Sees largest growth in PARCC scores in DuPage County

According to the latest newsletter issued by School District 88, Superintendent Dr. Scott Helton announced the results of the District's 2015-16 Illinois Report Card.

"At District 88, our mission is to work for the continuous improvement of student achievement," Helton said in his col-umn. "Each and every day, District 88 works to build posi-tive futures for its students inside the classroom and beyond. The results of the 2015-16 Illinois Report Card show the successes of District 88 and reflect the efforts of staff, Board of Education members, students, parents/guardians and community members."

Highlights of District 88's 2015-16 report card include:

 Graduation rate: District 88's graduation rate continues to be above the state level. District 88's four-year graduation rate is 86 percent, and the district's five-year graduation rate

Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and "I addressing for Assessment of Reduness for Conege and Careers (PARCC) exam: Helton said District 88 had the larg-est growth in PARCC scores in DuPage County, in terms of the percentage of students who approached, met or exceeded standards on the PARCC exam.

Helton continued to praise the staff, Board and community for the positive report.

"We had a student-participation rate of 98 percent on the ELA portion of the exam and 96 percent on the Math por-tion," he said. "The improvement in our scores truly is a testament to our staff, students, parents, guardians, Board of Eduation members and community members."

ISBE to offer SAT exam at no cost for juniors

The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) listened to
District 88's concerns regarding the PARCC exam, Helton
said, adding that the ISBE will now provide the College Board's SAT exam, including a writing component, at no cost to all public high school juniors this year. The ISBE said the SAT aligns with the Illinois Learning Standards and provides a college-reportable score for admissions purposes. It means Illinois high schools will transition from the ACT to the SAT as the state assessment.

How many freshmen will graduate?

Another component of the report card was how likely it is that the freshmen at a school will graduate in four years. ISBE reported that District 88 is above the state level in terms of the number of freshmen who are on track to graduate. District 88

is at 85.3 percent, compared to the state's 82.4 percent.



Wilmington (11-0) at IC Catholic Prep (11-0)

What: Quarterfinels of the Class 3A state football playoffs. Where: Lewis Stadium at Plunkett Athletic Complex, Elmhurst When: Likely Saturday, but check www.ihsa.org for official day and line.

Seeds: Wilmingson is the No. 4 seed on the top half of the Class 3A bracket; IC Catholic Prep is the No. 1 seed.

Last week: Wilmington 38, Byrou 18; IC Catholic Prep 65, Paxton-

Outlook: The top part of the Class 3A bracket has played out to seeds with only one exception (No. 6 Monticello is in the quarterfinals). Wilmington, located near folict, counces to Elmhurst without a loss on its record. The Wildcata, the No. 4 seed, won the Interstate Eight Conference Small Division. Wilmington had only two wins during the regular season against teams with winning records (one was 7-3, the other 5-4 that didn't make the playoffs) and two wins against teams that made the playoffs and finished 5-5. The Wildcats then defoured a 6-4 Chicago Corliss team in the first round of the playoffs and a Byron team that came in 10-0 to last week's game. Of note is Wilmington's first game of the year against St. Joe-Ogden. Wilmington won that contest at home 48-12. IC Catholic Prep ended St. Joe-Ogden's season last week in the playoffs with a 49-8 win in Elmhurst. The Knights continue to pile up points. They have scored 582 this season while giving up only 75 (7 shutouts and 9 games of 10 or fewer points allowed). Running back Jordan Rowell has rushed for 1,515 yards and 28 truchdowns this season. Quarterback Luke Ricobene has thrown for 2,022 yards and 24 touchdowns (only 5 interceptions). IC Catholic Prep's defense has created 33 turnovers (22 interceptions and 11 fumble recoveries). The Knights have committed only six turnovers on offense this season.

Up next: The winner heads to the semifinals to face either No. 2 Farmington (11-0) or No. 6 Monticello (11-0) in a game that will feature a pair of 12-0 teams. If IC Catholic Prep wins against Wilmington, it will hit the road regardless of semifinal opponent because both Farmington and Monticello have hosted twice and IC Catholic Prep will have hosted three playoff games. Farmington is a town west of Peoria, southeast of Galesburg and northeast of Macomb and is about 180 miles from Elmhurst. Monticello is 160 miles from Elmhurst and is located

east of Springfield.

Fenton boys cross-country team fights its way back to state

Bison enjoy strong postseason run

Fenton boys cross-country senior runner Anye Whyte said the Bison had something to prove this season.

"We were disappointed that we missed state by two points," he said. "Our big goal was to make it to state."

And that's exactly what the Bison did and along the way they won a sectional title.

"A big plus was winning that sectional title," said Whyte, who was part of a Bison's squad that competed in the Class 2A state finals meet this past weekend in Peoria.

More importantly, Whyte said the postseason success the team enjoyed was made possible through hard work and having its sights set on improved pack running.

proved pack running.

"Our goal was to improve our pack split and make sure we move up together," he said. "If we did that then we could be successful. It led to the sectional title. At the sectional our pack split (from the first through fifth scoring runners) was sub 20 seconds. Throughout the whole season we've been moving up together as a pack. Improving on the pack is

what helped us win."

Fenton improved throughout the season minus top runner Jose Vazquez-Perez, who missed a majority of the season with a stress fracture suffered this past spring during the track season. Vazquez-Perez returned at the conference meet and then logged matching eighth-place finishes at the regional and sectional meets.

Despite being injured Vazquez-Perez was a constant on the Fenton sidelines, helping and cheering on his teammates throughout the sea-

"Overall, our younger guys stepped up and that helped make up for some of the good guys we lost from last year's team," he said. "We work together as a team during workouts and races and we feed off each other during races. We help each other out when we need it."

Vazquez-Perez said it was evidentearly on that Fenton would field a strong team. "I saw that the team was going to make progress after our first meet where we did way better than the year before," he said. "And then after we ran at Elmwood Park, that's when I really saw we had the potential to win sectionals."

Vazquez-Perez admitted it was anything but fun sitting on the side-

lines for much of the season. "It was tough," he said. "I wanted to be out there, but I had to be smart with when I was going to come back. Now it feels great to qualify for state as a team my senior year."

Whyte said while Vazquez-Perez was not running during meets, his presence still was felt in a major way.

"Jose was with us the whole way," he said. "He supported us and we pushed ourselves even harder."

Whyte loves the team-first mentality that has been a constant throughout the fall.

"We are very close and supportive of each other," he said. "We all work very hard and push each other to work even harder. In order for us to be successful we had to do it as a team. Everybody on the team contributed to our success. We appreciate everybody and everything they do."

Whyte added there is an extreme sense of accomplishment in getting to run in Peoria in November.

"This is a huge accomplishment," he said. "It's always one of our big goals. To accomplish a big goal like this is very rewarding. We're very proud of it. We have a very good varsity team that is very close and has a lot of depth."

IC Catholic Prep football team going to quarter finals following blowout win

Points have not been hard to come by this season for the IC Catholic Prep football team.

For the Knights' opponents, not so much.

IC Catholic Prep vanquished another opponent this past Saturday via a 65-0 blowout win over Paxton-Buckley-Loda in a Class 3A second-round state playoff game at Plunkett Athletic Complex in Elmhurst.

The win puts the top-seeded Knights at 11-0 overall and sends them to the Class 3A quarterfinals likely to be held on Saturday at Plunkett Athletic Complex against Wilmington.

In the win against Paxton-Buck-ley-Loda, the Knights led 23-0 after the first quarter and 44-0 at half-time.

Quarterback Luke Ricobene went 17-for-20 for 290 yards and three touchdowns. He averaged 17.1 yards per completion and had a quarterback rating of 164.6.

IC Catholic Prep also gained 222 yards on the ground on just 16 carries (13.9 yards per carry),
Jordan Rowell ran only seven

Jordan Rowell ran only seven times, but for 119 yards and four touchdowns. He had an 82-yard run. Junior Daniel Gibbons ran two times for 55 yards and a touchdown, while Ricobene ran two times for 24 yards and sophomore Jacob Lytton, ran three times for 23 yards.

Matt Sutton caught four balls for 82 yards (53-yard long), while Brendan Russ had four catches for 67 yards. Rowell caught three passes for 49 yards. Khali Sanders caught three passes for 33 yards. Luke Calles caught two passes for 39 yards and Khalil Sanders caught two passes for 20 yards.

On defense, Chris Johnson had 10 tackles, while sophomore Kemon Reese had nine tackles. Khali Sanders had eight tackles. Matt Jordan, Lazerick Eatman, Jim Kenneally and Michael Johnson each had a tackle for loss. Jordan had a quarterback sack for nine yards. Sean Hipskind returned an inte

Sean Hipskind returned an interception 25 yards for a touchdown. Sutton also had an interception. Eatman and Rowell each had a pass

deflection. Sam Buffo kicked off eight times for 507 yards and had three touchbacks.

Khali Sanders, Gibbons, Sutton and Khalil Sanders each had a touchdown to go with Hipskind's interception return for a score and Rowell's four rushing touchdowns. Russ and Rowell each scored a two-point conversion.

Willowbrook football team headed to state quarterfinals after beating Glenbrook North

Warriors to host East St. Louis in next round

This year's Willowbrook football team is going to a place where few other teams in program history have been.

The Warriors recorded a 49-21 victory over Glenbrook North in a Class 7A second-round state playoff game held in Villa Park.

The win moves the Warriors to the Class 7A state quarterfinals on Saturday at home once again vs. East St. Louis, which edged Glenbard North 32-28 near St. Louis this past Saturday. Willowbrook improved to 8-3

Willowbrook improved to 8-with the victory.

This is only the fourth time in school history a Willowbrook team has made it to the third round of the state football playoffs and the first time since 1990. That team finished the year 9-3. The 1974 and 1975 Warriors teams also won their first two playoff games. The 1974 team went 10-2, while the '75 team went 11-1, meaning it owns the program's only 9-0 undefeated regular season.

In the win against Glenbrook

North, Willowbrook jumped out a 35-0 lead and went into halftime up 42-7.

Running back Jack Jessen scored three touchdowns, while Chris Diaz had two touchdowns. Quarterback MJ Ranieri had two touchdowns.

Saturday's game against East St. Louis (11-0) will kick off at 2 p.m. at Willowbrook. Gates open at 12:30 p.m.

The winner of the East St. Louis-Willowbrook game will face either Rolling Meadows (11-0) or Benet Academy (9-2) in the state semifinals

School District 4 working on contract with teachers

On November 3, 2016, the Addison School District 4 Board of Education and the Addison Teachers' Association (ATA) exchanged last and final offers as part of the ongoing efforts to successfully negotiate contract for District 4 teachers. The Board is not encouraged.

Without disclosing all of the details of the Board offer, the Board's salary offer includes a pay increase of 4% for all ATA members in the first year of the contract, a pay increase of 3.5% for all ATA members in the second year of the contract, and a pay increase of 3.5% for all ATA members in the third year of the contract. These offered pay increases far exceed the current and anticipated rate of inflation. The Board believes that the pay increases being offered are far greater than the guaranteed pay increases that most will receive for the next three years

The teachers have made little or no movement in their po-sitions since May 19, 2016, even though federal negotiators were brought into the bargaining process in August. point of view by distributing negotiations flyers to community members while handing out candy to children at the October 28, 2016 community 'Trunk or Treat" event.

"We want to negotiate a fair contract for our teachers," said Board Negotiations Chair Jim Towns, "but we need to balance their needs against our future priorities and revenue -which are often unpredict-

Playoff fever in Villa Park; **Warriors storm into Class 7A quarterfinals**

The Willowbrook football team played its first post-season home game since 1994 on Saturday, when it squared off against Glenbrook North in an IHSA Class 7A second-round playoff game. The Warriors routed the visiting Spartans 49-21.

Willowbrook will play another post-season game in Villa Park this Saturday. The Warriors, whose record stands at 8-3, will take on undefeated East St. Louis (11-0) in a quarterfinal contest that's scheduled to begin at 2 p.m.

Willowbrook opened the 2016 post-season with a 34-13 first-round win at Quincy on Oct. 29. The Warriors, who scored 28 points in the The Willowbrook football team played its

29. The Warriors, who scored 28 points in the game's last five minutes, earned their school's first playoff victory since 1990. Willowbrook on two games in the Class 5A level of the 1990 playoffs.

Saturday's second-round game against Glenbrook North marked the Warriors' third playoff meeting with the Spartans. The two teams also tangled in the 1974 and 2000 playoffs Glenbrook North won both of the first two

Willowbrook raced to a 35-0 first-half lead in Saturday's meeting with the Spartans, who finished their season with a 9-2 record. The Warriors held a 42-7 advantage at halftime. Junior Jack Jessen provided three touchdown runs for the Warriors in the opening half. Junior Chris Diaz delivered a pair of touchdown runs, including a 12-yard third-quarter score that accounted for the team's seventh touchdown of the day.

Senior quarterback M.J. Ranieri threw firsthalf touchdown passes to senior receivers Freddie Clay and Jonathan Kelso.

Warriors steamroll Glenbrook North to earn a trip to the state quarterfinals

played its first home playoff game in 22 years on Saturday. The Warriors delivered nearly flawless execution in their IHSA Class 7A second-round game against Glenbrook North, over-whelming the visiting Spartans 49-21 on a warm and sun-filled afternoon in

Villa Park.
The Warriors, who carned their first post-season win in 26 years when they rallied for a 34-13 victory at Quincy on Oct. 29, improved their overall season record to 8-3 with Saturday's home-field triumph.

Willowbrook's offense was virtually unstoppable in the first half, scoring touchdowns on the team's first five possessions to build a 35-0 lead in the second quarter. The Warriors held a 42-7 advantage at halftime. Willow-brook's third-quarter touchdown and extra-point kick produced a 49-7 lead and triggered a running clock, which is initiated when a second-half lead reaches at least 40 points. Glenbrook North, which finished the season with a 9-2 record, scored a pair of touch-downs in the closing minutes.

The victory propelled Willow-brook into the Class 7A quarterfinals. The Warriors will return to their home field for this weekend's battle against East St. Louis. The undefeated Flyers (11-0) earned their berth in the quarterfinals with a dramatic 32-28 win over Glenbard North on Saturday. East St. Louis scored the winning touchdown—a 23-yard touchdown pass play—with three seconds left in


The winner of the battle between Willowbrook and East St. Louis will face either Rolling Meadows or Benet Academy in a Class 7A semifinal matchup.



"One of the hard things to do in football is step back and enjoy the moment," said Hildreth after the second-round win over the Spartans.


"You're always looking forward to the next game. There are only eight teams left, and we're one of them. I don't know if it's sunk in at all.'

Prairie Ridge puts end to Montini's streak

LOMBARD - An impressive streak that is unlikely to be matched came to an end for Montini's football team

The Broncos, who played in seven straight championship games, were knocked out of the Class 6A playoffs with a 51-24 loss against Prairie Ridge, a team they topped in a state semifinal last year on their way to a title.




