

The District 45 Board of Education approved the appointment of new principals at two district schools for the 2017-18 school year. Regina Leeberg will be the next principal at Ardmore Elementary School, while Jill Amrhein will be the next principal at Jackson Middle School.

The board approved both appointments at its Jan. 17 regular meeting. Leeberg and Amrhein

will begin their new positions on July 1.

Leeberg is currently the principal at Meadowville Elementary School in Woodridge. According to a news release provided by School

New principals

The District 45 Board of Education approved the appointment of new principals at two Vilia Park schools during last week's regular meeting. Regins Leeterg (above left) will be the next principal of Ardmore Elamentary School, located at 225 S. Harvard Ave. Jill Amrhein (above right) will be the next principal at Jackson Middle School, located at 301 W. Jackson St. Leeterg and Amrhein will begin their respective positions prior to the start of the 2017-18 school year. Both appointments will be effective on July 1.

District 45, the Meadowville Elementary School's Partnership for Assessment of Readi-ness for College and Careers (PARCC) scores have increased by 13 percent in English Language Arts and 11 percent in mathematics since Leeberg became the school's principal in 2013. The Woodridge School also received top scores in the state on the 2015 Illinois 5Essentials Sur-

District 45's news release also noted that while serving as the principal of Meadowville Elementary School, Leeberg completed pro-fessional development at the Harvard Graduate School of Education and created a Genius Hour program that was presented at the Illinois Reading Council Annual Conference.

Before becoming the principal of the Woodridge school, Leeberg was the director of literacy and social studies for PreK-5 in Valley View District 365U in Romeoville. She also served as an instructional coach in Lisle Community Unit School District 202. She began her career in education as a first-grade teacher at the district in Lisle.

Leeberg earned a bachelor's degree in ele nentary education from Benedictine University in Lisle, which was formerly known as Illinois Benedictine College. She holds a master's degree in reading from Northern Illinois University in DeKalb, and a master's degree in leadership and administration from North Central College in Naperville.

Leeberg will replace current Ardmore Principal Michele Cummins, who is retiring at the end of the 2016-17 school year.

Amrhein has been the assistant principal at Ammen has been the assistant principal at Hadley Junior High School in Glen Ellyn since August 2011. According to District 45's news release, Amrhein was instrumental in leading the school's English as a Second Language (ESL) program. Under her leadership of the ESL program, the school implemented an after-school tutoring club in conjunction with the Glen Ellyn Children's Resource Center.

Amrhein served as Hadley's parent-teacher advisory committee and took the role of lead administrator for the school's mental health committee. Before becoming the assistant principal at Hadley, Amrhein taught seventh- and eighth-grade mathematics at the Glen Ellyn school, and at Heritage Middle School in Ber-

Amrhein earned a bachelor of arts degree in elementary education from the University of Il-linois at Chicago, a master of science in special education from Dominican University, River Forest, and a master of arts in school leadership

from Concordia University, River Forest.
Former Jackson Principal Renee Reynolds moved to a position in another district shortly before the beginning of the current school year. Jackson has had two interim principals while the board conducted a search for the school's next principal.

Strong finish helps Warriors pull away from Glenbard East

Saturday's boys basketball game between Willowbrook and Glenbard East featured two teams in the mid-dle of extremely different seasons. Willowbrook, which entered the game with only one loss, has found a way to win a bunch of close decisions. Glenbard East, on the other hand, has wound up on the losing end of numerous battles. The Rams entered the contest against their Villa

Park rival with only one victory.

Glenbard East hung right with Willowbrook through three quarters, but the Warriors unleashed a 16-0 run in the fourth quarter on their way a 48-33 win in Lombard. Willowbrook, which extended its winning streak to 11 games, im-

proved its overall season record to 18-1 with the non-conference victory. Glenbard East's overall record fell to 1-19 after losing the fourth and final game of its own one-day "When Sides Collide" event. Jacobs beat Hillcrest in the first game. Whitney Young beat Joliet West in the sec-ond contest, while Naperville North earned an overtime win over Evan-

Two players who began their seasons this month figured prominently in the neighborhood rivalry, which featured boisterous student sections from both sides. Glenbard East junior James Peterkin scored 17 of his team's 24 first-half points. Willow-brook senior Iman Reynolds provid-ed a team-leading 14 points and 10 rebounds for the winning Warriors. Both players became eligible to play

Reynolds connected on three attempts from 3-point range during the second half. Those three shots equaled Glenbard East's entire of fensive output in the half. The Rams scored six points in the third quarter. They went scoreless for nearly ter. They went scoreless for nearly the entire fourth period, producing their only points of the quarter on a 3-point shot from junior Korvante Davis in the game's closing seconds. Peterkin, who made a pair of 3-point shots in the first half, helped

Glenbard East to leads of 10-7 after one quarter and 24-18 at halftime. The Rams did not score in the first four minutes of the third quarter, until junior Anthony Janega made two free throws to give his team a 26-22 lead. Moments later, Reynolds sank a 3-point shot moments later to cut the Rams' lead to 26-25.

Reynolds made a driving basket to tie the score at 27-27. Willowbrook junior Sikander Zafar gave the War-riors their first lead of the night-a 29-27 edge—when he sank two free throws with 2:33 left in the period. About 30 seconds later, Reynolds grabbed an offensive rebound, drib-bled the ball outside the 3-point arc, and drilled a long-range shot to push Willowbrook's lead to 32-27.

Glenbard East freshman Alijah Nelson made a 3-point shot with about one minute to play in the period to account for the final points of the quarter and cut the Warriors' lead

Willowbrook proceeded to reel off 16 straight points, beginning with a 3-point shot from junior Marshawn Phillips at the beginning of the final period. A 3-pointer from Reynolds with about 4:30 to play extended the lead to 39-30. Senior Freddie Clay contributed to the Warriors' run with four straight points—a pair of free throws and a driving layup to move the advantage to 44-30. Junior Ethan Schuemer delighted Willowbrook fans with a breakaway dunk in the game's final minute

"Willowbrook's got a great team, said Glenbard East coach Scott Mill-er, who noted the Warriors and Rams had not faced each other in the last few years. "I thought we battled for almost three quarters. I don't know if we ran out of gas. We couldn't put the ball in the basket in the fourth quarter. I'm really proud of our guys. We're getting better."

One night before beating the Rams, the Warriors earned an important West Suburban Conference victory over Downers Grove South. Willowbrook edged the visiting Mustangs 56-53 in Villa Park. The Warriors completed the first half of their conference schedule with the win, which raised their mark to 5-1. Willowbrook's only loss of the season was a conference setback at Hinsdale South on Dec. 16. The Warriors and Hornets will play their second conference tilt of the season on Feb.







District 88 refinances bonds Projects \$10.6 million savings to taxpayers

Taking advantage of favorable interest rates, School District 88 (Addison Trail H.S. in Addison and WIllowbrook H.S. in Villa Park) has refinanced \$80 million of bonds. According to District 88 Chief Financial Officer Ed Hoster, the refinancing will save taxpayers about \$10.6 million in repayment interest.

"That refinancing of \$80 million of bonds (which was approved by the District 88 Board of Education on Dec. 19) will save the district and taxpayers \$10.6 million throughout the remaining 10-year bond term and future tax levies." said Hoster in a re-

The savings to taxpayers amounts to approximately \$63 per property owner in 2016, based on \$300,000

assessed value of their property. The savings will be about \$33 for each year thereafter throughout 2028. The bonds were approved by voters in the 'Building The Future' referendum and were initially issued with a 4.95% interest rate. The District refinanced the bonds at 2.714%

Hoster also announced that District 88 recently received an Aa1 rating by Moody's Investors Service. This is the second highest possible rating and is used to gauge lending and other decisions by investors, including potential interest rates for bond issues.






Author, American studies scholar to give MLK lecture

Jack Jessen can do it all.

No matter the sport, the Willowbrook 182-pound junior is a star.

A two-time state medalist and a state-title contender this season, Jessen has experienced proof success both on the wrestling mat and the football field.

"It's kind of rare to excel at both sports the way he does," said Willowbrook wrestling coach Brandon Murphy, who's also on the Willowbrook football chain gang. "There aren't too many who are all-state in multiple sports like he is."

An all-state running back and linebacker for the Warriors, Jessen ran for 1,671 yards and 2 touchdowns last fall as he helped the squad to the Class 7A quarterfinals.

Once he was done, he turned his attention to wrestling and hasn't lost yet.

"The reason I feel that I've been successful in football is because of wrestling," said Jessen, two-year starter in football. "Wrestling has gotten me to the point where it helps me tremendously in football. It teaches you balance, the strength of the legs, staying low and I power. There's also endurance and speed. It plays a big role."

Wrestling, however, has his heart.

Already verbally committed to wrestle at Northwestern University, Jessen says he's a wrestle guy.

His dominate season so far has showed that.

After he went 100-6 in his first two high school seasons, Jessen is currently 41-0 and ranke 2 in the current Illinois Matmen GO EARN IT Wrestling Apparel Class 3A 182-pound ranking

"We talk about trying to be the best in the county and working toward that because if you'r best in the country you're going to be the best in the state," Murphy said. "Our goal is just! better and better, but I know in the back of his mind he's pushing himself and he's envision himself being a state champion and at the top of the podium this year."

It's a spot he's come painfully close to twice.

Two years ago as a 170-pound freshman, Jessen lost in the state title match and, last year sophomore, he fell in the state semifinal and settled for third.

"I don't really feel much pressure to win a title this year, but rather it's a want," Jessen said want to get back there, and I know I can win it."

That quest begins Saturday in the Class 3A Lyons Regional.

"When you see Jack wrestle, he's like a machine," said Murphy, who's coached Jessen since was a young kid. "The wheels are always spinning. He rarely gets tired, never complains an goes to work every day."

A wrestling junkie, opponents haven't always loved facing him.

In a dominate season this winter, Jessen has only gone the distance a handful of times and a quest to finish with 1,000 career takedowns as he is currently in the 700s with this year's postseason and next year to go.

"My offense is really where I break people and where I score points," Jessen said. "I feel as as I stay on offense that I can do really well. I try to force the action every second of the m I'm always on my opponent. If they're taking a break, I'm on them. In between whistles, I' finding ways to try to score more points."

Jessen, who spent even more time in the weight room during the offseason, has also exper plenty of offseason success as he placed fourth in Fargo in both Junior Greco and Junior Fre last year and has also represented Illinois in offseason duals.

"Freestyle and Greco have definitely helped me in Folkstyle," Jessen said. "I get so many m matches in so many different styles than a lot of guys. Freestyle and Greco styles give me different perspective, tools and techniques that I've been able to use in Folkstyle."

Jessen is hoping all the work – during the season and the offseason – translates into his ult goal of winning a state title.

"I think it'd be the greatest feeling in the world," Jessen said. "When I was in youth wrestlir would go to state and watch all the high school wrestlers compete and, from that first mom always wanted to be down there, win a state title and have that moment. I've come so clos twice that I'm hungry to get it."
