

Stephen Steinhaus will serve as principal

As of April 16, Addison Trail alumnus Stephen Steinhaus (class of 1991) was set to open a brand new, free school in Solihull, England, for pupils who are 13 to 16 years old.

Steinhaus will serve as principal of the school called Solihull Academy. It will open with 30 Year 9 students and is planned to be at full capacity this coming September, with up to 110 students in Years 9 through 11. Steinhaus said the school will offer an alternative choice for students who are at risk of falling behind academically, socially and emotionally.

He graduated from University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign with a degree in teaching of English. While there, he was a member of the football team and was a letterman athlete and an Academic All-Big Ten honoree. He also earned a Master of Philosophy degree in English Litera-

ture from The Shakespeare Institute, where he was a Fulbright Scholar, and a Master of Arts degree in creative writing from University of Hawaii

About the academy

"Solihull Academy is an ambitious undertaking," he said. "We will work incredibly hard, but we will play hard as well, and we are creating a community of leaders and educators who can change the educational futures and life chances for every student who comes to us and, thereby, change what education looks like in Solihull and the West Midlands of England."

He added class sizes will be small (maximum of 10 to 12 students), the curriculum will be innovative and bespoke and the building has been extensively refurbished with a number of added benefits (courtyard garden, mini gym, etc.). But the core of what the school will offer students and parents/guardians will be the in-

novative teaching, inclusive practice, therapeutic environment, positive relationships and unrelenting passion offered by intensely committed staff members

'ATHS changed my life'

Steinhaus said his experiences at Addison Trail inspired him on his journey to pursue a career in education.

"Addison Trail changed my life — I can still draw a line directly from where I am now to Mr. Carlson's freshmen English class, when I first read, studied and watched Shakespeare," Steinhaus said. "I guess, like everybody else, though, the key to and highlight of my time at AT was relationships, both with staff and students. The love, care and support AT staff members had for us, and the drive, tenacity and ambition they instilled in us continues to loom large and bear fruit for me and many of us more than 25 years later!"



The me sures would help to provide clea judicial standards for deciding cas of sex discrimination and help wor en combat wage discrimination in t workplace.

"As legislators, it is our duty protect the rights of every Illing resident without discrimination Conroy added. "Our action on this sue will show women across the sta that we are serious about fighting t injustices of sex discrimination. hope that my colleagues will join in making history and vote in support the Equal Rights Amendment."

Senate Joint Resolution Cons tutional Amendment 4 previous passed the Senate and is under consideration in the House.


