





Holiday concert at Willowbrook

Rams rally from a 20-point deficit to beat South Elgin

Nelson's six 3-pointers lead team to an overtime win in its conference

The Glenbard East boys basketball team staged a massive comeback to pull out a victory in Saturday's Up-state Eight Valley Conference season opener at South Elgin. The Rams, who trailed by 20 points at one point in the third quarter, rallied to earn a 74.73 overtime victory. 74-73 overtime victory

Glenbard East, which improved its overall record to 5-2, will play West Aurora in this Friday's conference game in Lombard. The Rams

will play a non-conference game at Palatine on Saturday. South Elgin led the Rams 24-14 at the end of the first quarter. The Storm's lead stood at 39-27 at half-Storm's lead stood at 39-27 at half-time. Leading by as many as 20 points in the third quarter, the Storm held what seemed to be a command-ing 55-40 lead by the end of the peri-od. South Elgin scored the first three points of the fourth quarter to expand its lead to 58-40.

Glenbard East sophomore Alijah Nelson caught fire from 3-point range in the fourth quarter, hitting four long-distance shots. Senior Korte Davis added a pair of 3-pointers for the Rams during the fourth quarter. Glenbard East and South Elgin were tied at 67-67 at the end of the fourth period.

We forced a bunch of turnovers and made four or five threes in a row," said Glenbard East coach Scott Miller of the fourth-quarter uprising. "A lot of good things came out of this game. It was our first conference game against one of the better teams we're going to play in our league. We were able to fight from behind. Now our guys know they can come back."

Playing its first home game of the 2017-18 season, the Willowbrook boys basketball team crushed Addison Trail 80-38 on Friday night in Villa Park. The lopsided victory moved the Warriors to 5-1 overall and 1-1 in West Suburban Gold Conference play. Willowbrook opened its conference season with an overtime

loss at Proviso East on Dec. 1.

The Warriors had plenty of motivation in their rout of Addison Trail. The Blazers ended Willowbrook's 2016-17 season by beating the Warriors 81-67 in an IHSA Class 4A regional semifinal game in Batavia on March 1. Willowbrook beat Addison Trail twice during the regular season, but the Blazers dominated the post-season meeting. A 23-0 run during the first half carried Addison Trail to a 33-6 lead in the second quarter of the playoff contest. The Blazers held a 40-23 halftime lead on their way to the victory, which ended the Warriors' special season. Willowbrook posted an overall record of 24-5 in 2016-17. The Warriors surged to a 21-1 record; their 24win total set a new program record for victories in a season. Willowbrook finished the season with three

straight losses.

Nearly everything went the War-riors' way in the first half of Friday's game. Willowbrook held a 22-10 lead at the end of the first quar-ter. The lead ballooned to 46-18 by halftime. Junior Matas Masys sank a 3-point shot to give the Warriors a 27-12 lead with about seven minutes left in the first half. Senior Ethan Schuemer's baseline jumper pushed the lead to 40-15 with about two minutes to play in the half. Senior Marshawn Phillips made a 3-pointer to move the lead to 43-15, and junior Levi Bentsen drained a 3-pointer at the first-half buzzer to give Willow-brook its 46-18 halftime advantage.

Phillips, who made a pair of 3-point shots during the game, finished the night with a team-leading 16 points. Bentsen drained five of six attempts from 3-point range to tally 15 points. Schuemer and junior Matas Masys each scored 13 points. Masys connected on three of his five 3-point attempts.

"We had to come out ready to-day," said Phillips after Friday's decisive victory. "We've got a lot of goals this year. One of the goals is winning conference; we also want to beat last year's record.

"We knew we're the better team," added Schuemer, who is beginning his third varsity season. "We definitely wanted to come out here and take care of business. We've got a re-ally deep lineup with guys who know how to play together, so it's really a fun team this year."

The Warriors will play a conference home game against Hinsdale South this Friday.

overall and 2-1 in conference play. Hinsdale South dropped to 7-2 overall and 1-1 in the conference. Senior Ethan Schuemer excelled


on both ends of the floor for the War-riors. He scored 20 points, grabbed 14 rebounds and blocked 10 shots.


The two teams were tied at 57-57 at the end of regulation. West Aurora outscored the Rams 11-4 in the four-minute overtime period.



Ex-Bears wideout visits Villa Park

Wendell Davis' career cut short by devastating injury; likes Trubisky, Cohen

Chicago Bears fans who watched the post-Super Bowl XX championship team era squads no

doubt remember Wendell Davis.

Davis was a productive wide receiver for the Bears during the last five years of Mike Ditka's tenure as head coach and the first season of Ditka's successor, Dave Wannstedt.

A first-round selection by the Bears in the 1988 draft (27th overall) Beas in the 1996 that (27 Overain) following an all-American career at Louisiana State University, Davis was the Bears' leading receiver for three straight years (1990-1992).

However, Wannstedt's inaugural

season would end up being Davis' final NFL campaign.

Davis' pro career essentially ended in a Week 6 game at Philadelphia's Veteran's Stadium on Oct. 10, 1993. He tried to plant his feet in order to catch a pass that was underthrown, but his cleats got stuck in the stadium's Astroturf. He tore the patella tendons in both legs so severely that his kneecaps were pushed into his thighs.

It was listed by bleacherreport. com as one of the most gruesome injuries in NFL history. A favorite target of quarterback

Jim Harbaugh—who went on to coach the San Francisco 49ers and is now the head coach at Michigan-Davis' best year as a pro occurred in 1991 when he caught 61 passes for 954 yards and six touchdowns while averaging 15.5 yards per catch-all

career highs.

Harbaugh attempted to loft a pass Davis on the play he was injured.
Davis spent several months in a wheelchair following surgery with a cast on each leg from the thigh to the

Davis, who recently visited Sal's Beverage World in Villa Park to meet Bears fans and sign autographs as part of a Miller Lite promotion, is nearly a quarter century removed from his career-ending injury (he attempted to make a comeback in 1995 with the Indianapolis Colts, but didn't appear in a game). He smiles now as he talks about the injury, but

it was no laughing matter when it entrepreneurial spirit," he said.

A November 1993 story by Sports Illustrated's Peter King said that "Davis felt something snap simultaneously in both knees, and he flopped to the artificial turf as if he'd been shot. He began screaming in pain. He tried to move his legs but

"There were so many emotions going through that period," Davis said. "The pain, the agony, just the thought of not being able to do what you love to do. It was an up and down period but fortunately for me, I had my family and a strong foundation to help me get through it. I also had the opportunity to try to come back, and that meant a lot to try to get out there but I just couldn't do it anymore.

Davis then had to make the transition from NFL player to a more

traditional career.
"I started a business when I was playing so I've always had an

Davis emphasizes to young athletes the importance of getting an education and having something to fall back on in case their dream of playing in college or perhaps professionally doesn't pan out.

"I tell kids to continue to dream because you never know," he said.
"Your dream could come true. But you've got to run your train on two rails. Don't be a monorail; you can only go so far. I tell them to put it on a two-track system—education and athletics. You can do both; that's why they call you a student-athlete."

These days, Davis is the manager of minority business development at NMPL Steel Company in Elk Grove

"It's a great opportunity to meet people, a great opportunity to make a difference in communities," said Davis, who recently started at the company

Davis still keeps his hands in the

game. In addition to doing eight or nine appearances for Miller Lite the Chicago area during football season, Davis serves as a volunteer coach at Wendell Phillips Academy High School in Chicago, which went undefeated this past

season and won the Class 5A state championship.

His son, Malcolm, is a running back at Cal-Poly University in San Luis Obispo, California.
"My wife (Patricia) and I are

empty-nesters now," said Davis, who once coached wide receivers for the San Francisco 49ers when Bears Hall of Fame linebacker Mike Singletary, his former teammate, was the 49ers' head coach. "We're just living life and enjoying Chicago."

Davis still follows his old team

and hopes the Bears can get on the right track after enduring what will be a third straight under-.500 season under head coach John Fox and general manager Ryan Pace. The Bears haven't had a winning season since they went 10-6 in 2012.

"My personal opinion is when you're rebuilding, and you come up with injuries that you don't expect and you're not really settled at the quarterback position, those things kind of piled up," Davis said of the 2017 Bears' campaign. "When they pile up like that, you tend to have a

priety subpar season.

"They're struggling in every way, but it's the game of football. You have to continue to play through the season. Hopefully from this, they can build something. A lot of fans are expecting them to do well next year so it's a real challenge."

One reason for optimism is the continued development of rookie quarterback Mitchell Trubisky.
"I think so far he's proven to be a good quarterback," Davis said. Davis says the electrifying Cohen reminds him of Dennis Gentry, another one of Davis' former Bear teammates who was around Cohen's size and also returned kicks.
"My wife calls him Dennis Gentry,"

Davis said. "I used to play with Dennis; he's one of my best friends and he really reminds me of Dennis Gentry because you can put him in open space

and he makes things happen and he's an exciting player."

Davis is pulling for wideout Kevin White to return to the field. White, the No. 7 overall pick in the 2015 draft, has been riddled with injuries throughout his brief NFL career. He's appeared in only five games over a three-year

period.
"My heart goes out to him because I've been that position before," Davis said. "It just so happens that unifortunately it happened for him two years in a row. He's a talented player and he just hasn't had the opportunity to show it.'









Warriors crush Glenbard North

Ohio State recruit Aaliyah Patty showcases talent for Montini

. Aaliyah Patty accepted the pass, eyed the basket and calmly hit the corner 3-point shot.

A 6-foot-3 high school girl shooting threes?

Patty's coach, Montini's Jason Nichols, doesn't mind it a bit.

"When I make them." Patty said. laughing.

All kidding aside, Patty at times resembles a guard trapped inside a post player's frame.

It's a big reason why Patty, a Montini senior, is committed to Ohio State. Her talent was on full display Dec. 27 at the Montini Christmas Tournament as Patty had 17 points, four rebounds and four steals in the Lady Broncos' 75-25 first-round win over Huntley.

Illysse Pitts added 15 points and Sam Mitchell had 11 for Montini (14-1), unbeaten against in-state opponents this year.

At alternate times against Huntley Patty resembled a true post, and at other times she fluidly operated on the perimeter. The latter usually came when Patty was paired with 6-foot-5 Wake Forest recruit Lindsey Jarosinski

Patty dropped in a perfect highpost pass to Jarosinski for Montini's first score. Later in the second half, she took a pass at the top of the key, faked and gracefully drove guardlike down the lane.

It's those kind of skills that Ohio State has encouraged Patty to develop.

"That's one thing they emphasize is I'm going to have to play more outside," Patty said. "I'm average height in college. They tell me to work on my threes, ballhandling. I'm trying to work on that.'

She's still comfortable in the post. like when Patty dropped in a baby hook from the post against Huntley.

"I still have to go inside where there are people shorter than me," Patty said. "When people can match my size, I can go outside and play both. At the college level, you have to work on both."

Hard to believe now, but Patty was somewhat of a late bloomer.

She played primarily on the sophomore level as a freshman, with cameos on varsity. By last year she was one of the best players on Montini's team that took third in Class 4A. Now Patty is clearly the alpha female.

"Some times kids just aren't ready [when they first get to high schooll," Nichols said, "It took her a little time. It didn't mean she wasn't going to be good."

Patty is very good now, averaging 15 points and 10 rebounds a night. She's even made close to 20 3-pointers this year, shooting the highest percentage from beyond the arc on Montini.

Nichols asks who's better in Illinois' senior class. And he thinks she can be better.

"I still think she can bring a little bit more to the table," Nichols said. "I think she can score more, be efficient more. To me she's a 20 and 10 kid every night, a player who can go inside and out. She is easily one of the top players in the state of Illinois. I love her. She just has to show up every night. I want her to dominate even more. I know she has it in her."

With Patty and Jarosinski, Montini has twin posts that few teams can match. Depth, though, is an issue. Junior guard Zoe Zacker tore her ACL in Montini's first game of the season - her third ACL injury in high school.

That depth could be put to the test this week with opponents such as unbeatens Nazareth and Geneva.

"We need [Francesca Kokkines] and Sydney [Prochaska] to be more consistent because we don't have a lot of depth," Nichols said. "But we're trying to develop. You can still be good when you have good seniors and good juniors, and we have that.'





The Willowbrook High School Concert Choir will soon premiere a piece created in memory and honor of former District 88 Board member Mark Johnson.


Johnson, a 1966 Willowbrook



Regarding his team's performance, Doran noted the overall improvement after playing a number of high-caliber programs in a condensed period. The Dukes (8-5) missed an opportunity to add to their recent run. They won the tourney twice and finished second in a six-year run leading up to the 2017 tournament.

"Our kids get really excited about the tournament," he said. "It's a different feeling. I thought it was a great performance by us this year."

York junior guard Nick Kosich was the only Duke named to the 2017 Jack Tosh All-Tournament Team. Kosich averaged 11.3 points, two rebounds, two assists and 2.8 steals per game.






that didn't happen."

Wrestling: Willowbrook's Jack Jessen hungry for missing ingredient in Champaign

Northwestern recruit searching for state title to cap off his storied career

He has already established himself as one of the most decorated wrestlers in the history of the sport.

But there is a hard-to-fathom missing ingredient to the storied career of Willowbrook senior Jack Jessen: an individual state championship.

The Northwestern-bound 182-pounder has a national championship to his credit —the Greco title—as one of eight All-American efforts the last three-plus years at the famed Fargo tournament. But Jessen suffered three of his seven career high school losses in either the finals or the semifinals of the Class 3A state wrestling tournament.

"I think about it every day," Jessen said of his twin runners-up and one third-place result at the state meet in Champaign. "To come that close and not get [one state title]. I relive the things I could have done differently, the little mistakes I made."

Jessen is in a customary spot as the last third of the season comes into focus.

After extending his season-long winning streak to 34 matches with yet another tournament triumph in Sycamore last weekend, Jessen is ranked No. 1 in the authoritative illinoismatmen.com rankings among large-school 182-pounders.

Jessen was 50-0 last season heading into his state-championship match, only to be denied by Marian Catholic senior Kordell Norfleet in the finals.

After concluding an equally remarkable football career at the Villa Park high school last fall with nearly 5,000 total rushing yards, Jessen is ranked third in the nation at his weight class.

Jessen has made quite a name for himself in the West Suburban Gold during his wrestling career.

"He's not just good in the state but also nationally," Hinsdale South coach Bobby O'Brien said of Jessen. "He is so technically sound."

"In my opinion, he's the best kid in the country," Addison Trail coach Rob Serio said. "He's that good."

"He is relentless," Downers South coach Sean Lovelace said.

Jessen accumulates wrestling points like a pinball-machine phenomenon.

After averaging exactly 50 wins per season in his first three years, Jessen currently has 184 career wins.

Only four wrestlers have eclipsed the 200-win plateau in state history.

"It would be amazing to get to that 200-win club," said Jessen, whose seven career losses have all come at the hands of eventual state champions.

In his 184 victories, Jessen has also broke the program career pin mark set by two-time Class AA state champion Mike Behnke. He's also become the first athlete in Willowbrook wrestling annals to exceed 1,000 takedowns.

"Those are the benchmarks Jack is looking for," Willowbrook coach Brandon Murphy said of adding the career win total [201] to his legacy. "He is doing unique things."

Murphy has twin agendas for Jessen as the Warriors have fallen out of contention for a conference championship.

Nationally-ranked and consensus state top-ranked Montini is also a prohibitive favorite to represent the area programs in the dual-meet team state series.

Individuality, thus, takes center stage for Jessen.

"That's the stat we don't like," Murphy said of Jessen also finishing runner-up as a freshman and third as a sophomore. "His plan this year is to [win state] and get ready for college."

Jessen inked his letter of intent to Northwestern during the early signing period last fall after orally committing to the Big Ten program as a junior.

Jessen also considered North Carolina, North Carolina St. and Stanford.

"I visited [the Evanston campus] and I instantly fell in love with it," Jessen said. "I didn't want to go anywhere else. Being so close to home, I get to represent Illinois and Chicago."

But Jessen plans on a dress rehearsal at Illinois' other Big Ten school before graduation.

Alexa Scimeca Knierim and Chris Knierim named sole U.S. pair for 2018 PyeongChang Olympics

Married couple and pairs team **Alexa Scimeca Knierim** and **Chris Knierim** were selected as the pair to represent the United States at the 2018 PyeongChang Olympics, U.S. Figure Skating announced on Sunday. The U.S. only had a single pairs quota spot at the Games, its fewest spots since the first Winter Olympics in 1924 in Chamonix, France.

The Knierims are the first married U.S. pair to make an Olympics in 20 years, since **Jenni Meno** and **Todd Sand** at the 1998 Nagano Games.

Scimeca Knierim and Knierim won the national title in 2015 and 2018, but the years in between weren't an easy ride. Starting in April 2016, Scimeca Knierim began suffering from a **debilitating stomach illness**. She was even throwing up the night before her wedding to Knierim in June 2016. They missed most of the season, returning to competitive ice at the 2017 Four Continents Championships. Incidentally, that event took place inside the same venue that will host 2018 Olympic figure skating.

"This proves that everything I went through was so worth it," Scimeca Knierim said in a press conference. "I'll never forget how hard we had to work to get back to the place that we are now."

The pair has been the U.S.' strongest, partly due to their high-flying signature element, the quad twist. They are the first U.S. pair to execute the element in competition, doing so en route to their first national title in 2015. They brought it back for 2018 nationals, when Scimeca Knierim's stomach had healed enough to start training the element in earnest.

At the past three world championships, the Knierims have been the top placing U.S. team:

- 2017: 10th
- 2016: 9th
- 2015: 7th

As the only pair team for the U.S. in South Korea, the Knierims will be responsible for the team event competition short program and free skate on top of the pairs event short program and free skate in the span of about a week. Scimeca Knierim said because they train at altitude in Colorado Springs, Colorado, their bodies would hold up. Plus, she said, she has a spirit that would compete forever; at their first Olympics, they're seeing this extra responsibility as an honor.

The Knierims join the singles skaters named to the team earlier: **Nathan Chen**, **Adam Rippon**, and **Vincent Zhou** for the men, plus **Bradie Tennell**, **Mirai Nagasu**, and **Karen Chen** (no relation to Nathan).

Tarah Kayne and **Danny O'Shea**, the 2016 U.S. champions and this year's silver medalists, were named as the alternate team. Kayne suffered a concussion in the 2017 nationals short program and had to withdraw, then recovered from an unrelated knee surgery for much of this season. Kayne and O'Shea only returned to competition in December.
