

Team of Jefferson students qualifies for global event

A team of Jefferson Middle School students advanced to the 2016 Destination ImagiNation (DI) Global Finals with its Irist-place showing in this month's DI State Tournament at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb.

Destination ImagiNation is a non-profit organization that gives students the chance to work together to solve specific challenges. Teams competing in DI events explain their ideas and solutions during brief presentations to a panel of judges

The Jefferson team, known as the Manly Lobsters, placed first in the middle school level's service learning challenge. The students had to identify a community need, hold an event to address that need and present their experiences during a DI event. The Manly Lobsters decided to promote awareness of mental health and depression in their school community. Working

with an area affiliate from the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), as well as Jefferson Middle School's social worker, the team created a plan to educate their fellow Jefferson students about mental health and depression awareness.

The Manly Lobsters' outreach project included homeroom activities during a school spirit week. Team members also designed bracelets and T-shirts to sell at school. The \$600 they raised was donated to NAMI.

The team received the Torch Bearer Award at the state tournament. The award was presented for the extraordinary impact the Manly Lobsters' project made on their school community.

The same team of Jefferson students also qualified for last year's international event. This year's DI Global Finals take place May 25-28 at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

Drop off unused prescription drugs at the VPPD on Saturday

The Villa Park Police Department and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public an opportunity to rad their homes of expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs with an upcoming collection event. The collection will take place from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, April 30, at the police department, which is located at 40 S. Ardmore Ave.

The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

The DEA will not accept liquids, needles or sharps. Only pills and patches will be accepted.

According to information provided by the Village of Villa Park, medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

Residents are advised to refrain from flushing unused medicines down the toilet or from throwing them in the trash. Flushing the medicines or discarding them in the trash reportedly poses potential safety and health hazards.

Board votes to add a 50-cent surcharge to garbage bills

Villa Park Village Board members voted unanimously during Monday's meeting to pass an ordinance that adds a 50-cent surcharge to residents' monthly garbage and recycling fee. The fee will take effect for the bills mailed at the end of May, which are due on June 20, 2016.

Roy Strom Refuse Removal Service, Inc., of Maywood, is the village's refuse and recycling provider. The company used to sell the recycling materials it collected from the village. In the last 18 months, however, the market to sell recyclable materials has fallen dramatically. Instead of making money by selling recyclable materials, Roy Strom is now paying \$33 per ton to transport and recycle the items. A representative from the company spoke at the April 11 village board meeting and advised the board of the issue.

The village's contract with Roy Strom. which runs until June 30, 2018, contains a clause that allows the company to ask the village for assistance if the recycling market fails to generate revenue. Another clause in the contract allows the village to direct Roy Strom to forgo recycling and send recyclable materials into the garbage stream if the market isn't generating revenue. Village board members advised against that option at the April 11 meeting and advised the option of issuing a surcharge, which would be eliminated if the recycling market rebounds.

The theme of this year's sale is heirlooms and herbs. The event will feature a variety of heirloom vegetables and herbs, as well as a selection of prairie and natural plants.

According to information provided by the garden club, the items available at the sale will include over 600 prairie plants and 19 different varieties of herbs. Hanging baskets and númerous vegetables will also be for sale.

The garden club will have experts on hand to provide advice to gardeners. Recipes and details about growing information will be provided.

The Garden Club of Villa Park was founded in 1936 with a mission to foster gardening and fellowship. All male and female gardeners, 15 years of age and older and actively interested in home gardening, are invited to join the club. The club's meetings take place at 7:30 p.m. at the Villa Park Community Recreation Building on the fourth Tuesday of each month

Rams move to 12-3 with 2-0 victory over Bartlett

The Glenbard East girls soccer team rebounded from two straight losses to post three straight wins, including Saturday's impressive 2-0 victory over Bartlett in an Upstate Eight Conference Valley Division battle in Lombard.

Sophomore Ali Liljestrand's firsthalf goal gave the Rams a 1-0 lead over the visiting Hawks. Junior Dana Plotke supplied a second-half goal.

Senior goalkeeper Sierra Dana recorded her 10th shutout of the season for the Rams, who improved to 12-3 overall and 2-0 in Valley Division action. Bartlett's division record dropped to 2-1.

"We knew this would be a tough game," said Glenbard East coach Kent Overbey. "They [the Hawks] are very physical and dangerous up top. We did a great job of disrupting their offense and holding possession.

Overbey noted the effort of sophomore defender Katie Hansen. He said Hansen joined the rest of the team's defensive unit to do an exceptional job in covering Bartlett's two forwards.

Glenbard East turned in nine straight shutout victories after opening the year with a 1-0 loss to Lincoln-Way East. The Rams' overall record dropped to 9-3 after losses against Wheaton Warrenville South (on April 14) and Downers Grove North (on April 16) at the PepsiCo Showdown.

The Rams began a new winning streak with a 3-1 win at Plainfield Central on April 19. Trailing 1-0 at halftime, Glenbard East responded with three second-half goals. Junior



State to begin making payments to universities, colleges, students

Funding includes MAP grants for students

VILLA PARK — On Friday, April 22, the Illinois General Assembly passed legislation to partially fund state universities and communities colleges to avoid further costs and possible closings. The funding includes for Monetary Award Program (MAP) grants for college students. Governor Rauner is expected to sign the legislation.

Upon passage of the legislation, Illinois State Comptroller Leslie Munger issued a statement:

It is heartening that the Governor and legislative leaders have come together to authorize funding for our universities, community colleges and student MAP grants. I have directed my staff

to begin processing payments immediately, giving top priority to students and the institutions that are suffering the most.

"The \$600 million in funding for this legislation comes from the state's Education Assistance Fund, which today has \$354 million on hand. Those dollars will allow us to immediately pay student MAP grants and work closely with our universities and community colleges to ensure they have the resources

they need to avoid further cuts and closings. We will continue disbursing funds as they become available, with final payments being made in July. Our students and schools have paid a heavy price for this budget impasse, and we will do everything possible to provide long-overdue relief.

"It is my deep hope that the spirit of cooperation we saw today will continue and lead to the comprehensive balanced budget that our state so badly needs.'

Fenton girls track team wins own invitational

Bison take first in five events, edge Trinity for team title

The Fenton girls track team, on the strength of nine first- or second-place finishes, won its own Fenton Bison Invitational.

Fenton won the meet with 143 points. Trinity was a close second with 137 points.

Emmy Burris won the long jump for Fenton with a mark of 17-7 1/2. Fenton also won the 400 relay with a time of 50.2.

Maria Trentadue won the shot put with a throw of 35-10. Burris also won the 100 with a time of 12.6. Ashley Lira was victorious in the 200 with a time of 28.48.

Trentadue placed second in the discus with a throw of 97-4. Sarah Mason placed second in the triple jump with a mark of 32-3. Kaitlyn Jordan was second in the pole vault at 6-6.

Crystal Valadez was runner-up in the 300 low hurdles with a time of 52.2.

Hannah Matuszewski placed third in the long jump with a mark of 15-1. Fenton was third in the 3,200 relay with a time of 10:39.6. Valadez was third in the 100 hurdles with a time of 17.69. Jessica McCauley placed third in the 1,600 with a time of 5:50.25. Stephany Padilla was third in the 200 at 28.87. Fenton was third in the 1,600 relay with a time of 4:35.42. Skylar Dolecki tied

for third in the high jump at 4-4.

Marisol Garcia was fourth in the pole vault at 6-0.

Earlier, Fenton placed second at the Leyden Eagle Invitational. Fenton finished with 105 points, two points shy of first-place Morton.

Fenton won the 400 relay with a time of 50.77. The Bison also won the 800 relay with a time of 1:51.

Trentadue won the shot put with a throw of 33-2. Burris was second in the long jump with a leap of 17-8. She also took second in the 100 with a time of 12.45. Katrina Krebasch was second in the triple jump with a leap of 34-6.

Cassidy Kelly was third in the 400 with a time of 1:06. Matuszewski took third in the 200 at 26.87.

Trentadue was fourth in the discus at 85-8. Lira was fourth in the high jump at 4-4 and was fourth in the triple jump at 31-9 1/2. Fenton also placed fourth in the 1,600 relay with a time of 4-31

The two losses left Willowbrook at 7-10 overall and 4-4 in WSC Gold play.

In a 5-4 Game 1 loss, Hinsdale South broke open a tie game to take a 5-2 lead into the seventh inning. Willowbrook scored two in the seventh, but could not get any closer. The Warriors had 10 hits.

In an 11-1 WSC Gold win over Leyden in five innings,

Willowbrook scored two in the first, four in the second, two in the third and three in the fourth. Martyniuk had three hits. Zunkel and Kyle Ferguson each had two hits.

Geritano and Ferguson each had three RBI. Ben Espinoza had two RBI. Alec Michaelson was the winning pitcher. He went five innings and struck out three in a complete-game effort.
