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CDC: 99 percent of cannabinoid cases have occurred in Illinois

"After the careful consideration taken to weigh the implications of new restrictions on drugs, I want to thank my colleagues in the Senate for swiftly passing this legislation, and I urge the House to do the same," said Sen. Jacqueline Collins (D-Chicago), who sponsored the bill. "Many synthetic cannabinoids are already illegal, but by broadening the criteria, we ensure that they can't be made legal by small and potentially deadly changes to their chemical formulae.

Since March, news reports throughout the Midwest have told of the use of synthetic cannabinoids - called by names like "fake weed" and "K2" - leading to deaths and severe hemorrhaging. The Centers for Disease Control reported that 99 percent of these cases have occurred in Illinois.

"We can't afford to be stuck in a cycle of reacting to these irresponsible and deadly chemistry experiments," Collins said. "We must act now to stop future deaths.'

The measure passed the Senate without opposition. It is scheduled for consideration in the House.

Glatchak named All-American at National Wheelchair Basketball Tournament

Growing up, Addison Trail senior Ryan Glatchak was always into sports. He played baseball, basketball and football and had plans to continue as an athlete throughout high school and possibly at the collegiate level.

But after six reconstructive surgeries to correct a condition with the arches of his feet, Glatchak was told he could only pursue wheelchair sports. While the news was disappointing, Glatchak never let it get him down or stop him from following his passion. Eight years ago, he joined the SYNERGY Junior Bulls, which is part of the National Wheelchair Basketball Association (NWBA).

"I realized pretty quickly I can't change what happened, so I decided to make the best of it and be successful in the sport I can play," he said.

And he has certainly found success. Glatchak's team recently finished in 3rd place in the Junior Division at the 2018 National Wheelchair Basketball Tournament, and he was named as a Team 1 All-American.

'Earning that honor meant a lot to me because it's

my senior year, and I'm proud to set an example for everyone in the NWBA community," he said.

Along with his athletic accomplishments, Glatchak also maintains a GPA greater than 3.0 and recently received the President's Award for Educational Excellence. He said his inspiration and motivation come from his older brother, AT alumnus Nicholas Trojanowicz (class of 2012), who has neurofibromatosis, a genetic disorder that causes tumors to form on nerve tissue. He had to have his leg amputated at age 12 as a result.

Glatchak plans to attend University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and major in marine biology or biochemistry. He also has received an academic scholarship to compete on the university's Warhawks Wheelchair Basketball Team. And Glatchak has big plans for his future in wheelchair basketball - he hopes to make it to the Colorado Springs Olympic Training Center and qualify for the 2020 Paralympic Games.

"I want to play at the highest level possible and represent my country," he said.

With the final performance on floor exercise May 11. Sousa clinched a share of the state all-around championship with Highland Park junior Kevin Connors.

Sousa still was skeptical.

"My coach pulled me aside and said, 'You tied [for first].' He was following [Connors]," Sousa said. "I was like, 'I'll believe it when I'm up on the podium." When I was up there, I was like, 'Wow. This is really happening.' Insane. It's still setting in for me."

Sousa's career-best 55.60 earned a share of the state's first all-around co-champions. Sousa added four more top-five, all-state individual medals May 12 for a program-best nine medals in three seasons.

Sousa was third on vault (9.4) - a tenth of a point from first - tied for third on high bar (9.2), finished fifth on still rings (9.0) and tied for fifth on pommel horse (9.2). He tied for seventh on parallel bars (9.2) and tied for 12th on floor (9.15) in the finals.

York senior John Gill was an allstate third on rings (9.2), the Dukes' first all-stater since current Willowbrook coach Caleb Strejc's two state titles in 2010.

Glenbard East senior Marc Le was eighth in all-around (53.00). Le reached the finals on floor and rings, but did

On May 11, Sousa had the same event rotation as Connors, who also was competing for Highland Park's team (seventh, 152.55). Connors always performed first, but Sousa focused on preparation and never watched. After Connors scored 9.5 on floor, Sousa unknowingly needed - and scored - 9.45 to tie. Each had three higher scores.

"When I knew that [we tied], I was like, 'All the better,'" Sousa said. "Kevin's a great kid. He's a great contender, so I wouldn't have it any other way. I

was really thrilled for both of us. It's a huge honor to win for my Willowbrook family.

Willowbrook's other all-around state champion was Neil Schmitt in

As a York senior, Strejc won the 2010 state all-around title by .05 (55.40 to 55.35). His coach, Larry Ohannes, was a 1991 all-around state champion for Glenbrook South.

"That's why [Sousa's title also] meant so much to me," Strejc said. 'We're fine with a tie. It's still first. Kevin's a great kid, too, so I know he and Adam really bonded. It's cool when you get to the final meet and have your best score and it's legit."

Sousa twice finished fourth in allaround and did not compete in 2017, instead training toward college gymnastics at Illinois-Chicago. Reaching all six finals, Sousa was the only gymnast who performed the maximum 18 routines over two days:

"It's definitely a marathon meet," Sousa said. "I wish I could have won a couple of more events, but I went 18 for 18. I was proud of myself, didn't fall on anything, stayed as clean as I could, had fun."

At York's 42nd annual Ken Scorza Invite on April 14. Gill became the Dukes' first gymnast to finish first on rings twice. For his final routine, Gill performed great after making the 2017 rings state finals and finishing ninth (8.8).

"I'm happy that I placed third. I'm just happy that I placed, really," Gill said. "It's indescribable. I'm just extremely happy and this is amazing. The competition was really, really tough and I wasn't expecting all of this at all."

"That was his best routine all year definitely," York coach Nick Criel said. "He is always in the zone. As soon as he steps on the mat and salutes, he knows it's game time."

Other state qualifiers were York seniors Jake Anderson and Kelvin Stevens Jr. and sophomores Charlie Cripe and Dom Milazzo, Willowbrook junior Collin Donaldson and Glenbard East sophomore O.J. Miles.

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

school. Officials Officials propose creating new high school academies or pathways providing students the opportunity to experience more integrated and proj-ect-based learning. New academies could be established as early as the freshman class of the 2020-21 and enroll 400 to

600 students each.
Administrators will update the school board on possible new educational career path-

new educational career pain-ways June 4.
"No final decision has been made on particular strands of focus," U-46 CEO Tony Sanders said. "We are trying to align to the business and industry that's in this region and what jobs will be coming forward. So many districts are doing this exact same thing."
Sanders said officials are

seeking input from parents

Among the 11,346 students in U-46's five high schools this year, 1,322 are enrolled in subiect-specific academies.

They are: Broadcast Education and Communication Net-works (BEACON) Academy at South Elgin High; Gifted and Talented Academy at Elgin High; Science, Engineering and High Technology Academy at Bartlett High; Visual and Performing Arts Academy at Lar-kin High in Elgin; and World Languages and International Studies Academy at Stream-wood High. Those programs are under review and expected to continue at least through

The BEACON Academy is getting an upgrade with new equipment and a revised curriculum to be implemented during the 2019-20 school year, focusing on digital media and including work-based learning experiences. The Gifted and Talented Academy could offer an International Baccalaureate program next school year. Officials also are trying to distinguish Bartlett's STEM Acad-emy, which is built around Project Lead the Way courses,





Kamm will attend Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. He intends to study mathematics and physics, with plans to become a research mathematician.





To allow victims of childhood sexual abuse to speak out about their abuse and abuser, state Rep. Deb Conroy, D-Villa Park, is sponsoring a measure that will ban non-disclosure clauses in settlement agreements that prevent a survivor from speaking

Cullerton on board to merge election commission, clerk's office

Villa Park Democrat Tom Cullerton is working to ensure government in DuPage County is as efficient as possible and no bigger than neces-

According to DuPage County, Cullerton's House Bill 5123 would help create at least \$300,000 a year in taxpayer savings by allowing the county to merge its county board of election commissioners with the county clerk's office.

"Eliminating redundant functions of government saves valuable tax dollars and leads to lower property tax bills," Cullerton said. "This measure will empower the people of DuPage County to make active decisions on

how government will work for them. This is a win for everyone involved."
The bill would require an ordinance or resolution from the county board to dissolve a county board of election commissioners. Most elec-tion authorities are run through the county clerk's office and DuPage is one of only two counties in Illinois that currently has a board of election commissioners at the county level.

Cullerton said the DuPage County Election Commission has had issues the last few elections which increases the need for the measure. House Bill 5123 is a measure sup-

ported by the DuPage County Board, Better Government Association, Metropolitan Planning Council and the city of Aurora.
"Senator Tom Cullerton has been

a leader on consolidation issues that have saved the taxpayers of DuPage County millions," said Dan Cronin, chairman of the DuPage County

In March, voters in DuPage approved a nonbinding referendum, with 56 percent, to merge the DuPage County Election Commission with the DuPage County Clerk's Office. House Bill 5123 passed the Se

ate's Executive Committee with bipartisan support and now moves to the full Senate for consideration. not be further victimized by being

'Victims of sexual abuse should

forced into silence. They deserve to tell their stories if that's what they choose to do," said Conroy. "It is so important for sexual abuse survivors to have the ability to speak out as part of their own healing process and as a way to help prevent future abuse. This is especially true when the vic-tim is a child at the time of abuse."

House Bill 4752 ensures that no settlement agreement in civil lawsuits involving childhood sexual abuse includes confidentiality or non-disclosure provisions that are binding on the victim, effectively preventing a sexual abuse survivor from speaking about their abuse.

Currently, the state of Illinois

has no law on such agreements. The bill would allow underage victims of sexual abuse to disclose and discuss the abuse they were subjected to in an effort to raise awareness and prevent further abuses by the same abuse. This bill has been named the "The Aly Raisman Act," in honor of Raisman speaking out as one of the victims of sexual abuse by former Olympic team physician Larry Nas-

"It has been heartbreaking to learn that so many victims of sexual assault have been silenced because of legal loopholes that are used to protect abusers," Conroy added. "Our leg-islature should stand up for victims and ensure that no one is silenced. I urge my colleagues to vote in support of this bill."

Bond Court Monday morning where Judge Else set bond in the amount of \$50,000 with 10 percent to apply. Flint has been charged with one count of criminal sexual assault, a Class 1 felony. Flint was a volunteer

intern at Glenbard East High School. It is alleged that on three occasions Flint sexually assaulted the minor at her home. It is further alleged the assaults all occurred in April.

The assaults were uncovered when school personnel grew suspicious of Flint's behavior and alerted school authorities. School authorities in turn then contacted the DuPage County Children's Center, resulting in today's charges.

"The allegations against Ms. Flint are, simply put, disgusting," Berlin said. "It is alleged that she used her position of trust and authority to sexually assault a minor student on three separate occasions. This type of abhorrent behavior will not be

tolerated.
"I would first like to tnank school personnel and authorities at Glenbard East High School for their cooperation in this matter. I would like to thank the DuPage County Children's Center, particularly Director Pat Dempsey and Investigator Boris Vrbos, for their work not only in this case but for their continued efforts protecting ociety's most vulnerable children.

"I would also like to thank Assistant State's Attorney Tom Minser for his work in preparing a strong case against Ms. Flint."

Flint is scheduled to appear in court on June 4.

Fundraiser at Moose Lodge for students injured in fire pit explosion very successful

Car wash at Glenbard East reportedly raises over \$35,000

To say that the fundraiser held Saturday for four of the Glenbard East High School students who were among those injured following a fire pit explosion in Glendale Heights last month at the Lombard Moose Lodge was a success would be an understatement.

Hundreds of Lombardians and people from around the area packed into the Moose Lodge throughout the day for the fundraiser, which included food and raffles. Several mer-chants and businesses throughout Lombard donated raffle items.

"A lot of gift cards and memberships" were among the raffle items donated, noted Sandi Wolski.

Wolski and Tracie Sikorski, both Lombard residents, organized the

"We got a lot of stuff (donated),

were on the menu from noon to 3 p.m., and Wolski told ABC 7 Eyewitness News that 300 burgers were sold within a two-hour period. Lasagna dinners which included salad and garlic bread for \$10 served later that afternoon and into the evening also

All proceeds from the fundraiser will benefit the families of Glenbard East students Autumn Hamilton. Korryn Bachner, Alyssa Wolff and Ivan Galarza. Each student suffered serious burn injuries in the explosion, which authorities say was caused when someone poured gasoline onto a bonfire at a residence in the 1800 block of Marci Court on Saturday night, April 28. The four were among a reported 12 teenagers who were injured in the explosion.

It was not known at press time exactly how much money was raised Saturday, but the proceeds will be split equally between the families.

"It's going to be a nice amount to help these families, absolutely," said

"We were texting back and forth and we were talking about Dave and she (Tracie) was talking about Korryn," Wolski said. "I just grabbed the phone and said, 'This is it; we've got to do it (referring to putting together a fundraiser). I said, 'Are you ready to do this? She (Sikorski) said, 'Yes, Let's do it.' And this is what happened."
Wolski said the fundraiser took

about 10 days to organize. Shortly after the decision was made to pro-

ceed with the fundraiser, the Lom-bard Moose Lodge wanted to host it. "It happened so fast," said Jim Hartney, administrator at the Moose Lodge and a Lombard resident for over 50 years. "The ladies came up over 50 years. "The ladies came up with the idea. We got hold of Moose International and got a special dispensation to have a public crowd here with serving alcohol.

"The good people at Moose pushed it through as a community service event—we're allowed to do four a year—and it was for a really good cause. Everybody pulled to-gether and we pulled it off. It's over-

whelming.



Winning effort propels Biegalski to her fourth straight state-meet berth in the 800-meter run

STAFF REPORTER For the fourth year in a row, Glenbard East senior Cailyn Biegalski will compete in the 800-meter run at the IHSA Class 3A girls track and field state meet.

Biegalski earned her fourth straight state-meet berth in the 800-meter run when she delivered a winning performance in the two-lap race at the Wheaton Warrenville South Sectional. Biegalski, who surged ahead of Wheeling senior Yailene Leon in the final straightaway, won the event in a personal-best time of 2 minutes, 14.79

The Class 3A state meet takes place this Friday and Saturday at Eastern Illinois University in Charleston.

"I really wanted to stay relaxed and focused for this race," said Biegalski after her victory. "I was able to do

that. When we got to the last 100 me-ters I really wanted to give it my all."

Three years ago, Biegalski sur-prised herself when she earned a statemeet berth in the 800 as a freshman. One year ago, she earned her first trip to the finals in the event. She delivered a 10th-place finish.

"I was so surprised to make it as a freshman," said Biegalski, who will continue her track career at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. "After that I didn't want to put pressure on myself. The 800 is my favorite event. To qualify four years in a row means the world. It's so exciting."

Biegalski said she hopes to improve on last year's 10th-place finish this week. She said she's aiming to shave a couple of seconds off her personal-best time and finish the race in 2 minutes, 12 seconds.

Biegalski wasn't the only Ram to earn a state-meet berth in the 800-meter run at last week's Wheaton Warrenville South Sectional, Freshman Lauren Huber qualified for the state meet with her third-place time of 2:18.05, which was under the qualifying standard of 2:19.77.

sophomore Emily Anderson to earn a state-meet berth in the 4 x 800-meter relay. The foursome completed that race in a second-place time of 9:26.82, which was well under the qualifying standard of 9:35.97. Biegalski led off the relay and handed the baton to Weltin. Anderson ran the third leg, while Huber covered the anchor leg. The foursome completed the race in a personal-best time; its previous best was about 9 minutes, 33 seconds.

The Glenbard East foursome of Biegalski, senior Brenna Peters, Anderson and Huber finished the sectional by delivering a state-meet qualifying effort in the 4 x 400-meter relay. The quartet completed the race in a second-place time of 3:59.32. The state-qualifying standard is 4:04.53.

Senior Kionnah Weaver of the Rams earned state-meet berths in two hurdles races for the second consecutive year. Weaver won the 100-meter hurdles race at last week's sectional in a personal-best time of 14.55 seconds. Later in the evening, she qualified in the 300-meter hurdles with her sec-ond-place time of 45.36 seconds.

"I really had to fight from the start; it wasn't a clean race, but I had to finish what I started," said Weaver of her sectional victory in the 100-meter

Weaver did not advance to the finals in either event at last year's state meet. She hopes to change that this







As of May 9, 2018, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) has received reports of 164 cases*, including four deaths*. Cases report using synthetic cannabinoid products before suffering from severe bleeding, Several of those affected have tested positive for brodifacoum, a lethal anticoagulant often used as a rodenticide, or rat poison.


