In District 88 Superintendent Dr. Scott Helton's column in the most recent District 88 newsletter, he talked about the process of updating the School District's Strategic Plan. Early last week, he met with staff members at both Addison Trail and Willowbrook High Schools to discuss the plan.

"We are updating our Strategic Plan to retool and enhance the district's existing 2010 plan and this week was a tremendous opportunity to speak with our staff about our future direction and hear their thoughts and suggestions," he said. Through this process, we will meet with a variety of stakeholder groups to gather their input."

Helton said a focus group for internal parent groups was held Sept. 18 at Addison Trail. There are also plans for two external focus groups that are open to the community for all stakeholders. One is scheduled on Saturday, Oct. 20 from 9 a.m. to 12 noon at Addison Trail; another will take place on Saturday, Oct. 27 from 9 am. to 12 noon at Willow-

On Thursday, Sept. 20, at 7 p.m. at the Addison Public Library, the library and the Addison Historical Society will co-sponsor an historical lecture called "Bikes, Gas Buggies and Burma Shave.

Historical impersonator R.J. Lindaey will portray the founder of Oldsmobile, R.E. Olds and narrate a slide program with stories about early auto inventors such as Benz, Olds, Winton, Ford and Dodge and auto racing at Evanston, Elgin and Cleveland with Barney Oldfield and Bad Luck Baker. Also on the program will be the first cross country road trips by car with Bud the Bulldog in 1903 (he did not drive!) and Alice Ramsey in 1909. Lindsey will also discuss the roadside advertising phenomena of Burma Shave, an American brand of brushless shaving cream in the early 20th Century which posted humorous, rhyming poems on sequential highway roadside signs to advertise their brand.

The Battle of District 88 again goes to Willowbrook.

The Willowbrook football team remained undefeated after a 42-13 West Suburban Conference Gold Division victory against Addison Trail in Addison.

Willowbrook moved to 4-0 overall and 2-0 in WSC Gold play, Addison Trail slipped to 0-4 overall and 0-1 in WSC Gold action.

The Willowbrook boys golf team had itself a busy recent stretch.

The Warriors defeated District 88 neighbor Addison Trail in a combined West Suburban Conference Gold Division and 18-hole match held at Prairie Bluff Golf Course. par 36/72.

The two teams played an 18-hole match and the first nine counted as the official WSC Gold dual.

The Warriors won the WSC Gold match 182-193 and took the 18hole contest by a 369-388 count.

Addison Trail boys soccer team competes in PepsiCo event

Blazers open conference play this week

The Addison Trail boys soccer team again is part of one of the most prestigious high-school soccer tournaments around, the PepsiCo tournament.

The Blazers went into the event as a top-16 seed in the 64-team field. The Blazers lost 4-1 to Streamwood in their PepsiCo opener and then beat Plainfield Central 2-0 in the second game of the tournament.

Addison Trail was 4-4 through its first eight games of the season and West Suburban Conference Gold Division action this week with contests against Willowbrook and Hinsdale South (today at Hinsdale South).

Through late last week, senior midfielder Melvin Mora was leading the team with seven goals. Senior for-ward Lukas Rodriguez, junior mid-fielder Leo Acosta and sophomore forward Anthony Hernandez each had three goals.

Julio Acosta, Hernandez, Alex-

is Delapaz, Acosta, Rodriguez and Mora each had two assists.

Senior goalie Sam Sandoval had four shutouts through the team's first eight games. Sandoval had 44 saves on 58 shots on goal to go with a 1.75 goals-against average and a 76 per-cent save-percentage. "He's been in net for us every minute of the season so far," said coach Ryan Dini "Sain has been very vocal in the back for us and is having a solid season as goalkeeper. He is very confident in net and has very good field player skills if we need to play back to him. He also punts the ball past midfield, which is

Dini said the team has had a rough go on the offensive end in recent times, "Our offense has been strug-"Our offense has been struggling of late," he said. "We have a lot of skill and are getting tons of shots, but we are having a lot of trouble putting the ball in the net. We have 19 goals in eight games, which averages out to 2.38 goals per game. We would like that number to be over three goals a game. That being said, we have played four teams ranked in the top 30 in the state. Our competition has been really good. We've played teams such as Lake Park, Stream-wood, Maine West and Bolingbrook. We beat a very good team in Glen-bard North. Against Bolingbrook we outshot them 25-7 and lost 3-1. Once we start finishing, we are going to be very hard to beat.

Dini said the team is working hard on ramping up on the defensive end as well. "Our defense has been in-consistent," he said. "We are 4-4 on the season. All our wins have been shutouts. We also have let up five goals against Maine West and four against Streamwood. We made some

adjustments to our formation and we looked much better against Plainfield Central. I look forward to seeing our defense be stronger as the season goes on with familiarity with our system and understanding of what each defender is good at.

Dini lauded the team's efforts on the possession end. "We are possessing the ball very well this year," he said. "In seven of our eight games we have had more possession of the soccer ball. This is allowing for scoring opportunities. I also like the way we are challenging 50-50 balls in the air. We are not the tallest team but we show a lot of hustle and heart when the ball is in the air.'

Dini also has liked the way junior defender Martin Murillo and sophomore Hernandez have competed of late. "Martin has really stepped up," he said. "We moved him from midfield to left defender and he has done a great job with transition. He can be an extra attacker when we have the

ball and need him to push up. He is rock-solid in the back when we are defending. He has really bought into our system and has been better than advertised since coming from the club level last year.

Dini said Hernandez gives the team much-needed speed at the top. "He has a high level of soccer IQ," he said.
"He is dangerous and relentless on the attacking end. He is almost averaging a goal every other game for us and that is impressive as a sophomore."

Looking ahead, Dini sees a brighter

path for this team. "I really think we are about another week away from really starting to put together a good winning streak," he said. "Our schedule gets a little easier and we are coming together as a group. I really like what I have seen over the past week so hopefully we keep improving and limit our mistakes on defense and take advantage of our offensive playmaking ability. It should be a very exciting conference run over the next month.







She related that students take what are known as immersive learning classes, and "I had been working with the faculty adviser in projects

Stanis said she had worked as a production assistant, and as a junior began working with Flook on the centennial documentary, being named assistant producer.

She said work began last summer,

with directors and editors gathering information about the university's

history.
According to the university, Muncie business leaders "envisioned a local college to help boost the city's development." Among them were Frank C. Ball and his brothers, who had moved from New York to Muncie to expand their glass container

A small, private teacher training school was launched in 1899, but school was launched in 1899, but the community's efforts to keep the college going failed, according to the university. The Ball brothers bought the land and buildings and donated it to the state of Indiana, which in turn became the Indiana State Normal School Eastern Division, opening in 1918 and serving to train teachers

In 1922 the Indiana General Assembly changed the name to Ball Teachers, which then was changed to Ball State Teachers College in 1929.
The college expanded to include




