Weight restriction in effect at St. Charles Road Bridge

15-ton limit restricts large vehicles, including buses and fire trucks

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) recently informed the Village of Villa Park that the rating of the St. Charles Road Bridge over Salt Creek has been lowered from 20 tons to 15 tons. IDOT officials lowered the rating after conducting an inspection of the bridge.

The new limit does not restrict ambulances from using the bridge. The 15-ton limit does restrict garbage trucks, fire trucks, school buses and public buses. The restriction impacts PACE Bus Route 313 through Villa Park.

On Aug. 14, the Villa Park Village Board approved an agreement with V3 Companies to conduct temporary repairs of the bridge. The repairs will assist in maintaining the 15-ton limit until the bridge is reconstructed.

Two steel beams will be installed under the bridge to provide temporary repairs until the bridge can be reconstructed in the next two to three years.

Lane reconfigurations are taking place this week to allow for repair work. Advanced-warning message boards have been installed for the reconfiguration, which will be in effect for about two months. The bridge will remain open to four lanes of traffic—two eastbound and two westbound—during the temporary repairs. The four lanes will be narrowed. The weight restriction will remain at 15 tons after the emergency repairs are completed.

According to Villa Park Village Manager Rich Keehner, about 22,800 vehicles cross the bridge every day.

Superintendent writes about impact of new state school funding legislation

District 88 Superintendent Dr. Scott Helton wrote about the state's new school funding law in the recent District 88 newsletter, which was released Sept. 1

This past week has been a busy one in Springfield for education. On Aug. 31, Illinois Gov. Bruce Rauner signed Senate Bill 1947, a new school funding law that looks to provide a comprehensive solution to the decades of inadequacy and inequity in education funding throughout Illinois. SB 1947 was approved by the Illinois House of Representatives on Aug. 28 (after initially failing) and was then passed by the Illinois Senate on Aug. 29.

We are thrilled to have a funding formula for public education in Illinois, and we appreciate the hard work and efforts of our local legislators to ensure a budget for our students. Below are highlights of the bill, provided by the Illinois Association of School Administrators Alliance Legislative report, and how it will impact District 88.

- **Tax Increment Financing (TIF):** SB 1947 includes the creation of a TIF Task Force to study the benefits and costs of TIF districts and the interaction between the TIF law and school funding.

- **Property taxes:** SB 1947 includes a mechanism for property tax relief for taxpayers in school districts that are calculated to be at 110 percent of their adequacy target. It allows for a citizen-initiated referendum that asks voters whether the school district's tax extension should be reduced.

- **Mandate relief:** SB 1947 attempts to provide relief to school districts from unfunded and under-

funded mandates in the following ways: it makes changes to the current mandate waiver process; it gives authority to local school boards regarding physical education and driver education – each district can assess its instructional program and make its own decision on the physical education and driver education programs offered.

How does this change in legislation impact District 88? (The following information is according to the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) May 2017 analysis of the original evidence-based funding model.)

- Of the four tiers of school district funding distribution, District 88 is at Tier 2, and our adequacy funding level is about 90 percent of what the ISBE calculated to be needed for an adequate level of educational program resources.

- According to a press release from the ISBE, "SB 1947 incorporates General State Aid and other line items into a new evidence-based funding formula. This allows the ISBE and the Illinois Comptroller to move forward with distributing the \$6.705 billion appropriated for evidence-based funding in the fiscal year 2018 state budget."

While the ISBE won't have final evidence-based funding calculations for a few months, we anticipate receiving an additional \$30.88 per student, which in the original model equates to about \$125,000 more per

year (contingent upon student enrollment/attendance). The new tier distribution funds are expected to be distributed later this fall.

- Unfortunately, the correlating budget appropriation bill (Senate Bill 6) that was adopted as an override to Rauner's amendatory veto of Senate Bill 1 (a previously proposed school funding bill) – which was adopted before this most recent funding distribution law – will have some adverse impact to our school funding for fiscal year 2018.

- What this means for public schools in Illinois is a 24-percent reduction in Corporate Personal Property Replacement Tax (CPPRT) funding for the coming fiscal year. District 88 received \$1.7 million of CPPRT funding in the prior year fiscal year 2017, so this coming year the Illinois Department of Revenue has released its estimates for all local governmental agencies, and we stand to see a reduction of \$418,000.

Our students—along with all students in Illinois—deserve adequate and equitable funds to provide a high-quality educational experience, and we're hopeful SB 1947 will help accomplish that goal.

We will continue to monitor and share updates regarding this and related legislation.

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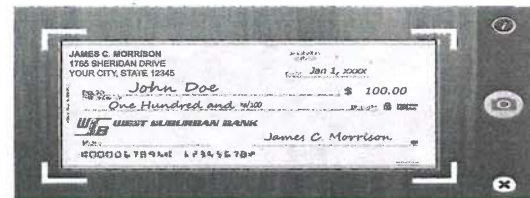

The Warriors will begin the West Suburban Gold Conference season with this Friday's contest at Leyden (2-0).

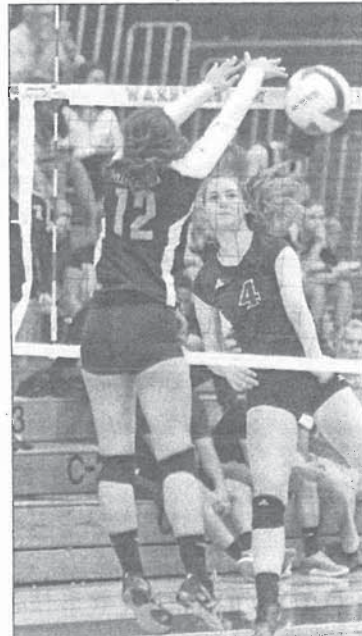
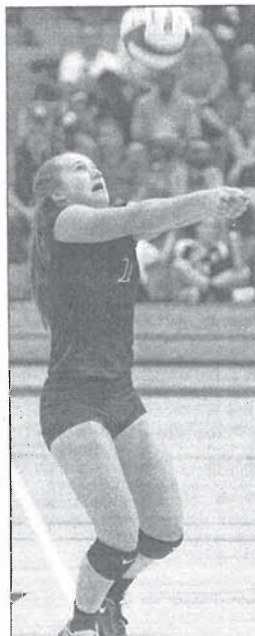

IRS: Beware of fake Hurricane Harvey charities

The IRS is warning well-intentioned Illinoisans to double-check the charity they're donating to. It could be a scam.

Hurricane Harvey has caused billions of dollars in damage to the Houston area, leaving many without basic necessities. With charities taking in donations of food, supplies and funds, a number of those outlets are actually scammers looking to get your donation and credit card information.

"Their whole goal is to solicit money or financial information," said IRS spokesman Michael Devine.

Devine said the IRS has seen people scammed by email, phone call, "Sometimes they're so bold that they'll go door-to-door," he said.

He says scammers know peoples' guards are down in the wake of a disaster like Harvey.

"Americans want to be helpful. They want to help those who are in distress," Devine said. "They're taking advantage of this."

He says the best safeguard against getting taken by a fake charity is to stick to ones you know and don't give out personal financial information.

Some tips from the IRS to avoid being taken by a fake charity:

- Be sure to donate to recognized charities.

- Be wary of charities with names that are similar to familiar or nationally known organizations. Some phony charities use names or websites that sound or look like those of respected, legitimate organizations. The IRS website at IRS.gov has a search feature, Exempt Organizations Select Check, through which people may find qualified charities; donations to these charities may be tax-deductible.

- Don't give out personal financial information — such as Social Security numbers or credit card and bank account numbers and passwords — to anyone who solicits a contribution. Scam artists may use this information to steal a donor's identity and money.

- Never give or send cash. For security and tax record purposes, contribute by check or credit card or another way that provides documentation of the donation.

- Consult IRS Publication 526, Charitable Contributions, available on IRS.gov. This free booklet describes the tax rules that apply to making legitimate tax-deductible donations. Among other things, it also provides complete details on what records to keep.

Taxpayers suspecting fraud by email should visit IRS.gov and search for the keywords "Report Phishing."

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
