Outlook: The sectional championship will come down to dictating the pace. Willowbrook needs to speed up the game, similar to how the Warriors rallied to beat Naperville North in the semifinals. Benet won't slow the play, but the Redwings will try to make Willowbrook work for everything in the halfcourt instead of chasing in the fullcourt. Schuemer, averaging 15.8 points and 8.8 rebounds, has been Willowbrook's leader for three seasons, and it'll be a tough post matchup for Crothers, averaging 10 points and 6 rebounds. Two of DuPage County's top defenders — Cooney and Zafar — are featured. Cooney could draw Masys, who's hit 67 3-pointers, while Zafar likely will guard Buh, Benet's leading scorer at 13 points a game. The benches could play a huge role. Guard Jake Ronneberg and 6-7 junior Noah Ferrell are key for Benet. Willowbrook goes a little deeper. Sophomore Everett Stubblefield III scored all 16 of his points in the second half while helping the Warriors rally against Naperville North. Big-game experience is on Benet's side. The Redwings have won three sectional titles since 2010. Willowbrook, which won its first regional title since 2004, seeks the first sectional title in program history

Metea Valley enjoyed its best season in school history in 2017, advancing to a sectional semifinal and finishing 21-10-1. Fortunately for the Mustangs, most who made last season possible return. Junior Colin Szezsenv finished as top goal scorer in 2017 with 83 goals and 25 steals. "Colin's biggest asset would be his ability to gain position in hole set and keep it. He's extremely motivated," coach Adam Zankowski said. Plenty of depth is back on offense, including junior Tyler Flanders, senior Andrew Eber, senior Ashton Howser, junior Brady Frdman and junior Raphael Kosta. Senior Jordan Brosius was tough defensively with 17 steals Flanders was named all-sectional, "Returning players are expected to play a smart, tough defense and make fast offensive decisions to control the game their way," Zankowski said. With a tougher game schedule than years past, for this year to be a success the team will need to continue playing tough and together, keeping strong communication evident. Townsend was an all-sectional pick. Junior Jack Hiss brings speed to the team and like others, a strong dedication to the squad. Sophomore goalie Allen Rosenberg was on the JV last year but saw varsity play. It was another big season for the York Dukes in 2017. The team finished 24-7-2, reaching a sectional final. Many of the players responsible for that success are gone, but coach Brian Drumm is optimistic that those lineup holes can be filled and the team continues its

# **Everett Stubblefield III sparks** Willowbrook rally in sectional semifinal

LOMBARD - Everett Stubblefield III wasn't even listed on Willowbrook's roster for the sectional program, but the sophomore guard's talent is no secret to his teammates.

Just ask Ethan Schuemer.

The Warriors' star senior post said the older guys talked up Stubblefield to their coach before his midseason promotion.

His last game on the sophomore team, Stubblefield went for 42 points against Downers Grove South. Stubblefield finally made his varsity debut against Larkin Jan. 23.

'When he finally came up, we were like all right, it's about time," Schuemer said. "He's obviously been a key to our team. He came up huge again."

If Stubblefield was a secret before, he indeed won't be now.

Stubblefield scored all 16 of his points in the second half – 12 coming during an electric performance in the last four minutes of the third quarter.

Together with Schuemer's 16 points, fifth-seeded Willowbrook rallied to knock off top seed Naperville North 47-43 in a Class 4A Glenbard East Sectional semifinal on March 6.

Willowbrook (26-5), which just won its first regional championship since 2004 last week, will go for the program's first sectional title March 9 against Benet.

It can thank its precocious sophomore guard, who lit a fuse on what had been a sleepy two-plus quarters offensively.

"They told me when I came up to varsity they wanted me to come in and score, to bring energy to the team, Stubblefield said. "Once I got in the mood of the game I started to calm down and I think my confidence increased."

His confidence was on full display during the third quarter against Naperville North.

With Willowbrook trailing 26-18, Stubblefield swished back-to-back 3-pointers, then showcased his lightning speed in scoring a transition basket to cut the margin to 27-26.

As the final seconds ticked down in the third quarter, Stubblefield kept his dribble, then buried a deep 3-pointer from near 30 feet with 6-foot-7 Chris Johnson of Naperville North in his crosshairs.

It capped a 12-1 Willowbrook run to end the quarter, all Stubblefield points, that sent the Warriors into the fourth quarter ahead 30-27.



"I saw the clock going down, felt the crowd's energy, I'd already hit two 3s," said Stubblefield, who attempted just two shots in the first half, "so I just pulled up."

It's the kind of spark Willowbrook coach Chris Perkins has grown used to seeing.

"He's been up about 12 games, and he's averaged double digits. He's been great for us," Perkins said. "We knew he had the talent to be up; it was just a matter of when. He came in tonight, got hot, gave us a boost and the rest of the guys fed off of that."

Schuemer and the rest took it from

The St. Cloud St. recruit battled all night in the post with Johnson and 6-foot-6 North junior Tom Welch, but got the best of the matchup down the

points in the fourth quarter. In the game's final seconds, after Welch hit two free throws for North, Schuemer broke the Huskies' pressure and passed ahead to Stubblefield for the clinching layup.

"He's been our rock ever since he's been with us," Perkins said. "I'm never shocked when he does what he does. Add another name to the list.'

Add another big win to Willowbrook's list.

The Warriors won a dramatic overtime game at Hinsdale South in the regional final, and the momentum appears to have carried over.

"If we can beat a team like Naperville North, we really believe we can come out and beat any of these teams," Schuemer said.

Matt Myers and Sikander Zafar both

Schuemer scored eight of his 16 added four points for Willowbrook. In a stunning reversal, the Warriors shot 25 percent in the first half - but 62.5 percent in the second in rallying from down 20-12 at halftime.

"The first half I felt like the guys were adjusting to their length," Perkins said. "Once the guys settled down, once we got some easy baskets and sped the game up, the momentum turned to our side, and then it was like an avalanche. We can go on rolls like that."

Welch scored 17 points and Johnson added 12 for North (26-3), which was hurt greatly at the free-throw line. The Huskies were just 6-for-14 for the game, 1-for-7 in the fourth quarter.

"They had the size advantage, but we definitely had the speed advantage," Schuemer said. "When we play like we did in the second half, we're tough to beat.





Team improves to 23-5; will play at this week's Class 4A Hinsdale South Regional

The Willowbrook boys basketball team wrapped up the regular season with last week's 68-62 victory over York in Villa Park. The contest was a crossover game featuring the sec-ond-place teams in the West Subur-

ban Gold and Silver Conferences.

Willowbrook, which finished second to Hinsdale South in the West Suburban Gold Conference standings, completed the 2017-18 regular season with an overall record of 23-5. The Warriors are one victory away from matching the program record for wins in a season.

program record for wins in a season. Last year's team set the new record by posting 24 victories.

The Warriors will open the IHSA Class 4A post-season with this week's game against either Metea Valley or Lake Park. A victory in the playoff opener would propel Willowbrook into this Friday's regional final, The Warriors would likely play Hinsdale South. The two teams split their two meetings during the regular season, with each team winning on its home court.

In addition to finishing the regular season on a winning note, the Warriors completed an unblemished home-court effort with their Feb. 20 win over York. Willowbrook closed out the season with a 10-0 home re-

Beating York wasn't easy for the Warriors, who trailed the visiting Dukes 18-10 after the opening quarter. York increased its lead to 22-10 before Willowbrook sliced the lead to 24-23. Senior Marshawn Phillips made a pair of 3-point shots during the Warriors' 13-2 run, while junior Matas Masys made one 3-pointer. York rebuilt its lead to 38-27 with about two minutes left in the first half. Willowbrook sophomore Everett Stubblefield, who joined the varsity team in January, scored the Warriors' last five points of the first half with a 3-point shot and a 2-point shot. York led the Warriors

39-31 at halftime.
The Dukes held a 46-37 advantage midway through the third quarter, but the Warriors unleashed a 14-0 run to take a 51-46 lead. Stubblefield contributed a steal and basket early in the run. He added basket early in the run. He added a 3-point shot to cut York's lead to 46-44. A steal and basket by Phil-lips tied the game at 46-46 with about 2:20 left in the third quarter. Stubblefield gave the Warriors a 49-46 lead when he drained a corner 3-point shot. Willowbrook led York 51-49 at the end of the third quarter.

The Dukes regained the lead after making a 3-point shot during the first minute of the fourth quarter. The Warriors then scored straight points—two baskets by Masys and one by senior Neil Pax-ton—to take a 57-52 lead. York then scored five straight points to even

Stubblefield, who made six of 10


shots from 3-point range, scored a team-leading 24 points.

# Conroy cites inequity in insurance coverage for addiction treatment

Continuing her efforts to raise awareness about the opioid crisis and hold insurance companies accountable, state Rep. Deb Conroy, D-Villa Park, re-cently convened the House Mental Health Committee to discuss inequity in "Our hearing in December reaffirmed the committee's understanding that

"Our hearing in December reaffirmed the committee's understanding that the lack of insurance parity in Illinois is a large barrier to treatment for those who struggle with addiction," said Conroy, who chairs the committee. "It has been 10 years since the federal parity law was signed and in that time we have seen the opioid addiction reach epidemic proportions. The Illinois Department of Public Health released a report that shows that overdoses continue to rise, Narcan use is way up, and deaths continue to rise but hospital admittance is down. The lack of parity enforcement directly contributes to the rising numbers." the rising numbers.

Both the federal government and the state of Illinois have laws in place to require insurance companies to provide the same coverage for mental health and addiction treatment as they would for any other health treatment. Even with these laws in place, expert panelists shared their struggles with insurance parity in the Illinois insurance market.

ance parity in the Illinois insurance market.

Dr. Tom Britton of the Gateway Foundation, an organization dedicated to alcohol and drug treatment, spoke about his struggles with insurance providers when trying to provide the most effective treatment plans for his patients. Critical treatments are withheld until insurance companies approve them, which can take up to 48 hours. Insurance companies can "claw-back" on services that have already been approved for coverage and require patients to pay back the cost of the services received. Luke Thomsha of the Perfectly Flawed Foundation stated that his insurance company would only cover sevendays of the minimum 30 days he would need at a recovery facility to avoid relapsing.

relapsing.

Legislators questioned the practice of the Department of Insurance in light of a report by the Kennedy Forum, which highlights the lack of insurance compliance for mental health and addiction treatment. Of the 8,000 consumer complaints received by the department last year, only 37 were for mental health or addiction related treatments, raising concerns as to how the Department of Insurance can proactively enforce parity laws and ensure that customers who are being denied coverage are aware of their ability to file a complaint.

complaint.

"It is not the patients' job to enforce the laws. That responsibility belongs to the Department of Insurance. I want to thank the Kennedy Forum for their commitment to this issue," said Conroy. "The House Mental Health Committee will continue to fight this issue and hold the Department of Insurance accountable for enforcing mental health and addiction parity. This is about the treatment and care of our brain health. Parity dictates that insurance companies treat it that same as any other health issue."



# School districts say student safety is highest priority

"Out and About" reached out to four area public school districts to get comments regarding the Feb. 14 mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Fla.

Following are some of the responses, all of which included condolences and sympathy for those affected

Anthony Palmisano, District 45 superintendent, stated: "Please be assured that the safety of our students and staff remains our highest priority. District 45 is grateful to have a strong partnership with the local law enforcement agencies that serve our community."

"I want to assure you that safety of our students is our top priority at Glenbard East," stated Principal Shahe Bagdasarian.

"The safety of our students and staff is our No.1 priority in light of the recent tragic incidents at Mariory Stoneman Douglas High School in Florida and Marshall County High School in Kentucky," echoed District 88 Superintendent Scott Helton

School Board President Courtney Long related that Ted Stec, school district superintendent, in a memo to the Lombard Elementary School District 44 School Board, was slated to discuss school security at an upcoming board meeting, and indicated to the board that "se curity has become front and center in the education world."

"Certainly we have a commit-ment to safety," Long emphasized. "From a board perspective, we talk safety on a regular basis."

All four districts have plans in place that, while not outlined in specific detail for obvious reasons, are focused on preventing and/or dealing with a crisis situation.

Stated Palmisano: "We review our comprehensive crisis plans

with our first responders on a reg-ular basis and they work with us to conduct our active threat drills. "Regular training also prepares

our employees for critical responses to unthinkable situations. By es to unthinkable situations. By Board of Education directive, the District 45 Safety Committee constantly updates our crisis plans and procedures."
"We have a comprehensive crisis

plan in place to help avoid trage-dies such as this," Bagdasarian said, adding, "The plan is reviewed and updated annually."

Helton mentioned that the school uses video cameras "in key places" both inside and outside of the buildings, to which local first responders

have access. He said the school has resource officers who are "on-duty, active officers there to work with us in our mission to maintain the security of our schools."

Additionally, he continued, the district has crisis plans that are reviewed annually with local police and fire departments, as well as ongoing drills, mock lockdowns and simulated situations they jointly conduct, including with the coun-

ty's Homeland Security office.
Helton said the buildings' halls are monitored, and visitors to the district must present a driver's li-cense, which is scanned to check

for criminal background activity.

Long said that the schools in District 44 also have restrictions on visitors getting into the buildings, and that all visitors must show a valid ID and undergo the scan.

She also said that staff go through active shooter civilian re-sponse training called ALICE, or Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter,

And, the board president added, "We refer quite heavily with the Lombard Police Department. We defer to them as the experts."

All district officials say that in addition to building security mea-sures, there is the interaction component that plays an important part in preventing crises.

Palmisano said District 45 works

to make sure the children "are in a safe, welcoming, loving environ-ment when they come to school."

"At Glenbard East, we have many adults who are available for our students should they have questions or concerns," Bagdasarian stated, including the school resource officer, deans, the assistant principal for student services, and related staff, teachers and counsel-

Helton pointed out that the district promotes Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports, or PBIS, which encourages students "to exemplify positive behavior and help others do the same."

"Our school psychologists, guidance counselors and deans are always available to speak with students who need guidance and support," the superintendent emphasized. "Those pupil services royide as a programming for students provide an opportunity for students to seek assistance in dealing with various difficult situations."

The high school districts also say that being observant is an important component of school safety.
"The most important component


of our plan is that we strive to promote a culture where everyone has a responsibility to be vigilant and focused on safety," said Bagdasari-an. "We ask that you talk with your children about the importance of sharing information, that could be considered threatening to our com-

munity, with a responsible adult."
"This includes posts that are made on social media that may be alarming or disturbing," he added, noting that the school has a confidential student tip line, 630-424-6670, which may be accessed by

students and parents.
Helton said the Addison Trail and Willowbrook high school princi-pals spoke to staff the day after the Florida high school mass shooting, They reminded staff and students to remember, "If You See Something, Say Something," which is based on a national campaign.

He emphasized the importance of being proactive to avoid potentially dangerous situations.

Long said the District 44 super-intendent "pulls principals togeth-er" on a regular basis to discuss the issue of safety within their respective buildings, and mentioned how he stated in his memo that "we will continue to be proactive instead of



The Willowbrook boys basket-

ball program earned a breakthrough victory on Friday night. Playing in hostile territory, the Warriors out-lasted one of their fiercest rivals to

win a regional championship.
Willowbrook won its first boys
basketball regional title since 2004 when it pulled out a 61-56 overtime victory over Hinsdale South on Friday on the Hornets' home court. The win at the IHSA Class 4A regional in Darien propelled the Warriors to this week's Glenbard East Sectional in Lombard, Willowbrook is facing Naperville North in this week's sectional semifinal battle.

In addition to winning their first regional title in 14 years, the Warriors set a program record for victories in a season when they beat the Hornets on Friday. Willowbrook improved its overall season record to 25-5 with the victory. Last sea-son's team, which posted a 24-5 record, set a new record for victories

"We pulled it out when it mat-tered most," said Willowbrook coach Chris Perkins after Friday's win. Perkins was a senior stand-out on the Warriors team that won the regional title in 2004. He was thrilled to end the program's 14-

year drought.
"This senior group, they've accomplished everything from win-ning Thanksgiving tournaments, Christmas tournaments, Martin Luther King tournaments, to a conference title [in the 2016-17 season]. The last thing we needed, the icing on the cake, was a regional title. We got it today. I'm real proud of the guys and all the hard work they put

The Warriors and Hornets figured to wage a spirited battle in Friday's post-season contest, which was played in front of boisterous supporters of both teams. The two rivals split their meetings during the West Suburban Gold Confer-ence season. The Warriors won the first meeting, prevailing 61-53 on Dec. 15 in Villa Park. Hinsdale South won the rematch on Feb. 2 in

Darien by a score of 69-63.

Hinsdale South won this season's West Suburban Gold Conference title with a 10-2 conference mark. The Warriors placed second with a 9-3 record. That runner-up finish in the conference standings didn't matter much when Willowbrook accepted the regional cham-pionship plaque on Friday.

The Warriors held a lead through most of Friday's regional final. Willowbrook built a 32-24 halftime lead and held a 36-27 advantage with just over four minutes left in the third quarter. Hinsdale South cut the Warriors' lead to 40-36 by the end of the third quarter.

Junior Matas Masys drained a

3-point shot to give Willowbrook a 45-40 lead with about six min-

But our guys, they've played in a ton of big games. The greatest attribute for them, I think, is keeping their composure. We kept fighting and fighting, and we found a way."

The Hornets missed their next shot, and Schuemer grabbed the rebound. Senior Neil Paxton of the Warriors made a pair of free throws with 14.3 seconds left to extend Willowbrook's lead to 59-56. Paxton sealed the victory when he add-ed two more free throws with 2.4 seconds to play.

# 'We Are Change': Hundreds of Chicago-Area Students Hold Court With Officials Over Gun Control, School Safety

In light of the Florida school shooting, local students are taking action in the event of a tragedy. Hundreds gathered on Monday to go over ways to protect themselves. NBC 5's Chris Hush reports.

Many school administrators can't recall too many times when entire student bodies came together on one issue. On Monday, hundreds of students had open ears and an audience ready to listen.

High school students from around the Chicago area told their school administrators, police chiefs, lawmakers and peers what change they want to see. Around 400 students from 30 Chicago-area schools spoke out under one roof at Willowbrook High School. The students are a part of a growing movement since the mass shooting at a high school in Parkland, Florida last month.

"We are students," one teen said. "We will be voters. We are change."

Another student said schools need more drills to help students stay safe.

"We don't have active shooter drills, we don't know what it's like if we're stuck in a hallway or during a passing period," another said.

"We are at the point where we want to be heard," Willowbrook High School student Sebastian Berlin said. "We don't want to wait anymore. We're tired. We're fed up."

"I feel bad that it had to have another tragedy for me to speak up," said Adriana Gutierrez, an Addison Trail High School student. "I just don't want it that, it has to hit home in order for our voices to be heard."

Their audience--all adults and in positions of power--were listening. That included Sen. Tom Cullerton.

"I hesitate to use the words kids," Cullerton said. "If you saw their forum today, these weren't kids talking, these were actual involved citizens."

"Whenever you give 14- to 17-year-olds an opportunity to have a piece of the conversation they will always surpass our expectations.

From gun control and mental health, to arming teachers--their audience responded--even to the toughest questions.

"I just don't know that we're at a place where arming teachers is a great answer to this situation right now," Villa Park police Chief Mike Lay said to student applause.

What's next?

Anything is possible now that their voices are being heard, the students say.

"A month ago we weren't expecting ourselves to be in this situation," Berlin said. "In the one span of the one month we've had from parkland to now, look at what we've done."

The forum came just days before a planned nationwide school walkout on the anniversary of the mass shooting at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Flordia.

Many schools, but not all, are supporting--though not promoting--the walkout, as long as it's done peacefully.
