Police investigate burglary at Villa Park auto dealership

Five vehicles stolen; four recovered as of Feb. 20

The Villa Park Police Department is investigating the Feb. 13 theft of five vehicles from Lucky Motors, lo-cated at 225 W. Roosevelt Road.

At least five suspects reportedly entered the business at about 9:15 p.m. and removed five vehicles from the service area. Three of the five vehicles were recovered within less than 24 hours of the incident. Another one of the stolen vehicles was recovered on Feb. 20.

According to Chuck Pickerill, who manages the repair shop at Lucky Motors, video surveillance footage shows the suspects enter-ing the business at about 9:15 p.m. Pickerill said the business normally closes at 8 p.m. on weeknights. He said employees had left the business by about 8:45 p.m. on the night of the burglary.
"You can tell from the video how

organized they were," said Picker-ill of the suspects, who entered the business through an overhead door in the service area. "It was very orchestrated "

Pickerill said the five suspects on the surveillance video were wearing gloves and hooded sweatshirts. He noted that the suspects were only inside the business for about 10 min-

"An alarm went off, but they [the suspects] were in and out so fast,' said Pickerill.

According to information provided by the Villa Park Police Department, the suspects searched the interior of the dealership for keys before taking the vehicles. Pickerill noted that all of the stolen vehicles were removed from the service area. He said the keys to the vehicles lo-cated in the showroom are stored in

a locked location.

The stolen vehicles included a Volvo, a Mercedez-Benz, a Bentley, a Jaguar and a Honda Accord. Pickerill said the five vehicles have a total estimated value of about \$250,000.

According to Pickerill, the Volvo

was recovered on Roosevelt Road in Oakbrook Terrace. The Mercedez-Benz and Bentley were both recovered in Chicago. Those three vehicles were all located by the afternoon of Feb. 14. On Feb. 20, police in Chicago recovered the stolen Jaguar, leaving the Honda Accord as

the only missing vehicle.

The vehicle used in the Feb. 13 burglary at Lucky Motors was re-

portedly the same vehicle used in at least one other recent burglary at a Village to hold two sales-tax

referendum meetings in March hold a pair of community outreach meetings regarding the sales-tax referendum on the ballot in the April 4 election. The meetings will take place Tuesday, March 7, and Thurs-day, March 23. Both meetings will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the Iowa Community Center, 338 N. Iowa Ave.

The referendum question in the upcoming election asks voters if they want to approve an increase in the village's sales tax, from 7.5 to 8 percent. If approved, the increase would reportedly produce about \$1.5 million annually for the village. That money would be used to pay for infrastructure projects, including the installation of water

mains and storm sewers.

The question as it will appear on the ballot in the April 4 election

"Shall the Village of Villa Park increase the Village's Non-Home Rule Municipal Retailers' Occupation Tax and Non-Home Rule Municipal Service Occupation Tax (commonly referred to as a "municipal sale tax") from one half of one percent (5%) to one percent (1.0%) for expenditure on public infrastructure, including the installation, replacement, and maintenance of sanitary sewer, storm sewer and water main systems, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of Sections 8-11-1.3 and 8-11-1.4 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.3 and 65 ILCS 5/8-11-1.4)?"


Villa Park voters rejected a similar proposal in the election of Nov. 8, 2016. According to the results from the DuPage County Election Commission, the proposal failed by a margin of about 51.7 percent to 48.3 percent, with 4,818 "No" votes and 4.498 "Yes" votes

Village voters also turned down similar proposals in the elections of February 2010 and November 2010.

Villa Park's sales-tax rate dropped from 7.75 percent to 7.5 percent on June 1, 2016. The decrease was a re sult of the expiration of the DuPage Water Commission sales tax.

Villa Park's neighboring communities, including Addison, Lombard, Elmhurst and Oakbrook Terrace, all have a current sales-tax rate of

In November 2014, Villa Park voters approved a referendum to borrow up to \$23 million to pay for road improvements. Those funds can only be used to pay specifically for road work and cannot be directed to fund related underground

Villa Park residents who receive refuse collection on Fridays will have their waste collection day change to Thursdays, starting March 2. The final Friday collection will take place this week, on Feb. 24.

According to information provided by the Village of Villa Park, affected residents have received a notice in the mail, as well as remind-er stickers, informing them of the schedule

Village President Deborah Bullwinkel noted during the Feb. 13 village board meeting that the change is a result of the village's refuse collector—Roy Strom—acquiring another municipal client for refuse pickup.

Collection material should be curbside by 6

ComEd performs tree trimming in Villa Park; about 20 trees removed

ComEd will perform village-wide tree trimming and vegetation management in Villa Park this year. The maintenance program, which began in February, will help to ensure the re-liability of the electrical system. According to ComEd, vegetation contact with ComEd equipment is a leading cause of outages.

Large trees and branches can cause extended power outages when they come into contact with overhead power lines, states ComEd, which has notified affected property owners of its maintenance program.

Villa Park Village Manager Rich Keehner stated during the Feb. 13 village board meeting that ComEd hired a third party to conduct the tree trimming. Keehner said that about 20 trees would be removed in the area of the Illinois Prairie Path from Monterey Avenue westward to the area near the Rugaard Gazebo, which is located just west of Ardmore Avenue. Keehner said that ComEd did not have a tree replace-ment program in place for the removed trees, but that it might plan some type of replacement around Arbor Day—April 28.

ComEd noted that vegetation management can cause concern for residents because trees

located near electrical wires are trimmed significantly and can occasionally require remov-al. ComEd has contracted with qualified in-line clearance workers to perform the tree pruning. Supervisors and general foremen will be in close contact with the crews to ensure the work is performed properly.









Willowbrook junior Jack Jessen wound up one win short of a state title at the IHSA Class 3A individual state meet, which concluded on Saturday at the State Farm Center in Champaign. Jessen made it to the 182-pound championship match with three victories in Champaign. Jessen, who entered the title contest with a perfect 50-0 season record, lost a 13-3 major decision to Marian Catholic senior Kordell Norfleet in the final. Norfleet finished the season with an unblemished 43-0 record.

Jessen has now earned two second-place finishes at the individual state meet. As a freshman, he placed second in the 170-pound division. As

Senior Dominic Ranieri of Willowbrook wrestled three matches at this year's state meet, which began Feb. 16 and continued through Saturday. Ranieri won his first match in Champaign before losing his next two contests. He finished the season with an overall record of 42-13.

One of the team's cap finishes came from the 200-yard freestyle relay foursome of Evan Zimmerman, Jacob Grygo, Jack Burns and Michael Strycharz.

The four boys completed the event in a fifth-place time of 1 minute, 32.01

The 400-yard freestyle relay quartet of Grygo, Jack Wentworth, Stry-charz and Jack Burns posted a sev-

enth-place time of 3:26.25.
Zimmerman joined Lucas Walsh, Jake Roucka and Grygo to earn an eighth-place finish in the 200-yard medley relay. The four boys posted a finishing time of 1:47.68.

The team of Warriors and Blazers tapered their training in an attempt to swim their best times of the season at the sectional. Some of their



Not quite alone at the top; Warriors earn a share of conference title

A three-way tie for first You're going to have a tough game no matter what There are no easy games

The Willowbrook boys basketball team had a chance to earn sole possession of the West Suburban Gold Conference championship with a victory at Downers Grove South on Friday night. The Warriors and Mustangs waged an even battle into the middle of the fourth quarter of the finale of the conference season. Downers Grove South pulled away in the closing minutes to earn a 58-48 victory, and a share of the West Suburban Gold title.

Willowbrook, Downers Grove South and Hinsdale South all finished the conference season with identical 9-3 records. Hinsdale South earned a share of the championship with Friday's victory over Proviso East.

Friday's loss gave the Warriors an overall record of 24-3. The 2016-17 team set a new program mark for victories in a season when it posted a 52-48 conference win at Leyden on Feb. 14.

Feb. 14.
Willowbrook will finish its regular season with this week's crossover game against an opponent from the West Suburban Silver Conference. The Warriors will open the IHSA Class 4A playoffs with a March 1 game against either Addison Trail or Waubonsie Valley at the Batavia Regional. If the Warriors win, they will play in a regional championship game on March 3. Winning the regional would propel Willowbrook to a semifinal game at the Hinsdale Central Sectional. The Warriors are the

sectional's No. 5 seed.

Willowbrook held a 9-8 lead over Downers Grove South at the end of the first quarter. The teams were tied at 22-22 late in the second quarter, but a 3-point basket and a 2-point field goal from sophomore Matas Masys gave the Warriors a 27-22 lead. The Mustangs drained a 3-point shot at the end of the first half to cut the Warriors' halftime lead to 27-25.

Junior Ethan Schuemer made a midrange shot as the third quarter expired to give Willowbrook a 39-38 lead with eight minutes to play.

The Mustangs scored the first four points of the final period to take a 42-39 lead. Willowbrook responded with four straight points—a basket from senior Iman Reynolds and a pair of free throws from senior Freddie Clay. The two free throws from Clay handed Willowbrook a 43-42 lead with 5:01 to play.

The Mustangs then made two 3-point shots

The Mustangs then made two 3-point shots during the next two minutes to seize a 48-43 lead. Schuemer made one free throw to drop the lead to 48-44 with 2:43 to play, but Downers Grove South then scored four straight



For starters, the Warriors set a new program record for wins in a season with 24, breaking the old record of 23 that had stood since the 1969-1970 season

"We shot the ball particularly well from the 3-point line. We were 6-for-

17," said Perkins. "It was a solid game. It was our senior night and all seven of the seniors started and played. Marian was a pretty big team and I thought we shot the ball well.'

Matas Masys led the Warriors with 20 points. Ethan Schuemer had 19 points and 18 rebounds.

"Ethan had another big game for us," said Perkins.

In other earlier action, Willowbrook scored a 52-39 WSC Gold win over Morton.

"We did a good job limiting turn-overs," said Perkins. "We keyed in on their main guys and contained them. We shot the ball not necessarily well, but we had good looks in that game.

Schuemer led Willowbook with 16 points and 12 rebounds, while Masys had nine points.

A 52-48 WSC Gold win against

Leyden helped clinch no worse than a share of the title. "It was a close game, but we led beginning to end," said Perkins.

"They run a 3/4-court zone and that slows the game down and forces us to play at their pace. We were forced to take outside shots and we went 6-for-15 from three."

Schuemer led the Warriors with 15 points. Masys had 13 points, while Iman Reynolds had 11 points.

"We are thankful we accomplished most of our goals," said Perkins. "We set out to win the Thanksgiving tournament, the Christmas tournament, the Martin Luther King tournament and win the conference. After conference we would like to win regionals and see if we can make a run. We are headed in the right direction. We're starting to get ready for the environment we will see in the playoffs."





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McHugh has a different way of defining adversi

Connor McHugh smiles and after preliminary introductions opens a heavy gym door and leads the visitor out and across the hall.

He opens another door into an administrative office then rounds a corner to a smaller office. He's got his cellphone, a writing utensil or two, a computer tablet, a bottle of water. Once McHugh and the guest are both seated at a small conference table, the high school senior lightly drums a foot on the veneer finish.

This is not rude. Nervous maybe, but not rude.
He needn't be nervous. As

He needn't be nervous. As the universally admired manager of both Wheaton Warrenville South's boys varsity basketball team and the varsity football team, dozens of strong athletes have his back. So do coaches at all lev-

So do coaches at all levels, administrative personnel, athletic trainer Traci Headley, Tigers boys basketball coach and athletic director Mike Healy, varsity football coach Ron Muhitch, WW South principal Dave Claypool.

cipal Dave Claypool.

"He's pretty much got the run of the whole school," Healy says, and it's clear that McHugh, despite several physical challenges, rules this

His travels are confined to a wheelchair he expertly maneuvers by pressing his small right humerous bone against a toggle control, due to upper limb amelia (or absence) also present on his left side. The 17-year-old also has proximal femoral focal deficiency that in his case—upon his initial diagnosis the most severe of four classifications of the condition, said his mother, Patti — means lacking fully formed hips and fibula.

Connor also has scoliosis of the spine, but other than needing constant core strengthening to counter that, his overall situation is stable and should be for the rest of his life, he said.

Everything most people do with their hands McHugh does with his feet — opening doors, tapping on tables, playing the Madden video game, using his tablet to chart shots and statistics in basketball games and practices. Healy calls his work "spot on" even compared against game film.

Healy said McHugh is "a

Healy said McHugh is "a true hero in terms of overcoming adversity." To an extent the dark-haired boy humbly takes exception.

"I really see myself as normal, for me," said McHugh, whose older brother and two older sisters attended Benet Academy.

ters attended Benet Academy. the "I don't really consider Meeverything I do adversity.

Everyone has things they have to do in life on a daily basis and for me it's just doing something a little different but the same

Williams scored 26 points, Hargrove 18, Kalbas 15, Colton Noel 12 points and Daniels 10 points. Noel also had 9 rebounds.

Willowbrook, hampered by 19 turnovers, was paced by Matas Masys' 16 points. Freddie Clay scored 13 and Iman Reynolds 11 off the bench. Ethan Schuemer had 8 points, 12 rebounds and 4 blocked

"I really liked the energy we had," said Blazers coach Brendan Lyons. "It was great and we were able to ride that momentum and that start we had. It carried us through."
