All-conference performer Raza back for Willowbrook boys tennis

The Addison Trail boys tennis team has some strong experience to lean on this season.

The Blazers return No. 1 singles player Alex Franco. The senior earned all-West Suburban Conference Gold Division honors after placing second in the league at No. 1 singles.

Also back are juniors Nico Favuzzi (No. 2 singles) and Josh Sapnu (No. 1 doubles). Favuzzi and Sapnu played No. 1 doubles together last year.

Addison Trail placed fifth in the WSC Gold last year and opened up the 2016 season with a 6-1 non-conference loss to Timothy Christian.

"This year we are hoping to improve our conference place from fifth to fourth or third," said Addison Trail coach Justin Hegner. Residents are advised to refrain from flushing unused medicines down the toilet or from throwing them in the trash. Flushing the medicines or discarding them in the trash reportedly pose potential safety and health hazards.

Village board considers what to do about paying to recycle waste

Monday's Villa Park Village Board meeting included a presentation from a representative from the village's refuse and recycling provider—Roy Strom Refuse Removal Service, Inc. of Maywood.

George Strom, who gave the presentation, told village board members that the price of recycling materials has declined in the last 18 months. One of the primary causes of the decline, said Strom, has been the steep drop in oil prices. Strom noted that the lower oil prices have reduced the prices of virgin materials and eliminated the cost advantage of using recycled materials to produce a variety of packages and containers.

According to information provided by the village, in order to recycle materials gathered through weekly refuse pickup, it now costs \$33 per ton to transport and recycle the waste. That cost, stated the information from the village, has become an additional financial burden to Roy Strom and the village. The company and village staff brought the issue to the board to seek direction on the issue.

"In the past, recycling was basically cost-free," said Villa Park Village Manager Rich Keehner shortly before George Strom's presentation. "Now it costs \$33 per ton to transport and recycle."

Keehner mentioned there is a clause in the village's contract with Roy Strom that could allow the company to send recyclables into the garbage stream. Keehner said that would be contrary to what the village has been preaching, and doing that would add another 100 tons a month into the garbage stream.

Keehner told board members that village staff is looking for direction on what to do. The village could absorb the cost of paying to recycle materials—estimated at \$3,500 to \$4,000 per month or pass the cost on to residents. One figure provided by Strom pegged the additional cost for residents at 48 cents per month.

During his presentation, George Strom urged residents not to place their recycled materials in plastic bags.

"Plastic bags are a big nuisance to us and processing facilities," Strom said. "Those bags can clog up the machines [that separate materials]. We've been asking our customers to go bagless or use paper bags."

George Strom also said that the company's contract with the village could allow it to ask the village for a rebate if the current trend continues.

Trustee Robert Wagner said that Roy Strom has been a great vendor for the village, and very responsive. Wagner said he would not like to see the village send recycling materials to a landfill.

"I just think it sends a bad message to people," stated Wagner.

Trustee Albert Bultuis said he did not think the village would want to absorb the additional cost of transporting recycled materials—a cost of around \$40,000 per year. Bultuis also said he didn't think the village would want to readjust residents' bills each month. He suggested village staff could come up with some average figures for a rate increase that would offset the cost of recycling. Villa Park Village President Deborah Bullwinkel directed village staff to look into how other municipalities are dealing with the issue of recycling costs.

Keehner stated that the village already absorbs the costs associated with recycling electronic items. He said the village also absorbs the costs of additional pickups of branches and debris following heavy storms.

The village's current contract with Roy Strom runs until June 30, 2018. The village has an option to renew the contract for an additional five years. The current residential base rate for collection is \$17.90 per month. Beginning July 1, 2016, the rate will rise to \$18.62 per month. The monthly charge increases to \$19.36 on July 1, 2017.

The contract also includes terms for Roy Strom to issue a fuel surcharge when fuel costs exceed \$3 per gallon. George Strom noted during his presentation that the surcharge had been in effect but went away as fuel costs declined.
