Willowbrook boys soccer team looking to grow as season goes on

Warriors sport youthful look, especially on back line; Standout goalie Giase returns

While the Willowbrook boys soccer team got off to a 1-5 overall record through its first six games, coach Ed DeLaCruz sees plenty of promise.

"We are very young," he said. "Our defensive back line starts two sophomores."

Willowbrook is coming off a 2017 season where it went 7-11 and finished 2-4 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division play.

While young, DeLaCruz has talent throughout the roster. Three-year starting goalie Mario Giase is back.

"Mario is a captain who I know can play at the next level," said

DeLaCruz. "He does it all in regards to being our leader and a great student-athlete. He is the total package who is a great coach's player. He makes people better around him."

Fellow three-year starter David Rizzo also returns at left midfield. "David is a very talented two-footed player," said DeLaCruz. "He takes the set pieces, free kicks and corner kicks. He is lightning quick with great field presence."

Senior captain Jeff Wolski also returns at defensive midfield. "David easily is the best field-presence player on our team," said DeLaCruz. "He is super-intelligent on the field and in the classroom. He is a physical player who jumps up with no disregard to heading the ball and winning the 50-50 balls."

Key newcomers to the team include junior center midfielder Dorian Mahone and senior center back Thomas Waldorf.

"Dorian had a great summer season leading into the fall," said DeLa-

Cruz. "He has grown physically and is someone who I will count on regarding holding possession and leading the team with assists. He is a playmaker who is super-athletic. Thomas uses his volleyball skills to win aerial balls. His conditioning is top-notch with anyone else. He is in phenomenal shape. He always wants to take on the best player on the opposing team."

DeLaCruz said depth will be a big benefit for the Warriors. "Our depth has stood out this season and the team chemistry on this team is one of the best I've seen as both an assistant and varsity coach at Willowbrook," he said.

DeLaCruz said a key will be the development of the team's back line. "We have a brand-new back-four defensive line," he said. "Our outstanding goalkeeper Mario is up to the challenge of leading the troops."

The coach said the team would like to improve its standing in the WSC Gold. "Sixth place isn't going to get

it done," he said. "It has hindered our regional positioning for the playoffs so getting off to a good start is crucial."

Tackle Ben Melion an anchor to stout defense for York

Ben Melion makes no bones about his role on York's defense.

Keep the hands off Zane Heemsoth.

"We have our D1 linebacker [Heemsoth], and I try to do my job, to not let them touch him, try to let him make a play," said Melion, York's senior defensive tackle. "If I get a chance, I'm going to make a play myself."

Heemsoth, the Dukes' heavily-recruited middle linebacker, made plays all over the field in York's last game, a 28-0 win over Lyons Township. The Dukes held LT without a first down until late in the third quarter.

Give Melion an assist.

The 6-foot-1, 245-pounder is the guy who takes up space, takes on double teams, and frees up Heemsoth and York's linebackers to fly to the football.

It's added up to two straight shut-outs and a 2-1 start for the Dukes.

"Ben does a lot of things that statistically you don't see," York coach Mike Fitzgerald said. "He's got a high motor, his energy is contagious, he makes guys around him better. We have another defensive tackle who is a junior,

Chris Eckard. Ben has really been a mentor to him."

Melion indeed is a good guy to learn from.

Promoted to varsity at the start of his sophomore year, Melion was starting at defensive tackle by the second week. Melion and Heemsoth, good

buddies, have been together for three years on the York defense.

"Learned a lot playing behind those guys, seeing how they prepare," Melion said.

He also learned from older brother Grant, also a three-year starter who graduated in 2018. It was an interesting dynamic in practice, though, as Grant was a running back.

"It was a little interesting to say the least," Ben Melion said. "Practice, that was where the jawing came in."

Melion is, to be sure, not afraid of being vocal. He tries to forge the mindset in his teammates that nobody can beat them, but he also tries to keep them level-headed.

There is certainly excitement around York, whose last winning season was 2011.

"Especially with this week, Glenbard West, one of our rivals coming in," Melion said. "Last week gave us a lot of confidence."

Fitzgerald, who has had success installing his new up-tempo offense in his first season in Elmhurst, knew he had a strong defense to lean on.

The Dukes returned seven defensive starters. Fitzgerald didn't make

many changes, didn't put in new terminology or new language.

"I think that continuity has helped us," Fitzgerald said. "It's a tight-knit group."

One tweak was moving Don Kasper from defensive line coach to offensive line coach and bringing aboard Matt Anderson — who played defensive end at Northwestern — to help with the defensive line.

"It's been good for our offensive line and defensive line," Fitzgerald said. "[Anderson] is a pretty successful business guy who moved into the area last year and kind of fell into our lap. He helped with the freshmen last year, and me and him hit it off."

"You can tell that he knows what he is talking about; people listen when he's talking," Melion said. "He has a great way of teaching and understanding how we think."

Right now, Glenbard West is front and center on the Dukes' minds. The Hilltoppers (2-1) have won at least a share of every Silver title since 2008.

"It's going to be a battle, plain and simple," Melion said. "We are all focused. It's been one of our best practices of the season."

Mohammad Ayesh, young 'D' help Willowbrook remain unbeaten

Warriors 3-0 for first time in nearly 20 years after defeating Leyden

VILLA PARK — A year ago, Mohammad Ayesh was on the Willowbrook sophomore team during his first season of high school football.

Now less than 12 months later, the sophomore linebacker finds himself as a key cog on a varsity defense that has helped Willowbrook to its first 3-0 start in nearly 20 years.

Ayesh had an interception as the Warriors began West Suburban Gold play with a 26-9 victory over Leyden on Sept. 7.

"It's a lot faster," Ayesh said when asked about the jump from last year to now. "But it is a lot of fun running around and playing fast and playing hard."

Ayesh is not the only underclassman excelling on defense. Fellow sophomore Sergio Ayala lines up right next to him at linebacker. As a unit, Willowbrook has allowed just 26 points through the first three weeks, 17 of which came against a strong Hinsdale Central offense in Week 2.

"We are just playing fast and playing with a lot of heart," said Ayesh, who also contributed on special teams, making one tackle and returning a kickoff, "and we are putting in a lot of effort."

"It's great to be 3-0 and 1-0 in the conference, but this is not our max potential, not even close. We have a lot of things to fix up, a lot of things to get better at."

Junior Deandre Holliday also picked off a pass for the Warriors, and added a

58-yard touchdown reception from Sam Tumilty. Holliday finished with five catches for a game-high 82 yards.

"We've got a pretty young defense, especially with two sophomore linebackers," Holliday said. "But we feel like we are solid as a defense, especially when we play as a unit. With our line getting to the quarterback and creating pressure, that allows our defensive backs and linebackers to pick off passes. This game, even though it wasn't our best, I feel like we did play pretty well on defense. We just have to keep it up."

Tumilty threw two more touchdown passes, one a 77-yarder to C.J. Harris to kick off the scoring in the opening quarter and the other a 19-yard strike to brother Scotty in the fourth quarter after the Eagles had closed to within 19-9. Scotty Tumilty had three catches for 42 yards and Everett Stubblefield hauled in three receptions for 37 yards.

Sam Tumilty also found the end zone on a two-yard run and accounted for 325 yards of total offense (238 passing and 87 rushing).

"It's good to have this start and win our first conference game," Sam Tumilty said. "But we've got to clean up some things and be ready for next game. We've got to keep bringing that effort. A lot of that starts in our practices and then it carries over into the games."

The defending conference champions will look to keep their unbeaten streak intact when they head to Addison Trail next week.

"We don't take wins for granted, but we definitely feel we can play better," Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth said. "We struggled to get our rhythm and the tempo we like. Those long plays for touchdowns, you will always take those but we didn't move the ball well. We need to be more efficient."

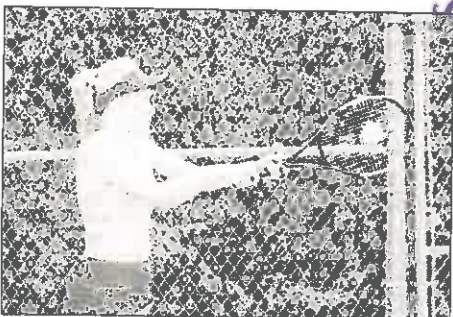

Law protects veterans' employment rights

A new Illinois law will ensure service members' rights are protected while they are serving our nation.

State Sen. Tom Cullerton (D-Villa Park) sponsored Senate Bill 3547, which modernizes state military service member employment rights. The updates to the law protect modern operational reserve forces.

This bipartisan measure was signed into law on Sunday and goes into effect Jan. 1, 2019.

"It's important that we ensure state laws are modernized with the growing needs of our military members," Cullerton said. "While our service men and women are sacrificing their lives to protect our country,

they should not have to fear losing their civilian jobs."

Senate Bill 3547, known as the Service-Member Employment and Reemployment Rights Act, takes the following action:

- Consolidates all Illinois laws providing Illinois service members employment protections
- Expands protections regarding military rights notifications and performance reviews during leave
- Adds definitions to resolve issues under existing laws, including the calculation of differential compensation
- Combines enforcement within the Office of Attorney General.

The Village of Villa Park an-

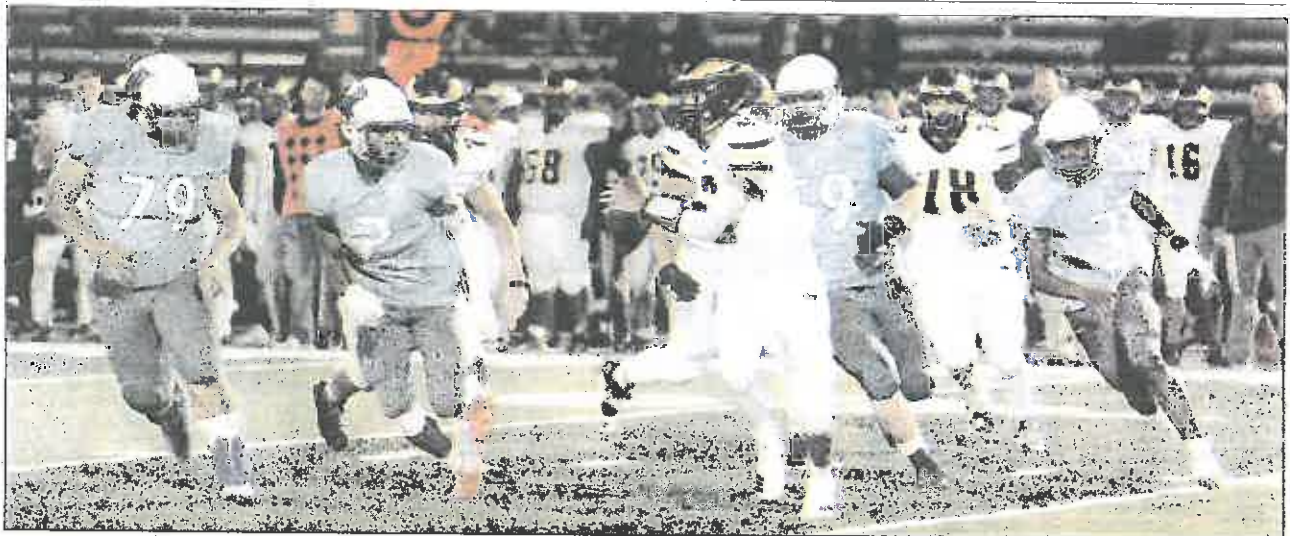

Still perfect; Warriors beat Leyden to move to 3-0

Willowbrook travels to Addison Trail this Friday

The Willowbrook football team opened its West Suburban Gold Conference schedule with Friday's 26-9 win over Leyden in Villa Park. The Warriors, who improved to 3-0 overall this season, will take on conference rival Addison Trail in this Friday's conference game in Addison.

The Warriors took an early lead when junior quarterback Sam Tumilty connected with senior C.J. Harris on a 77-yard touchdown pass in the middle of the first quarter. Senior Zoe Ericson-Staton added the extra-point kick for a 7-0 lead.

Sam Tumilty's 3-yard touchdown run with about four minutes left in the second quarter pushed the Warriors' lead to 13-0. Willowbrook's conversion attempt failed.

Winning 13-0 at halftime, the Warriors didn't take long to extend their lead in the second half. Sam Tumilty completed a short pass to junior Deandre Holliday on the half's second play from scrimmage. Holliday burst down the field for a 58-yard touchdown reception. The extra-point attempt failed, leaving Willowbrook with a 19-0 lead.

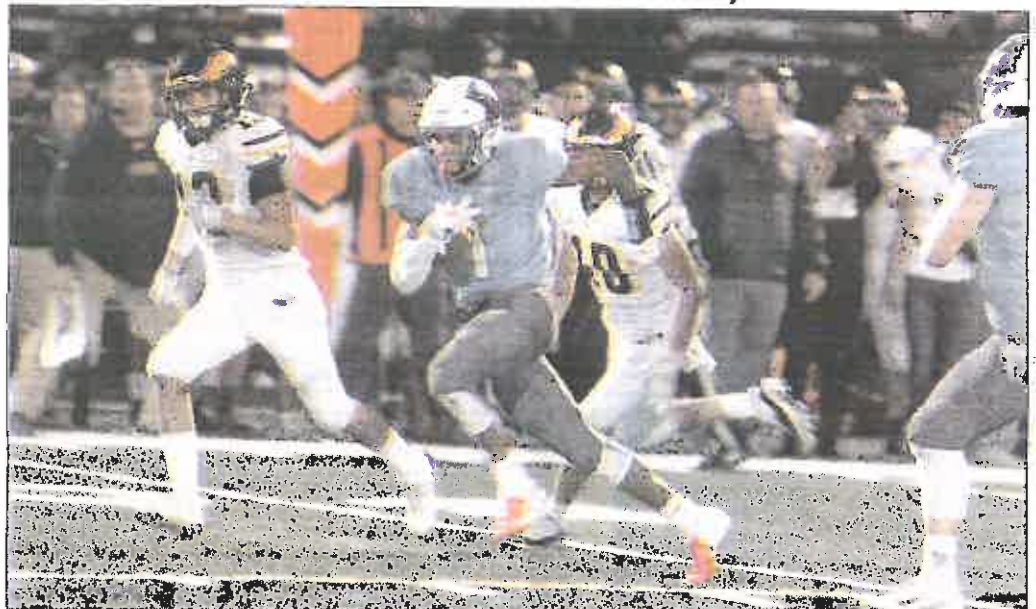
Leyden (0-3 overall, 0-1 in conference play) scored its first points of the night on a safety, which came moments after an excellent punt that gave the Warriors possession of the ball near their own goal line. Moments later, the Eagles tackled a Warrior runner in the end zone to cut Willowbrook's lead to 19-2.

Leyden produced its only touchdown drive of the game later in the third quarter. The touchdown and extra-point kick cut the Warriors' lead to 19-9 with about four minutes left in the third quarter.

Willowbrook all but sealed its victory when Sam Tumilty fired a 19-yard touchdown pass to his brother—senior Scott Tumilty—with about nine minutes left in the game. Ericson-Staton made the extra-point kick.

Ericson-Staton almost made a 35-yard field-goal attempt later in the fourth quarter. Her kick caromed off the crossbar and bounced back toward the field.

In addition to making a touchdown reception, Holliday contributed a key defensive play when he intercepted a Leyden pass late in the third quarter. Sophomore Mohammad Ayesh of the Warriors provided an interception in the first half.

Rams continue their undefeated season with a rout of West Chicago

West Aurora visits Lombard this Friday; both teams are 3-0

The Glenbard East football team, which hadn't posted a 3-0 start to the season since 1999, improved to 3-0 with Friday's 50-14 thrashing of West Chicago.

The Rams haven't played in the IHSA post-season since 1999—the last year they enjoyed a 3-0 start. There are still six more games in the regular season, but it sure looks like the Glenbard East football program will end its playoff drought this year.

The Rams took a 36-0 halftime lead over West Chicago (0-3) in Friday's Upstate Eight Conference game in Lombard. Glenbard East's first touchdown of the second half triggered a running clock for the remainder of the game. The Rams built a 50-0 lead by the end of the third quarter. West Chicago scored both of its touchdowns late in the fourth period.

"You're 3-0," said Glenbard East coach John Walters after the victory. "The confidence builds in your team. The trust builds in your team. You know your guys can make plays and do the things they need to do."

Senior quarterback Bret Bushka ran for 53 yards and three touchdowns on six carries. He completed 10 of 17 passes for 144 yards and one touchdown. He threw one interception.

"Our offensive line did a phenomenal job," said Bushka in discussing the Rams' offensive success against West Chicago. "They are big boys. They worked hard in the off-season. It's really showing up now."

Senior Billy Gotsch ran for 53 yards and a touchdown on five carries. Gotsch also hauled in Bushka's touchdown pass—an 8-yard scoring reception in the second quarter.

Senior Jake Netchin ran for 36 yards and one touchdown. Senior linebacker Anthony Shockey scored Glenbard East's final touchdown of the night when he intercepted a West Chicago pass in the third quarter and raced 65 yards into the end zone. Shockey made an 88-yard interception return for a touchdown in the Rams' season-opening win over Elgin on Aug. 24.

Bushka scored the Rams' first touchdown of the night on a 36-yard run in the first quarter. He then fielded a bad snap on the extra-point attempt and threw to Shockey for a two-point conversion. The Rams held an 8-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. They added four more touchdowns in the second

quarter to take the 36-0 halftime lead.

Shockey recovered a fumble late in the first quarter. That recovery helped the Rams to their next score—Bushka's 8-yard touchdown pass to Gotsch.

A 39-yard punt return by senior Mushar Lewis set up Glenbard East's next touchdown—an 11-yard scoring run by Netchin. Gotsch added a 35-yard touchdown run later in the second quarter. Bushka added a 9-yard touchdown run just before halftime.

Bushka scored his third touchdown of the night on a 16-yard run in the third quarter. Shockey provided his interception return for a touchdown later in the same period.

"Honestly, every time I get an interception, I black out," said Shockey after the game. "I just run like crazy. I follow my guys to lead me to the end zone. I put up six. It was very exciting."

Walters noted that Bushka and Shockey are both beginning their third seasons as varsity starters. Shockey was an all-conference selection last season.

"He's playing like a returning all-conference player," said Walters. "When you have two guys like that [Bushka and Shockey] who are like quarterbacks on each side of the ball, it makes us that much tougher."

The Rams will face their toughest test of the season thus far when they meet West Aurora (3-0) in this Friday's conference game in Lombard. Like Glenbard East, the Blackhawks have begun the 2018 with three decisive conference wins, including a 54-0 win over West Chicago on Aug. 31. West Aurora improved to 3-0 with Friday's 54-0 win over Streamwood.

"We're very confident," said Shockey. "We have the best defense in our conference. I don't think we have any weak spots in our defense."

Regardless of what happens in this Friday's game against West Aurora, the Rams look more than capable of ending the program's playoff drought. Coaches might not like to look beyond their team's next game, but it's hard for anyone else not to peek at the upcoming schedule. Based on the results of the first three games of the season, Glenbard East could expect to win at least four of its last six regular-season games. The team needs six wins—or three victories over the next six weeks—to lock up a post-season berth.

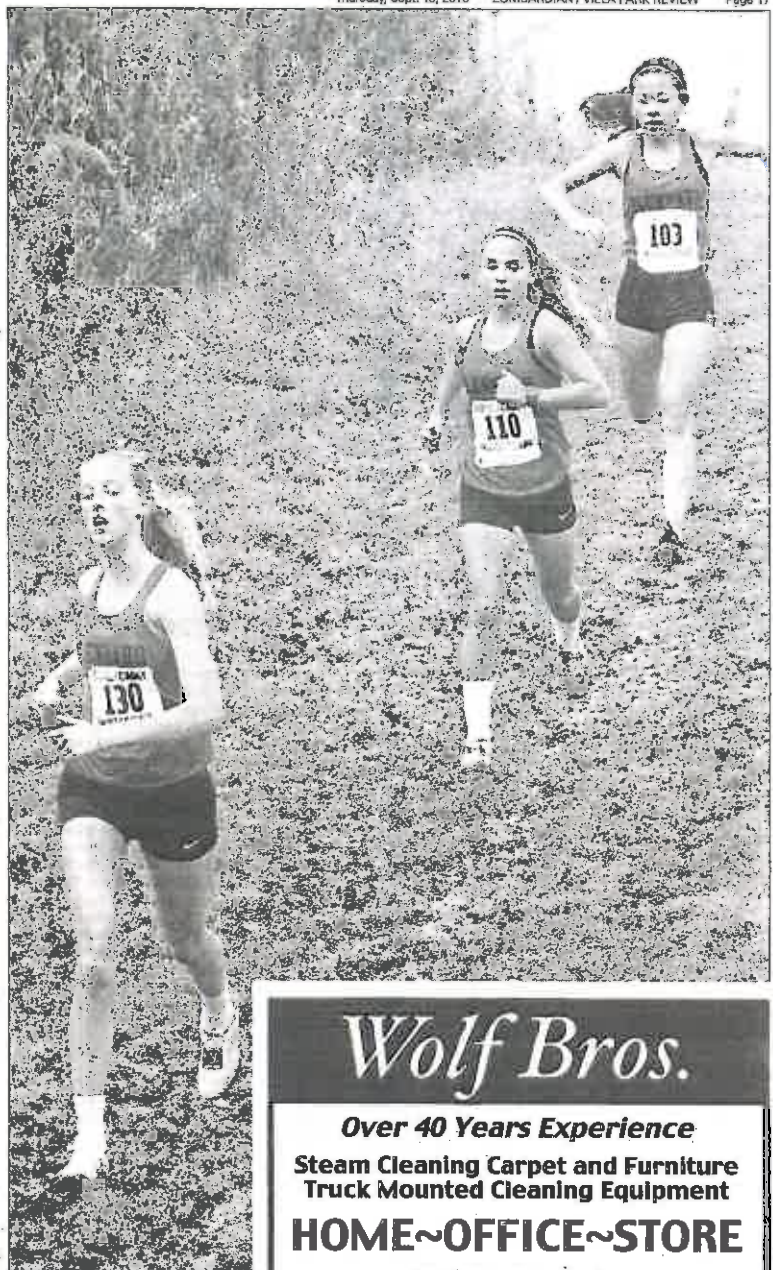
Come on down

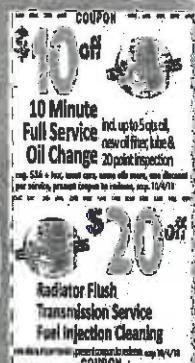

Wheaton North still looking for the big play

Last year Wheaton North's football team averaged more than 200 rushing yards a game.

It's a little different this season but still kind of the same.

The Falcons remain committed to the run — about 130 yards a game — but it's not as explosive and they don't have a battering ram like graduated back Sam Singleton.

Antwon Tolbert returned after last season rushing for more than 400 yards, but his Week 1 injury forced junior Stephen Garner to switch from defense over to offense. When Garner also got dinged up in Week 3, the Falcons promoted Samson Zander from the sophomore team to help fill out the backfield.

In last week's 7-6 overtime win over Lake Park, all the backs were on display for Wheaton North. Tolbert returned to rush for 62 yards and the team's lone touchdown while Garner added 52 yards, Zander had 35 yards and quarterback Nathan Love had 24 yards.

It was enough to move the chains 14 times for first downs, but not enough to crack the end zone in regulation.

"We do have three kids who can carry it, but none of them have broken a long one yet," said Wheaton North coach Joe Wardynski. "We just haven't had the home run in the run game."

With newfound depth in the backfield, Garner will be able to return to more defensive duty. Tolbert and Zander will carry the load on offense, although the Falcons hope to balance things out with more passing.

"As a whole unit we haven't executed enough to bust those big plays," Wardynski said. "We have to find it some way, whether it's with the pass or the run."

Winning combo:

The passing combination of Nick Plaso to Tavlon Keith showed great progress in Glenbard South's 42-13 win over East Aurora.

Plaso, a junior, completed 21 of 29 pass attempts for 264 yards and 4 touchdowns.

Three of those scores came courtesy of Keith, a 5-foot-8, 140-pound senior receiver. Keith scored on plays of 23, 66 and 14 yards. Plaso also found sophomore Cade Hardtke 4 times for 56 yards and a 14-yard touchdown.

Keith's 12 receptions set a program record, and his 176 yards receiving rank third at Glenbard South.

"It was a game our receivers needed to have and our quarterback needed to have to boost their confidence," said Raiders coach Ryan Crissey. "The pace of play, and our receivers finally seeing everything starting to jell really has given us a boost of energy

moving into playing a really athletic Larkin team."

A point guard for the Raiders' basketball team, Keith is a bundle of fast-twitch fibers, hard to bring down despite his size.

"His route-running and elusiveness makes it difficult to tackle him in the open field," Crissey said. "We try to utilize him in ways where we're not asking him to run over people, we're trying to put him in positions where he can have open field in front of him, where he can make one or two defenders miss for a long gain."

Plaso was the Raiders' starting sophomore quarterback the past two seasons. His footwork and pocket patience are catching up to his arm strength and accuracy.

"He's making the progress that we're expecting him to make, and he's really helped being that field general who is able to put the offense in good positions based on what the defense is giving us," Crissey said.

Vazquez gets it:

In a trying season to date for Glenbard North, Panthers coach Ryan Wilkens sees positives from quarterback Mike Vazquez.

"He's done some nice things for his first year," Wilkens said of the junior. "He understands what we want, has good timing, understands where we want the ball."

The younger brother of Indiana State freshman Jose Vazquez, the 2017 DuPage Valley Conference offensive lineman of the year, Mike Vazquez has established a connection on the field with junior receiver Kobie Jamison. Getting behind the defense, Jamison has caught 16 passes for 362 yards — 22.6 yards a catch — and 2 touchdowns.

Held without a touchdown pass in his first two games, Vazquez has thrown for 2 the last two games for Glenbard North.

"His development's been quick because of his understanding of the game and

what we want to accomplish. He's been doing a better job of taking care of the football the last few games," Wilkens said.

Backing up last year's starting quarterback, Lee Rady, Vazquez witnessed game speed up close.

"The ability to not have to tell him anything twice is huge," Wilkens said. "Even when he runs the scout offense, he runs scout offense very well because he understands what we're trying to accomplish. He gets it."

Best wishes:

It's a sight no football fan, coach or player ever wants to see.

At last week's Glenbard West game at York, a stretcher was needed to carry Hilltoppers defensive back Kyle Dell off the field. The senior suffered a broken leg.

"It was one of those freak accidents," said Glenbard West coach Chad Hetlet. "It's awful. You hate to see that happen to anyone."

Dell, a team captain and a starter on last season's basketball team, was one of seven returning starters for the football team. Before the second-half injury struck, he forced a fumble and broke up two passes.

In more ways than one, Dell's absence will hurt the Hilltoppers.

"It's tough to keep playing after something like that, but our guys kept going," Hetlet said. "He was on his way to being an all-conference defensive back for us. He's just an awesome kid."

Close but:

Addison Trail has struggled to put points on the scoreboard this season, something

that's become a source of frustration for the Blazers.

"It's frustrating because we're right there," said Addison Trail coach Paul Parpet. "We have to capitalize on our opportunities."

Willowbrook charged to a 14-0 lead on the Blazers last week. Addison Trail drove inside the Warriors' 20-yard line only to be turned away without any points. The Blazers' defense held and the offense again drove into the red zone — and still the Blazers scored no points.

The Blazers amassed nearly 200 yards last week, including 111 on the ground despite leading rusher J'Land Williams going down with an injury. Quarterback Nick Daudelin wound up leading the team with 40 rushing yards and a
