

Sam Tumilty, Willowbrook win at York

Warriors remain undefeated with 28-14 victory over Dukes

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ELMHURST - Nick Hildreth and Mike Fitzgerald are former football teammates, both having been wide receivers at Lake Forest College in the early 2000s.

On Sept. 28, the two longtime friends were back on the same field together, albeit as head coaches on opposite sidelines.

In the end, it was Hildreth who got the upper hand over his good pal as Willowbrook stayed undefeated at 6-0 with a 28-14 win over York in Elmhurst.

"I remember being a freshman at Lake Forest," Hildreth said, "and doing a walk-through and we were standing together. He is one of the first guys I got to know. The last time we played together was 2002. This is the first time we coached against each other. So it's been like 16 years since we were on the same field. It's really cool. It speaks volumes about the fraternity of this sport. We wouldn't know each other if not for this game."

Fitzgerald echoed those thoughts.

"It's definitely weird being on opposite sidelines," the first-year Dukes coach said. "But obviously we are both competitors. I love Nick and he has done a great job with that program and that is what we are trying to do here at York."

One of the big differences between the two programs is the Warriors have the Tumilty brothers. Junior quarterback Sam Tumilty threw a pair of touchdowns while also rushing for 141 yards and a score.

Older brother Scott hauled in one of those TD passes, a 7-yard strike in the fourth quarter that upped the margin to 28-7. Scott also scored on an 8-yard run early in the second half.

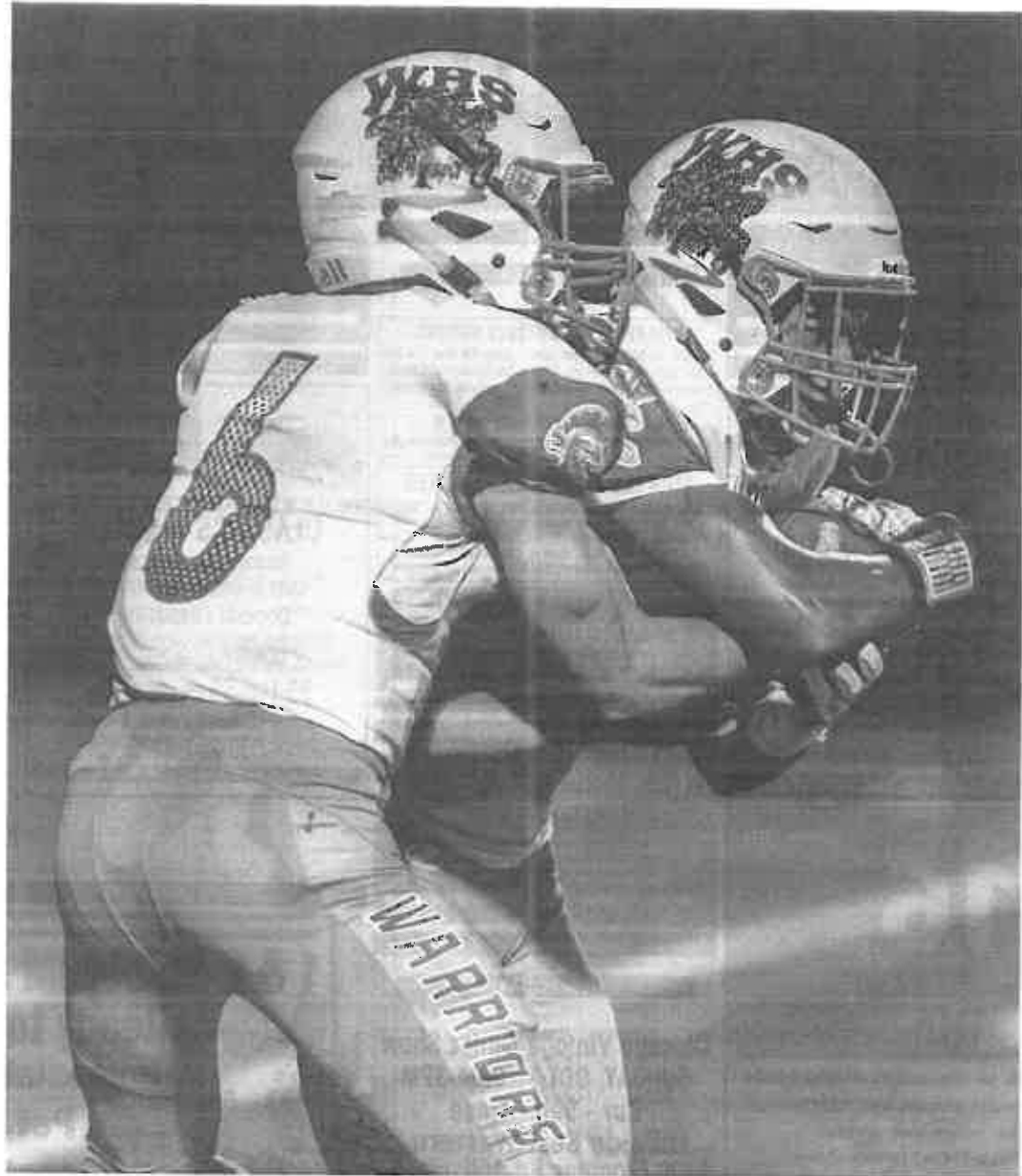
"You have to give those guys a lot of credit," Fitzgerald said. "They both play with a lot of heart and that's the way coach Hildreth played."

Sam Tumilty also connected with Deandre Holliday for a 34-yard touchdown to begin the scoring at the 6:07 mark of the first quarter.

"That was a good first touchdown," Tumilty said. "He ran a great route to get open and I just had to get him the ball."

Once again, Tumilty was quick to credit his offensive line, which continues to open up plenty of running holes while also excelling in pass blocking.

"It's insane how far we've come as a team," senior offensive lineman Emmanuel Chavez said. "Starting off the

season, nobody thought we'd be one of the top dogs. But we've come out and shown that we have some talent. And we always want to get better. We strive to get better each week and we want to win every game."

With games against Morton, Proviso East and Downers Grove South remaining, a perfect regular season is well within the Warriors' grasp. But Willowbrook isn't looking that far ahead.

"We just need to take it one game at

a time," Sam Tumilty said, "and that is what our coaches want as far as our mindset. We just have to keep grinding and try to be a better version of ourselves every week."

"Tonight York came out with great intensity and they were real competitive. It was good to come out and get the job done."

Mock elections at area high schools 'elect' Pritzker governor

LWV, commission provide authentic machines, ballots, tabulators

During the week of Sept. 17, the Elmhurst League of Women Voters took part in mock elections at Addison Trail High School in Addison.

The Mid-term elections are an important part of the election process, covering all 435 Congressional races, as well as important state offices including Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, Controller, Treasurer and more. Unlike presidential elections, which use the Electoral College to determine who the next president will be, Congressional elections use the direct vote of a state's citizens to choose the winners.

As Illinois prepares to elect state, congressional and local public officials on Tuesday, Nov. 6, students and teachers in 14 high schools in DuPage County participated in mock elections.

Since 2008, students experience a unique learning experience by voting in a mock election on actual voting machines, ballots and vote tabulators used in polling places. The League of Women Voters, the DuPage Election Commission and Governmental Business Systems (GBS) partnered with DuPage County high schools to provide a hands-on learning experience.

"[The League of Women Voters has] a long history of community involvement and leadership, including nonpartisan election activities, such as sponsoring candidate debates and town hall meetings on important public issues," said LWV member and volunteer Jan Dornier. "Bringing the mock election experience to the schools increases civic awareness."

Teachers like the authentic voting learning experience.

"Democracy is not a spectator sport," said teacher Lindsey DiTomasso. "We are so privileged at York

High School to have a positive and sustainable relationship with Elmhurst League of Women Voters and DuPage County Board of Elections allowing our students to have opportunities for both civic engagement and exposure to the responsibilities of being a citizen."

Social studies teachers worked closely with League representatives to maximize student participation. Students experience the entire voting

process - from registering to vote to casting ballots. Students voted for representatives from the 5th, 6th, 8th, and 11th Congressional Districts along with Governor, Attorney General, Secretary of State, Controller, and Treasurer.

Partnering with the League was the DuPage Election Commission. The Election Commission delivered actual voting equipment to the 14 schools, including voting booths, a

ballot box and optical scanner. Student voters received the "I Voted Sticker" after completing the ballot and feeding it into the optical scanner.

The official results from Addison Trail are as follows:

At Addison Trail, a total of 254 ballots were counted. JB Pritzker (D) won the race for governor, garnering 132 votes to Governor Bruce Raun-

er's (R) 82. Behind them were Kash Jackson (L) with 24 and Sam McCann (C) 13. For Attorney General, Kwame Raoul (D) received 102 votes over Erika Harold's (R) 96. Bubba Harsy (L) received 53. Jesse White (D) dominated the vote for Secretary of State with 175 over Jason Hellend's (R) 47 and Steve Dutner's (L) 29. In the race for State Controller,

Susana Mendoza (D) received 130 votes over Darlene Senger's (R) 67 and Claire Ball's (L) 49. State Treasurer went to Mike Frerichs (D) with 107 while Jim Dodge (R) received 79 and Mike Leheny (L) 46.

In the 8th Congressional District, incumbent Raja Krishnamoorthi (D) garnered 158 votes to Jitendra Diganvker's (R) 95.

Willowbrook football team moves to 6-0, clinches another playoff berth

Warriors boys golf team takes third at conference meet

The Willowbrook football team punched another playoff ticket for itself after a 28-14 West Suburban Conference crossover win against York in Elmhurst.

The win moved the Warriors to 6-0 on the season. Willowbrook now has won 16 of its last 18 contests dating back to last season.

Willowbrook is in the state playoffs for a third year in a row after advancing to the state quarterfinals in each of the last two seasons.

The Warriors return to WSC Gold Division play Friday against Morton in the regular season home finale in Villa Park.

Willowbrook golf

The Willowbrook boys golf team recently placed third at the West Suburban Conference Gold Division meet held at par-72 Prairie Bluff.

Willowbrook took third in the seven-team meet with a 347 score.

Logan Rattana, a junior, was eighth with an 84. Senior Taylor Sarovich also shot 84, but took ninth and senior Jackson Hathaway shot 86 and finished in 10th place. Senior Joey Guthrie shot 93 to round out Willowbrook's scorecard.

Rattana, Sarovich and Hathaway were named to the all-WSC Gold team.

Willowbrook competed in a Class 3A regional at Glendale Lakes earlier in the week.

Willowbrook boys cross country

The Willowbrook boys cross-country team was 4-2 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division duals through late last week. Willowbrook lost to Downers Grove South and Morton in conference action.

Sophomore Tyler King has moved into the team's No. 1 position in the lineup. Matt Caron, a senior, is running second. "Both are competing with each other and are getting better every day," said Willowbrook coach TJ Artman.

Artman said the team has good cohesion as it heads to the key part of the season. "We're running our first through seventh runners at around a 60-second split, so that's good," said Artman. "We are working on running as a pack and getting that split time closer."

In addition to King, Willowbrook also has been bolstered of late by the efforts of senior Gavin Hitzeman and junior Brandon Heselton. "Tyler is turning it up and him being a sophomore is exciting," said Artman. "Gavin is new to cross country and is doing a great job breaking into the top-seven of the lineup. Brandon is a junior who is taking on a leadership role on and off the course."

Willowbrook does not compete this weekend and will return to action at the WSC Gold meet at Hinsdale South a week from Saturday.

"The season has gone by fast," said Artman. "We all can't believe it's almost conference and state race season. Our goal is to qualify the team to sectional."

Willowbrook girls volleyball

The Willowbrook girls volleyball team dropped a recent 19-25, 25-20, 25-20 West Suburban Conference Gold Division match to Downers Grove South. The loss put the Warriors at 2-2 in WSC Gold play.

Katie Linnig had 13 digs, nine assists, one kill and one ace. Payton Ceh had 20 digs, six kills, one assist and one ace.

Kaitlyn Karcz had two kills, two blocks, two digs and one assist.

Boys soccer team runs winning streak to nine games

Blazers 3-0 in conference play heading into home stretch

The Addison Trail boys soccer team's fortunes have turned around in a hurry.

The Blazers at one point were sitting below .500 at 3-4, but have since rattled off nine wins in a row and now stand at 12-4 overall and 3-0 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division play.

In recent action, Addison Trail downed York 2-1 in a WSC crossover contest, scored a 4-3 WSC Gold win over Leyden and upended Neuqua Valley 2-0 on senior night at Addison Trail.

In previous conference play, Addison Trail shutout Hinsdale South 4-0 and Willowbrook by a 3-0 count.

The Blazers square off with Proviso East and Downers Grove South in conference play this week and then have their WSC Gold finale against Morton this coming Tuesday in a match that could determine the WSC Gold champion.

"We hope that when we play Morton that it's for the conference championship, but we know we have to take care of business first," said Addison Trail coach Ryan Dini.

So what has led to the team's rapid turnaround?

"Our team defense," said Dini. "We have nine shutouts. We started off the year 3-4 and switched our defense around and switched formation. Since then we haven't lost."

Addison Trail also has benefited from the return of center-midfielder Eduardo Gomez. "He missed our first five games," Dini pointed out. "His senior leadership gave us the ability to move guys around and have them play their true positions."

Sam Sandoval has nine shutouts in goal for the Blazers and has a 1.2 goals-against average and a save percentage of 85.

"He's been our leader back there," said Dini. "He's very vocal. He's one of the best goaltenders in the area. His stats speak for themselves. He has that experience as far as being a leader. He's one of our top guys."

Addison Trail's offense also has improved of late. "We're averaging almost three goals a game now," said Dini.

Melvin Mora, through late last

week, was leading the team with 12 goals and four assists. He's a three-year varsity player. Sophomore Anthony Hernandez had 10 goals to go with four assists.

"We have good balance between those two and our midfielders have stepped up," said Dini. "We go 15 deep and our subs go in there and give us that extra punch."

One of those super-subs is Leo Acosta who had six goals and five assists through late last week.

"We can put him in at midfield or forward and when he comes in he gives us a spark when we need it," said Dini.

Senior leadership as a whole has benefitted the Blazers this season. "Of our 18 guys, 11 are seniors," said Dini. "They know that it's crunch time."

Dini noted Addison Trail beat three teams ranked in the Chicagoland-area top 20 within the last two weeks. "We're getting hot at the right time," he said. "We still have a chance to win the conference title if we beat the teams we are playing (this week). We want a chance at Morton for the conference title. The guys are excited. We are playing well. Our team defense is very solid and we are moving the ball well."

Rams secure a playoff berth by pounding East Aurora

Win propels Glenbard East to 6-0; Rams will play their homecoming game this Friday

For the first time in 19 years, the Glenbard East football team is going to the playoffs.

The Rams clinched a 2018 playoff berth with Friday's 42-8 Upstate Eight Conference victory at East Aurora. The win gave Glenbard East an overall (and conference) record of 6-0.

Glenbard East has not had a winning season, or made the playoffs, since 1999. Nineteen years ago, the Rams won three post-season games on their way to the semifinal round of the IHSA Class 8A playoffs. Until this year, the 1999 team is the only Rams team to make the playoffs since the current post-season format began in 1974.

"It's obviously a big deal," said Glenbard East head coach John Walters of the 2018 playoff berth. "Everything's positive. The school is buzzing. The community is buzzing. It's a great time to be a Ram."

The Rams built a 35-0 halftime lead over winless East Aurora (0-6). They added a third-quarter touchdown to raise their lead to 42-0 and trigger a running clock for the remainder of the game.

The Rams scored their first touchdown of the night on a 33-yard pass from senior quarterback Bret Bushka to senior receiver Jeremy Johnson. Bushka threw two more touchdowns in the game—a 22-yarder to senior Kurt Csech and a 39-yarder to Johnson, whose pair of touchdown receptions against East Aurora gave him 10 TD catches this season.

Senior Jake Netchin, senior Billy Gotsch and junior Jamyleen Miles each contributed a rushing touchdown for the Rams. Gotsch's 4-yard scoring run in the third quarter triggered the running clock.

Bushka completed nine of 15 pass attempts for 198 yards and three touchdowns. He threw one interception. Johnson made four receptions for 127 yards. Netchin rushed for 91 yards on seven carries.

The Rams will play their homecoming game against Streamwood (1-5) this Friday. Glenbard East will complete the regular season with road games at Glenbard South (Oct. 12) and Elgin-Larkin (Oct. 19). It's reasonable to expect the Rams to win all three contests to post a perfect 9-0 regular season.

Cullerton legislation proposes stricter penalties in road construction zones

The Illinois Tollway and state Sen. Tom Cullerton (D-Villa Park) are working together to keep Illinois work zones safe by imposing stricter penalties for reckless driving in Illinois work zones.

Cullerton's proposed legislation would increase the fine for hitting a construction worker in a work zone from \$10,000 to \$25,000 and would create a new encroachment violation that would impose a fine for going

around cones and barrels.

"Driving recklessly through construction zones to shave off a few minutes of your arrival time can be the difference between life and death," Cullerton said. "Our road construction workers are working day and night to improve our state's infrastructure. It's our job to drive responsibly and respectfully to prevent tragedies."

This legislation comes in light of

an accident in which Bartlett resident Frank Caputo, a flagger, was struck and killed in an Illinois Tollway work zone.

Officials say there are 4,800 work zone crashes in Illinois each year. In 2017, fatalities were reported in 29 of them.

"We will work to honor Frank Caputo by finding ways to keep his fellow workers safe," Cullerton said. "Tragedies like this stress the need to

drive carefully, if not for your own life but for those sharing the road with us."

Cullerton is working to file legislation that can be taken up as early as November during Veto Session.

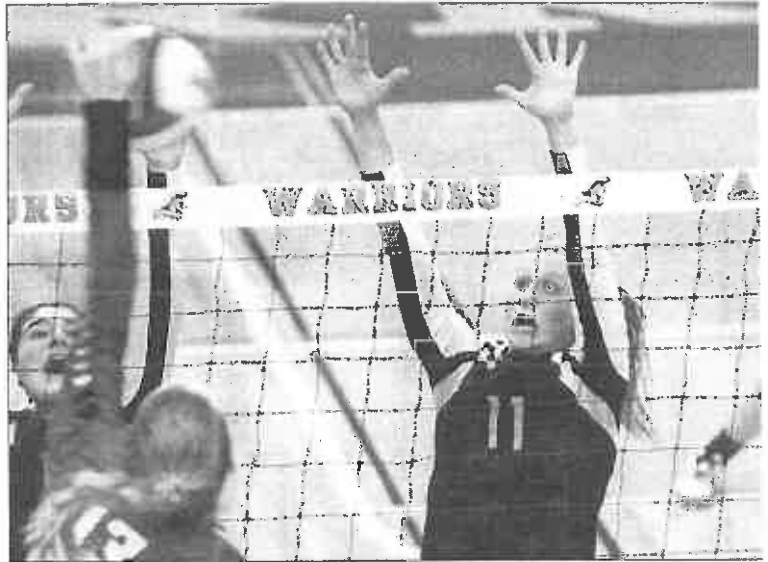

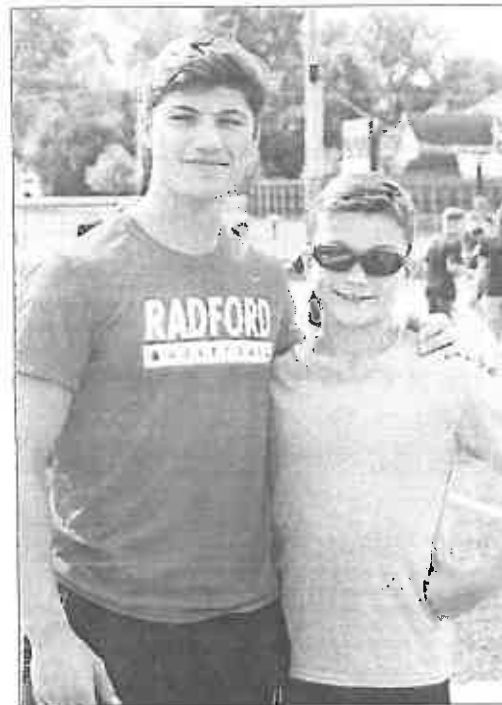
Mystery reader

The Willowbrook football team improved to 6-0 with Friday's 28-14 victory over York in Elmhurst. The win at York's homecoming game clinched a playoff berth for the Warriors, who advanced to the post-season in 2016 and 2017. York scored a touchdown in the middle of the second quarter and tied the game at 7-7, but the Warriors scored on their ensuing drive, which began with Sam Tumilty's 35-yard run. The junior quarterback ended

the drive with a 5-yard touchdown run.

The Warriors delivered an 80-yard scoring drive to start the second half. Scott Tumilty closed out that drive with an 8-yard touchdown run with about eight minutes left in the third quarter.

The Tumilty brothers connected on a 7-yard touchdown pass with about 10 minutes left in the fourth quarter. Ericson-Staton added her fourth extra-point kick of the night to give the Warriors a 28-7 lead. The Dukes scored a late touchdown on a pass that covered about 30 yards.

"The line and the receivers did a great job of blocking," said Sam Tumilty after the game. "The offensive line does a great job of giving me the protection I need. They've been getting better and better."

Willowbrook will play its final home game of the regular season this Friday. The Warriors will face Morton in a West Suburban Gold Conference game. The Mustangs will enter the contest at 1-5 overall and 0-3 in the conference.

Willowbrook will complete its regular season with conference games at Proviso East (Oct. 12) and Downers Grove South (Oct. 19). It doesn't take much imagination to see the Warriors winning their last three games to complete an unblemished 9-0 regular season.

Down 21-0, Montini pulls out a win at Loyola

The Montini football team rallied from a 21-0 deficit to beat Loyola Academy 28-27 in Saturday's Chicago Catholic League Blue Division game in Winnetka.

The Broncos improved to 6-0 overall and 2-0 in the Blue Division. Loyola fell to 3-3, 0-2 in the Blue Division.

Montini trailed the Ramblers 27-20 in the fourth quarter. The Broncos cut the lead to 27-26 when sophomore quarterback Robert Brazziel threw a short touchdown pass to junior Nate Muersch with about five minutes to play. "He [Ross] caught the ball around the 2-yard line," said Bukovsky. "It was a big scrum. Thank goodness, he was able to cross the goal line."

Junior defensive lineman Patrick Peters helped stop Loyola's next offensive drive by pressuring the quarterback on a fourth-down pass. The pass went incomplete and the Broncos took possession. Montini sealed the win when junior quarterback Deontay Bell completed a fourth-down pass to senior Zack Olson, whose reception picked up a first down. The Broncos were able to run out the clock after Olson's reception.

"It was kind of a story of two halves," said Bukovsky of the game. "We didn't start out too well. We were reeling."

Loyola, which advanced to the IHSA Class 8A state championship game last season, took its 21-0 lead over Montini by scoring touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams. The Ramblers scored their defensive touchdown by making a sack in the end zone, stripping the ball and making a recovery. Loyola scored its special teams touchdown on a punt return.

Moments after that punt return, Montini senior Nick Pedanzo returned the ensuing kickoff 99 yards for a touchdown. Senior Scott West kicked the extra point to cut Loyola's lead to 21-7.

West caught a touchdown pass from Brazziel in the second quarter.

Loyola then made a field goal to take a 24-14 lead by halftime.

"We felt fortunate to be down only ten points at halftime," said Bu-

kovsky. "Brazziel and Muersch connected for a touchdown pass of about 35 yards in the third quarter. The Broncos missed the extra-point attempt."

Loyola kicked a field goal later in the quarter to increase its lead to 27-20. The Broncos' two quarterbacks—Bell and Brazziel—have shared duties throughout the season.

"We ran them in and out, sometimes on alternate plays; it keeps people guessing," said Bukovsky. "They are both very mature, and they give us a lot of options."

The Montini football program has seen a lot, including capture six IHSA state titles. But until Saturday, the Broncos had never beaten

Loyola. The Ramblers won the two previous meetings with the Montini, both of which took place during the regular season.

"When you play at Montini, you don't get to celebrate a lot of firsts," said Bukovsky. "But the greatest players who ever played here—they never beat Loyola."

The Broncos will try to improve to 7-0 when they play Penick in this Friday's game at Triton College. Montini will play at Providence Catholic on Oct. 12. The Broncos will finish the regular season with an Oct. 19 home game against Brother Rice (currently 6-0). Montini will battle for either a piece of the Blue Division title, or first place outright, in the regular-season finale.

"I don't think a lot of people thought we'd be in this position," said Bukovsky.

Next step for NBA: Hiring women in positions of power

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — San Antonio Spurs coach Gregg Popovich sees one simple way for both the NBA and women to mark real progress in the league.

Hire more women in positions of power.

"I think there just has to be more, more of the same," said Popovich, who during the off-season promoted assistant coach Becky Hammon, moving her one step closer to a head coaching seat. "There are more Beckys out there, they just have to be noticed and given the opportunity by people who are wise enough and courageous enough to do it and not just sit in the old paradigm."

And not just on the bench, but on the business side of the NBA as well.

The NBA routinely gets high marks for its diversity efforts and is widely viewed as a leader on social issues. Still, NBA Commissioner Adam Silver believes the league needs to be better, and he made his feelings known in a memo to teams in the wake of the Dallas Mavericks' embarrassing scandal.

Several NBA teams tout statistics about women in their workforce, but beyond a handful — including Lakers controlling owner Jeanie Buss and Pelicans owner Gayle Benson — the next step for the league seems to be more women in positions of power such as CEOs and COOs.

Memphis guard Mike Conley said it's important for basketball, business and society itself to have women in positions of authority.

"We welcome it, and we do want to see more of that," Conley said, "and I think that will help bridge that gray area and

all the things that have been happening with the Mavs and situations like that and hopefully it will never occur" again.

The NBA earned an A+ for racial hiring practices but a B for its gender hiring practices this summer from The Institute for Diversity and Ethics in Sports. That puts the NBA "significantly above" other professional sports, even as the number of women hired at the team level dropped for a third straight year with the percentage of women in team vice presidents and professional staff dipping as well, according to the report's author, Richard Lapchick.

When the NBA began investigating a report of sexual harassment and improper workplace conduct involving the former team president, the Mavericks did not have one woman at the executive level. Owner Mark Cuban hired former AT&T senior executive Cynthia Marshall as CEO and president in February, promoted four women to executive roles and now has eight women among 18 leadership roles. A memo obtained by The Associated Press last month shows the NBA plans workshops in Atlanta and Los Angeles in mid-November on the diversity and inclusion efforts. The NBA also set up an anonymous tip line after the Mavs' story broke. NBA teams surveyed by The Associated Press say they've already been holding seminars on workplace conduct and putting women in leadership roles.

Irina Pavlova represented the Nets on the Board of Governors before leaving last year and was replaced by a woman as president of the company that runs the Nets, Barclays Center and Nassau Coliseum. The Toronto Raptors have Teresa Resch as vice president of basketball operations and

player development, and Dr. Lisa Callahan is chief medical officer for both the Knicks and the WNBA's Liberty.

The Miami Heat recently hired Ruth Riley Hunter as its newest television and radio analyst, a move in motion before Silver talked about wanting more women in the NBA.

Grizzlies general manager Chris Wallace has seen the number of women in the NBA jump dramatically since he joined the league in 1986 and believes its heading in the right direction. Chantal Hassard has been with the Grizzlies since the franchise was in Vancouver and is entering her third season as VP of team operations and player programs. Memphis also just brought back Nicki Gross as a basketball analyst after she was the D-League's only woman assistant in 2015 with Iowa.

"I think it adds a viewpoint, a skillset that is very beneficial for the teams," Wallace said. Silver wants teams hiring more women, including jobs with power, so the NBA is going to help. "The NBA plans an event at the All-Star break in Charlotte, North Carolina, in February to grow the pipeline of female talent in basketball operations roles."

Lapchick said hiring more women has to be a combination of efforts by both the NBA and its teams.

"Teams saw the results in Dallas with no women in leadership to stop/confront bad behavior, which I believe is not uncommon toward women in the workplace in and out of sport," Lapchick said. "Adam has the respect to push and I am impressed by the NBA's actions after the decline in gender grade when the Report Card was published followed by the post investigation in Dallas."

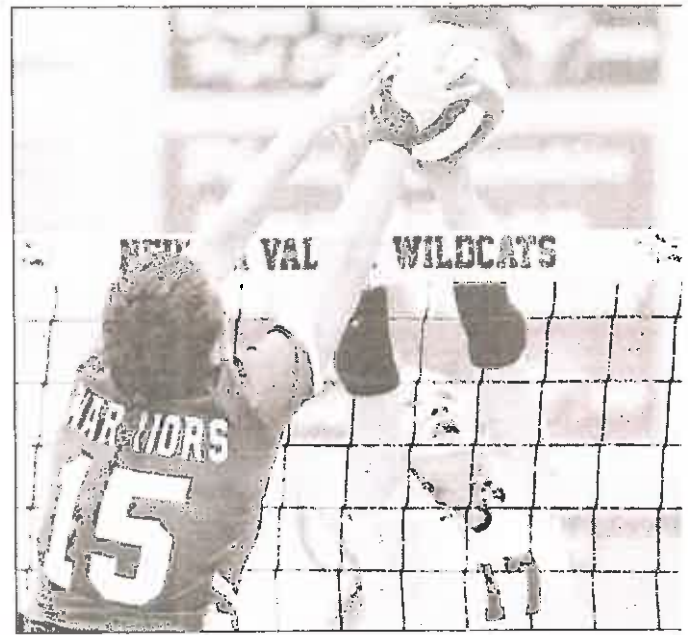

Daily messages motivated Brooks Koepka

Brooks Koepka had two sets of daily reminders for a season that PGA Tour players voted as the best.

One was his annual list of goals that he writes every Jan. 1 during quiet time on the beach, some of them golf specific, some of them about life. He tucks the list in the middle of his closet so he can't miss it when he's getting dressed, packing for a trip or getting his watch and wallet.

"I'm definitely ahead of schedule on certain things," Koepka said Tuesday.

No doubt he was referring to winning two majors, which made him the obvious choice as PGA Tour player of the year. His second straight U.S. Open title made him the first back-to-back winner since Curtis Strange in 1988-89. His two-shot victory in the PGA Championship made him only the fifth player in 100 years to win in the same season the two U.S. majors held on different courses.

And he missed on a few goals. One was to not miss a cut, which ended in Canada with a 77 in the opening round that led to a weekend off. Another was to finish in the top 10 in half of his events.

And then there was one that made him laugh just to say it.

"Stay healthy," Koepka said.

His left wrist was bothering him last December in the Bahamas, where he finished last in an 18-man field, 21 shots out of the lead. A month of rest didn't help. He started the new year at Kapalua and finished last in a 34-man field, 37 shots behind. Only then did he discover a partially torn tendon that kept him out of the Masters during his four months away from golf. That led to the second reminder.

It was a quote from Kobe Bryant after the Los Angeles Lakers great ruptured his Achilles tendon. Koepka set the quote as wallpaper eight months ago so that he would see it every time he activated his phone.

"It was too long for me to quote it exactly, but it was to wake up every day and find the positive because you were one step closer to being you, and to enjoy the moments of

frustration because with each step you get better and better, and to embrace those moments," Koepka said.

Koepka leaves this weekend for the start of a new PGA Tour season, even though the year isn't over. He is playing the CJ Cup in South Korea, followed by the HSBC Champions in Shanghai, and then his title defense at the Dunlop Phoenix in Japan the weekend before Thanksgiving.

He is the sixth winner in the last six years, the longest streak since players began voting on the award in 1990. The most recent winners were Justin Thomas, Jordan Spieth, Rory McIlroy and Tiger Woods. Thomas and Johnson won three times and took turns at No. 1.

"That doesn't trump two majors by a guy who spotted the field some four months."

"So many guys can take over the top spot," Koepka said. "It's probably the best group of guys that I've ever seen, and they keep coming. And you throw Tiger into the mix now. You never know what's going to happen."

Koepka never saw a year like this coming, at least not the way it started.

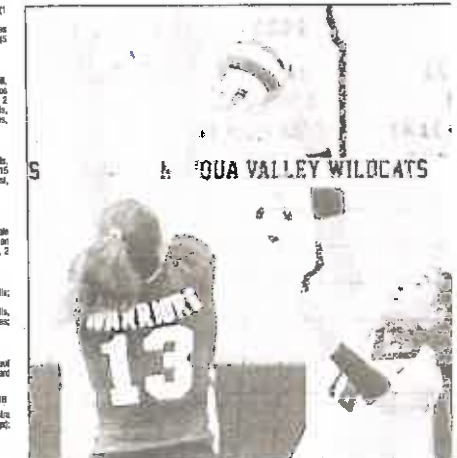

Will schools around Illinois vote to revamp playoff system?

Conference shuffling. We've talked about it. We've dreaded it. Frankly, we're sick of it.

But what can we do about it?

This week's Eyes on Five looks at a proposal from the IHSA Football Advisory Committee that we're hoping has the legs to make it successfully through a statewide vote by the member schools.

scheduling difficulties.

Scheduling nondistrict games at the start of the season would be easier because playoff implications are eliminated. Teams like Naperville Central wouldn't have to travel to Ohio or Kentucky just to fill its schedule.

It checks all the boxes for the DVC but, unfortunately for the league, they may not have enough companions in the pro-district camp.

1 What is a district?:

In April the IHSA Football Advisory Committee unveiled a proposal that introduces districts as a way to eliminate conference shuffling and make it easier for schools to schedule "nondistrict" games.

Districts would replace conferences — only for football. There would be eight districts, created by the IHSA, for each of the eight football classes. They'd be formed geographically by enrollment and feature eight or nine teams each.

The district schedule allows for one or two nondistrict games at the start of the season, similar to nonconference games now. Those games wouldn't count toward playoff qualification, meaning teams would be more open to playing each other without having to worry a loss affecting a potential playoff berth.

The top four teams in each district qualify for the playoffs, and the bracket is designed so no district teams face each other until the third round of the postseason at the earliest.

If the upcoming IHSA town hall meetings go well, the proposal could advance through the bylaw amendment process and land on the

2 Pro:

Naperville Central athletic director Andy Lutzenkirchen is a member of the IHSA Football Advisory Committee. He's also a member of the DuPage Valley Conference, which is in desperate need of a district system.

The DVC stands at only five schools — Metea Valley, Naperville Central, Naperville North, Nequa Valley and Waubonsie Valley — after four schools departed at the start of this school year to form the DuKane Conference. Even with rumblings that DeKalb might become the sixth member of the DVC, it remains a tough situation for the football programs.

"I've heard more positives from people about (districts) than I have negatives, compared to proposals in the past," Lutzenkirchen said. "We've got to try something. I like districting because we're a conference of five and our conference has seen the most change in the area with schools leaving, coming and leaving again. Something's got to stop with that."

Districts solve the DVC's problems. The five schools likely would land in the same district, maintaining their rivalries, and they wouldn't have to worry about

3 Against:

The new DuKane Conference has eight members. The merger announced last week between the Chicago Catholic League and the East Suburban Catholic Conference creates a group of 24. The West Suburban Conference has been a stable group of 14 schools since 1986.

At the very least, that's 46 schools likely to vote against a district proposal if it appears on a statewide ballot.

That'll be a tough bloc for the DVC and other pro-district folks to overcome.

Why is there an anti-district faction? Turns out it's not all roses.

Hinsdale South is a Class 6A school living in an 8A West Suburban Conference. In a district system the Hornets would lose many of their football rivals and possibly be placed in a group with St. Francis, DeKalb, St. Laurence ... schools with no connection whatsoever beyond a few playoff meetings.

Glenbard South, a 5A program, is in a similar situation. The Raiders no longer would play Glenbard East and most other Upstate Eight Conference schools in a district system. They'd be with Kaneland,

maybe Lemont and Montini ... who knows?

What if playing levels don't match up among the football programs in a given district? That creates massive scheduling difficulties in a system that was designed to help eliminate scheduling issues.

What about southern Illinois teams in Class 7A and 8A? Think of the massive weekly commutes in a district with them and south suburban schools.

When schools throughout the state look at what's best for their football program, I'm afraid it'll be bad news for the pro-district camp.

4 Alternatives:

Right now the alternatives are limited. If districts don't

survive the state's bylaw amendment process, it's back to the drawing board. The answer could come from future expansion of the football playoffs.

It's an option the IHSA isn't afraid to turn to ... like when the playoffs expanded from five to six classes in 1980. Or when the playoffs expanded from 16 to 32 teams in each class in 1985. Or when the playoffs expanded from six to eight classes in 2001.

In terms of precedence, the possibility of expansion is much greater than the chance of adopting a drastic new system of districts.

How does expansion help the DVC and the pro-district camp? Expansion means more playoffs teams, which obviously means an easier path to the playoffs.

Which means teams won't have to be concerned about reaching five or six wins. Which means schools won't need to switch conferences in search of those five or six wins. Which means teams

will be more willing to schedule nonconference games against power leagues like the DVC.

I'm not an advocate for playoff expansion, which inevitably leads to more early-round blowouts. But if it helps ease the conference shuffling and the scheduling of nonconference games, I can get behind it.

It's got a better chance of happening than districts.

5 Stat time:

With three additions last week, eight DuPage County schools now have clinched a playoff berth. The list includes Glenbard East, Glenbard West, IC Catholic Prep, Lisle, Montini, St. Francis, Wheaton Warrenville South and Willowbrook.

A victory this week sends Benet, Hinsdale Central, Hinsdale South, Naperville Central and Waubonsie Valley to the postseason.

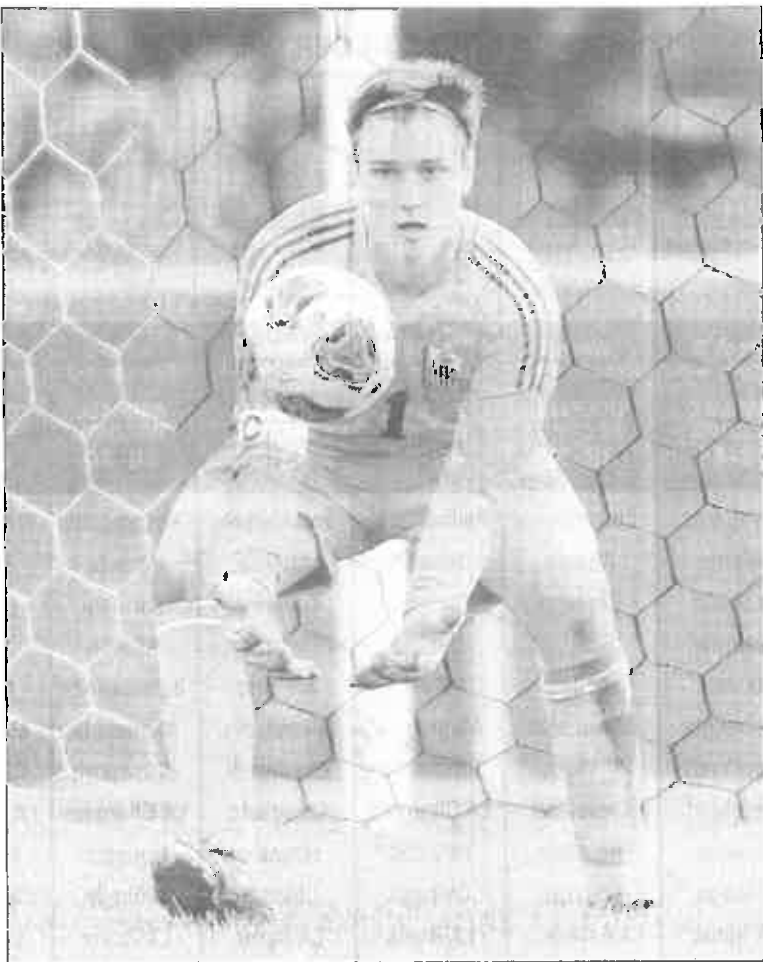
