Bret Bushka scores 3 TDs as unbeaten Glenbard East routs Glenbard South 38-7

GLEN ELLYN - Glenbard East likes to get players involved. Having 10 players on offense touch the ball Oct. 12 proved that.

Still, every great team needs a leader. That's Bret Bushka.

The senior quarterback scored three touchdowns and led five touchdown drives as the Rams rolled past District 87 rival Glenbard South 38-7 in the Upstate Eight.

"The kid is a special player. He's tough to stop," Glenbard East coach John Walters said. "He runs the offense well. ... He's the engine.'

Bushka played a key role in the Rams' first touchdown. With Glenbard East facing a third-and-13 from its 48-

yard line, Bushka eluded what looked to be a sure sack by the Raiders and completed a 37-yard pass on the run to wide receiver Deon Cook to set up Glenbard East in the red zone.

"They came with some good pressure. I got out of there, but I knew ... Deon would get open," Bushka said. "It's just being calm, knowing that everyone's doing their job and trust everyone."

Three plays later, the Rams took a 7-0 lead on a 6-yard run by Cook.

Later in the game, Bushka completed a 21-yard pass on a first-and-22 play after a Rams penalty.

Bushka scored with just over eight minutes left in the second quarter on a 20-yard run, and the Rams scored once more before halftime on a 28-yard field goal by Dominic Tenca for a 17-0 lead.

After a long kickoff return by Mashar Lewis, Jake Netchin, who ran for 83 yards on 16 carries, scored on an 8-vard run for Glenbard East.

Bushka got the Rams on the scoreboard twice more on a 1-yard run and an 8-yard pass to Jeremy Johnson to begin the fourth quarter.

"Our offensive line did a really good job today," said Bushka, who finished 9-for-17 for 116 yards and also ran for 60 yards on 11 carries. "They gave me some time [to] toss the ball to our good wide receivers [and] they gave us some running lanes for our running backs to run through."

Glenbard East's defense, whose highlights this season include a timely interception by Lewis to help beat West Aurora, an 89-yard interception return for a TD by Anthony Shockey against West Chicago, and a fumble return for a TD last week by defensive tackle Jesus Lopez III against Streamwood, lived up to its reputation by containing Glenbard South most of the night.

"All around, those guys take a lot of pride in what they do," Walters said. They're real defensive-minded kids."

A 10-yard TD pass from Nick Plaso to Cade Hardtke with just under two minutes to play were the only points the injury-plagued Raiders, who were without top receiver Tavion Keith be-

cause of an ankle injury, could muster.

Glenbard East and Glenbard South face different situations this week. The Raiders (4-4) travel to West Chicago to take on the Wildcats with a playoff berth on the line. The Rams (8-0), already guaranteed their first playoff berth since 1999, look to go undefeated with a win over Larkin.

advanced to play No. 3 seed Glenbard West in Tuesday's semifinals.

"I think we all started to come together as a team and work more with each other and less for ourselves," Hurka said. "That really helped us work more cohesively.

Despite playing without injured senior libero Peyton Ceh, the Warriors (15-21) led 8-6 following a kill from fresh-

man setter Katie Linnig. The Hornets ran off the next 4 points until senior Kaitlyn Karcz landed a kill to pull the Warriors within 10-9.

# Miller, Bison stick together

Senior setter MacKenzie Miller is the glue that holds together the Fenton girls volley-ball team. And when she's on, which she usually is, she makes the Bison a tough customer.

That's good news, considering the IHSA Class 4A play-Girls Monday.

Volleyball Coming into Fenton's firstround regional match with Leyden, Miller had 568 assists

this season. Add 18 more against the Eagles, along with 5 digs, and the result was a 25-16, 25-20 victory for the Bison (24-11), which avenged a regular-season loss. They'll face host Glenbard East in the regional

semifinal at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday. "She's been incredible," Fen-

ton coach Kelly Torres said. "She's probably going to go over 600 assists for a season, which is pretty incredible. She's irreplaceable with her speed, her dedication. She's a leader, she's a captain, she's one of those kids that works her butt off and leads by example."
But to ask Miller about per-

sonal accomplishments? Well, that's tough, because she'd rather talk about teammates like senior middle hitter Victoria Krzyszkowski, who ended up with 7 kills thanks in part to Miller's efforts.

"Our hitters strong, so it makes my job a lot easier, because they are able to finish it," said Miller, who also set up junior Julianna Krebasch and senior Agate-Kukielko for success. After a breezy 25-16 first-set win, Fenton needed Miller in a tight second set and she produced. The Bison held a slim 15-11 lead, which prompted a timeout by Leyden coach Danielle Kowalkowski.

Coming out of the play stoppage, Krzyszkowski made it 16-11 on a kill that was expertly set up by Miller.

A little while later, on a Leyden sideout, Miller did

the same thing, setting up Kukielko for a kill to put the Bison up 18-12.

Looked good for Fenton, right? Wrong. Leyden stormed back thanks to solid serving from junior Summer Moham-mad and senior Catherine Saponieri to pull the Eagles to within 23-20.

But it was too little, too late. A Krebasch kill made the score 24-20, and a Leyden return out of bounds sealed

return out of bounds sealed the victory for Fenton. "It got a little antsy, obviously, but I'm really happy we pulled through," said Krzyszkow-ski, who recently committed to Dominican University in River Forest and added 3 blocks.

In the first set Fenton junior Sydney Minard's serving took a slim 9-7 advantage and made it 16-8 in almost the

blink of an eye.

"I think the nerves got to them in the first set," said Kowalkowski, who saw her team's season end at 16-20. "They were extremely nervous, all of them. I think they kind of calmed down a little bit (in the second set), and once we got our hitters involved and some nice kills, we got the momentum on our

# Koepka's biggest feat as No. 1: Getting there

Reaching No. 1 in the world felt even sweeter to Brooks Koepka because of how he got

Golf is about winning, and the world ranking is merely result of

that. For all the math involved in a formula that tries to measure perfor-mance over two years, it's a lot easier to understand when the new

No. 1 is pos-

ing with a trophy. Dustin Johnson knows that feeling. So does Rory McIlroy.

"I always wanted to earn my way to No. 1 in the world," Koepka said after his fourshot victory at the CJ Cup in South Korea. "And I felt like if I played and won, that would be exactly how I could draw it

Justin Rose would have preferred it that way instead of reaching No. 1 last month by missing a 4-foot putt to lose in a playoff at the BMW Championship. Tiger Woods got to No. 1 for the first time with a tie for 19th in the 1997 U.S. Open. There were no fist pumps that day.

Lee Westwood and Nick Faldo did not even play the

Faldo did not even play une week they rose to No. 1.

Of the 23 players who ascended to the top of the world ranking, Koepka world ranking, Koepka became the 11th to get there for the first time by winning.

Nick Price remains the only player to reach No. 1 for the first time by winning a major, the 1994 PGA Championship at Southern Hills. Vijay Singh had one of the more gratify-ing moments in 2004 when he not only ended the five-year reign of Woods by winning the Deutsche Bank Champion-ship, he played with Woods in

the final group.

Ultimately, though, it's all about getting there.

And that's why it was such a big deal for Koepka. As much as he was trending as the best player in the world - especially after a double major season — there is no guarantee of being No. 1 until your name is at the top of the 8,712 oth-ers listed in the Official World

Golf Ranking.
This was the sixth tournament where Koepka had a chance to reach No. 1.

He was poised to get there at the start of the FedEx Cup playoffs until Johnson birdied his last four holes for a 61 to stay No. 1 by a slim mar-gin. The next week, John-son closed with a 64 to fin-ish one shot ahead of Koepka. And the following week, Rose went from No. 4 to No. 1 with his playoff loss in the BMW Championship. Koepka shot 78 in the

second round at East Lake to squander another

opportunity. He tied for seventh at the Dunhill Links

Championship.

And then, finally, he won the CJ Cup with a bird-ie-par-eagle finish for a 29 on the back nine.

Inevitable? There was another multiple major champion who would

say otherwise.

Because while golf celebrates a new No. 1 — the fourth this year, matching the most in a single year since 1997 — Koepka becoming the 23rd player at No. 1 is another reminder that the list does not include Phil Mickelson.

Lefty looked to be a lock to reach No. 1 in 2010, when Woods was recovering from the downfall in his personal life and the gap was shrinking

Mickelson won the Masters to get back to No. 2. He was runner-up at Quail Hollow. The Players Championship was the first time in his career that he had a mathematical chance to be No. 1.

Needing a victory, he bogeyed three of his opening six holes, closed with a 74 and tied for 17th. Then it was off to Colonial, where he had won two years earlier. He missed the cut. At the Memorial, he

tied for fifth.
"I don't know the ranking system or world points or how that works, nor do I care," Mickelson said that year. "I just know that if I continue to play well, ultimately in the long run, it will happen

But it never did.

He had nine more chances that year and except for a tie for fourth at the U.S. Open, never came particularly close. And when he showed up in Shanghai, golf finally had a new No. 1 — Westwood, which had to sting even more.

Westwood never won a major. He just played some of major. rie jusi piayeu some or his best golf at the right time, which was the time Woods went on hiatus. Mickelson played some of his best golf when Woods was at his peak, which is why Lefty might for-ever hold the distinction of being No. 2 longer than any player who has never been

That's one problem Koepka

won't have.
Instead, he joins Johnson,
Rose and Justin Thomas as players to occupy No. 1 this year. The last time that happened was in 1997 with Greg Norman, Ernie Els, Tom Lehman and Woods.

Lehman lasted only one week. He reached the top ranking with a tie for fourth at Hilton Head and never was introduced as the No. 1 player in the world. Lehman took a month off and when he returned at Colonial, he was back to No. 2.

But at least he was there.

Mickelson wouldn't trade his five majors or 46 worldwide victories for the No. 1 ranking. His legacy is secure without it. But he probably would have taken No. 1 even



Miller was leading the team in aces with 91, while Krzyszkowski was at 192 kills through late last week. Miller had 530 assists, while Krzyszkowski had 46 blocks and Agata Kukielko had 125 digs to lead the team.

"Our top players have really stepped up and have been performing at a high level," said Kleidorfer. "Mackenzie Miller has been averaging about 20 assists per match in recent weeks, while Agata has taken her game to a higher level as well. Her defense has been outstanding and then her attack has been unstoppable. Finally, Vicky has been the best player on the court in most matches. She has a variety of ways to get kills. She is really using her court awareness to put it where the defense isn't."

Kleidorfer liked how her team played in the loss to Aurora Christian. "Our passing was excellent against Aurora Christian," she said. "That match was the top two teams in the conference and it probably was the best-played match in our gym in quite some time. Both teams were outstanding and it was the best we passed in a long time. Passing is what we have improved on the most in recent times. We are really passing at a high level right now."

Fenton still is working on its service game. "Right now we have to improve our serving," said Kleidorfer. "Serving was a strength at the beginning of the season but has really haunted us in some of our big matches. We aren't getting the number of aces we got earlier in the season and our errors have increased."

Fenton played Wheaton Academy earlier this week to close out MSC Red play.

"We need to finish conference with a strong showing against Wheaton Academy, have fun and play well while honoring our seniors against Thomton-Fractional North," said Kleidorfer late last week. "And then we turn our focus to Leyden and the opening regional match. We are too good to not have some success in the state tourney."
