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Ilthuis makes his case for village preside

Longtime village trustee campaigns in three-way race By Chris Fox

has spent the last decade on the village board. After 10 years as a trustee, he's hoping to win

And to years a distect ne brighing to win this year's election for village president. Bulthuis is running in the three-way race for village president in the upcoming April 4 election. He's facing Villa Park Trustee Robert Taglia and longtime village resident Chuck Pickerill. The winner, who will replace outgoing Village President Deborah Bullwinkel will serve a four-year term. Bullwinkel's successor will be sworn into office in May.

Bullwinkel announced at the end of 2016


that she would not seek a second term as village president. After serving as a trustee, Bull-winkel was elected village president in 2013. She succeeded Tom Cullerton, who was elected to the position in 2009. In November 2012, shortly before finishing his term as village president, Cullerton was elected to the Illinois

"I knew that Deborah Bullwinkel wasn't "I knew that Debotan bullwhilker was a running, and I think consistency is important in government," said Bulthuis in explaining his position to run for village president. "We have a number of things going, and I have some of my own ideas I want to work on. Consistency is his this Wa've made a lot of progress." a big thing. We've made a lot of progress."

A 30-year resident of Villa Park, Bulthuis

was first elected to the village board in 2007. He won re-election to four-year terms in 2011 and 2015. If he does not prevail in next month's election, he will continue to serve as a trustee. His current term expires in 2019. Taglia's four-year term on the village board expires this year.

Bulthuis is making his second run for village president. He joined Cullerton and Villa Park Village President Joyce Stupegia in the

2009 race. Cullerton won that election, with Housing," said Bulthuis, referring to a pro-Bulthuis finishing second and Stupegia placing

Making his case in this year's election, Bulthuis said he has worked in the last 10 years to make Villa Park safer, and to improve the village's economic climate.

"I'm the guy who introduced Crime-Free

gram that's been implemented in the village. The Crime-Free Housing program helps to educate landlords of their legal rights related to the eviction of tenants.

"It's in place as strongly as the state allows as a non-home-rule community," said Bulthuis of the program.

Bulthuis also noted that he instituted the village's vacant-building ordinance, which requires the owner of a vacant house to reg-ister with the village. He said that before the ordinance was implemented, the village wasn't always aware of who owned the property. The current law, he said, has helped maintain a higher standard of upkeep of vacant properties.

Bulthuis also mentioned his involvement in updating the village's comprehensive plan—a sort of road map of a vision for Villa Park.
"It's ongoing—we can change and tweak

it," he said of the comprehensive plan.

In discussing important issues facing the village, Bulthuis referred to infrastructure projects, including road work and storm water management

"People still have sewage backups in their basements; that's not acceptable to me," he said. "Nobody should have to put up with that."

Bulthuis said another pressing issue in the village is what to do about Villa Park's two public pools. Jefferson and Lufkin pools are both in need of substantial repairs.

"The pools are failing; something needs to be done almost immediately," he said.

Bulthuis said he looks forward to meet-ing residents and campaigning for their votes during the next month.

"The biggest thing in Villa Park is that you have to knock on doors," said Bulthuis. "People really want to meet the candidates, It's enjoyable to meet everybody. They're willing to listen and very accommodating."



Appellate Court affirms conviction in 2012 murder of Lombard woman

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert B. Berlin announced last week that the Second District Ap-pellate Court of Illinois has affirmed the first degree murder conviction of Todd Mandoline, 31, for starting a 2012 fire that claimed the life of his former girlfriend, Paula Morgan, 24,

On Jan. 20, 2012, a jury found Mandoline guilty of first degree murder and aggravated arson. On April

30, 2015, Judge John Kinsella sentenced him to consecutive terms of imprisonment in the Illinois Department of Corrections-27 years for murder and 12 years for aggravated

In his appeal, Mandoline argued that; probable cause did not exist for his arrest; he did not voluntarily

reinitiate questioning after the ini-

statements he did make were in vio-lation of law that requires electronic

recording; and the trial court erred in its jury instructions.



The referendum question in the

want to approve an increase in the village's sales tax, from 7.5 to 8 percent. If approved, the increase would reportedly produce about \$1.5 million annually for the village. That money would be used to pay for infrastruc-ture projects, including the installation of water mains and storm sewers.

The question as it will appear on the ballot in the April 4 election asks:

"Shall the Village of Villa Park in-crease the Village's Non-Home Rule Municipal Retailers' Occupation Tax

and Non-Home Rule Municipal Service Occupation Tax (commonly referred to as a "municipal sales tax") from one half of one percent (.5%) to one percent (1.0%) for expenditure on public infrastructure, including the installation, replacement, and maintenance of sanitary sewer, storm sewer and water main systems, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of Sections 8-11-1.3 and 8-11-1.4 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65) ILCS 5/8-11-1.3 and 65 ILCS 5/8-11-

Warriors complete regular season with a loss to Downers Grove North

Trojans close game with a 10-0 run

The 2016-17 Willowbrook boys basketball team, which set a new program record for victories in a season, will enter the IHSA playoffs on

The Warriors finished the regular season with a 60-57 loss to Downers Grove North in a Feb. 21 crossover game between West Suburban Conference foes in Downers Grove. Willowbrook held a 57-50 lead with over four minutes to play. The Trojans closed the contest with a 10-0 surge, including a last-second 3-point shot. nne nnal shot, which caromed off the backboard and through the hoop, broke a 57-57 tie and gave the Tro-jans their only lead of the second half. The final shot, which caromed off

Willowbrook, which held a 40-30 halftime lead and a 51-45 edge through three quarters, completed the regular season with an overall record of 24-4. The Warriors' held a 24-2 mark before losing their West Suburban Gold Conference finale at Downers Grove South on Feb. 17. That loss left Willowbrook, Downers Grove South and Hinsdale South as co-champions of the conference. Each of the three schools finished the

season with 9-3 conference records.
Willowbrook opened its season with seven straight wins before loswith seven straight wins before los-ing a conference game at Hinsdale South on Dec. 16. The Warriors then reeled off 14 straight wins before dropping another conference battle to the Hornets on Feb. 3. Willow-brook proceeded to win its next three games before losing 58-48 at Downers Grove South on Feb. 17.

Four days after losing at Downers Grove South, the Warriors visited Downers Grove North for the crossover game against a team from the West Suburban Silver Conference. Willowbrook appeared to be on the way to its 25th victory when it held a 49-34 lead in the third quarter, but the Trojans unleashed an 11-0 run during the period to trim the War-riors' lead to single digits. Junior Ethan Schuemer's dunk

gave Willowbrook a 57-50 lead with over four minutes left in the game. The Warriors committed multiple turnovers as they went scoreless in the game's closing minutes. The turnovers included a five-second violation with about 1:30 to play and an

over-and-back violation with nearly 30 seconds remaining. The Trojans, who had tied the score at 57-57 with about 50 seconds to play, held the ball on their final possession before

onnecting on the long-range shot as time expired.

"We didn't get a shot off in the last two minutes," said Willowbrook coach Chris Perkins after the loss. "We did it to ourselves. We played a beautiful first half. We weren't getting movement, and we were turning the ball over in the fourth quarter. Silly turnovers came back to haunt us. That's how you lose a game."

Schuemer scored a team-leading 17 points for the Warriors. Junior Neil Paxton contributed 10 points by making all four of his shots from the field and sinking two of three free-

throw attempts. Junior Matas Masys, who drained a pair of 3-point shots, provided nine points. Senior Freddie Clay scored eight points, while junior Matt Myers added five points.

The loss at Downers Grove North came eight days before the Warriors' opening game in the IHSA Class 4A playoffs. Willowbrook will take on Addison Trail in this week's semifinal game at the Batavia Regional. A victory would propel the Warriors into this Friday's regional champion-

min this Finday's regional champion-ship.

"This should sting, but going into the playoffs, everybody is 0-0," stat-ed Perkins after the loss at Downers Grove North. "This was just a tune-up for the playoffs. We can't get stale in practice. We have to be sure we're mentally ready."




Bukovsky receives

Appellate Court affirms convicti 2012 Lombard m

Wan who set fire that claimed one life, severely injured another, will serve terms

week that the Second District Appellate Court of Illinois has affirmed the First Degree Murder conviction of Todd Mandoline, 31, for starting a fire in 2012 that claimed the life of his former girlfriend, Paula Morgan 24, of Lombard, On Jan. 20, 2012, a jury found Mandoline guilty of First Degree Murder and Aggravated Arson. On April 30, 2015, Judge John Kinsella sentenced him consecutive terms of imprisonment in the Illinois Department of Corrections - 27 years for murder and 12 years for Aggravated Arson.

On July 21, 2012, Mandoline attended a birthday party Morgan held for herself at her home in Lombard. During the party, Mandoline was asked to leave, which he did. In the early morning hours of July 22, however, Mandoline returned to the home and set fire to Morgan's mother's car located in the driveway. The

DuPage County State's Attorney fire spread to the home and ultimate-Robert B. Berlin announced last ly claimed Morgan's life and severely claimed Morgan's life and severely injured one of Morgan's friends.

In his appeal, Mandoline argued that probable cause did not exist for his arrest; he did not voluntarily reinitiate questioning after the initial interrogation has ceased, due to his invocation of his right of counsel; his statements to police were not voluntary, knowing or intelligent; statements he did make were in violation of law that requires electronic recording; and the trial court erred in its jury instructions.

In its affirmation, the Appellate Court found that the Trial Court acted properly and within its power on each of the issues raised by Mandoline. Justice Birkett delivered the judgment of the Court with Justices Burke and Spence concurring.

Mandoline's appeal was defended by Edward Psenicka of the DuPage County State's Attorney's Criminal Appeals Division.





Willowbrook junior Jack Jessen deserves a lot of credit for his candor.

In the aftermath of losing his only wrestling match of the season in the Class 3A 182-pound state title match. Jessen shared his thoughts with the Independent on this past season and what lies ahead for him.

"I'm not really happy with how the season ended," he said. "Overall, the season was good. I was undefeated going into the finals but I wasn't able to finish it off, I wanted the state title more than anything. It's something I've wanted ever since I was a little kid.'

Jessen dissected the state title match where he dropped a 13-3 decision to Mt. Carmel's Kordell Norfleet, who moved to 43-0.

Tracing the arc of Bambule's game

Montini senior Kaylee Bambule has been playing basketball for as long as she can remember, but it wasn't until six years ago when she ventured out to 3-point land.

"Probably around sixth grade I started shooting more out there and I thought it was a lot of fun," Bam-bule said. "I've always just loved being in the gym shooting."

Of course, shooting is always fun when you make your shots, and Bambule has done that with incredible efficiency over her four years in high school.

The 5-foot-8 guard is the Broncos' all-time leading 3-point shooter.
Despite missing 14 games due to injury, she has made 292 3-point shots, breaking the previous mark of 276 held by Kateri Stone and Lea Kerstein. That ranks 11th on the IHSA's all-time list.

"When you shoot at a 45 percent career clip, that's amazing," Montini coach Jason Nichols said. "It's outstanding.

"There may be kids that hit more 3s, but she's efficient. Every kid is going to have a bad shooting night. She does not have three or four bad shooting nights

Bambule, who 1,242 total points heading into this weekend's Class 4A semifinals, is the best player on arguably the best team in the state. The Broncos (32-1) are two wins away from winning their fifth state champion-ship since 2010. They are 127-11 during Bambule's four years.

But Bambule is as humble as she is accurate when asked about her success this season

"I just think how our team is set up this year, everyone shares the ball," Bambule said. "That's just how it is. All we've ever done is give each other the ball, so if I'm open I shoot it and it just goes in."

And it will go in from anywhere. Bambule has NBA range and is not afraid to shoot from long distance. "She can bomb," Nichols said. "At the

Christmas tournament against Geneva, they were trying to guard her hard and she popped a 26-footer and hit nothing

ut net, so she's got big-time distance."

Other teams know this and sometimes face-guard Bambule out near midcourt.

"If you started a game and you spread her out to Roosevelt Road (a hair-mile from campus), they would guard her," Nichols said. "You have to, she's that

The ironic thing is Bambule, a first-team all-state selection, often goes unrecognized by the uninitiated. She has guard skills in a power forward's body and is seemingly more suited to

playing fullback.
"Some kids will walk in the gym and just look the part," Nichols said. "She plays it but she doesn't necessarily look

"When college coaches that didn't know her would come into the gym ear-lier in her career, I'd say, "That's our best player and leading scorer over there.'
"They're like, "That kid?' But after the

open gym they'd be like, 'Wow.'" Bambule knows she isn't the most athletic player, but she has made herself great by studying the finer points of the game and listening to her coaches.



The attention was met by souped-up defensive schemes and hounding foes determined to dim the spotlight on Bibbs

and his 16 college offers.

"Honestly, it's been difficult," Bibbs said. "Mentally and physically it's kind of taken strength to get through it. But it's definitely going to prepare me for what I have to deal with in the future, so I'm thankful for it."

If frustrated, Bibbs didn't show it.

"He's a classy kid, just handled himself exceptionally well on the court the last four times we played them. He's a tough competitor, but he kept his composure said Glenbard East coach Scott Miller.

Admiration at the high school level was widespread and profuse.

"Every single team that we have played the opposing coach has come up to me and said, by far he's the best player we've faced the entire year," said West Chicago coach Bill Recchia.

And that makes Tai Bibbs the cap-tain of the 2016-17 Daily Herald DuPage County All-Area Boys Basketball Team.

First, the numbers

A three-year starter - teaming his first A unee-year starter — teaming his first two seasons with older brother Mikey — Tai Bibbs averaged an even 26 points a game for the 16-12 Wildcats, racking up 701 points.

He made 74 3-point baskets, converting a solid 38 percent from beyond the arc. Conversely, he attempted 240 free throws and made 77 percent of them. Bibbs averaged 4.7 rebounds and led West Chicago with 1.6 steals a game. Maybe most amazing is that for a player who had the ball in his hands as often as he did, Bibbs was credited with more assists than turnovers.

He finished with 1,390 points, West Chicago's third all-time scorer behind John Konchar, now at Indiana-Purdue-Fort Wayne — where Bibbs holds an offer — and his own coach, Recchia.

"From an athletic standpoint Bibbs is tough to defend," said Glenbard South coach Wade Hardtke. "You can't put a 'big' on him because he's too quick. You can't put a guard on him because he jumps over you.'

jumps over you."

The most valuable player of West Chicago's Thanksgiving tournament and Upstate Eight Conference Valley Division player of the year despite his team tying for fifth place, Bibbs displayed his full arsenal at DeKalb's Chuck Dayton Holiday Classic, earning all-tournament honors while leading the Wildcats to the consolation title.

In four games Bibbs averaged a tourney-best 32.8 points, made 48 percent of his 3-point shots and 59 percent from the floor overall. He surpassed 1,000 points in a 33-point effort against Hampshire and scored his high of 41 points on 15-of-20 shooting in the consolation win over Belvidere North.

"I was aware of his numbers, and his numbers are amazing on their own. But did not realize how much everyone is doing things out of the ordinary to get the ball out of his hands," said Glenbard West coach Tim Hoder, whose hours of illm study paid off by eliminating West Chicago in the Class 4A playoffs. Box-and-1, triangle-and-2, faceguard-

ing, double-teaming in full- and halfcourt, sending an extra man at him off ball screens. Bibbs kept coming. He

"You can do a fantastic job on him and he still may score, and there's just not that many high school kids you can say that about," Hoder said.

There's more

"He is as humble as if he was the last man on the bench," Ricci said. "Your best player has to be your hardest worker, Tai fits that also. He leads drills and usually works harder than his teammates. He understands he is under a microscope

and acts accordingly."

Recchia noted Bibbs' ability to accept coaching, being the first to arrive at practice and the last to leave. He praised Bibbs' desire to work with younger players; Bibbs himself called sophomore teammates Isaac Nelson and Jordan Wilkins "my younger brothers.

Those traits started at home. His parents are the former Sarah Meyers, once a star track athlete at West Chicago, and Chris Bibbs, a self-described attitude problem on the court at Lake Park

"I was definitely more of the type of basketball player who couldn't be told anything," Chris Bibbs said. "I tried to teach my kids to be the exact opposite of

who I was in high school."

It's worked. Tai Bibbs, who said his grade-point average is around 4.7 on a 4-point scale, handled all those recruiters, all those clutching defenders, with style.

"Everyone always says to try to enjoy your senior year the best you can and try to avoid all the distractions and focus on the important things," he said. "School, family and basketball. Obviously, that's important to me."
