



Warriors pound Addison Trail 38-7 to regain custody of 'The Lady'

The Willowbrook football team's preparation for Friday's showdown with District 88 rival Addison Trail must have been exceptional. The Warriors could not have been much sharper against the Blazers.

Willowbrook traveled to Addison and raced to a 31-7 halftime lead on its way to a 38-7 victory in the opening game of the West Suburban Gold Conference season. The dominant victory gave the Warriors an overall record of 2-1. Willowbrook will play its homecoming game this Friday. The Warriors will face conference rival Hinsdale South. The Hornets (0-3 overall) opened its conference schedule with a 37-24 loss to Downers Grove South.

The winner of the annual grid-iron battle between Willowbrook and Addison Trail claims possession of the District 88 Trophy, also known as "The Lady." The Warriors regained custody of the trophy for the feet their 2013 win the first time since their 2013 win over their rivals. The Blazers won the next two meetings, including last year's down-to-the-wire con-test in Villa Park. Willowbrook had a chance to beat Addison Trail with a last-second field goal, but the kick bounced off the upright. The Blazers edged the Warriors 28-26.

"Last year definitely hurt," said senior Jonathan Kelso, an offensive and defensive starter who provided a touchdown catch and two interceptions during Friday's victory. "We used that as fuel all week long going into this game. We just used that feeling from last year. We didn't want to lose this game, and we came up big."

A touchback on Friday's opening

kickoff gave the Warriors the ball at their own 20-yard line. Willowbrook's first drive of the night ended

Shortly after making the touchdown reception, Kelso turned in a key defensive play by intercepting an Addison Trail pass. He added another interception during the second

with a 35-yard field goal by senior kicker Mike Dembowski. Addison Trail (1-2 overall) punted on its first offensive series, giving the War-riors the ball at their own 19-yard line. Junior running back Jack Jessen highlighted the ensuing 81-yard scoring drive with a 57-yard run down to the Blazers' 2-yard line.

Jessen ran the ball across the goal line on the next play. Dembowski's extra-point kick gave the Warriors a 10-0 lead with about five minutes to

play in the first quarter.
"I thought we did a pretty good job," said Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth of the team's fast start against the Blazers. "We were able

to get things going on the ground."
Willowbrook junior Nick Sabatino made a key defensive play in the opening quarter to help the Warriors preserve their 10-0 lead. Addison Trail made a big gain on a long re-ception before fumbling the ball at

the end of the play. Sabatino recovered the loose ball at the Warriors'

Addison Trail cut into Willowbrook's lead with a 95-yard drive that ended with a 25-yard touch-down pass with about nine minutes left in the second quarter. The con-version kick reduced the Warriors advantage to 10-7.
Willowbrook needed a handful

of plays to rebuild its lead. A couple of runs by Jessen and a completion from senior quarterback M.J. Ran-ieri to senior Freddie Clay preced-ed Ranieri's 28-yard touchdown pass to Kelso. The extra-point kick

moved the Warriors' lead to 17-7
with 8:04 left in the second quarter.
Kelso, one of several Willowbrook starters on both offense and defense, intercepted an Addison Trail pass on the Blazers' ensuing drive. The Warriors then unleashed another scoring march that ended on a 7-vard touchdown run by junior Chris Diaz with 6:15 remaining in the first half. Moments before scoring the touchdown, Diaz ran for

a 33-yard gain.

The Willowbrook defense bottled up Addison Trail's offense on the next series, forcing the Blazers to punt from deep in their own ers to punt from deep in their own territory. The Warriors' subsequent drive, which began at Addison Trail's 39-yard line, ended with Ra-nieri's 7-yard touchdown run with 2:33 to play in the opening half. The scoring run by Ranieri was Willow-brook's third touchdown in a span

of under six minutes.

The Warriors scored their fifth and final touchdown of the night on a 16-yard pass from Ranieri to se-nior Khalif Copeland in the middle of the third quarter. "I wouldn't say this was a sur-prise," said Jessen of Willow-

brook's overwhelming victory over Addison Trail. "We were ready for this. We had great preparation for






DuPage Election Commission seeks election judges

The DuPage Election Commission is recruiting judges to work the General Election on Nov. 8. Election judges are responsible for the conduct of the election at precinct polling places on Election Day. Qualified individuals are required to report to the polling place by 5:15 a.m. and should be prepared to remain at the polling place up until two hours after the polls close at 7 p.m. They should also be available the night before for

set up.
Illinois statute outlines a list of qualifications for those wishing to serve as election judges. Applicants must:

- · Be a citizen of the United States: · Be a registered voter in DuPage
- · Be of good repute and character;
- Be able to speak, read and write the English language: · Be skilled in the four fundamen-
- tal rules of arithmetic (addition, subtraction, division and multiplication);
- Not be a candidate for any office at the election; and Not be an elected committee-

man. Illinois statutes also require bipartisan representation in the polling place so a judge must declare the political party he or she wishes to represent. Attendance at a training seminar is required prior to Election Day (approximately three hours including a test) and judges are paid based on

With any trip, in these days since 9/11 and the attacks across the world, one must be more aware and extra cautious. But to stay home simply because of a "what if," does not make sense.

Travel brings me joy. This trip with my Prince has been a joy to anticipate and I'm sure will be a delight every day.

We do not have plans to be in Paris, but not because of fear of attacks. My husband is not a big city guy. We will spend a leisurely month exploring the south, mainly Provence, and enjoying a slower pace of life. I do find it bittersweet that the state

I do find it bittersweet that the state of the world is one of such mixed emotion. For all those who have a bit of good-natured envy that we are off to France for a month, there are just as many who shrink back in fear and think we're foolish.

Some people have a fear of flying and that keeps them from getting on a plane. Now the fear of terror attacks keeps people from traveling. That is sad.

I choose to focus on the good. I lived in France for a year a decade ago. At that time, there were riots and burning of cars and buildings in Paris and Toulouse, where I lived. It was much exaggerated in the media. My friends were told it was not safe to travel to France and they are so glad they trusted their intuition and came any way. The trip of a lifetime could have been spoiled by fear.







Willowbrook football team defeats Addison Trail

Warriors rack up close to 300 yards rushing; Strong line play cited in win

They say football games are won and lost in the trenches.

And Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth is a big subscriber to that theory. Hildreth pointed to his team's strong play on both sides of the line in a 38-7 victory over District 88 neighbor Addison Trail in a Week 3 West Suburban Conference Gold Division game in Addison.

The win pushed Willowbrook to 2-1 overall and 1-0 in WSC Gold action. Addison Trail dropped to 1-2 and 0-1.

The Warriors' victory snapped a two-game winning streak in the District 88 series for Addison Trail. Willowbrook has now won three of the last five meetings. Addison Trail leads the series 11-6 since 2000.

"We had some good balance," said Hildreth.

Ranieri threw touchdown passes to Kelso and Copeland and also ran one in himself.

"It's been up front for us," said Hildreth. "We've been able to establish the run game a little bit. We only threw it nine times against Addison Trail and 16 times the week before. We are minimizing the third-and-long situations. We've been more efficient across the board."

Willowbrook led 10-0 after the first quarter and then scored 21 points in the second quarter to take a

31-7 lead into halftime.

Hildreth said the team isn't getting too caught up with having momentum with a two-game winning streak. "We don't really look at momentum," he said. "We roll from one week to the next. We know Addison Trail is a well-coached and tough team. It was a very good win but it's as important as all the other wins. We are getting there. We're still a little inconsistent in spots and we know we need to improve in those areas."



Fenton is slated to face Aurora Central Catholic Friday and will head to the Eagle Quad at White Pines on Saturday.


"We're looking for a great finish," said Johnson. "These guys are getting better every week. It's a really nice group of young men and one great young lady in junior Jamie Minard."


