

Hinsdale South senior Zion Griffin's meteoric rise the result of hard work

It's the gym by his house.

Rare is the day that 6-foot-6 Hinsdale South senior Zion Griffin doesn't go there to put in work. On one day, it's jump shots. Others, he'll practice off-hand dribbles.

He'll go with his cousin and uncles, or other times teammates. The goal is 500 shots a session, 1,000 a day.

'That's what I do," Griffin said, "and I'm sticking to it."

That routine, those long hours, are what enabled a good high school player with next-level athleticism to make a meteoric rise in one vear.

Griffin, who had just one offer, from Division II St. Cloud State, at the beginning of last summer, committed to Iowa State in September.

He hardly rested on those laurels. Griffin went out this season and averaged 21.1 points and 9 rebounds, leading Hinsdale South to its first-ever West Suburban Gold championship. He hit 40 3-pointers after attempting just five all junior

"If I had to sum up this last year in one word, it's dedication," said Griffin, the Suburban Life Player of the Year. "Coming off last year, we could have settled. I felt like I had to put the leadership cap on and teach them the vision that I saw.'

Few could envision Griffin's

As a sophomore, he was an athlete who could score around the rim. He showed flashes and was a decent shooter.

The jumper started to come junior year. Griffin hit seven straight mid-range jumpers the first conference game at Morton, and he averaged 17.3 points and 8.7 rebounds. Still, the lack of a true outside game kept Griffin under the radar.

Hinsdale South coach Brett

Moore made a highlight video of Griffin and sent it to a ton of schools. He didn't get one response.

"He was a late bloomer on AAU, high school, you name it. It was a process," Moore said. "He spent a lot of time working on his shot."

Griffin watched video of that shot. He immersed himself in the weight room and gym to improve it.

It all took off for Griffin in late July. At the AAU Hardwood Classic in Lawrence, Kan., playing for the Illinois Hoopers, Griffin scored 42 and 31 points in two games. He made 18 threes in another AAU tournament.

The buzz grew. Griffin rose to a four-star, top-100 prospect. Kansas and Illinois offered, 15 schools total, Griffin chose Iowa State, his first Division I suitor.

"It definitely was a crazy time with all those schools, but crazy good," Griffin said. "It showed me that all the hard work paid off."

It kept paying off. Griffin was dominant in two games against Proviso East. He saved his best for

a home game against Willowbrook, going for 39 points and 17 rebounds.

"In a game he didn't shoot particularly well," Moore said. "That goes to show his growth.'

Griffin looks forward to continuing that growth.

He'll lead quite a pipeline from Illinois to Ames next year. Joining Griffin will be Simeon's Talen Horton-Tucker, whose mom coincidentally went to the same school as Griffin's parents, and Corliss power forward George Conditt, who Griffin has known since AAU days in Indianapolis.

"It's ironic. I never thought it would have happened," Griffin said. "Those are the guys I want to go to war with. I know they're serious."

Moore knows his star is serious about the next level.

"He has the athleticism to play right away," Moore said. "Very few high school kids realize the jump. It will be a battle for him from this point on. I think he will be a kid motivated by that. He isn't going to back down from a challenge.'

LOMBARD - David Buh held the game ball, the sectional nets draped around his shoulder.

Every Benet player, really, earned a piece.

Buh scored 14 points, one of four Redwings starters in double figures. Benet shot a blistering 61.4 percent for the game and blew past Willowbrook 67-40 in the Class 4A Glenbard East Sectional final March 9.

It was Benet's 18th straight win and put the Redwings (27-4) into a supersectional matchup against Larkin in

"We feel like the sum of the parts on this team is better than any individual," said Buh, a senior guard. "This game just shows the depth and diversity on this team."

It sure did.

Will Engels had 17 points and nine rebounds, Jacob Petrovic scored 15 points - hitting five 3-pointers - and Colin Crothers scored 13 points.

It was Benet's ninth sectional title and third in the past five years.

And maybe the most unexpected.

The Redwings were not on many radars after a so-so showing at the Pontiac Holiday Tournament in December, but haven't lost since.

"We were maybe overlooked," Engels said. "Pontiac, we didn't play like we wanted to. We knew we just had to turn the corner. We're on a roll now."

Ethan Schuemer scored seven of his 15 points in the second quarter for Willowbrook (26-6), which was going for its first sectional title.

Willowbrook cut Benet's lead to 30-26 at halftime, and a Schuemer basket drew the Warriors to within two.

But Willowbrook never got closer.

Benet held the Warriors to 22.7 percent shooting in the second half, the 14th time the Redwings have kept a team to 40 points or fewer.

"They were double-teaming me, helping on the other guys. That's why they're sectional champs," Schuemer said. "They shot really well. Obviously we didn't make enough shots.'

Petrovic, a senior guard, did.

He knocked down three 3-pointers in the first half, and his fourth got the Redwings rolling in the third quarter.

"We try to get the extra pass, always," Petrovic said. "Whoever is open for our team, if it needs kicking it to an even more open shooter, that's what we're going to do."

"I just want to do whatever I can to help my team win," Engels said. Willowbrook is an incredibly talented team. We withstood it and went on a run.'



Scott Tumilty added six points for Willowbrook.



The Ramblers are mov-ing on to face Nevada after two breathtaking victories, a run that has captivated col-lege basketball and turned 98-year-old team chaplain Sister Jean Dolores Schmidt into a celebrity.
They knocked off Miami on

Dante Ingram's buzzer-beating 3-pointer from the March Madness logo, then got the sweetest of all bounces on Clayton Custer's jumper in the closing seconds to beat Tennessee in Dallas.

The Ramblers (30-5) will bring more wins than any other team in the program's 100-year history into Thurs-day's game in Atlanta, having surpassed their 1963 champions during this NCAA run.

No small accomplishment for a team that struggled for decades following a Sweet 16 loss to Patrick Ewing and Georgetown in 1985. Loyola went 14 seasons without a winning record at one point. The first few years after Moser took over in 2011 weren't so smooth, either.

They've gone from 7-23 with just one win in the Hori-zon League in his first season to capturing the Missouri Val-ley Championship, from small home crowds to their first sellout in 15 years, from obscurity to center stage. It's quite a turnaround for the Jesuit school of about 16,000 along the lake-front on Chicago's northern edge. For guard Lucas Wil-liamson, it's been a nonstop flow of well-wishes and congratulations. Whether it's from posts on social media, students

"When you have a media mar-ket like Chicago ... you can't put into words (what it means to the school). I'm sure in the months ahead they'll be put into a more detailed impact. But right now, it's just fun for the university to have this kind

of national recognition."

And he's not shying away from the attention.
"The media scrutiny, the

spotlight, it's great for them," Moser said. "They're mature enough to handle it. They've been handling it now for a month straight. I'm not that guy that's gonna hold back and not enjoy this journey. They're enjoying it. But they're gonna absolutely ... be locked in, ready to go."

The Wolf Pack (28-7) are in the Sweet 16 for the second time. Otherwise, it would have been Ramblers against Bearcats in a matchup that sure would have sparked flashbacks to the '63 title game. That year, Loyola beat two-time defending champion Cin-cinnati in a landmark moment



Emergency professionals now have a new tool to combat opioid epidemic in DuPage County

DuPage County now has a new tool to fight the growing opioid epidemic in Illinois. State Sen. Tom Cullerton (D-Vil-

la Park) has announced a standing order has been issued to make the lifesaving drug, Naloxone, more readily available to first responders and community members

and community memoers.
"We can't rest until the opioid crisis is eliminated from our communities," Cullerton said. "Allowing emergency professionals to have quick access to this life saving tool will help us fight this nasty epidemic."

Naloxone is a non-addictive prescription medication that, if used while someone is having a heroin overdose, can save the person's life. It is more commonly referred to as Narcan.

The Naloxone Standing Order allows eligible organizations, mostly pharmacies and opioid overdose education and naloxone distribution (OEND) programs to provide naloxone to any person without a direct prescription. With Illinois' standing order, insurers, such as Medicaid and Medicare, can be

Eligible individuals must complete appropriate training on naloxone administration to use the pro-

Cullerton believes this standing order puts a missing link in place to provide the lifesaving drug to emergency professionals to save DuPage County residents' lives.

"Thirty-eight percent of Illinoisans have never heard of naloxone," said Deborah A.P. Hersman, president and CEO of the National Safetty Council. "We are paying for that lack of awareness with lives lost. We applaud Sen. Cullerton and his

colleagues for making naloxone available via a statewide standing order. Efforts like these will save

Since 2014, over 3,143 individ-Since 2014, over 3,143 individuals have been trained to administer Narcan among 60 program sites across DuPage County and the northern Illinois area. The DuPage County Narcan Program was the first countywide overdose prevention program approved by the state Division of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse. stance Abuse.

Approximately 145 lives were saved in DuPage County in 2016. However, the increased use of the deadly drug fentanyl with heroin is believed to have led to an increased number of overdose related deaths.
In 2016, Cullerton worked to

address heroin and opioid abuse and addiction through House Bill i. The law combats the opioid epidemic in a variety of ways, by training public safety entities in administering Narcan, requiring state agencies to develop a three-year heroin and opioid drug prevention program and expanding state-fund-ed treatment to include addiction

treatment and prescription costs.
"Our work to end the opioid
overdose epidemic in Illinois and across our nation is far from done," Cullerton said. "We cannot rest uncuntertor said. We cannot rest un-til this crisis is eliminated from our communities. Until then our top priority will remain putting pro-tections and precautions in place to save lives."

Warriors fall to Benet in a sectional final

Willowbrook beats Naperville North before losing to the Redwings; Warriors finish season with a 26-6 record

The Willowbrook boys basketball team's season ended with Friday's 67-40 loss to Benet Academy in the championship game of the IHSA Class 4A Glenbard East Sectional in Lombard. The Warriors, who trailed Benet 30-26 at halftime, couldn't keep up with the Redwings in the second half. Benet increased its lead to 46-36 by the end of the third quar-ter. The Warriors managed only four points in the fourth period.

Benet improved to 27-4 and advanced to this week's super-sectional game against Elgin-Larkin at North-

ern Illinois University.
Willowbrook, which won its first regional title in 14 years on March 2, advanced to the sectional final by beating Naperville North 47-43 in Lombard on March 6. The Warriors finished their special season with an overall record of 26-6. This season's team set a new program record for victories in a season. Last season's Warriors established a new record by winning 24 games during the 2016-17 campaign.

Willowbrook trailed Naperville North—the sectional's No. 1 seeded team-20-12 at halftime. The War-riors rallied in the third quarter to grab a 30-27 edge with eight minutes

The kids have been fighting all year," said Willowbrook coach Chris Perkins after the win over Naperville North. "We've been down before. Our outside shots started falling, and then it's like an avalanche."
Willowbrook, which was seeded

fifth in the sectional, couldn't dupli-cate its second-half success against Benet, the sectional's No. 2 seed.

The atmosphere was electric during both of the Warriors' sectional games in Lombard. The Willowbrook student body came out in full force for each game to support its team. The Glenbard East gymnasium was packed to capacity for Friday's sectional final; some late-arriving fans weren't allowed in because there were no seats available. Benet brought its own raucous student section for Friday's battle.

Willowbrook sophomore Everett Stubblefield, who was called up to the varsity team in January, helped to spark his team's second-half rally against Naperville North. Stubble-field did not score in the first half, but he poured in 12 points, including three 3-point shots, during the third quarter. He closed out the period by draining a long 3-pointer to give the Warriors a 30-27 advantage.

"I saw the clock going down,"

said Stubblefield of his shot at the end of the third quarter. "I felt the crowd's energy. I already hit two threes before that."

"He came in, got hot and gave us a boost," said Perkins of Stubblefield. "The rest of the guys fed off of that energy, and our crowd got into it and we were able to build momentum."

"I was a little bit nervous," said Stubblefield after the win over the Huskies. "But once I got in the mood of the game, I started to calm down

or the game, I started to cam down and it started coming to me." Stubblefield and senior Ethan Schuemer both scored 16 points in the Warriors' win over Naperville North, which finished its season with a 26-3 record. Schuemer scored four baskets during the final quarter. His steal and layup gave the Warriors a 38-31 lead with about four minutes

"At halftime we kind of regrouped," said Schuemer after the sectional semifinal. "We made sure we came out with much more energy and much more intensity in the second half. It was crazy. Our fans were huge tonight. It was a lot of fun."

An offensive rebound and basket by senior Matt Myers pushed Wil-lowbrook's lead to 44-39 with a little more than one minute to play. The Huskies scored a basket to cut the Warriors' advantage to 45-43 with 9.8 seconds to play.

Following a time out, Myers passed to Schuemer, who sent the ball to an open Stubblefield, who drove for a victory-sealing layup with a few seconds remaining.

Benet held a 15-9 lead over Willowbrook after one quarter of Fri-day's sectional final. The Redwings built a 21-9 lead early in the second quarter, but Willowbrook sliced the



lead to as low as two points later in the period. Junior Scott Tumilty sank a pair of 3-point shots for the Warriors during their second-quarter surge. Schuemer's dunk cut the Redwings' lead to 26-22. Myers then added a basket to trim Benet's lead to 26-24. Schuemer added one more basket in the period to cut Benet's lead to 28-26.

The Redwings, who built their lead to 46-36 by the end of the third quarter, padded their lead by opening the fourth quarter with a 10-1 run to grab a 56-37 advantage with five minutes to play. The Warriors' starters headed to the bench with about three minutes remaining.

Schuemer, who spent three seasons on the varsity, scored 15 points in his final game as a Warrior. Tumilty added six points with his two 3-point shots. Junior Matas Masys scored five points by making all five of his free-throw attempts. Senior Sikander Zafar also scored five points, while Myers provided four points.




