# Boys soccer: Addison Trail claims 13th straight victory

Addison Trail's boys soccer team has enjoyed such a dominant season that it hasn't played many games with frantic finishes.

Playing in just their third game that was decided by a single goal this fall, the Blazers answered Downers Grove South's late equalizer with the game-winner five minutes later to earn a 2-1 West Suburban Gold conference victory on Tuesday in Addison.

It was the 13th straight victory for the Blazers.

"It's always a battle when it's us and them and they've gotten us the last couple years so it was nice to get them," Blazers coach Ryan Dini said. "It's a great win for us going into the playoffs because we had some adversity. A team comes on our field and ties us and we haven't been in a lot of close games this year so it was good to see how they'd respond, especially in getting ready for the playoffs."

Addison Trail (18-1-0, 5-1-0) scored the game winner when a Downers Grove South player struck the ball accidentally with 7:54 remaining for an own goal as it went away from goalkeeper Parker Smith.

"I was proud of the kids for working hard like they did and to come back," Mustangs coach Jon Stapleton said. "Unfortunately we had a little destruction on our end to give them one there, because that can't happen."

The Blazers struck first in the 14th minute when Jonathan Hernandez took a cross and flipped it to Tom Kania.

"Johnny got it to me and I saw my chance and headed it in," Kania said. "I felt like that gave us a lot of momentum. We've scored a lot of goals this year so we know we just have to keep pushing through and applying pressure until they make a mistake or something else happens."

Downers Grove South (9-4-4, 3-2-0) was beginning to run out of time before Peter Becht scored with only 13:12 remaining.

"Peter made a good decision and Tom (Wielgosz) was kind of a screen," Stapleton said. "One of the good things that Peter does is putting the ball on frame for us and Tom made a decision to be a decoy there and not take a touch."

An opportunity for both teams to have a game decided by PKs for the first time was averted when the Blazers scored the own goal to earn the victory.

Uriel Martinez and Jason Solares had scoring chances for the Blazers sandwiched between the equalizer and the go-ahead goal, but both were off target.

"We created a lot of chances," Dini said. "We'd get in to their offensive third and just couldn't finish, but they're a good team and we knew it was going to be a battle."

They Blazers were also strong in the middle with Ruben Amaro leading the way.

"Ruben Amaro was phenomenal," Dini said. "He was winning 50/50 balls and distributing, and overall, it was a great team effort."

Both teams were without one of their top players, as Enrique Luna didn't play for the Blazers and Nicholas Rohl was out for the Mustangs.

"I think we played pretty well, a little shorthanded, but that's why we're a team," Stapleton said. "We've been trying to find the consistency in all phases of the game. We can be as talented as anybody when things are going well. We just have got to work on finding that for ourselves."

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## Ex-inmate secures professional license under new law's provisions

Illinois' new law allowing inmates to train for certain professional licenses before their release has produced its first success story.

Landus Jackson took all of the required classes and was approved to receive his cosmetology and barber's license, but he was still in an Illinois prison. Once released from the Vienna Correctional Center, Jackson was able to secure his license right away and with it, a better chance to stay out of prison. Jackson is the first to do so thanks to the new law.

He is excited about his job prospects.

"I feel that this has given me a big-

ger opportunity to do whatever it is that I want to do," the 40-year-old said.

"I am extremely proud that Illinois is taking steps to improve outcomes for men and women who have been incarcerated," Illinois Department of Corrections (IDOC) acting Director John Baldwin said.

"Everyone deserves a second chance, and that is exactly what Landus is getting today — a fair shot at finding employment that will increase his odds of not returning to IDOC custody."

The state requires 1,500 hours of training to get the license so before the legislation passed, Jackson would have needed to spend months training

without pay after his release before he could support himself with his skills.

"So often, when offenders are released, there are a lot of hurdles in their path that prevent them from finding employment," Corrections spokesperson Nicole Wilson said. "We anticipate all who complete their courses are going to at least apply for that license before they leave IDOC custody."

Gov. Bruce Rauner, by executive order, created a commission with the goal of reducing the prison population in Illinois by 25 percent by 2025. Removing barriers for ex-inmates to get professional licenses was one of the commission's recommendations.

## Deficit spending part of most Illinois school districts' fiscal curriculum

Nearly six out of every 10 school districts in Illinois are looking to spend more than they take in next year, a recent Illinois State Board of Education report said. But almost no one involved in education across Illinois is blaming taxpayers for the statewide shortage of school dollars.

State Sen. Sue Rezin, R-Ottawa, said taxpayers pay enough. It's state government that have shortchanged schools.

Rezin said former Govs. Rod

Blagojevich and Pat Quinn cut state aid nearly 15 percent during their time in office.

"Proration has been the most regressive policy that's been implemented in the last decade," Rezin said.

Galesburg School District 205 Budget Director Jennifer Hamm said the district has spent more than it has brought in for the past six years because the state trimmed \$9 million from its bottom line.

"This year, we have a \$1.2 mil-

lion deficit in our operating fund," Hamm said. "Last year, we had a \$2.3 million deficit in our operating fund. This is the trend."

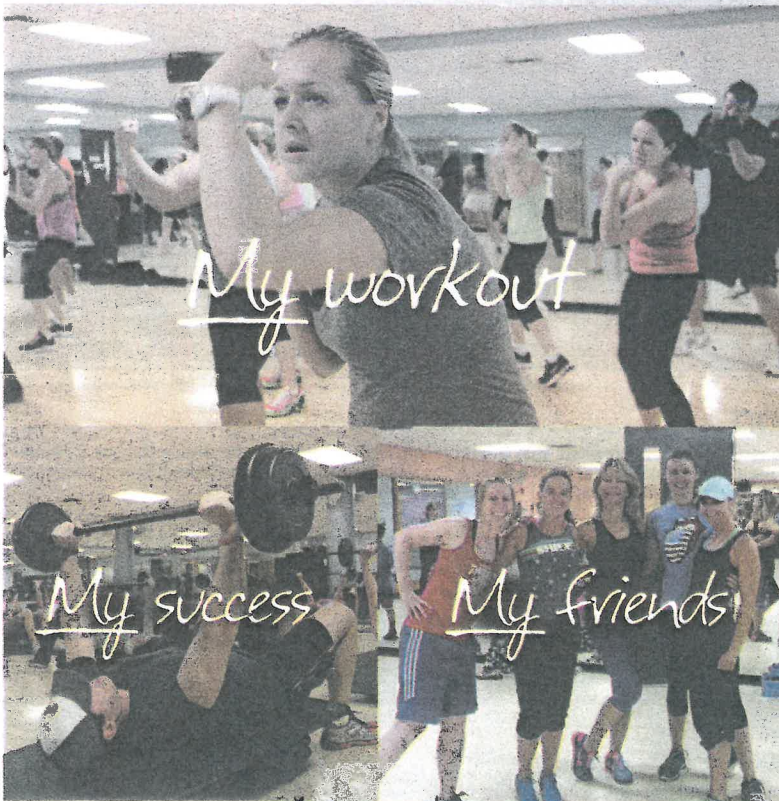
Rezin compared proration to a payday loan. The problem with a payday loan isn't the interest. Most people who need a payday loan are living on such a small margin, it just takes them too long to scrape together the extra cash to pay it off. Rezin said many districts are now so far in debt, they may never be able to catch up.

rious—"Is being the Mayor a stressful job?"—to personal questions—"What is your favorite color?"

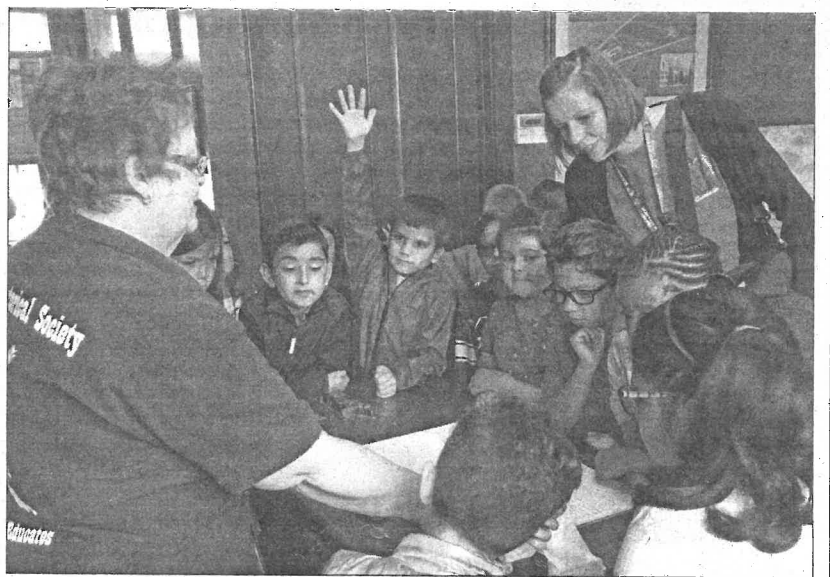
The field trip concluded with a visit to the Addison Public Library, where students were given the opportunity to tour the building and spend some time on a craft project coloring Day of the Dead bags.

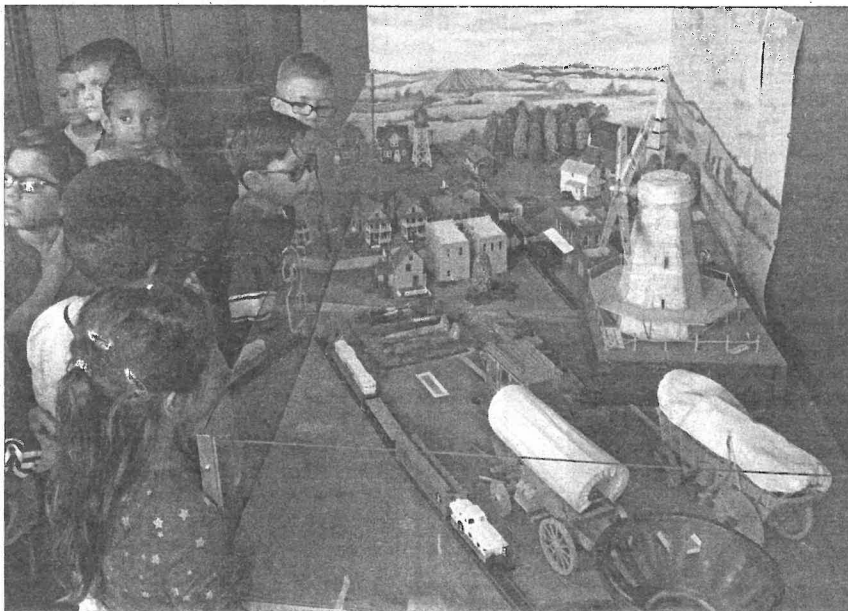

## Golf outing rescheduled; alumni perform theatre production

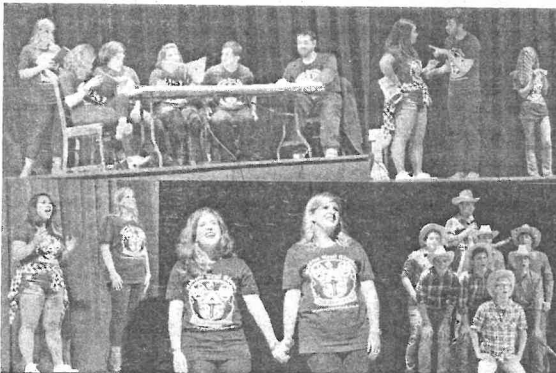
Throughout the 2016-17 school year, Addison Trail will continue to host events/activities in celebration of the school's 50th anniversary.

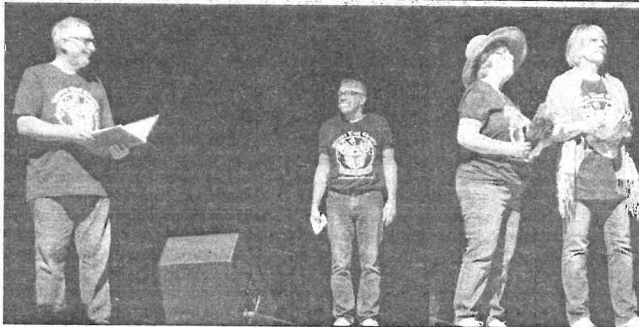

## D'Ambrose powers Addison Trail football team to victory

### Blazers' girls volleyball team brings unbeaten conference record into this week

Addison Trail running back Nick D'Ambrose scored five touchdowns to help the Blazers record a 47-28 West Suburban Conference Gold Division victory over Morton in Berwyn.

The win improved Addison Trail to 3-4 overall and 2-3 in conference play. The Blazers are still alive for a playoff berth, needing to win their final two games against Proviso East and Glenbard West to become play-off eligible.

The two teams played to a 14-14 tie in the first quarter and went into halftime in a 21-21 stalemate. Addison Trail outscored Morton 20-0 in the third quarter to pull away.

D'Ambrose rushed 19 times for 216 yards and scored three touchdowns. He also caught three passes for 130 yards and two touchdowns and finished with 367 all-purpose yards after adding 21 kick-return yards.

Quarterback Bobby Daniels completed 14 of 18 passes for 305 yards and three touchdowns. He also scored a rushing touchdown. Stevan Jones caught four passes for 118

yards and a touchdown.

Andrew Felix led the defense with 11 tackles, while Chris Lasanta had eight tackles. Lasanta also had two tackles for loss and two quarterback sacks. Felix had a quarterback sack, as did Randy Petrbok who also had two tackles for loss. Vittorio Venuti had a quarterback sack, while Jose Sanchez had a tackle for loss. Carlos Rosado had an interception.

Addison Trail racked up 538 total yards of offense in the win. The Blazers face Proviso East in Week 8.

Addison Trail girls tennis The Addison Trail girls tennis team finished the dual-meet portion of its season at 9-5 overall and 3-3 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division play.

The Blazers recently scored a 4-3 non-conference win over Maine West and dropped a 4-3 WSC Gold match to Leyden.

"We have won almost all of our close dual meets," said Addison Trail coach Justin Hegner. "The only one the whole season that slipped away was Leyden."

At the recent Riverside-Brookfield invitational, Pamela Kobeszko took second place in the 1st/2nd

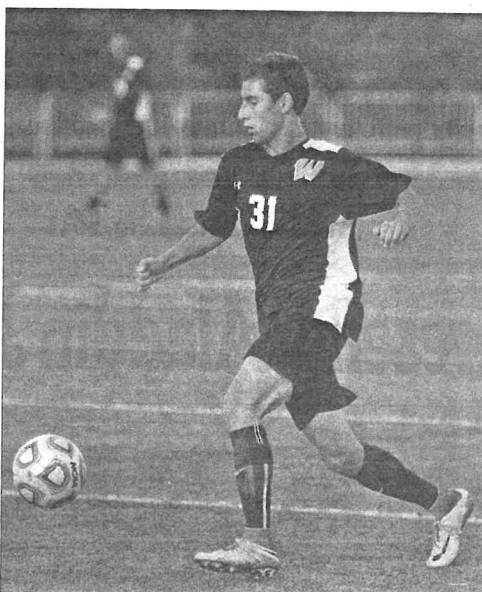
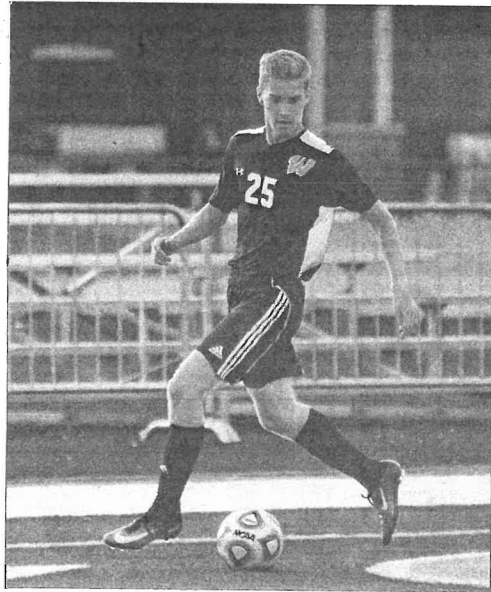

## Village board meeting includes discussion of licenses for liquor and gaming

Villa Park Village President Deborah Bullwinkel and Villa Park Trustee Albert Balthuis both spoke about liquor and gaming licenses during the Sept. 26 village board meeting.

One of the meeting's public participation segments included comments from a prospective business owner who would like to establish a café and deli near the Jewel-Osco store at 33 E. St. Charles Road. The business would fill the space formerly occupied by a dry cleaning establishment just east of the Jewel-Osco store. The prospective business owner noted that he needed a liquor license to open the business, and that also wanted to incorporate a gaming business.

As village president, Bullwinkel also serves as Villa Park's liquor commissioner. She explained why she did not approve the initial request for a liquor license for the prospective café and deli.

"When I make a decision about a liquor license I don't take it lightly," said Bullwinkel, who told the applicant she spent quite a bit of time mulling over his request. Bullwinkel stated that she had been "pretty liberal with issuing liquor licenses" since becoming village president and liquor commissioner in 2013.

"But when I feel that there is something that comes forward that may not be in the best interests... people expect me hopefully to make the right decisions," Bullwinkel said.

"We don't have any additional liquor licenses available for the gaming establishments, and I'm not planning on recommending any," she added. Bullwinkel explained that residents have told her they feel there are too many gaming establishments in the village.

"When I look at where we're at, I feel very protective of the businesses we have today," said Bullwinkel, who mentioned there are 55 liquor licenses in the village. She also noted the prospective business would be close to Villa Park Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post No. 2801, which offers food, liquor and gaming.

"I just don't want to take away from existing businesses," Bullwinkel said.

Minutes after Bullwinkel addressed the issue, Balthuis stated that he had previously spoken with the prospective business owner, as well as two others who were interested in opening establishments, including a sports bar, in Villa Park.

"I heard you, Madame President, mention that you've talked to staff about this," Balthuis said to Bullwinkel. "But I haven't heard anything as a trustee, except for the gentlemen, when they contacted me. A lot of times in the past, we've always talked how we work here as a team, and I think the team sort of got left out. Some of these decisions need to be talked about with the trustees."

Balthuis added while the village president serves the role of liquor commissioner, the village board regulates the number of available liquor licenses.

"Some of these issues...we have to make decisions as a board," said Balthuis, who stated he had not heard an outcry from residents about the amount of gaming establishments in the village.

## Tonight's town hall meeting focuses on upcoming referendum

The Village of Villa Park invites residents to attend tonight's town hall meeting at the Iowa Community Center, located at 338 N. Iowa Ave. The meeting, which will begin at 6:30 p.m. and should last about 45 minutes, will include information from village staff about the referendum question on the ballot in the Nov. 8 election. The question will ask Villa Park voters if they want to approve a half-percent increase in the village's sales tax rate, from 7.5 to 8 percent. If approved, the increase will reportedly generate about \$1.5 million annually. That money would be used to pay for village infrastructure projects, including the

installation of storm sewers and water mains.

The question, as it will appear on the Nov. 8 ballot, states:

"Shall the Village of Villa Park increase the Village's Non-Home Rule Municipal Retailers' Occupation Tax and Non-Home Rule Municipal Service Occupation Tax, (commonly referred to as a "municipal sales tax") from one half of one percent (.5%) to one percent (1.0%) for expenditure on public infrastructure in accordance with and subject to the provisions of Sections 8-11-1.3 and 8-11-1.4 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.3 and 65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.4)?"

The village's current sales tax rate of 7.5 percent includes the one half of one percent municipal sales tax mentioned in the referendum question. That tax generates about \$1.5 million each year. The money is directed to the village's street improvement fund and used to pay for road repairs. Approval of the referendum on Nov. 8 would generate approximately \$1.5 million in additional funding.

Villa Park voters approved a referendum proposal in the election of November 2014 to authorize the village to borrow up to \$23 million to pay for road improvements. The funding related to that referendum can only be used for road work; it

cannot be directed toward related underground projects.

The Villa Park Village Board approved a resolution at its Aug. 8 meeting to place the referendum question on the ballot in the Nov. 8 election. Villa Park Village Manager Rich Keehner stated at the Aug. 8 board meeting that, if approved, the tax increase would take effect July 1, 2017. Keehner also said that some of Villa Park's planned road projects are uncertain because the road-related work is funded, but the related underground work is unfunded.

Village staff held two similar town hall meetings at the Iowa Community Center in September.

## Lisle Man sentenced to 40 years for predatory criminal sexual assault of a child

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin announced last week that Filiberto Garfias-Fernandez, 28, of Lisle, has been sentenced to 40 years in the Illinois Department of Corrections for sexually abusing a young girl.

On Aug. 30, Garfias-Fernandez appeared in court where he entered a blind plea of guilty to two counts of predatory criminal sexual assault to a child, a Class X Felony in front of Judge George Bakalis, who imposed the 40-year sentence.

The sentence is the result of allegations that from October, 2009, through October, 2014, that Garfias-Fernandez sexually assaulted the daughter of his girlfriend on numerous occasions. The assaults began when the girl was three to four years old and ended when she was seven. The assaults took place at the girl's home while her mother was away at work. After seeing an Erin's Law presentation at 9 years old, the victim disclosed the abuse to her teacher.

"For years, this young victim was repeatedly sexually assaulted by an authority figure in whom both she and her mother had placed a great amount of trust," Berlin said. "That trust was repeatedly shattered in the worst imaginable way. Thankfully, she was able to find the strength to reveal the horrors Mr. Garfias-Fernandez had inflicted upon her."

Garfias-Fernandez will be required to serve 85 percent of his sentence before being eligible for parole.

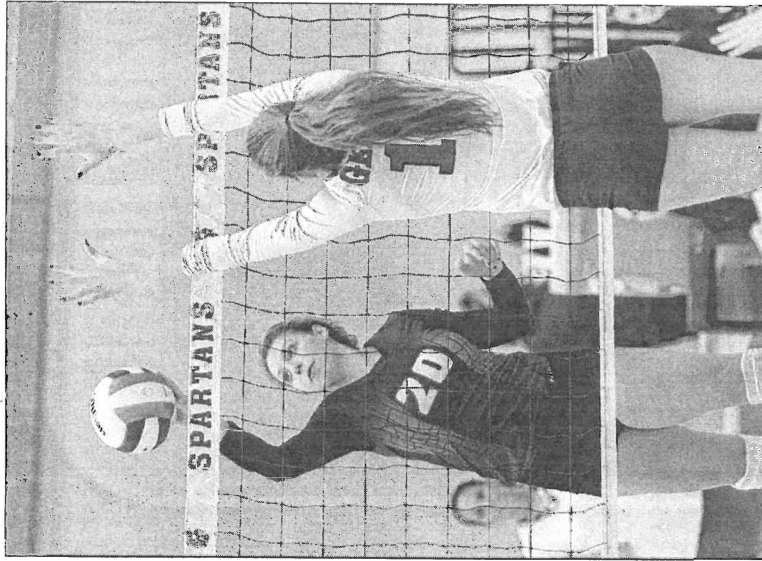
