

Senate Bill 3547, known as the ervice-Member Employment and Reemployment Rights Act, takes the following action:

sues under existing laws, including the calculation of differential compensation

Combines enforcement within ing their lives to protect our country the Office of Attorney General.







But the RedHawks got only one more shot — a long-dis-tance try from Clancy that Benet goalie Hunter Randolph


saved easily with 3:30 to go.
