

It also scripts Wendy as an only child.

Welge: You moved to setter a couple years ago. How did you work at making the adjustment?



Experts trying to reduce collisions at Illinois railroad crossi

State ranks second in the country; nearly 150 people hit by trains, 46 deaths

Illinois has the second-largest rail system of any state with more than 7,300 miles of track and more than 10,000 public highway-rail cross-

"The simple answer to the raw figures is Illinois has an exposure problem," Chip Pew, state coordinator with Illinois Operation Lifesaver, said. "We have the second-most public crossings, other than Texas. We have the second-most miles of track. Add to that we have more than 140,000 miles of streets and roads. We have a lot of trains. We have a lot of crossings. And we have a lot of people."

Pew says there remain hundreds of places in the state without any kind of active warning system of an approaching train. However, that technology is no guarantee that problems will be eliminated.

"People think crossings, if they have bells and lights, then they would be safer," Pew said. "When, in actuality, more than 50 percent nationally of all collisions that occur at public crossings occur because people drive around the crossing gates. Crossings that we would think have the best protections aren't necessari-

ly making them any safer." Illinois actually is ahead of the national average when it comes to crossings with active warnings systems, and federal regulations mandate at least 20 seconds of advance warning time once the lights begin flashing and the arms come down at

a crossing.

But Pew says drivers still appear to frequently misjudge how quickly a train is approaching.

"The background creates no depth so you can't accurately judge speed

and distance of it," Pew said. "And, fatal decision." unfortunately for people who think

He recommends increased enforcement efforts at crossings in Illinois

"I think you need to issue citations," Pew said. "There has to be

ultimate consequence in which they lose their life.

State lawmakers recently increased fines for drivers who disregard activated railroad gates and

some consequence other than the warning lights to \$500 for a first worst, ultimate consequence in offense and \$1,000 for a subsequent offense. The state now has some of the strictest penalties in the nation.

Texas is the only state with more collisions at crossings than Illipois.



"Consumers who trusted the security of Equifax should not foot the bill for freezing their accounts due to the carelessness of a large corpora-tion," said Conroy. "Personal infor-mation of millions of Illinoisans was put at risk, and consumers need to be able to take steps to protect their identities and sensitive information '


Equifax announced it had suffered a massive data breach of sensitive consumer information from May to July of this year, impacting as many as 143 million Americans. In Illinois, the breach is believed to have jeopardized the personal and financial

In response to the recent Equifax information of more than 5.4 million

In order to protect oneself from identity theft, Attorney General Lisa Madigan is encouraging residents to consider placing a freeze on their credit and sign up for free credit reports.

House Bill 4095 would require agencies like Equifax to provide this service for free.

'The massive leak of information by Equifax puts millions of Illinois residents at risk and should be taken very seriously," Conroy said. "The Attorney General's office has been working diligently to educate people on the steps they need to take to protect their personal information. I encourage all residents to seek out the resources and information put out by the Attorney General's office.

The Illinois Breast and Cervical Cancer Pro-gram (IBCCP) offer free screenings to detect breast cancer or cervical cancer, both of which have better treatment results if detected early. Although IBC-CP is available throughout Illinois, the Health Department only serves DuPage County resi-dents. For more information about IBCCP and enrollment forms, visit dupagehealth.org.

In 2016, the Health Department's IBCCP served 657 clients, and provided 1,386 screenings, including breast exams, mammograms and pelvic/pap exams.

There are more than 3.1 million breast cancer survi-vors in the United States, including women being treated and those who have com-pleted treatment.

Women should be aware that:

- · Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women.
- · Hispanic women have fewer mammograms than Caucasian women and African American women.
- · Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer among Hispanic women.
- · Women below the poverty level are less likely than women at higher incomes to have had a mammogram within the past two years



Legislative leaders consider using state tax dollars for Obama museum

Funds part of budget meant for road repairs

Democrat leaders in Springfield are signaling that they plan to propose using state road dollars to help build President Barack Obama's museum in Chicago. Rauner said he supports both road spending and the library, but wouldn't commit to the idea

In the last couple days, both Senate President John Cullerton (D-Chicago) and House Speaker Michael Madigan (D-Chicago) said they'd support using state road funds on Obama's presidential library that will be built over the next three years on Chicago's south side. The presidential center would need to have one road demolished and for using state funds on the project others altered to be completed. On Thursday, Rauner said he supports more infrastructure spending as well as Obama's library, but he didn't say he'd commit public funds to the project.

"No. 1: I am very supportive of more investment in infrastructure," Rauner said. "No. 2: I am very supportive of the Obama library.

But Rauner said that he would like to see further government spending restraints before the state invests in tourism attractions such as the library.

A Chicago Tribune poll from 2014 showed that more than half of likely voters polled didn't support state taxpayer funds being used on the Obama library project. Opposition

was 2-1 outside of Chicago.

State Rep. C.D. Davidsmeyer (R-Jacksonville) said Obama should be more than capable of raising that money himself."It's just amazing that one of the most prolific fundraisers in the history of politics can't come up with the money to build their library," he said.

Davidsmeyer, who is also vice president of Illinois Road Contractors Inc. says the state's roads are in dire need of repair.

"I don't think we're in any situation to spend another penny some-where else let alone \$100 million," he said.

Democrats pushed in 2014 to offer \$100 million in road funds to persuade Obama's foundation to put the library in Chicago.

Rauner has long expressed sup-port for the Obama library, but he has been skeptical of public funds going into it.Last month, Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel said that there should be a state commitment to helping build the Obama Pres-idential Center just as they have the Abraham Lincoln Museum in Springfield.

In 2014, then gubernatorial candidate Rauner said that the state has more pressing needs and thought that the Obama library should be privately funded like other presidential museums. In 2015, Rauner signed a bill that would make lawsuits against the building of the Obama Presidential Center and the now-relocated Lucas Museum more difficult.



Willowbrook football team headed back to playoffs

Warriors down Morton 56-6 in Week 7 action

It's back to the playoffs for the Willowbrook football team.

The Warriors scored a recent 56-6 win over Morton in a Week 7 West Suburban Conference Gold Division game at Morton West Stadium

The win moved Willowbrook to 6-1 overall and 4-0 in WSC Gold play. Not only did the Warriors remain atop the WSC Gold standings with two games to play, but they earned an automatic playoff berth with its sixth victory.

In the Morton contest, the Warriors gained 274 yards on the ground and had seven rushing touchdowns. Jack Jessen ran nine times for 122 yards and scored two touchdowns. Chris Diaz ran seven times for 72 yards and scored three touchdowns. Franshun Jordan ran three times for 65 yards and scored a touchdown, while John Taylor had a 10-yard touchdown run.

Taylor completed 5 of 6 passes for 88 yards. Chase Cavanagh also threw a 79-yard touchdown pass to CJ Harris. Sikander Zafar caught three passes for 56 yards.

Through seven contests, Willowbrook was averaging 308 rushing vards per game.

Taylor has completed 81 of 135 passes for 1,181 yards and eight touchdowns against only four interceptions.

Jessen has rushed for 1,277 yards on 180 carries and has 15 rushing

touchdowns. He's averaging 182 yards per game on the ground and has six 100-yard rushing games.

Diaz has 373 rushing yards and six touchdowns, while Taylor has 305 rushing yards and three touch-

Zafar has caught 25 passes for 428 yards and one touchdown. Jacob Entwistle has 18 catches for 212 yards and two touchdowns, while Diaz has 14 catches. Martique Barksdale has 15 catches for 188 yards and two touchdowns.

On defense, Jessen leads the way with 52 total tackles. Kevon Dobbins had 45 total tackles and three quarterback sacks. Entwistle and Christian Washington each have 37 tackles, while Nick Rushing has 36 tackles, 12.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 quarterback sacks.

As a team, Willowbrook has 59.5 tackles for loss.





Studying the Lake Park effect

Week 9. You can interpret that line in dozens of ways when it comes to IHSA football. Or, in DuPage County, one way for each of our 28 football teams heading into the final game of the regular season.

This week's Eyes on Five looks a just a few of those interpretations.

Trickling down:

Kudos to Lake Park. The Lancers (5-3, 5-2

DuPage Valley Conference) all but guaranteed their first playoff berth since 2009 with Friday's overtime victory over Neuqua Valley. It's a feat that's even more impressive given a three-game losing streak that included back-toback gut-wrenching losses.

Lake Park persevered.
Again, an admirable accomplishment after last season's team closed the year with six straight losses. The heart clearly beats differently with this group.

The Lancers take a threegame winning streak into their Week 9 home game against Naperville Central, and a win would give the program a share of its first DVC title.

This is a moment to savor for Lake Park. The Lancers obviously don't have time to savor anything except the opportunity to prepare for their next game, but eventu-ally this will sink in.

And the trickle-down effect of their playoff qualification will reach the entire state.

Bounces:

Lake Park's revival from a 2-3 start surprised folks, but it also upset the bracket. There are eight playoff classes divided enrollment, and

firmly in the largest class. What that

means is one previ-slated team ously Class 8A is getting bumped down to Class

7A, the sec-ond-largest class. And that team looks to be Glenbard West.

The Hilltoppers competed in 8A last year and in 2014, and in 7A in 2015 and 2013. They've always tiptoed on the border between the two classes, and Lake Park's win likely pushes them to 7A. If other larger schools like Downers Grove South and Waubonsie Valley win to qualify, teams like Edwardsville and Maine South could drop to 7A.

Got all that? Good ... because Lake Park's trick-le-down effect reaches further down the bracket.

Willowbrook has been a 7A or 8A team since the expansion to eight classes in 2001, but this year the Warriors have teetered on the edge of 7A and 6A. Lake Park's qualification now likely drops the Warriors to 6A.

In the long run it may not make a difference for any of the teams. The top teams in 6A, 7A and 8A could win any

It's a matter of depth, though. If dropping down a class creates a better draw in the opening couple of rounds, it's worth it.

Safe and unsound:

Here's a rundown of where DuPage County's potential playoff teams

Six teams already have qualified with at least six wins — Glenbard West, Hinsdale Central, IC Catholic Prep, Naperville Central, Wheaton North and Willowbrook. A bunch of five-win teams also will qualify based on playoff points, which is a strengthof-schedule tiebreaker representing the total number of wins by opponents on a team's schedule.

Five-win teams Glenbard South, Lake Park, Montini and Naperville North will surpass the expected minimum playoff point total of 38 or 39. If four-win teams Downers Grove North, Downers Grove South, Glenbard North, Waubonsie Valley and Wheaton Academy win, they'll also qualify based on a

high number of playoff points.
Two five-win teams really need a clinching win to avoid the bubble: Hinsdale South and Neuqua Valley.

Hinsdale South enters the weekend with 34 play-off points and a tough game against Hinsdale Central. The Hornets will get four to six playoff points this weekend, putting them right on the bub-ble if they don't beat the Red Devils.

Neuqua Valley is in much more dire shape if it doesn't get a sixth win. With 32 playoff points, there's no way the Wildcats can reach 38 or 39 points. They pretty much have to beat Glenbard North to qualify.

Grand finale:

I can't believe we're entering the final weekend of DuPage Valley Conference football as we know it. The nineteam league is splitting in

half at the end of this school year, with Glenbard North, Lake Park, Wheaton North and Wheaton Warrenville South leaving to form the DuKane Conference with Batavia, Geneva, St. Charles East and St. Charles North.

The possible outcomes from Friday's grand finale are fascinating.

There could be a sole

champion in Naperville Central, or as many as three champions with the Redhawks, Lake Park and Wheaton North.

If Glenbard North and Waubonsie Valley win, there will be a remarkable

seven playoff-eligible teams among the nine DVC schools. Only Metea Valley and WW South are officially eliminated from postseason

play. mentioned earlier. though, Neuqua Valley likely won't qualify if Glenbard North beats the Wildcats. It simply adds to the intrigue of a weekend where every conference game matters.

One hope for Friday night ... I'd love to see WW South break out the hook-andladder one last time against Naperville North. Just for old times' sake.
