LifeSource to implement FDA guidance regarding Zika virus

No impact to blood currently on shelves

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) is recommending that blood banks screen all blood donations in the U.S. for the Zika virus.

LifeSource, a local agency which conducts blood drives in Chicago's western suburbs, is working closely with the FDA to implement Zika virus testing in compliance with the new guidance and within the FDA timeline requirement of November

"LifeSource is not in an area that is immediately affected by Zika, and there is no impact to the blood currently on our shelves," said Dr. Darrell J. Triulzi, M.D., LifeSource/ ITxM Medical Director, "LifeSource anticipates minimal impact to our donors and collections, no disruption to the community's blood supply, or any effect on product distribution to

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

OVERCOMING **OVERBITE**

Upper front teeth that vertically overlap the lower front teeth more than normally would be expected describes the malocclusion known as an "overbite." The plan to treat this condition in growing children involves moving the lower jaw forward, which can be accomplished with headgear. However, to be effective, headgear must be worn 14-16 hours per day, which some young patients may not find appealing. To overcome this non-compliance challenge, the orthodontist may choose to introduce a non-removable, functional orthodontic appliance known as a "Herbst appliance." This tube-and-rod device connects the upper and lower jaw and moves the lower jaw forward and the upper jaw backwards. It does not interfere with opening and closing the mouth or with eating.

When your child first gets his or her Herbst appliance, there may be some muscle tenderness and soreness. As your child's mouth adapts to the appliance, the soreness should fade. 



"We are off to the best start since I have taken over coaching (11 years)," said Hegner. "It usually takes us half the season to get our feet under us and be mentally tough to win close matches. This year we have started off by winning most of our close matches with other teams, so the mental focus is already apparent."

Addison Trail is coming off a 2015 season where it went 6-10 and 2-4 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division action (fifth place).

Back for the Blazers is junior

Marina Tollko, who is playing her second year at No. 1 singles. Also back is returning all-conference player Pamela Kobeszko (No. 2 singles). Kobeszko was an all-conference performer at No. 1 doubles last year. Seniors Gianna Sarli and Jessica Bach are back and will play No. 1 doubles this season. Sarli was all-conference at No. 3 doubles last season. Senior Meryem Ahmed also returns and is playing No. 2 doubles.

'We have a lot of seniors this

year," said Hegner. "We have three strong singles players that will challenge the division. We have four returning doubles players playing with new partners this year. The new partners seem to be doing well quickly this year. I like that this group comes out and enjoys the sport of tennis, but they also know when it is time to focus and play hard."

Hegner would like to see his team move up the conference standings.

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

Susie, who was born in 1976, participated in sports at Jackson Middle School and Willowbrook High School. She graduated from Willowbrook in 1994. Susie's talent, competitive spirit and academic achievement helped her to earn a volleyball scholarship to Purdue University. Then, the unexpected happened. Susie was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor when she was 19 years old. She battled for more than two years before passing away at the age of 22 in 1998.

The EISUS Fun Fest, which honors Susie, was designed as a family event featuring games for children and adults, as well as music, light refreshments, face painting and a raffle. Admission is free; fundraising is generated by the sales of tickets for games and the raffle. The funds raised during the event are donated to the American Brain Tumor Association (ABTA) to help support research and assistance to families touched by brain tumors. Each of the previous two EISUS Fun Fest events raised over \$5,000 for the ABTA.

Additionally, the Susan Jurkonis Memorial Foundation was created to award scholarships to outstanding student athletes at Willowbrook. The foundation has presented more than \$50,000 in scholarships to nearly 40 students since 1999. The four members of Willowbrook's Class of 2016 who received scholarships from the foundation earlier this year are: Lucas Betts, Eugene Ciesla, Bridget Garner and Danielle Velasquez.

Susie's Smash—a badminton tournament held each May at Willowbrook—helps fund the

scholarships.

Tonight's town hall meeting focuses on referendum

The Village of Villa Park invites residents to attend tonight's town hall meeting at the Iowa Community Center, located at 338 N. Iowa Ave. The meeting, which will begin at 6:30 p.m., will include information from village staff about the referendum question on the ballot in the Nov. 8 election.

Nov. 8 election.

The question will ask Villa Park voters if they want to approve a half-percent increase in the village's sales tax rate, from 7.5 to 8 percent. If approved, the increase will reportedly generate about \$1.5 million annually. That money would be used to pay for village infrastructure resisters including the increase. projects, including the installation of storm sewers and water mains.

The question, as it will appear on the Nov. 8 ballot, states:

"Shall the Village of Villa Park in-crease the Village's Non-Home Rule Municipal Retailers' Occupation Tax and Non-Home Rule Municipal Service Occupation Tax (common-ly referred to as a "municipal sales tax") from one half of one percent (.5%) to one percent (1.0%) for expenditure on public infrastructure in accordance with and subject to the provisions of Sections 8-11-1.3 and 8-11-1.4 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.3 and 65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.4)?"

The village's current sales tax rate of 7.5 percent includes the one half of one percent municipal sales tax mentioned in the referendum question. That tax generates about \$1.5 million each year. The money is directed to the village's street improvement fund

and used to pay for road repairs. Approval of the referendum on Nov. 8 ould generate approximately \$1.5 million in additional funding.

Villa Park voters approved a ref-erendum proposal in the election of November 2014 to authorize the village to borrow up to \$23 million to pay for road improvements. The funding related to that referendum can only be used for road work; it cannot be directed toward related un-

derground projects.

The Villa Park Village Board approved a resolution at its Aug. 8 meeting to place the referendum question on the ballot in the Nov. 8 election. Villa Park Village Manager Rich Keehner stated at the Aug. 8 board meeting that, if approved, the board meeting that, if approved, the tax increase would take effect July

1, 2017. Keehner also said that some of Villa Park's planned road projects are uncertain because the road-related work is funded, but the related underground work is unfunded

Tonight's meeting is the first in a series of town hall meetings village staff will hold before the Nov. 8 elec-tion to provide information about the referendum question.


