Warriors crush Addison Trail 45-0 in District 88 showdown

Willowbrook travels to Hinsdale South this week

The Willowbrook football team The Willowbrook football team maintained possession of the District 88 Trophy with Friday's emphatic 45-0 thumping of Addison Trail in Villa Park. The Warriors dominated the visiting Blazers in the annual meeting between the rival schools, seizing a 31-0 lead by halftime.

Willowbrook improved to 3-1 overall and 2-0 in West Suburban Gold Conference play. The Warriors will battle Hinsdale South (also 3-1 overall and 2-0 in the conference) in this Friday's showdown in Darien.

The Warriors raced to a 24-0 lead over Addison Trail (2-2 overall, 0-1 in the conference) after the first quarter. Senior quarterback John Taylor and senior running back Jack Jessen provided touchdown runs in the opening period. Senior kicker Betty-Ann Garrett added a 22-yard field goal to push the lead to 17-0. Sopho-more Sam Turnilty increased the lead when he intercepted a Blazer pass and returned it nearly 90 yards for a touchdown. Garrett's conversion

a touchdown. Garrett's conversion kick raised the lead to 24-0.
"I saw the quarterback looking, and I just made a play," said Tumilty, a first-year varsity player, of his interception return for a touchdown. "I just saw a lot of green and took off."

Senior Chris Diaz ran for a second necessary of the second necessar

ond-quarter touchdown to boost the Warriors' lead to 30-0. Jessen turned in a short touchdown run in the third quarter. Taylor completed a touch-down pass to senior Jacob Entwistle in the fourth quarter to trigger a running clock for the rest of the game

I don't think we were surprised said Willowbrook coach Nick Hil-dreth after the team's dominant effort. "Our expectation was to come out and do the things we had focused

Tumilty, who made his first interception of the season in the Warriors' 20-13 win at Leyden on Sept. 8, made a pair of interceptions against Addison Trail. He followed his touchdown return in the second quarter by picking off another pass in





the third quarter.

"It's really fun," said Tumilty of his first varsity season. "Everyone's always working hard, and the coaches are putting a lot of time in. The

Broncos rally for a thrilling last-minute win The Montini football team pulled out a dramatic 29-28 victory over Brother Rice on Friday night in Lombard. Trailing 28-21 late in the game, the Broncos drove 70 yards to score a touchdown with less than one minute to play to cut Brother Rice's lead to 28-27. Montini attempted and converted a two-point conversion to grab the lead.

Montini improved its overall record to 3-1 with the thrilling win. The Broncos will face Marmion (4-0) this Friday in Aurora

Senior quarterback Nick Orlando scored the late touchdown on a short run. Orlando completed the conversion pass to senior Matt Quaglia to put the Broncos in the lead with 33 seconds to play.

Senior Rian O'Connor sealed the victory when he intercepted a Brother Rice pass in the closing seconds.

The Broncos opened the scoring

after Brother Rice fumbled on the game's second play from scrimmage. Senior Jalen Slater of the Broncos re-covered the fumble near the Crusaders' 35-yard line. Moments later, Orlando threw a 6-yard touchdown pass to Ouaglia. Senior Michael Cooney added the extra-point kick to give Montini a 7-0 lead with over nine minutes left in the fourth quarter.

Brother Rice (1-3) scored on its next offensive drive to tie the score at 7-7, but Montini responded with its own touchdown drive. Orlando completed a 37-yard pass to Quaglia during the drive, which ended with Orlando's 2-yard scoring run with about one minute to play in the first quarter. Cooney added the extra-point kick to give the Broncos a

Orlando added another touchdown run with about three minutes left in the first half. Brother Rice kicked a field goal with less than one mir to play in the half. The Broncos held a 21-10 lead at halftime.

The Crusaders, who pounded Montini 42-7 in last year's meeting, unleashed an 18-0 run in the second half to take a 28-21 lead in Friday's

The Rams trailed West Aurora 20-6 in the second quarter, but Rech's 11-yard touchdown pass to Johnson, followed by Tenca's conversion kick, reduced the Blackhawks' lead to 20-

Rech and Johnson hooked up on a 19-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter to trim West Aurora's edge to 20-19. Tenca then booted the extra-point kick to tie the game. The Blackhawks took a 26-20 lead when they scored a touchdown with about one minute left in the third quarter.

The Rams drove the ball inside the Blackhawks' 5-yard line late in the game but couldn't convert the drive into points. A miscue on a third-andgoal play from the 2-yard line left the Rams in a fourth-and-goal hole at the 18-yard line.

Johnson finished the night with


10 receptions for 128 yards and two touchdowns.






Tough loss for the Rams

Wes Baker to exhibit American Images


Some pieces in this exhibit were a part of a four-year traveling exhibition at the National Motorcycle Museum and the Motorcycle Hall of Fame.

'Some of my paintings are about the wind in my hair and two wheels in motion," Baker said. "It's unclear where the rider is going and whether the ride is freespirited and joyous, or whether imminent danger looms

Baker began his artistic career as a teenager, working as a sign painter and pin-striper. After a four-year stint as an artist in the U.S. Air Force, working as an illustrator for the flight magazine and the flight school, he returned to college and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Industrial Design. After a 35-year career in the construction industry, his life came full circle, returning

to painting full time.

Firehouse Subs honors owner with patriotic employer award







Side by side, they feel at home.

Scotty Tumilty and his younger brother, Willowbrook sophomore Sam, never played high school football together until this year.

They're hardly football strangers, though.

"In youth, we would be on the same team all the time," said Scotty, a ju-nior. "We would both play defense and I would be quarterback."

Now they're giving fits to opposing quarterbacks.

Opposite cornerbacks on Willowbrook's defense, both Tumiltys have three interceptions on the season. Both brothers picked off passes against Leyden in Week 3. Sam took center stage last week, with two of Willowbrook's five interceptions in a surprisingly one-sided 45-0 win over District 88 rival Addison Trail.

"We had a good week of practice, and we were prepared for the test,' said Sam, a 5-foot-8 strongside corner. "Our coaches wanted us to come out fast and aggressive and be physical."

The Warriors (3-1) were off to the races after Sam stepped in front of a pass and returned it 90 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter.

'It was goal line, we were in cover-4 and I saw the quarterback looking my way," Sam said. "I just tried to come down and make a play. I got a block from Jacob Entwistle and I saw open field.'

The brothers' dad, Scott, was a three-sport star at Naperville Central and later an All-American in football and track at Augustana. Their aunt Beth played soccer at Michigan State, uncle Pat played baseball at Evansville and another uncle, Jim, played football at Wheaton Warrenville South.

Scott briefly was Willowbrook's head coach in 2011, but resigned before coaching a game. He's been an assistant at Maine South.

Both those brothers are competitive and have great instincts," Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth said. "There's a healthy competitiveness
