

County health department and sheriff's office receive federal grant

Funds to support countywide behavioral health partnership

Justice two-year grant of \$471,000 to support the Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program (JM-HCP).

HCP).
The JMHCP will serve 700 individuals through the work of the DuPage County Behavioral Health Collaborative (BHC), which is cochaired by DCHD and DCSO. The BHC will divert individuals with mental illness or co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse from the criminal justice system, and provide re-entry supports for incarcerated in-

dividuals to reduce re-offending.

"This funding will allow the Behavioral Health Collaborative to move forward with countywide partnerships that will offer residents a sustainable community resource tools to bridge issues between mental health, substance use and criminal justice systems," said Karen Ayala, Health Department Executive Direc-

DuPage County Jail statistics from 2017 show 1,048 inmates self-reported having mental health issues,


The DuPage County Health Dcpartment (DCHD) and DuPage County Sheriff's Office (DCSO) have received a U.S. Department of Justice two-year grant of \$471,000 on medication to treat psychiatric. conditions, and the average stay for inmates with mental health issues (90 days) was more than triple the stay (28 days) for those in general

population.
"This is another great example of the benefits of the continued partnership between the Sheriff's Office and the Health Department," said Sheriff John Zaruba. "The Sheriff's Office is dedicated to serving all citizens of DuPage County and we need to continue to be creative in how we assist those suffering from mental health and substance use issues.

"The implementation of diversionary programs and services for these segments of the population are essential in fostering continued treatment for those in need, and I'm dedicated to the advancement of these

types of partnerships and programs."

The BHC will continue its work on two of DuPage County's highest priorities, a 24/7 central receiving center for mental illness, substance use and post-incarceration support.

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

Presenting the candidates their private employment.' for DuPage County Board in District #1

The League of Women Voters posed five questions to the candidates for County Board in Districts #1 and #2. The Independent presents the replies to three of those questions. Some replies have been edited for length.

Q-1. According to Forbes Magazine (7/25/17 issue), DuPage County had more than 200 employees earning in excess of \$100,000 annually. One top staffer reportedly makes an annual salary of \$201,750. Do you have a plan to reduce personnel costs

Ashley Selmon (D) replied:

"I support a 10-year salary freeze for County Board members - DuPage County Board members are the highest compensated in the state for part time work. A pay freeze would allow for these positions to contin-ue being paid, which is important to ensuring that anyone can serve regardless of personal finances, while allowing the excessive salaries to normalize over time.

"I support eliminating health care benefits for part-time elected officials. Many board members [hold] jobs, or own their own companies Taxpayers should not pay for health care for officials, who have other alternative ways to obtain care through

Zahra Suratweala (D) replied:

"DuPage County Board members are paid almost twice the salary of other Counties and just voted to give themselves a raise -- we need to institute a 10-year salary freeze.

"We need to stop providing benefits to Board members without a demonstrated need. If they have careers or businesses from which they already derive benefits, this is a aste of taxpayer money.

"DuPage County outsources its lobbying to outside firms at a cost of \$282,000 in 2018 alone, which should be reduced or discontinued. Other counties spend zero on lobbying because they do it themselves.

'Several DuPage officials receive car allowance of \$450 per month, which needs to stop immediately.'

Sam Tornatore (R) replied:

"County personnel costs are market driven. A substantial number of the jobs indicated are public safety jobs and professionals, such as engineers, IT specialists, etc. I have always subscribed to the belief that we should hire the best and brightest to protect and serve the County taxpayer. Additionally, many of the employees earning these salaries are union employees wherein the County is bound by collective bargaining agreements.

The highest paid salary is our County Administrator, whose salary is less than similar posts in adjacent

counties and certainly less than some Village administrators and school district administrators.

Dino Gavanes (R) did not reply to the League of Women Voters ques-

Q-2. County activities are often opaque to the average citizen and most do not even know what district they are in. What is your vision for better communication to show more accountability and transparency to your constituents?

Ashley Selmon (D) replied:

"Transparency in board practices and decision making and access to local officials are currently lacking. Meetings are held during the work-day on Tuesdays, when many District 1 residents cannot attend. Decisions about spending taxpayer funds are made with little public oversight, with little explanation offered. I will fight for easily accessible publication of recordings of committee meetings and adjusted meeting schedules so more can attend.

"Furthermore, I will solicit the advice of residents and explain my votes. I admire the example of Liz Chaplin, who often posts topics and helpful information on her website. I will attend community events and will meet with constituents year round, not just during election years.

Zahra Suratweala (D) replied:

'DuPage residents need direct ac-

cess to their elected officials. From the middle-of-the-workday timing of the meetings (10 a.m. on Tuesdays) to the way decisions are made with little input from residents, the system is currently exclusive, rather than inclusive.

"I plan to follow Liz Chaplin's example of posting an account of every Board meeting on my website, so that residents can learn what goes on in meetings and what decisions are being made. My constituents will know how to reach me and will be confident of receiving a reply. Events will be attended year round, not only during an election cycle. I am easily reached online and reply back in a timely fashion.'

Sam Tornatore (R) replied:

"The fact that members of the general public do not know their CB District may be an indication that we are doing our job. People in general only come out when they have a complaint or to speak on a sensitive issue. The County Board meetings are open to the public, steamed live and always provide for public comment. I also spend many evenings and hours with seniors, Rotary clubs. Chambers of Commerce and attend Board meetings of the seven Villages and Cities in my district. I will continue to be available to the residents in my District."

Q-3. As part of the strategic plan the county must foster the continued growth of its economy. Ensure DuPage County residents have competitive job skills. Foster economic growth and development. Champion DuPage County as a desirable place in which to live and work. What are your suggestions for fulfilling this

Ashley Selmon (D) replied:

"Working with towns to draw green jobs and tech-friendly industries, like data storage facilities, will grow our tax base while expanding job opportunities. In District 1, development related to the O'Hare expansion can be a significant source of

revenue; the County Board must be a leader in this project to ensure that economic benefits are felt in DuPage County, not just Cook. To support local businesses, the Board should end no-bid contracts and open up the contract bid process. Bringing new businesses to DuPage and encouraging growth of businesses should remain a top priority.'

Zahra Suratweala (D) replied:

"Economic growth can be accomplished through green jobs, especially solar energy. Most consumers would like to reduce their carbon footprint, and the County can present options, encourage businesses to bring green solutions to the consumer, and generate jobs in the process.

We need to end no-bid contracts for County projects to stimulate and encourage companies to bid so they have a chance to thrive. Infrastructure projects can provide jobs as well as promote safety, convenience, and

interconnectedness.

"DuPage County is already a desirable place to live and to work, but with some new leadership and fresh perspective, we can reach our unmet potential.'

Sam Tornatore (R) replied:

"The County has developed work net DuPage and the DuPage initiative, whereby start-up companies and new entrepreneurs can learn business skills from seasoned professionals, through business incubators and with an agreement with College of DuP-

age.
"Our cooperation with the business community and Choose DuPage has resulted in more new growth, the lowest unemployment rate in the state and a AAA Bond rating, causing lower interest rates on bonds.

All of this, with a balanced budget and flat tax levy for the past ten ears, continues to make DuPage County a great place for business.

Westmont man charged with aggravated DUI in deadly crash

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert B. Berlin and Downers Grove Chief of Police Shanon Gillette announced last week that bond had been set for a Westmont man charged with crashing his car into a tree, killing his passenger, Annajeanne Dew-Onecimo Vazquez-Valazquez, 30, of 318 W. Naperville Road, appeared at a bond hearing where Judge Liam Brennan set bond at \$500,000 with 10% to apply.

He has been charged with one count of Aggravated DUI Causing Death (Class 2 Felony), one count of Reckless Homicide (Class 3 Felony) and one count of Attempt to Leave the Scene of an Accident Involving Death (Class 2 Felony.)

It is alleged that on October 7, 2018, at approximately 1 a.m., been tragically lost to an alleged Vazquez-Valazquez was traveling at drunk driver," Berlin said. "Why

a high rate of speed northbound on Fairview Avenue near the intersection of 55th Street in Downers Grove. It is alleged that Vazquez-Valazquez attempted to pass a car by entering the center turn lane, lost control of his vehicle and crashed into a tree, splitting the vehicle in half and killing Dewey. It is further alleged that following the crash, Vazquez-Valazquez left the scene but returned a short time later. It is further alleged that when interviewed by officers, there was a strong odor of alcohol on Vazquez-Valazquez's breath and that he had glassy and bloodshot eyes. Vazquez-Valazquez's BAC was allegedly .077 approximately one and a half hours after the crash.

"Once again, an innocent life has

is beyond me. Not only is drinking and driving dangerous, reckless and selfish, it too often turns fatal, as is alleged in this case. Every year, thousands of lives could be saved if people would simply call a cab or a friend for a ride home if they have been drinking instead of thinking they are fine to drive. I offer my sincerest condolences to Annajeanne's family and friends as they are now sentenced to their lives without Annaieanne.'

Vazquez-Valazquez's next court appearance is scheduled for Nov. 2018 for arraignment in front of Judge Brennan

Delapaz scores key goals in both postseason wins

The Addison Trail boys soccer team's goal of postseason success hit its first check point.

The Blazers defeated York 3-1 to win the Class 3A Hoffman Estates regional title. It's Addison Trail's second regional crown in three years.

Addison Trail moved to 17-5 overall and has won 14 of its last 15 games.

The Blazers opened play in its own Class 3A Addison Trail section-

al against Benet Academy earlier this Hoffman Estates. De La Paz had the week. If Addison Trail won that game it will play for the sectional title Fri-day at 6 p.m. against either Lake Park or St. Charles East.

Addison Trail is the No. 6 sectional seed in its own sectional. Benet is the No. 7 seed. Lake Park is the No. 1 seed and St. Charles East is the No. 5 seed

In the 3-1 win against York, Alexis Delapaz scored a goal off an assist from sophomore Anthony Hernandez. Eduardo Gomez scored a goal off a failed clear and Melvin Mora tallied a goal off a free kick from about 40 yards out.

Addison Trail reached the regional final after a 1-0 win against host game's only goal at the 11-minute mark of the contest.

"We were able to hold on," said Addison Trail coach Ryan Dini. "We had to sit one of our better players who was injured in that game. Hoffman Estates played us tough. They played everybody in the back and had one guy up top. They wanted to try and keep it a low-scoring game.'

In the regional final, York led 1-0 in the first 10 minutes of the game. 'We had a mistake in the back,' Dini. "After that we picked it up. The resiliency of this group showed after York scored that goal. We played our best soccer of the year. We were possessing the ball and winning the 5050 balls. This is why we've won 14 of our last 15 games. These guys are all-in. They play well and they expect to win.'

Dini also cited strong play from Martin Murillo on defense. "He's a junior who plays left back for us," the coach explained. "We can create offense with him. He's really good at sending long balls up to the forwards and switching fields. He can fill in for Eduardo Huerta our sweeper when he pushes up. Martin has been excellent. He's a midfielder who we moved to defense. He has midfield skills as a defender and we're able to use them in a lot of different ways."

Dini again lauded the contributions goalie Sam Sandoval. "He's so consistent," the coach said. "He's allowed an average of one goal a game. He's played every minute this season except 20 minutes and has played against a lot of top teams. It's good to have someone back there with that type of consistency."

Dini said his squad is looking forward to playing in the sectional at

"It's going to be a good game against a good team especially at this time of year," he said. "We've won regionals now two of the last three years. The program is changing. It's really come full circle. We haven't won a sectional in forever and haven't hosted one in a long time. It's something we are very excited about.'

Where: Willowbrook High School, Villa Park Seeds: Lincoln Park is the No. 28 seed in the 32-team Class 7A bracket. Willowbrook is the No. 5 seed.

Outlook: The Warriors are in the state playoffs for a third year in a row after a pair of quarterfinal appearances. Back in 7A, the Warriors are one of five undefeated teams in the bracket along with No. 1 Chicago Simeon, No. 2 Glenbard East, No. 3 Rockton Hononegah, No. 4 Batavia and No. 6 Rolling Meadows. Simeon's opponents had a 43-38 record. Glenbard East, Hononegah and Batavia each had opponent combined records of 36-45, while Willowbrook was at 33-48 and Rolling Meadows was at 31-50. Willowbrook played against two playoff teams, while Batavia and Hononegah led the way among the 9-0 Class 7A teams with four games against playoff-bound foes. Chicago Lincoln Park only averages 14.4 points a game while giving up 17.1 points. Lincoln Park plays in the same CPS Illini Land of Lincoln conference that IC Catholic Prep first-round opponent Chicago Raby does. Lincoln Park has one win against a team with a winning record (against Chicago Raby) and has scored 12 or fewer points in six of its nine games.

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

The Crusaders finished the regular season undefeated at 9-0, 4-0.

Brother Rice limited Broncos' se nior running back Nick Fedanzo to 22 yards. Junior quarterback Deontay Bell ran for 82 yards.





The Rams traveled a few miles south on Friday night to resume their rivalry with Glenbard South—the two teams' first meeting on the grid-iron since 2016 when the Raiders edged the Rams, 28-25.


ed three blocks.




