Veterans to get designation on state ID cards

A new law championed by state Sen. Tom Cullerton (D-Villa Park) will make it easier for veterans to obtain an official veteran designation on their state identification cards.

Cullerton's House Bill 4332 was signed into law recently, allowing an identification card issued under the

federal Veterans Identification Card and filled out various forms to receive Act of 2015 to be used as verification a federal designation—they should Act of 2015 to be used as verification for a veteran's designation on a state ID or license.

"This commonsense law will streamline the process for Illinois' vet-erans," Cullerton said. "Our veterans have already jumped through hoops

not have to complete a redundant pro-cess to receive state approval."

"Our returning heroes should not have to go through additional red tape when they return home," Cullerton said. "It is our duty to ease their tran-

sition back to civilian life by utilizing practical procedures."

This measure is supported by the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Illinois AMVETS Service Foundation.

House Bill 4332 passed the Senate and House with bipartisan support. It goes into effect on Jan. 1, 2019.



to pressure the quarterback." Forced into action as a sophomore because of injury. junior quarterback Colin Gillespie is ready to take on a bigger role in the offense. His receiving corps is extremely inexperienced, but Ben Hickey rushed for 560 yards and the line returns starters Shane O'Mara and Matt Kickel.

"It was great that Colin got that experience," New said. "It'll definitely slow down for him this year.

Balance on both sides of the ball makes Benet a team to watch in the East Suburban Catholic Conference and in Class 7A.

"Expectations are high, but our guys know nothing will be handed to them," New said. "It won't be easy."

how to practice that way and prepare for games. It's not perfect, but that's how we have to do things now."

A 55-player roster is pretty small by program standards, but Molinari believes it's a quality

Jayden Lambert could play anywhere. Last year he rushed for 494 vards, threw for 99 and caught two passes. George Ross stabilizes the quarterback spot after starting last year due to injury, but Lambert might be seen there, at running back or receiver.

Lambert is so valuable to the offense that Molinari hopes to use him sparingly on defense.

"He's a force that teams have to deal with," Molinari said, "He's an explosive athlete.

Jaelynn Blecke is another explosive athlete who will play on both sides of the ball with Kyle Heavey and Vinny Provenzano in

the secondary. Standout linemen Shawn Lee and Kendall Burrow also will play both ways.

Lee, Burrow and Max Foster anchor a strong offensive line. Kenton Johnson and sophomore Devean Washington will be the main running backs

The defense, which last season notched three straight shutouts, took a hit with the graduation of all-state lineman Sergio Villalobos. The Mustangs remain dangerous up front thanks to Ali Issa's return for a third starting

Even with the large number of two-way players, the Mustangs have the talent to claim the West Suburban Gold title for the first

time since 2013.

"I hate to say this at Downers Grove South, but I'd say we're underdogs this year," Molinari said, "We have legitimate playmakers who can make it happen.'

A new era begins for Bartlett football in more ways than

For two decades, Bartlett players had to catch a bus to Streamwood High School to play so-called home games because the Hawks didn't have their own field.

Those nomadic days are over. The Hawks fly home for good on Aug. 31 when they play Glenbard East in the first home game under the lights at their new stadium complex.

The right-hander can throw the ball accurately down the field, makes good decisions and has stepped up as the leader of the offense, according to his coach.

O'Brien gains a stable of tall, talented receivers, headed by returning all-Upstate Eight pick Austin Gates. Also one of the area's best basketball players, Gates is strong in the air and can outleap defenders. He finished a successful junior campaign with 65 receptions for 784 yards and 9 touchdowns. Gates also rushed 12 times for 28 yards and a score.

Opponents will have trouble matching up against O'Brien's other targets: 6-foot-3 senior Nick Mansk and 6-4 sophomore Hayden Angell.

Scotty Tumilty plans to keep winning ways going

Warriors are coming off back-to-back state quarterfinal appearances

Scotty Tumilty has moved on from last season, but he hasn't completely forgotten.

Why would he?

Tumilty, a Willowbrook senior, was a starting cornerback for a team that won the program's first outright West Suburban Gold title and advanced to the Class 6A quarterfinals before losing to eventual champion Prairie Ridge.

Before that, Tumilty was called up to varsity in Week 8 his sophomore year. He was a backup defensive back and special teams player for a team that reached the 7A quarterfinals. It's been Willowbrook's most successful two-year run since 1975-76.

It's a new year, and much of the experience has graduated.

The mindset around Villa Park remains the same.


"Next man up, that's what the coaches always say," Tumilty said. "We don't have a ton of returners from last year, but the guys are ready to step up."

While the Warriors will be hardpressed to replace Suburban Life Player of the Year Jack Jessen, he of the 2,050 rushing yards and 90 tackles, the cupboard is far from bare.

Willowbrook's defensive backfield, in particular, should be a strength and brings back the most experience. Tumilty and younger brother Sam Tumilty, who combined for 11 interceptions, return, as does talented junior DeAndre Holliday. They'll be particularly important with Willowbrook replacing its entire linebacking corps. Scotty Tumilty noted that two sophomores could see time at linebacker.

"We try to make sure that the younger guys know their stuff, and if they're in a wrong spot fix them," Tumilty said. "When game time comes we are full go. The coaches might get mad and yell at them, so we try to calm them down and make sure they are emotionally and physically ready."

That leadership seems a natural fit. Football is in the Tumilty family DNA. The boys' father, Scott, was a three-sport star at Naperville Central, and later an All-American in football and

track at Augustana. Scott briefly was Willowbrook's head coach in 2011, but resigned before coaching a game. He's since been an assistant at Maine South.

The ball-hawking brothers, opposite corners last year, have been moved to safety this season.

To that end, Tumilty took a strength training class in the offseason, borrowing a workout from his dad's at Maine South. He lifted four days a week, and

has seen noticeable gains. Tumilty, who has designs at playing at the next level, has been in contact with a number of Division II and Division III schools. The experience of playing "massive" guys from Prairie Ridge influenced Tumilty to put in the time to get stronger.

"Stronger, faster, more explosive,"
Tumilty said.

The brothers will be busy on both sides of the ball. They'll share time at quarterback, along with junior Everett Stubblefield.

"We'll both be in there for different formations and concepts," Scotty Tumilty said. "When I'm playing quarterback Sam will be out wide."

Tumilty looks forward to forging the same chemistry that made the last two years such a renaissance around the program.

"We loved playing with each other," Tumilty said. "I've tried to incorporate that with the new guys, a team bond. That's the main thing I took out of last year is that trust."

From far across the field. the words of a Wheaton North player exhorting his team-mates drifted into the hot, hazy, humid evening.

"Keep up the pressure! Keep up the pressure!" The Falcons heeded that

missive Monday and the result was a 1-0 victory over Hoffman Estates in a Lake Park Hillner Classic tourna-ment game played at Whea-

"Coach was telling us, even though we were up 1-0, we looked like we were the team that was down 1-0," said Falcons junior forward Will Wanzenberg, "just the way we were pressing and constantly attacking, pressuring them when they had the ball and trying to win the ball back."
