

The Willowbrook boys basketball team brought some hard-earned momentum into this week's Class 4A playoffs.

The Warriors wrapped up the regular season with a victory over York in the second-place game in the West Suburban Conference annual crossover series.

The win pushed Willowbrook to 23-5 overall and gave it its fourth win a row heading into the regional. Willowbrook finished second in the WSC Gold Division with a 9-3 record, behind league-champion Hinsdale South.

"We started off sluggish against York and were down at the half," said Willowbrook coach Chris Per-

Strong shooting helped the Warriors earn the win. "We shot the ball well," said Perkins. "We hit 10

Our full-court pressure and halfcourt trap got us some easy looks.

Sophomore Everett Stubblefield led the Warriors with 24 points. Marshwan Phillips had 16 points, while Matas Masys added 10 points. Ethan Schuemer added eight points. Stubblefield has been with the varsity squad since being called up seven or eight games ago, Perkins said.

Perkins noted the root cause of the recent winning streak has varied. "Every game is something different," he said. "We are doing a good job of moving the ball and playing together on the offensive end of the floor. We're scrappy and we play hard on the defensive end. I like where we are at and hopefully we can sustain that and keep going in the playoffs.'

Sitting at 23-5 and the No. seed in the sectional, Perkins said his squad has plenty of motivation. The kids are very motivated," he said. "Mostly the whole lineup experienced what it was like last year to have an early exit from the playoffs. Hopefully they have a chip on their shoulder.

Trojans break 20-win mark have potential and talent. All they had to and advance to sectional championship game

The Timothy Christian girls' basketball team turned up the jets and then some once the calendar turned to 2018.

From January forward coming back from the school's Renew term break, the Trojans lost only two games and finished the season with a 20-10 record.

The Trojans won a Class 2A regional title and advanced all the way to a Class 2A sectional fitle game where they lost to Chicago Harlan.

Timothy also finished 8-4 in Metro Suburban Conference Red Division play. Timothy's 20 wins are the most since Strube's second season at the helm where the team went 15-13 after going 5-22 the previous year. Last year, the Trojans finished 13-15 for a second year in a row.

'I'm beyond thrilled," said Strube, who coaches the team with her husband, Jon Strube. 'It was a great end to our season. We played fantastic against bigger teams. The girls proved to themselves that they

"It's going to be hard losing Olivia and Emily," said Strube. "Olivia has been consistent and strong for us all year and Emily DeBoer really came on the last three weeks. That was fun to see from her. We will have a different dynamic next year. It's going to be hard losing those two, but we are going to be able to fill in what we are losing with some sophomores

Freshmen Hannah Schuringa and Sureya Alex both played key roles for the Trojans this season. "Hannah will be a beautiful player," said Strube. "She will break records. Sureya also had a great season. Both of them stepped right in this season and helped us.

Two other freshmen, Sarah Carstensen and Greta Hookstra, also were brought up to the varsity at the tail end of the season and will provide further reinforcements next season, Strube noted.

The stellar results this season did not surprise Strube. "Jon and I always hoped

with this group," she said. "We have really great potential. It took a lot of work and constant coaching and instruction. But the girls work so hard and listen so well. They trust us and believe in us and they kept working and working. I love the hard work and all the time they put in over the last four months. There were times when we were going six days a week. I couldn't be prouder of this group. All their hard work showed on the court. It stinks when you lose by one or two points. There are some games from the beginning of the season that we would like to play again because we played so well the last month of the season

"We always knew there was potential here. It's fun to see it finally show on the court. These are amazing young women who come from fabulous families. It's nice that it all came out on the court. They showed their talent."

Strube was impressed with how the team played in the regional title game against

"I always love defense and it's fun to see the different defenses we played and see them pay off," she said. "We held Lisle's big scorer to seven points. She had 30 points against Westmont. She didn't make one basket against us, it was all free throws. We lost to Lisle in overtime last

year and to do what we did on the court against them was a great moment for the girls.

Strube noted Heidi Westra and Abby Carstensen provided the defensive help in the Lisle game. "That girl was 5-4 and Heidi is 6-2 and Abby is 5-4 so we put height and speed on her and it worked," she explained.

Strube tipped her hat to Chicago Harlan, which won the sectional title and went on to place second in the state in Class 2A.

"Harlan was fabulous," she said. "I'm not ashamed of how we played against them. We played the best we probably could. We were nervous and turned the ball over 26 times. You cannot do that in the sectional championship game. They had four players in double figures. They were a good team. Their coach knew what to do to us. They saw us play in the previous game and Olivia had 21 points and Emily had 16 points. Against Harlan it was three and five points. He shut them down.'

Strube is already looking forward to what is ahead. "We can come back and do good things." she said. "We saw that against Harlan. What happened this season is a great sign for our future.

Knights defeat Timothy Christian thanks to fourth-quarter freethrow shooting

The free throw was the IC Catholic Prep boys basketball team's best friend.

The Knights made 31 of 41 free throws, including a 22-for-30 effort in the fourth quarter alone, on their

to a 54-45 win over crosstown neighbor Timothy Christian in the championship game of the Class 2A Guerin Prep regional.

The win was IC Catholic Prep's third regional crown under coach TJ Tyrrell. This was the Knights seventh regional-championship game appearance in a row, the past six coming under Tyrrell's direction.

"It was a huge win," said Tyrrell. "It felt good to avenge the loss to them earlier in the season and to

walk away with the hardware."
IC Catholic Prep lost at Timothy Christian earlier in the season. "The last time we played them it was at their home gym and we had a very slow start," said Tyrrell. "In that game, Timothy started very quick and shot the ball very well. We were down 20-6 after the first quarter. We battled back and won the next three quarters combined, but lost 50-42. Losing that game actually was a good thing to help us to really look at areas we needed to improve on and prepare for against Timothy."

Tyrrell said an adjusted game plan worked well in the regional title game. "I thought we came in with a very good game plan," he said. "We wanted to slow the pace down and really throw them off with our zone defense. We scored a quick basket early and then they scored the next

six points. We called a timeout and didn't want a repeat of last time. That settled our guys down and they scored only four more points in the half. It was a very low-scoring game in the first half."

IC Catholic Prep led 10-8 after the first quarter and 16-10 at halftime. We held them to two points in the second quarter," the coach pointed out. "We felt we were in a very good spot at halftime being up and having that lead. That was a good place mentally for us.

Timothy cut IC Catholic Prep's lead to 25-23 after three quarters. "In the second half, we knew Timothy would come out more aggressive and

try to pick up the speed a little bit," said Tyrrell. "We had a few runs back and forth and both teams battled.

Tyrrell felt a key turning point in the game in the fourth quarter was a possession where the Knights ended up scoring five points via a combination of a shooting foul and a technical foul. Kevin Cheng made 3 of 4 free throws during the sequence and IC Catholic Prep scored a basket on the ensuing possession after the throws.


"That extended the lead to 10 points at that point," said Tyrrell. We had the momentum in our favor and felt pretty good and then all of

No. 1 Naperville North (25-2) vs. Nc. 8 Geneva (19-12)

Class 4A Naperville North regional final

Outlook: The Huskies won their 10th straight game in a 69-50 semifinal victory over Hinsdale Central. They improved to 10-0 at home, so playing at the Madhouse on Mill is an obvious advantage. The Huskies' frontcourt tandem of 6-foot-7 Chris Johnson and 6-6 Tom Welch combined for 44 points and 14 rebounds on Tuesday. If Jack Hill gets hot on the perimeter, watch out. The focus for the defense will be on Geneva's perimeter game that knocked down 10 3-pointers in Wednesday's 62-44 win over Downers North. Mitch Mascarl had six of them while scoring 20 points.

Advancement: The winner advances to Tuesday's Glenbard East sectional semifinals against the winner of the Hinsdale South regional final between Hinsdale South and Willowbrook.

No. 4 Hinsdale South (21-6) vs. No. 5 Willowbrock (24-5)

Class 4A Hinsdale South regional final

Outlook: The third meeting between these West Suburban Gold rivals — they split in the regular season — will be must-see basketball. Willowbrook showed tremendous focus in a 71-44 semiffinal win over Metea Valley. The Warriors attack teams in so many ways, from 6-foot-6 Ethan Schuemer in the post to 3-point artist Matas Masys. Hinsdale South's clear counter is 6-5 lowa State-bound forward Zion Griffin, who had 39 points and 17 rebounds in the last meeting. The Hornets, 11-0 at home, edged DeKalb in the semifinals.

Advancement: The winner advances to Tuesday's Glenbard East sectional semifinals against the winner of the Naperville North regional final between Naperville North and Geneva.

No. 2 Benet (24-4) vs.

Class 4A Addison Trail regional final

Outlook: Benet has held 16 opponents under 45 points so far this season. Can Naperville Central's balanced offense break through? As bough as it'll be, the Redhawks have the ideal inside-outside approach with point guard Tyler O'Brien and 6-foot-8 Ben Wolf, committed to Northern Michigan. But the Redwings have answers to both with 6-8 sophomore Colin Crothers and two of the area's top perimeter defenders in leading scorer David Buh and Ben Cooney. Benet beat Downers South and Naperville Central held off Glenbard West in the semifinals.

Advancement: The winner advances to Wednesday's Glenbard East sectional semifinals against the winner of the Bartlett regional final between Wheaton Warrenville South and Bartlett.

No. 3 Wheaton Warrenville South (23-6)

vs. No. 12 Bartlett (16-12)

Class 4A Bartlett regional final

Outlook: WW South was sharp in beating Wheaton North 53-37 in the semifinals. Play like that again with experienced seniors Jake Healy, Parker Robinson and Chase Stebbins leading the way, and the Tigers will win another regional title. Three-pointers from Matt Brodhead and Jeff Kratz make them even tougher to beat. Standing in the way, though, is an intriguing Bartlett team that upset No. 6 Batavia 42-37 on Wednesday. The Hawks played 12 games without leading scorer Ben Tompson, who was out with an ankle injury. This will be their 11 th game with him.

Our high school sports coverage generally doesn't include institutions such as Marquette Manor Baptist Academy in Downers Grove because they're not affiliated with the Illinois High School Association.

Regardless, the Minutemen do a bang-up job within their own realm, the Illinois Asso-ciation of Christian Schools. The school has won 13 IACS titles in boys soccer, six in girls volleyball and one in boys basketball.

In fact on Feb. 24 Marquette Manor's girls basketball team won its second IACS Championship in three seasons. The Minutemen (20-1) beat Rockford's North Love Christian School 37-18 behind senior forward Stephanie Woods' 19 points and 8 rebounds, and 5 assists from Joanna Schlagel of Downers Grove. The title game was held at Berean Bap-

tist School in Rockford.
"The defensive side was probably the strength, team defense," said athletic direc-tor Matt Scalzitti, a 1998 graduate of Marquette Manor, which for years hosted the annual "Centurion Classic," a boys basketball all-star game between teams of suburban and Chicago players.

Woods, Schlagel, senior guard Ashley Henkle of Downers Grove and senior forward Hannah Schuster of Willowbrook also played on the 2015-16 Marquette Manor team that went 19-3 and won the IACS title over Romeoville Christian.

The girls program wasn't always a dynasty, or even a program. It was renewed seven years ago, Scalzitti said. and in the first two seasons the varsity team won two games. In the five years since Schlagel's older brother, Paul, has coached the team Marquette Manor has gone 72-26.

The reasons are the same as in the IHSA.

"It's personnel, it's good coaching," Scalzitti said.

Hornets' Griffin elevated his game

Zion Griffin rose.

Above opponents and teammates — and absolutely above the rim — the Hinsdale South senior forward exploded down the court on a breakaway. Every one knew what was next.

The home crowd in Darien came to its feet as Griffin rose for a thunderous twohanded dunk.

Griffin didn't know it at the time but that exclamation point on a win over Downers Grove South also turned out to be his 1,000th varsity point, a milestone requiring only 53 games.

The moment perfectly summed up the previous year for Griffin, who transformed himself from a good high school player into an elite college prospect committed to Iowa State University. From a low-to-mid-major flyer into a tal-ent coveted by Power Five conferences.

Elite, in fact, is a word that began sur-rounding Griffin during the last year. And rising? Well, that's just what Grif-

fin does.

"From between last season and this season, I felt I had to get that motor going," Griffin said. "I want to be remembered here when I leave and I feel like my impact last year wouldn't get me there. I still had more stuff on the table."

Rising to the occasion for himself and his team this season, Griffin is the 2017-18 Daily Herald DuPage County All-Area Basketball Team Captain.

Responding

It's not like Griffin struggled his junior year, his first on varsity. An All-Area hon-oree, he averaged 17.3 points and 8.2 rebounds — numbers he boosted this season to 21.1 points and 9 rebounds.

Colleges, however, remained luke warm on him.

"I made a highlight video of him last year and sent it to a ton of schools," said Hinsdale South coach Brett Moore. "I

did not get one response."
It became Griffin's mission to improve his game. Not just for himself but for the team he yearned to take deeper in the

Between adding the ability to consistently knock down 3-pointers — he hit 40 this season compared to attempting only five his entire junior year — and the improved ability to rely on both hands, everything came together during an off-season playing for the Illinois Hoopers AAU team.

No longer did Griffin need to be a 6-foot-5 post player. Now he could play anywhere and thrive.
"He's always had the athleticism," Moore said. "He was kind of seen as a tweener until he showed he could shoot the 3. He developed a 3-point shot and

he jumped up a level with colleges."

Mere months after hearing nothing on Griffin's junior video, Moore started getting calls from all corners of the coun-The offers flooded in as Griffin and his mother, Santina Guyton, took the recruiting journey together. Griffin boarded an airplane for the

Captain

first time during his official visit to Ames and Iowa State University. It was his dream to play college basketball, and the reality often seemed unreal.

"It was a good experience for me and my family," Griffin said. "It was fun, but it was also a little stressful. We did all our research and learned as we went. It worked out."

Among an array of college scholarship offers rarely seen among past DuP-age County prep standouts, Griffin ulti-mately committed in September to Iowa State to be part of an intriguing Chicago-land-heavy recruiting class that includes Simeon's Talen-Horton Tucker and Cor-liss' George Conditt.

The Cyclones emerged victorious from the other members of Griffin's list of final four schools — Illinois State, Pittsburgh and Kansas. Yes, that Kansas. Griffin, though, felt at home in Ames.

"Colleges weren't going to recruit a 6-5 center," Griffin said. "I had to open up my arsenal a little bit and put the pieces of my game together. And it blos-somed from there."

The next level

In the matter of a few months Griffin's college stock matched his level of play.

Zion Griffin rose.
"His improvement between his junior and senior year was a huge leap," said Wil-lowbrook coach Chris Perkins. "If you can get 1,000 points in two years, that's pretty remarkable '

Griffin scored at will during Hinsdale South's February victory over Willowbrook.

He reached 39 points midway through the fourth quarter and, like the dunk on his 1,000th point, he didn't know he was so close to 40. Griffin never reached that milestone, choosing instead to do everything else necessary to secure a 69-63

Hinsdale South went on to win a second straight West Suburban Gold title and takes a 21-6 record into Friday's Class 4A Hinsdale South regional title game. A victory there gives the program an unprecedented third straight regional championship.
Griffin not only transformed himself the

last two years. He also helped transform the Hornets.

"He went from not being able to drib-ble at all with his right hand to being one of the best players in the state," said senior teammate Robert Barnes. "I saw his work ethic every day so I could see it coming."

Griffin knows the work can't stop at the next level. He eventually aims to develop into an NBA-caliber player, but that's a long way off. He's been told by Iowa State coaches that he'll play where he's capable of defending and, for someone who's only been playing basketball since the seventh

grade, it'll be a steep learning curve.
But he's prepared to meet the challenge, rising every step of the way.

"I want to make all my weaknesses stronger," Griffin said. "I want a scouting report on me to not know what to do."

Tom Welch, Naperville North


