

llage board votes to cancel this year's Oktoberfest

Citing declining revenues, attendance and vendor participation, the Villa Park Village Board approved the cancellation of this year's Oktoberfest event.

Village board members voted unanimously during the May 22 board meeting to direct village staff to cancel this year's event. In recent years, Oktoberfest has taken place years, Oktoberriest has taken place on a Friday, Saturday and Sunday in the middle of September at Lions Park, 320 E. Wildwood Ave. The 2016 event ran from Sept. 9-11. According to the village's web site, the 2016 Oktoberfest marked the 37-year anniversary of the event, which began in 1079.

which began in 1979.

The announcement of a new fundraising event in Villa Park this fall also factored into the decision to

cancel this year's Oktoberfest.
Villa Park Village Manager Rich
Keehner told board members during
last week's meeting that the School District 45 Foundation for Excellence is planning to hold its inaugural "45Fest" fundraising event in the village this fall, from Oct. 13-15. Keehner said that new event will resemble Oktoberfest by featuring carnival rides, a beer tent, live music

He said the District 45 Foundation for Excellence is looking to raise at least \$50,000 during its inau-

gural three-day event.

Keehner stated that village staff was concerned that the close timing of the two events could strain the community's participation in Oktoberfest

In addition to Oktoberfest, the village supports other annual events, including the Fourth of July parade, Summerfest and Joyful Traditions.

Keehner said that the village staff's suggestion to cancel Oktoberfest was not taken lightly. He said that attendance at the event has declined over a number of years. Keeh-ner also noted that poor weather has hurt attendance during some recent Oktoberfests.

He mentioned the village has to pay the costs to cover carnival attractions and live music regardless of the weather conditions. Keehner said the village annually spends about \$30,000 to pay for bands and carnival activities at Oktoberfest. Village staff takes about one week to set up the event, which requires ad-ditional expenses for police services.

The cancellation of this year's Oktoberfest will eliminate a fundraising opportunity for the Villa Park Lions Club, which receives a portion of the revenue from the event's beer sales. Village staff proposed the Li-ons Club could work with Summerfest volunteers at the beer tent and share the proceeds from that festival. Keehner said Lions Club mem-bers could help check identification and sell beer at future Summerfest events. This year's Summerfest will take place June 16-17 in the area near Ardmore Avenue and Park Bou-

Trustee Chris Aiello initially stat-

ed during last week's discussion that he would like to continue Oktober-fest this year. Trustee Don Kase also said the village could try holding the event one more year, and that he wanted to carry over discussion of the issue to the next board meeting. Village President Albert Bulthuis said the board was at a point where it had to make a decision. Bulthuis said the event had run its course and wasn't attracting local vendors. Bulthuis also referred to another new village event planned for this fall— Villa Park Brewfest—scheduled for Sept. 23 at Cortesi Veterans Memo-rial Park.

Villa Park Public Works Director Vidas Juskelis, who is a member of the Lions Club, stated club members were agreeable with plans to can-cel Oktoberfest and have the club share the beer sales from Summerfest. Juskelis said that working the Summerfest event would require a lot less work for club members than setting up numerous tents for Okto-

After hearing the Lions Club wouldn't mind the cancellation of Oktoberfest, board members voted 6-0 to cancel this year's event. Trustees Nick Cuzzone, Cheryl Tucker and Robert Wagner joined Aiello, Kase and Bulthuis in the vote.

Former Lombard and Villa Park resident turns 100

Russell Lantz says he once came "thisclose" to meeting Charles Lind-bergh, and remembers when Lombard was putting in sewer and water systems.

Lantz, who turned 100 on May 7,

lived the first few years of his life in Lombard, on Main Street near what is dubbed the "Orphan Annie"

He grew up on the northwest cor-ner of Wisconsin and Madison in Villa Park, the second of four sons of Matilda and Victor. He now lives

in Durand, Ill., near Rockford.

Lantz said he recalled nearly meeting Lindbergh, who had roomed with a family friend in Villa Park. He happened to be flying in the area, and "landed an old biplane in Meyers cornfield."

"My brother and I ran over there," theater was torn down, "That broke he continued, adding, "He was not rmy heart," Lantz said.

The centenarian also narrated how, in 1933, he saw a zeppelin one summer day while he was living in Villa Park. He said it was a scary site as it created a huge shadow that darkened a large area; it came close enough to the ground that it was very clear to see.

Attending York High School (Class of 1938), Lantz was in the school band and formed an 18-piece dance band during the "Big Band days," as he put it, and they played a

number of venues.

He remembers working as an usher at the former Villard Theatre in Villa Park, near the old post office on Kenilworth, adding, "That used to be a big theater."

He also recounted how he would "shuttle" films between the Villard and the DuPage theaters during the Depression.

When he heard that the Lombard

Lantz related how he made and

Park during World War II, and later worked for a pipeline company.

He and his wife, Evelyn, who at-

tended confirmation class together at Trinity Lutheran Church in Villa Park, were childhood sweethearts. He said they lived in Congress Knolls for a time before moving to California.

He has two sons. Steve and Russell Jr. His wife and a son, Bryant, passed away. He said he is also the grandfather of nine.

When asked how things have changed since he grew up here, Lantz responded, "Oh, all the development ... very little vacant space anymore," because when he lived in the area, "There wasn't much there,

Lantz commented that about 30 years ago he recorded his personal story for the Villa Park Historical

Warriors edge Lake Park to claim post-season title

The Willowbrook baseball program captured its first regional championship in five years with Sat-urday's 6-5 victory over Lake Park in the title contest of the IHSA Class 4A Hoffman Estates Regional.

The win, which gave the War-riors an overall season record of 25-8, pushed the team into this week's Class 4A sectional at Boomers Stadi-

um in Schaumburg.
Senior Mike Dembowski delivered the game-winning hit in Satur-day's regional final. Dembowski's double with one out in the bottom of the seventh inning snapped a 5-5 tie and drove in senior Kyle Ferguson with the winning run.
Ferguson hit a solo home run in

the bottom of the fifth inning to give the Warriors a 5-4 lead. The Lancers tied the game at 5-5 with one run in the top of the seventh inning.

Senior Alec Michaelson connected for a two-run single in the bottom of the first inning to give the Warriors an early 2-0 lead. Lake Park grabbed a 3-2 advantage with a three-run dou-ble in the top of the fourth inning. Junior Sam Pelsor bashed a pinch-

hit, two-run single to left field to give the Warriors a 4-3 lead in the bottom of the fourth inning. Pelsor delivered the critical hit on an 0-2 pitch.

Sophomore Ryan Mintz pitched the first four innings for Willowbrook before he was relieved by sophomore Jack Nilles in the top of the fifth inning. Nilles pitched two innings, while senior Scott Kohrt pitched the seventh inning. The three Warrior righthanders allowed a total

of five hits during Saturday's game. Ferguson singled with one out in the bottom of the seventh inning and scored moments later on Dembowski's line-drive double to center field.

In addition to providing the game-winning hit, Dembowski made a pair of great defensive plays at first base. He leaped to snare a line drive to end the second inning. In the fifth inning, Dembowski made an overthe-shoulder catch of a pop fly. He spun and made a long throw to third base to nearly cut down a Lake Park baserunner who had tagged up from second base.

Ferguson went 2-for-3 at the plate



during the regional final. Sophomore Jack Hines also went 2-for-3; Hines cracked a double just before Pelsor's two-run, pinch-hit single. Sophomore Trevor Jaloszynski's single preceded Hines's double.

The Warriors opened the post-sea-son with a 6-0 win over Batavia in a regional semifinal game on May 25. Michaelson pitched six and two-thirds innings to lead Willowbrook to the victory. He allowed just one

hit. Michaelson recorded five strikeouts and walked five batters. Kohrt relieved Michaelson in the seventh

Michaelson provided his own offensive support by bashing a two-run home run in the bottom of the fourth

Dembowski, Jaloszynski, Pelsor and senior M.J. Ranieri each drove in one run in the win over Batavia.
