According to a recent news release issued by District 88, the guidance department encourages all students who are enrolled in AP courses to take the corresponding AP exams, which will be administered during the first two weeks of May. The department has issued the following details about test registra-

 Students must register for AP ex-ams by March 17 at the Willowbrook Bookstore. Registration began on Monday, March 6.

•The registration fee is \$93 for each exam. Students can pay with cash, credit card (Visa or MasterCard) or check made payable to Willowbrook High School. Students who miss the

registration deadline of March 17 will czamora@dupage88.net. be charged a \$55 late fee.

· Students who receive free or reduced lunch will have their test registration fee waived. However, those students must still register for the exams by March 17.

• To help prepare students for the AP exams, there will be a mandatory session, which will be held in the chool cafeteria during Warrior Time in April, All students who plan to take an AP exam are required to attend the pre-administration session.

 Final instructions will be sent to AP teachers before the testing dates. The instructions will include the exact time and location of each exam.

Willowbrook will offer 21 AP exams this school year. For more about the AP exams and registration, contact Willowbrook counselor Cindy Zamora-Failla at 630-782-3137, or at

According to the information provided by District 88, one of the benefits of taking AP exams is that they give students an opportunity to earn college credit. Students must receive a certain score on the exam to earn college credit; that score varies depend-ing on the college or university. All public colleges in Illinois, however, must give students credit if they score a 3 or higher on the exam.

Gaining college credit while in high school can save money for students and their parents, as the students do not have to take the related courses in college if they achieve the required exam scores. Taking the AP exams also exposes students to college-level assessments.

Blazers build massive first-half lead

The Willowbrook boys basketball team set a new program record by winning 24 games during the 2016-17 season. The Warriors won a share of the West Suburban Gold Conference title with a 9-3 mark that included a pair of decisive wins over Addison Trail.

The Warriors' success in the regular season did not carry over into the playoffs. Willowbrook opened the IHSA Class 4A post-season with an 81-67 loss to Addison Trail in last week's regional semifinal game at Batavia High School.

Addison Trail dominated the War-

riors in the first half of the March 1 contest, building a 20-4 lead by the end of the first quarter. The Blazers delivered a 23-0 run that began in the first quarter and carried into the econd period. Addison Trail held a 33-6 lead in the second period before Willowbrook went on its own run to cut the Blazers' advantage to 40-23 by halftime.

The Warriors finished the season with an overall record of 24-5. The team opened the season with a seven-game winning streak and responded to its first loss by winning its next 14 games. Willowbrook finished the season with three straight

Willowbrook defeated the Blazers 74-51 in a Dec. 9 conference meeting in Villa Park. The Warriors won the regular-season rematch in Addison. prevailing 50-38 on Jan. 28. Those regular-season results clearly didn't affect the Blazers' confidence in the playoff meeting. Addison Trail made 14 of 26 shots from the field during the first half. That performance in-cluded a 5-for-9 effort from 3-point range. The Warriors made eight of 31 shots in the first half. That perfor-

31 shots in the first half. That performance included a 3-for-15 showing from 3-point territory.





made four 3-point shots during the game, connected on a 3-pointer early in the fourth quarter to cut the Blazers' lead to 63-48. Baskets from senior Freddie Clay and Reynolds reduced the margin to 63-52 with about 6:40 left in the game. Addison Trail then scored six straight points to raise its cushion to 69-52. The lead dropped to 71-59 when Clay made a 3-pointer with under four minutes remaining. Addison Trail, which had the support of a boisterous student section in Batavia, then scored seven straight points to take a 78-59 lead.

tonight," said Perkins of the Blazers. "We had every opportunity to get



• What is one good idea you have to better the community that no one is talking about yet?

Left We always have trouble with the question, "How do we get more people downtown?"

Sadly, we usually settle for the stale idea of yet another "streetscape" project on Front Street.

Unless your destination is in the CBD, people avoid driving through downtown. This means they don't see the new restaurants and stores, and they certainly won't stop in for a coffee.

What if we could get them downtown by a means other than a car?

What if touring downtown Wheaton was a destination in and of itself?

I would like to see a bike and walking trail that connects to the Prairie Path and allows people to circulate around the downtown area. (It could go up West Street, travel along Wesley, and connect back to the Prairie Path on Cross.)

The Illinois Prairie Path is a valuable asset that is largely underutilized, but has a lot of untapped potential. Indianapolis has had huge success with their "Cultural Trail" that brings many people from surrounding areas into their downtown.

This would be a family focused investment that will drive commerce, support a healthy city, and make the downtown more accessible for all residents.

4. What other issues, if any, are important to you as a candidate for this office?

A Another important issue to me is the make up of the council. The council needs a member with expertise in public infrastructure.

As a city, Wheaton needs to:

- Construct safer roadways.
