

Villa Park police releases Thanksgiving enforcement numbers

The Villa Park Police Department conducted additional traffic enforcement Nov. 16-26, reminding motorists to buckle up and not drive impaired, day or night, as part of the nationwide Click It or Ticket/Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over enforcement effort.

The Police Department joined other state and local law enforcement agencies across Illinois to reduce highway deaths by issuing citations to unbuckled motorists and

arresting impaired drivers. During the 10-day mobilization, Villa Park police issued:

- 13 seat belt citations
- 1 suspended/revoked licenses 1 uninsured motorists



Second-half surge lifts Warriors to victory over Addison Trail

Masys scores all 22 of his points in the second half

The Willowbrook boys basketball team opened its West Suburban Gold rence season with last Friday's 72-60 victory at District 88 rival Addison Trail.

The visiting Warriors, who handed the Blazers their first loss of the season, improved their overall record to 4-1.

Willowbrook trailed the Blazers (who dropped to 5-1 overall) 38-32 at halftime, but rallied to tie the game late in the third quarter. Senior Matas Masys of the Warriors sank a wild 3-point shot at the third-quarter buzzer to give Willowbrook a 49-46 lead with eight minutes to play.

Masys, who did not score in the first half, provided five points in the third quarter. He piled on 17 points in the fourth quarter to finish the night with a team-leading 22 points. Masys made a pair of 3-point shots and sank nine of 12 free-throw attempts during the

"It was a great environment," said Warriors head coach Chris Perkins after the game, which was played in front of raucous student sections from both schools, as well as an NBC Sports Chicago crew covering the contest as its high school game of the week, "We had great attendance from both sides. It was a great atmosphere for the first conference game. This is what high school basketball is all about."

Every time Masys touched the ball during the contest, the Addison Trail student section shouted, "Overrated." Those taunts didn't seem to bother Masys, a four-year varsity player. In addition to finishing with 22 points, Masys handed out eight assists.

Near the end of the game, after Masys delivered his offensive burst, it was the Willowbrook students who were shouting out "Overrated,"






Welge: What's the biggest challenge of going from playing eighth-graders to high school?
