





Eleven wrestlers from area schools earned berths in the IHSA Class 3A individual state meet with their topfour finishes at the Downers Grove North Sectional.
Seven Montini wrestlers will join two athletes from

both Willowbrook and Glenbard East to compete in the state meet, which begins today at the State Farm Center in Champaign. The top four finishers in each weight class at the sectional secured state-meet berths.

Willowbrook junior Jack Jessen maintained his perfect season record by winning three straight matches and claiming the title in the sectional's 182-pound weight class. Jessen pinned Montini sophomore Pete Christensen in the first period of Saturday's sectional final. Jessen improved his overall season record to 47-0 with his three sectional victories

As a freshman, Jessen claimed second place in the 170-pound division at the state meet. One year ago, he

placed third in the 182-pound class in Champaign.
"I've always wanted that high school championship, ever since I was a little kid," said Jessen after winning the sectional title on Saturday. "Being so close and not getting there has definitely motivated me."

Jessen added that he feels comfortable wrestling in

Champaign, and he won't alter his game plan for any "I face the guy who they put in front of me," he

said. "It's a matter of execution. I go out there and I wrestle the match the way I want to wrestle. I don't let

my opponent dictate the match."
Senior Dominic Ranieri of Willowbrook earned his first state-meet berth by battling to a third-place finish

to State of the configuration of the configuration

in the third-place match.

"It's an honor to be moving on to state," said Ranieri, who improved his season record to 41-11 with his sectional performance. "It's so amazing to be able to do this."

Ranieri had not competed in a sectional until this season. He narrowly missed a sectional berth as a sophomore. He suffered an injury late last season and

was unable to wrestle in the post-season.
"I had nothing else to lose," said Ranieri of his mindset after losing his opening match at the sectional. "I just came back and dominated."

Glenbard East seniors Scott Szabo and Brandon Raines qualified for the individual state meet by carning fourth-place finishes in their respective weight classes. Szabo placed fourth in the 138-pound level, while Raines finished fourth in the 285-pound division. Szabo will enter the state meet with an overall season record of 32-8, while Raines heads to Champaign with a 38-7 record.

Four Montini wrestlers won sectional championships at Downers Grove North. The Broncos' sectional winners included freshman Dylan Ragusin (106 pounds), junior Real Woods (126), freshman Fidel Mayora (132) and junior Will Lewan (145). Ragusin and Mayora will both head to the state meet with season records of 40-3, Woods finished the sectional with a 32-2 record, while Lewan improved to 36-2 with his sectional victory.

Christensen advanced to the state meet with his second-place finish behind Jessen in the 182-pound division, while junior Joey Melendez (113) and sophomore Matt Ortiz (152) earned state-meet trips for the Broncos with third-place finishes at the sectional.

Could there actually be good news from Springfield?

Positive efforts are taking place

It's true - when the constant discussion of the state's budget impasse gets all the news, the good news gets swept under the rug. But there is good news to report, according to Constance Beard, director of the IIlinois Department of Revenue who discussed the effort to transform state government.

The Grand Bargain is an effort in the Senate to get rid of the logjam, create jobs and restrain spending," she told those who attended the Illi-nois Chamber of Commerce Legislative Summit on Wednesday, Feb. 8. "Rauner's administration has improved things for the better. We're not getting out the good news."

There are five areas which have

seen improvement, Beard said: ERP/ SAP agency conversion; a new Department of Innovation and Technology; state agency administrative hearing reform; "Cutting Red Tape;" and lean management training and implementation.

The Enterprise Resource Project (ERP) was prompted when Governor Rauner recognized that all state agencies were doing things differently. His first act was hiring a technology expert who said the state was about 40 years behind in its technology and software. Some agencies were still using software from the late 1960s and 1970s. Once everything was automated and done digitally, they were able to consolidate 75% of outdated systems into one that covers all agencies state-wide.

It allowed us to replace more Beard 120 redundancies," said. "It will save between \$52- and \$193-million a year."

"There were people working, but still collecting unemployment," she said. "[Correcting] that is saving \$17 million. Consolidated registration and reporting is working well for business tax payers, too. You register just once and don't have to fill out separate forms."

Centralized administrative hear-

Centralized administrative hearings was a program developed after the system in place was taking too long when people had disputes with a state agency.

Beard said the effort has eliminat-

Beard said the effort has eliminated case backlogs, reduced resolution time, offered more transparency for taxpayers and created a consistency between state agencies in administrative processes.

"All cases are being resolved in a much more timely manner." she said.

much more timely manner," she said. By Executive Order in 2016, Rauner called on all agencies to "Cut the Red Tape" and perform comprehensive reviews of their own rules and regulations and remove anything that is redundant, outdated, repetitive, unnecessary, confusing or harmful. The Illinois Competitiveness Council even offers an online portal for the public to share ideas to simplify or reduce regulations, Beard said.

"It is our goal to be more responsive to people," she said.

And with the new "Lean Manage-

And with the new "Lean Management" training, there is further elimination of items that waste time, effort or money. Each agency was asked to identify each step in their processes and then revise and remove that which holds no value to the agency or to the public.

"There are 67 teams already reviewing operations to focus on continued improvement, such as using less paper," she said. "Now, an issue comes in electronically, it's immediately 'triaged' to the right place and it is made viewable to taxpayers. There's no [spending] involved, just common sense."

Beard is glad things are moving forward in a positive way. "It's embarrassing to say we still

"It's embarrassing to say we still do it the old-fashioned way," she said. "It's been fun to watch the various teams get involved and go ahead and it's done."

During Q&A, someone asked about taxing Internet sales, but Beard was doubtful that would happen.

"Internet online sales may seem to be impacting local dollars," she said. "But many pay taxes where they have distribution centers, including Illinois"

He talked about licensing as well. "In terms of basic entrepreneurial businesses, the state has 2 million," Fisher said. "But one in three

requires a permission slip from the government to keep their jobs. There may be 16,000 more jobs but a rise of 300% more regulation. If you want to braid hair, be an interior decorator or a landscaper, you need [certification] and there are 470 others."

Fisher reminded the audience about the funeral director who was caught a few years ago improperly disposing of bodies. He got his license revoked but continued to do it.

"Government oversight through licensing is a way of delivering value to customers that people can rely on," he said. The bright news is that the state is working on ways to expedite the licensing process after Gov. Rauner ordered an overview of all agencies who are responsible for licensing with a goal of reducing it by 25%.

Asked if the state could file bankruptcy, Fisher said no. Cities can but states cannot.

"We are required to keep up our pension liabilities, which will keep pushing us deeper and deeper in debt," he said. "[Without reform] all other spending and services won't happen."

Asked for a best case scenario, Fisher said if workers compensation gets under control, and we keep things going forward, then the state can grow. Illinois still has one of the lowest rates of state income tax, but we're losing 1000 jobs a year, he said

"Comprehensive tax reform at the federal level needs to take place then we could see growth across the country," Fisher said, "but it hasn't been comprehense in the property of the property

done since Reagan was in office."

He did commend the local government consolidation that has taken place recently.

"We still have I believe 6,500 units of government, which is twice as much as the next closest state," Fisher said. "Some special assessment districts have been eliminated."



Learning about lungs at Army Trail

At Army Trail School, 3rd and 5th grade students spent their physical education class learning about respiration from Respiratory Therapist Kimberly Stafford. She spoke to the students about how the lungs work with the heart to provide oxygen-rich blood to the body. The students enjoyed having the opportunity to use a stethoscope to hear the difference in breathing and heart rate before and after physical exertion.

According to physical education teacher Gale Stafford, the elementary PE teachers now have to teach health because of changes made at the state

"This semester we teach the body systems," said Stafford, "Last week I taught the respiratory system to all the students. One day last week I arranged to have my daughter, Kim Stafford, come in to do a presentation to my classes that I had that day."

Kimberly is a respiratory therapist at Advocate Children's Hospital in Oak Lawn. The students watched a short video then Kim spoke to them about the respiratory system and how it works. She also talked about issues such as asthma. She brought in some respiratory equipment and showed the students what would happen if they had to go to the hospital and needed help breathing.

Kim demonstrated to the students how a doctor uses a stethoscope and showed them how to listen to their own lungs. Then the students were given stethoscopes to listen to each other's lungs and breathing. After doing exercise they listened again to compare the difference.

Students in Mrs. Scimeca, Ms. Carroccio, Mrs. Rozo and Mrs. Kardadi's classes participated in the presentation and activities.

At the Lyons Township regional the previous week, Ranieri was the No. 4 seed and finished third to move on to the sectional.

Sectional tournaments favor regional champs and award them firstround byes, and the road to state for wrestlers who fall in the first round of the sectional is arduous. Ranieri survived the test.

"It was just all mental and physical. I wouldn't say I'm a big 132-pounder, I'm about average size. A lot of the kids are strong, and it's just so amazing to be able to do this," Ranieri said.

This was the first sectional tournament for Ranieri, who started wrestling when he got to high school. He was on the freshman team his first year, made the varsity postseason lineup as a sophomore and finished fourth at the regional, and was injured before last year's regional tourney.

"Just making it downstate for the first time – it's my senior year, I had nothing else to lose," Ranieri said.

Ranieri had a good resource to ask what the state experience is like in junior teammate Jack Jessen.

Jessen locked up his third state berth with a 20-8 major decision win in a 182-pound semifinal at the sectional. He claimed the title with a pin at the 1:48 mark of the final.

Jessen entered the state tournament

VILLA PARK - After being academically ineligible for nearly two years, Willowbrook senior Iman Reynolds finally returned to the basketball court last month.

The 6-foot-4 guard was motivated by the chance to play with a team that was making history.

"I missed the end of my sophomore year and my whole junior year and I came back because I wanted to play with these guys," Reynolds said. "It's been great being able to play with these guys, not just any people. It's a great group that I feel like can make a strong run in the playoffs."

The Warriors have made a tremendous run through the regular season. They beat Morton 52-39 in West Sub-

urban Gold action Feb. 10 for their Schuemer said. "Willowbrook basket-23rd victory, tying the school record set in 1969-70. The Warriors then set the record for wins with a 52-48 victory against WSG foe Leyden on Feb. 14.

"He's a bigger guard and he's a lefty. He can handle the ball, so I can put him at the point, and I can put him on the perimeter, so it's a different dimension or our team.

Revnolds still defers to Schuemer, who has been amazingly consistent all year. Schuemer tallied 16 points - eight in each half - to go with five rebounds. two steals and two blocks. He scored four straight points in the fourth quarter during a 9-4 run that came after Morton had pulled within 7.

"My role is to keep my guys together," Reynolds said. "When 'Shue' is down, I pick him up. We look to Shue a lot. He's a junior, but he's our leader. He carries most of the load. I help him out when I can.'
