"Both goalies have been stellar in the net," said Dini. "We rotate them all the time. Jacob and Jean have flourished in competing against each other in practice and are continuing to make each other better."

record-wise, Dini stressed there still are improvements that can be made.

"We need to get better at our set plays," he said. "We were executing them early in the season and were making teams pay. The last couple weeks we have been a bit unorganized and have not had guys in the right spots. We have worked a lot on this over the past week so we hope to see some good results over the rest of the season. We practice these a lot and need to take advantage of them in conference play and in the playoffs."

# Property owner opposes proposal to establish special service area at North Avenue Townhomes

The owner of multiple units at the North Avenue Townhomes is expressing her oppo-sition to the Villa Park Village Board's recent proposal to establish a special service area at the townhomes.

The establishment of a special service area would impose a special assessment on property owners of the complex, which includes 18 six-unit buildings. The North Avenue Townhomes are located on the south side of North Avenue, near Villa Park's western border with Lombard

Anita Lepianka and her three siblings own Anta Lepianka and ner three storings own five of the complex's 18 buildings. Lepianka, who spoke during a public participation segment of the Villa Park Village Board meeting on Sept. 26, said the special service assessment would add an annual charge of about \$1.600 to would add an annual charge of about \$1,600 to

would add an aimital charge of about \$1,000 to each of the 30 units owned by her family.

"That comes out to about \$50,000 a year," said Lepianka during the meeting. "That's to pay for somebody else's landscaping and somebody else's driveway and garbage ser-

The special services provided to the area would include the reconstruction of driveways and parking spaces, drainage and landscape improvements, and the construction of a new fence on the south side of the townhomes. The south side of the complex borders single-family homes in Lombard.

The proposed special service assessment of the townhomes calls for a tax rate not to exceed \$3 for every \$100 of equalized assessed value. Lepianka said her family's 30 units at the complex have an equalized assessed value of \$27,000, which is higher than other units in the complex. Each of the complex's units is about

1,200 square feet properties that include three bedrooms and a basement.

"This isn't a joke," stated Lepianka of the rillage's plan to impose a special service area at the complex. "Once Villa Park starts doing this at one part of the neighborhood, they can do it to all the rest of the neighborhood. They're just going to learn how to do it, and do it all over town for whatever project they

There will be a public hearing about the village board's proposal at Villa Park Village Hall on Monday, Oct. 10. The hearing will begin at 6 p.m. The hearing will include the consideration of the issuance of up to \$1.6 million in bonds to pay for the special services in the area. The bonds would be retired over a period of up to 20 years with funds generated by the assessment

Preventing the establishment of the special services area will require a petition signed by at least 51 percent of the registered voters who live in the townhomes, as well as a petition signed by at least 51 percent of the complex's property owners. That petition would have to be filed within 60 days of the Oct. 10 public hearing.

Lepianka said that her family is only able to provide one signature to the petition to property owners despite owning more than 25 percent of the units in the entire complex. Lepianka, who spoke during both of the village board's meetings in September, said during the Sept. 12 meeting she would pursue litigation to oppose the proposal.

"And my biggest, biggest objection to all of this is it's for the benefit of private owners," Lepianka said at the Sept. 26 meeting. "This is all private property. None of it is public proper-

"Conference judging allows youth to demonstrate their mastery beyond just what the exhibit may show," said Judy Mae Bingman, University of Illinois Extension 4-H Media and Communications specialist. "The final awards are based both on the execution of the project work and the interview

# Village board approves new charge adding \$9 to residents' monthly water bills

The Villa Park Village Board voted unanimously during its Sept. 26 meeting to approve the final reading of an ordinance that will add \$9 to residents' monthly water bills. The new charge will take effect Jan. 1,

Board members discussed the proposal to assess the new fees at their Sept. 12 meeting. They voted unanimously at that meeting to advance the proposal to the formal agenda.

The new \$9 flat fee on residential

customers includes a \$3 monthly charge for combined sewer separation and a \$6 monthly charge for

storm water management.

The new ordinance applies a new flat fee of \$18 (\$6 for combined sewer separation and \$12 for storm

water management) for commercial and industrial customers, as well as accounts for residential multi-family

The money generated from the new charges will be used to pay for underground work associated with road projects throughout the village. The underground work includes the installation of sewers and water

Raising money to pay for underound projects has been a topic of discussion at several recent board meetings. Villa Park Village Manag-er Rich Keehner has noted during the discussions that the money related to the voter-approved referendum of November 2014 can only be used for road repairs and cannot be directed

toward related underground work.

Villa Park voters approved the referendum nearly two years ago to

authorize the village to borrow up to \$23 million to pay for road repairs.

According to Keehner, there are about 6,700 water accounts in the village. Villa Park Trustee Albert Bulthuis stated during the Sept. 12 meeting that the new water fees would generate about \$750,000 in annual revenue.

annual revenue.

Shortly before the vote to approve the ordinance at the Sept. 26 meeting, Trustee Robert Taglia asked about applying an exemption for Villa Park's senior residents who are below the poverty line.

Keehner responded that while the village does not have the financial records of Villa Park households, it could make modifications to the ordinance in the future. Taglia suggested that Keehner could review each request for a discount or waiver on a case-by-case basis.

ty. So you're asking one person, us, namely, to pay for repairs for other owners who have neglected to re-

pair their properties."

Lepianka said a majority of the other property owners at the complex rent out their units. She said after the meeting that each of the 13 buildings that aren't owned by her family includes one or two owners who live at the complex.

"They're getting rent, collecting

money from their tenants," said Lepianka during the Sept. 26 meet-

ing in referring to the majority of property owners at the site.
Following the Sept. 26 meeting, Lepianka noted that her family had its portion of the back alley at the complex repaved last year. Her family has also recently paid for new concrete stoops and railings at the entrances of about half of their properties. The Lepiankas hire a private firm to collect garbage from their tenants. The firm makes three pickups per week.

Lepianka said the village is proposing to repair the entire back alley of the complex at a cost estimated at \$600,000 to \$800,000.

mated at \$600,000 to \$800,000.
"We did our portion, which is about 30 percent [of the entire alley], for about \$36,000," she said. "I could even accept up to \$250,000 if they put drains in, but if our portion was about \$36,000, doing the whole alley should cost about \$120,000."
"So very reaching me to any for

"So you're asking me to pay for 40 percent of the burden of those taxes for other people getting in-come from those properties, and not fixing their properties," said Lepianka. After the meeting, she said that the problems at the com-plex, including crime and trash col-lection, would be manageable if the village would provide the services it's currently obligated to provide.

'What I want from the village is for them to do their traditional government function," said Lepianka after the meeting. "That's po-

licing to reduce crime in the area and code enforcement for lack of maintenance of property. Those are traditional government functions. Every community has them. That's why we pay taxes."

If the special service assess-

ment is imposed, Lepianka said the charge will be passed on to tenants.


"The cost has to be offset some-how," she said. "The rents have to

go up. There's no other way."

Lepianka said that about two years ago, village staff members asked her to donate one of the family's five units to the village, which would have demolished the building to create open space. She

turned down the request.

"The majority of the people who live here are decent, hard-working people," added Lepianka, who said most of the crime in the area was drug-related. "These are not bad people. Why shouldn't these people get appropriate government services?"

Concern over road project

Villa Park Trustee Albert Bulthuis asked about the recently completed resurfacing of Highridge Road during the Sept. 26 village board meeting. He said the condition of the road has been reported to the Illinois Department of Transportation. "They are mulling over what can be done," Juskelis stated in response to Bulthuis. A federal grant reportedly covered about half of the project's cost, which was estimated at \$436,000. Villa Park Village Manager Rich Keehner stated during the summer that the project came in under budget.

# Rams edge East Aurora to earn their first win of the season

"Our defense was awesome," said Glenbard East coach John Walters after the game, which took place in intermittent drizzle. "Our guys on de-fense have been grinding all year long. It was nice to see them come out and

The Rams improved to 1-5 overall and 1-2 in conference play. East Aurora slipped to 1-5 overall and 0-3 in the


