Rams battle to a third-place finish at their own Springfest Invite

The Glenbard East boys volleyball team won four of five matches on its way to claiming the third-place on its way to claiming the thrid-place plaque at its own Springfest Invita-tional. The Rams' only loss in the 16-team event came to Lake Park in the semifinal round. Lake Park went on to beat two-time defending state champion Glenbard West in the first-place match. The Rams earned a three-game victory over West Aurora

"At times I was happy with how we played," said Glenbard East coach Marci Maier at the end of the invite. "I think everybody played well at different points. Fundamentally, we've got some things we need to work on in practice. We're looking forward to continue to sharpen things

up as the season goes on."

Glenbard East's overall season record stood at 10-3 through Saturday's five matches. The Rams began the week with a 29-27, 25-20 win over Naperville North on April 4. One night later, Glenbard East opened its Upstate Eight Conference schedule with a two-game victory over Elgin-Larkin.

The Rams advanced to the semi-finals of Saturday's Springfest Inmatches to claim first place in their four-team pool. Glenbard East opened the event with a 25-15, 25-12 win over Romeoville, followed by 25-7, 25-18 victory over Schaum-burg. The Rams completed pool play with a 25-23, 25-23 win over Neuqua

Junior Filip Kwidzinski provided eight kills in the win over Romeoville, while senior Adrian Cebula bashed seven kills. Senior Jake Ea-gan handed out 25 assists. Kwidz-inski and senior Justin Murphy böth supplied six kills against Schaum-burg. Senior Mason Arnold doled out 10 assists.

Eagan and Arnold contributed 13 and 11 assists, respectively, in the tight win over Neuqua Valley. Arnold also contributed eight kills. Cebula had six blocks and five kills, while sophomore Nick O'Brien made 12

Arnold had 13 assists and six kills, while O'Brien made seven digs. Ea-ran had 11 assists.




"Our last three matches were all good matches," said Maier. "We were right there against Lake Park. We had opportunities in both games





"This year, we have a lot of elaborate sets and a large, diverse team," O'Donnell and Levato said. "It also will be special because of the added element of the school's 50th anniver-


Every aspect of the show - from the choreography to the costumes to the lighting - is run by the students, and the production involves about 100 dancers, crew members and staff members.

Pitching powering

Addison Trail baseball team's Villasenor posts 36 strikeouts in first 19 innings of work

Addison Trail baseball coach Mike Kennedy thought his team would be pitching-rich this season. And in the early going of the 2017 season, that certainly has been the case. While the Blazers sat at 2-2 through midlast week, stellar pitching had helped the squad stay ultra-competitive in all four games. Not included in that total was a 2-2 stalemate after 11 innings against defending West Suburban Conference Gold Division champion Hinsdale South. "We were one out away from beating them at their place—the defending conference champions," Kennedy noted.

They hit a home run in the bottom of the seventh to tie it up. Our guys are confident and our pitching has been outstanding." In particular, staff ace Nick Villasenor has been nearly unhittable. Through mid-last week, Villasenor had pitched in 19 innings (3 games) and had surrendered only two earned runs while striking out a staggering 36 batters in those 19 innings.

"The most impressive thing is Nick hasn't walked anybody," said Kenne-dy. "He's been outstanding." Kennedy also praised the mound work of Bobby Daniels. "Bobby is another guy who has been outstanding for us. He's given up three earned runs in 15 innings-that's just outstanding," he said. "Our pitching is on fire and our bats are starting to come around. It's been a learning curve for our younger guys. We are starting to come

At the plate, sophomore shortstop Michael Scali has been effective. "Michael is hitting real well," said Kennedy. "He's made the adjustment to varsity ball really well." Ricky Perez, Simon Marinelli and Jack Kalbas also have been aiding the offensive attack for the Blazers. "Ricky has been outstanding with his bat out of the No. 3 spot," said Kennedy. "Simon is leading off for us and getting on base. In the first three games, Jack Kalbas was on base six times. He's very disciplined as a hitter. He's a big nuisance on the base path. He'll take second and third on you on two pitches.

While Addison Trail's pitching has been strong, Kennedy pointed out the staff has received an extra jolt from the play of Marinelli behind the

"Simon behind the plate stops the other team's running game," he said. "We talk about Simon's offense, but he's an outstanding defensive catcher. He works for the pitchers. He works for strikes. If a team gets on first base he throws them out steal-

ing."
Kennedy noted the two games the squad has lost have been instances where some defensive miscues have been costly in close situations.

"We've been in every game," he said. "We lost 2-1 to Glenbard North and gave up two unearned runs in the top of the sixth. We kicked a couple balls around. We lost 4-2 to Larkin and we kicked a couple of balls. In every game we're keeping teams in check-they aren't scoring a lot of runs on us. The most runs we've given up is four. If we can continue to do that and our hitting keeps coming around, hopefully we can start stringing together some wins. We know the next two weeks we're playing games every day and we're getting into the heart of conference play. We're out there throwing strikes and our guys want to play defense. It keeps the game moving. The game against Hinsdale South, we played 11 innings in two hours and 15 minutes. Our guys can play. They put in the work in the off-season and we're starting to see that pay off now. Our record says 2-2, but we're a much better team than that and we're starting to see that.'




