In addition to attending every girls home match, McArdle rides his bike to some of the team's road matches to cheer for the Warriors.

McArdle has received numerous awards, including Willowbrook's Distinguished Alumni recognition.

Pedestrian struck, killed by freight train near Ardmore. Union Pacific railroad tracks

On Monday, Villa Park Police and Fire Departments responded to the area of Ardmore and the Union Pacific Railroad tracks for the report of a pedestrian who was struck by a westbound Union Pacific freight train at around 3:59 a.m.

A 38-year-old man was fatally struck by the freight train, according to police. The Villa Park Police Department, along with the DuPage County Coroner's Office, are conducting a death investigation.

Identification of the deceased is being withheld pending notification to the next of kin

Additional details regarding the incident were not available as of press time.



Rams earn trip to state gymnastics meet

Program's first state-meet berth as a team; will compete against 7 other schools

Glenbard East's girls gymnas-tics team earned the program's first team berth in the IHSA state meet with its strong performance at last week's Wheaton Warrenville South Sectional. The Rams earned a total team score of 145 at the competitive Feb. 4 sectional, placing third behind winner Glenbard West (147.9)

and runner-up DeKalb (146).

The state's four sectional champions earned automatic berths to the proise cannot automatic bettis to the next four highest-scoring sectional teams earned at-large berths into the state meet. Two of the at-large teams (DeKalb and Glenbard East) competed at the Wheaton Warren-ville South Sectional. The other two at-large qualifying teams (New Tri-er and Glenbrook South) came from the Stevenson Sectional.

"We are very excited to make it to the state meet as a team," said Glen-bard East coach Jessica Bugajsky, whose team won an IHSA regional title in its own gym on Jan. 31. "The sectional went very well—only mi-nor mistakes."

The Rams will tangle with seven other teams, including defending state champion Glenbard West, in the team competition of this year's state meet, which takes place Friday and Saturday at Palatine High School.

The top five scorers in each sectional event earned individual berths to the state meet. Additionally, the 12 best scorers in each event from among all sectional competitors advanced to the state meet as at-large

qualifiers.
Glenbard East sophomore Kali Kartheiser earned automatic in-dividual state-meet berths in two events-the uneven bars and floor exercises. She also earned an automatic state-meet berth in the allaround competition by placing fifth in the sectional's all-around scoring

with her total of 36.65.

Kartheiser placed fourth in the sectional's uneven bars event with her score of 9.325. She earned a fifth-place finish in floor exercises where her routine received a score

Senior Sierra Olson and junior Kelsey Donovan both earned automatic state-meet berths for the Rams in the vault. Olson placed fourth in the sectional's vault event with her score of 9.5. Donovan tied for fifth in the vault with a 9.45.


Donovan and Glenbard East ophomore Becca Honig will join Kartheiser in the state meet's allaround competition. Honig and Donovan both earned at-large spots in the state all-around contest with their performance's at the sectional. Honig posted an eighth-place total of 36.075, while Donovan earned a ninth-place score of 36.05.

Donovan's younger sister— freshman Erin Donovan—placed 13th in the sectional's all-around standings. She didn't advance to the state meet's individual all-around competition, but she did earn an in-dividual berth in the uneven bars. She placed eighth in that event at the sectional with her score of 9.075.

In addition to securing an at-large berth in the state meet's all-around contest, Honig earned individual state-meet spots in the vault, bal-ance beam and floor exercises. Honig tied for seventh in the vault (9.425) at the sectional. She tied for ninth place in both the balance beam ninth place in both the balance beam (9.075) and floor exercises (8.925).

Two Willowbrook gymnasts—junior Karli Wilson and freshman Tess Placek—competed in the Wheaton Warrenville South Sectional. Wilson placed 28th in the all-around scoring with her total of 30.75. Placek wound up 31th with her score of 29.875. (See photos in the sports section.)



Strong finish lifts Warriors to sectional title, trip to state meet

Willowbrook, Glenbard East secure trips to this week's state meet in Rockford

team earned a berth in the IHSA state meet by winning an IHSA sectional title last Saturday.

The Warriors outscored 11 other teams at the Hinsdale South Sectional, which took place at Suburbanite Bowl in Westmont. Willowbrook delivered a strong showing in the sixth and final game of the day, posting a combined score of 992 to jump from third place to first in the total team standings.

Willowbrook finished the with a total sectional score of 5,702. Downers Grove South placed second with its score of 5,667—two pins ahead of third-place York (5,665). Glenbard East, which held the overall lead through five games, finished with a fourth-place total of 5,649which earned a spot in the upcoming

The top four teams at each of the state's six sectionals advanced to the IHSA state meet, which takes place

One week before winning the sectional title, Willowbrook won an IHSA regional title. The Warriors have now won regional and sectional titles in each of the last two seasons. Willowbrook captured this season's West Suburban Conference title by going 8-0 an conference dual meets

"Our girls were really fighting through the whole day," said Willowbrook coach Kevin Allen moments after the Warriors accepted the sectional plaque. "The last game is usually when they give it everything they've got. They always seem to come through in that last game. We were sitting in third place after five games. I told the girls not to worry about the other teams, but to have a really good game for ourselves and earn our spot to state. They came out and had a wonderful last game-a 992. They were awesome."

The Warriors gained 135 pins on

the sectional. Glenbard East held a 71-pin lead over York through five games. The Rams posted a total score of 857 in their sixth game. It was their lowest-scoring game of the sectional. They opened the day with scores of 923, 941 and 982. They rolled a 914 in their fourth game before erupting for a team score of 1,032 in their fifth

Glenbard East junior Molly Gal-vin won the individual title at the sectional. She posted a six-game score of 1,354—an average of just over 225 per game. Galvin fired scores of 225, 202 and 279 in the first three games of the sectional. She was nearly flawless during her 279 in the third game, when she connected for 11 strikes in 12 frames.

She knocked down nine pins and made the spare in her fourth frame of the game. Galvin posted afternoon scores of 201, 245 and 202 at the sectional. She finished her sixth and fi-nal game of the day with five straight strikes to hold off senior Kaia Gray of Kenwood in the battle for the individual title. Gray finished 20 pins behind Galvin with her six-game to-

Senior Paula Williams led Wil-lowbrook to the sectional title with her six-game total of 1,254, which was good for seventh place in the event's individual standings. Williams opened the sectional with a 170 in her first game. She closed out the morning session with games of 201 and 204. She rolled a 200 in her fourth game. Williams then fired a career-best 227 in her fifth game of the day. That career high didn't last long; Williams exploded for a new career high by firing a 252 in the

Senior Holly Helsper of the Warriors placed ninth among all individ-uals with a six-game sectional total of 1,203. She rolled her best game of the day—a 225—in the fifth game. Senior Katie Pettinger of Willowbrook finished 12th in the individual standings with her score of 1,169. Pettinger turned in her best game of the day—a 229—in the fourth game.
Junior Makaylah Jones provided

the Warriors with a six-game total of 1,076. Senior Brianna Bryant con-

tributed a six-game score of 1,000. Glenbard East senior Kennedy Sawyer finished 19th in the individual standings with a six-game score of 1,120. Sawyer bowled nine strikes on her way to a 253 in her fifth game. Sophomore Heather Cox of the

Rams fired a six-game total of 1.077. which included a 219 in her third game. Junior Kirsten Kadow contributed a six-game score of 1,062 that included a 245 in her second game. Kadow finished that game with nine straight strikes. Kassidy Wells of Glenbard East rolled a six-game total of 1,036, which included a 199 in her

Glenbard East's Reese Martin and Alex Posada earned berths in the IHSA Class 3A individual state wrestling meet with their performances in the Conant Sectional

Martin and Posada both ad-vanced to the sectional championship matches in their respective weight divisions. Martin lost a 6-4 decision to DeKalb's Danny Curran in the 120-pound division's title match. Posada lost a 5-2 decision to DeKalb's Bradley Gillum in the

145-pound final.

Martin, a junior, will enter this week's state meet in Champaign with a 37-5 season record. Posada senior, heads to the state meet with a 35-4 record. Both Rams competed in the state meet last season. Neither Glenbard East wrestler earned a vic-

tory in Champaign.

The top four finishers in each sectional weight division advanced to the state meet, which will take place at the State Farm Center on the campus of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.





"We came out kind of weak," Krissinger said. "Sometimes against zone, we need to get into it a little bit. moving the ball around.

"We might make foolish passes at the beginning of the game, but we sort of got into the rhythm of things, moving the ball. It really helped a lot when we got the ball moving because that's



Bartlett ousts defending state champs

Bartlett threw the first punch, deflected a counter blow from Geneva, and left the Class 4A Batavia sectional semifinal with a 60-52 victory Monday night, meaning there will be a new state champion after the Vikings had won the last two.

As they have all year, a sophomore, Lexie Sinclair, and a freshman, Mackenzie Hare, led the way for the Hawks. Sinclair scored the first 6 points leading to a Geneva timeout just 90 sec-

onds into the game. She finished with a gamehigh 26 points. Hare added 15 points and three 3-pointers, and Bartlett never trailed in front of a nearly packed Bata-

via gvm. "We had a lot of energy coming out," Sinclair said. "Coach (Brad) Hunt has told me I have to be a leader on the team. And if I make my first couple shots, my teammates do a really good job finding

No. 3 seed Bartlett (29-A) will play for the sectional championship at 7 p.m. Thursday against fourth seed Wheaton Warrenville South (22-8), a 39-28 winner over Lake Park in the first semifinal Monday.

Savannah Standefer chipped in 7 points off the bench and Dani Hedeen's 6 points included a key baseline jumper in the fourth quarter with Geneva (20-12) trying to

come back.
"We all kept our composure and know how to execute at the right times," Standefer said. "This whole night was just great energy.

After Sinclair's 6 quick points to start the game, Hare knocked down back-to-back 3s for a 12-3 lead.

Geneva turned the ball over on its first four possessions for a similar slow start to its regional title win Thursday over Glenbard West. Bartlett led 16-10 after one quarter.

"We started off slow and in a sectional semi you can't do that," Vikings coach Sarah Meadows said. "You can't do that against good teams."

Standefer opened the second quarter with a 3-pointer after the Hawks kept the possession alive by hustling for two long rebounds. Sinclair capped the half with a floater in the lane to go to halftime up 28-20.

Geneva appeared to take the momentum back when Katie Montgomery, who had to be helped off the court late in the second quarter after a hard fall, returned and scored the first four points of the half to pull her team within 28-24.

Geneva had a chance to pull closer but missed two free throws and a couple shots under the basket. While Lindsay Blackmore sank all 10 of her free throws, the rest of the Vikings hit just 9 of 21.

Sinclair stopped the Geneva run with a 3-pointer, Hare drove from one end to the other for a three-point play, and Sinclair's spin move helped the Hawks weather Geneva's rally and lead 41-34 after three quarters.

"We tried to come back in the third quarter," Meadows said. "They held us off. They hit shots when they needed shots."

The Vikings got as close as 41-36 in the fourth before
