

DuPage County consolidates Election Commission into County Clerk's Office

The DuPage County Board voted on Jan. 15 to officially dissolve the DuPage Election Commission into the County Clerk's Office, completing a multi-year process to consolidate the sixth unit of government under the County's ACT Initiative. The action comes as a result of the enactment of Public Act 100-0628, which was passed by the General Assembly in May 2018 and signed by Gov. Bruce Rauner

"Today marks the conclusion of our efforts to bring greater oversight to the Election Commission and the election process by folding its operations into the County Clerk's Office," said County Board Chairman Dan Cronin. "The Election Commission staff performed admirably during the latest election, and we have faith the transition to the Clerk will be a smooth process."

DuPage County began soliciting public input on the proposed consolidation of the DuPage Election Commission in 2017. In March 2018, a majority of DuPage County voters said they were in favor of consolidating the Election Commission into the Clerk's Office.

Through this merger, DuPage County taxpayers can expect the County to save at least \$300,000 annually. The County Board approved the consolidation by a vote of 11-7.

District 88 Board submits resolution in support of statewide access to property tax relief grants





Everett Stubblefield III didn't particularly like the gym in Sterling.

Stubblefield, Willowbrook's junior guard, put on quite a show Jan. 21 at the Sterling MLK Classic.

Stubblefield scored a varsity career-high 42 points, rallying the Warriors to an 87-85 overtime win over Oswego East. Willowbrook later lost to Maine South, 72-58, despite Stubblefield's 24 points.

Against Oswego East, Stubblefield shot a sizzling 14-for-20, including 8-for-12 from 3-point range, in rallying Willowbrook from down eight after three quarters.

In one dazzling nine-second sequence late in regulation, Stubblefield hit two free throws, forced a turnover in the Oswego East backcourt, and hit a 3-pointer. His two free throws in overtime clinched it.

"It was a good game. We played pretty well," said Stubblefield, who scored 42 points in a sophomore game last year before a promotion to varsity. "We made a run to come back and tie the game and pulled it out."

Stubblefield, still uncommitted, made the most of an opportunity to go head-to-head with Oswego East senior Ray J Dennis, a Boise State recruit. Dennis, one of the rising stars of Illinois' senior class, scored 34 points.

Stubblefield's 42 points are the third-most in the five-year history of the event. Former Willowbrook star Alonzo Verge Jr. has the record of 45, set in 2015.

"It was a good experience," Stubblefield said. "I always hear [Dennis']

name and how good he's been doing. We played them over the summer, but I had got injured that game and hadn't had a chance to play a full game against him."

Willowbrook was less than full strength at Sterling. Senior guard Matas Masys missed both games with what Stubblefield said is an LCL injury.

"It didn't change my role that much. I just ran the point a little more," Stubblefield said. "I still took the shots I normally do. The game was just flowing."

Willowbrook has a busy weekend ahead, hosting District 88 rival Addison Trail on Jan. 25, then playing Batavia on Jan. 26 in the nightcap of the Batavia "Night of Hoops."

"I still feel like we have more room to grow to become a better team," Stubblefield said. "I feel like if we play like we did against Oswego East, we can beat anybody."

District 88 Board supports access to property tax relief grants

As District 88 has previously shared, Illinois recently implemented a school funding law that looks to achieve adequacy and equity in education funding throughout the state.

That Evidence Based Funding law also provides money for a Property Tax Relief Grant. The intent of that program is to assist communities in Illinois that are experiencing a significant local property tax burden due to limited local property wealth. It's an opportunity to lower the property tax burden on local taxpayers, with the state replacing a portion of foregone tax revenue with state funds.

District 88 has applied for this grant on behalf of the property taxpayers of the district and Illinois. However, the district is concerned there isn't sufficient funding allocated to fully and effectively implement this program to support all eligible communities. During its Jan. 14 meeting, the District 88 Board of Education approved submitting a resolution to address concerns regarding the underfunding by the state for property tax relief. That resolution was sent to State Senators Ton Culierton and Don Harmon; State Representatives Deb Conroy, Deanne Mazzochi, Terra Costa Howard and Kathleen Willis; Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker; State Superintendent Dr. Tony Smith; and Peg Agnos, Executive Director of Legislative Education Network of DuPage (LEND).



BATAVIA - Scotty Tumilty admits some of his teammates likely took Willowbrook's loss to Batavia in the Class 7A state football quarterfinals personally.
