Man dies from injuries suffered in workplace incident in Villa Park

A 59-year-old man who worked for the DuPage County Water Commission died several days after being injured in a workplace incident in Villa Park

According to a news release issued by the Villa Park Police Department, the village's police and fire departments responded to a traumatic injury on the 200 block of E. Roosevelt Road at 12:09 p.m. on Feb. 8. The injured man was reportedly struck on the head by a portable directional board. Villa Park paramedics transported the injured man to Elmhurst Hospital. According to the police department, the man died on Feb. 16.

The Occupational Health and Safety Administration (OSHA) was notified and responded to the scene because it was a workplace incident. The death is under investigation by the Villa Park Police Department and the Cook County Medical Examiner's Office.



Broncos claim 3 individual titles in Champaign

Stiles, Christensen both repeat as state champions

Three Montini wrestlers won state championships at the IHSA Class 3A individual state meet, which concluded last Saturday at State Farm

Center in Champaign.

Junior Dylan Ragusin won the 126-pound title.

Senior Jake Stiles captured the 152-pound champaign. pionship, while senior Peter Christensen claimed first-place honors in the 195-pound weight class.

Stiles and Christensen both turned in repeat performances in Champaign. The also won individual state titles last year.

Ragusin won his state title on Saturday with a 4-2, double-overtime victory in the championship match. He moved his season record to 43-6

with the victory.
Stiles won the 152-pound title match by a 7-3 decision. He raised his season record to a perfect 47-0 with that victory. Christensen earned a 3-1 win in his title match to move his record to 47-2

Five other Broncos secured top-four finishes at the individual state meet, Sophomore Nick Gonzalez (106) and junior Fidel Mayora (145)

earned second-place finishes in their respective divisions. Junior Trevor Swier placed third in the 182-pound level. Sophomore Nain Vasquez (120) and senior Dylan Burnoski (132) both posted fourth-place finishes.

The Broncos are in the hunt for their second straight Class 3A dual-team title. The state dual meet champion will be decided this Saturday in Bloomingto





Warriors, Rams finish bowling season at state meet Helsper places 27th in the individual standings

Glenbard East junior Molly Galvin and Willowbrook senior Holly Helsper both ad-vanced to the individual finals at the IHSA state bowling meet, which took place last Friday and Saturday at The Cherry Bowl in

Glenbard East and Willowbrook both advanced to the team competition of the state meet, which included 24 teams. The top 12 teams from Friday's play advanced to Saturday's finals. Neither the Warriors nor the Rams advanced to the team finals. Willow-brook stood in 17th place at the end of Friday's play, while Glenbard East finished in 20th place.

Galvin led the Rams during Friday's play, bowling a six-game total of 1,161. Galvin's two best games on Friday were a 221 in her second game and a 215 in her fourth game. Helsper turned in Willowbrook's best

Helsper turned in Willowbrook's best six-game total on Friday, rolling an overall score of 1,134. She opened the day with two straight games of 207. Her high game of the day was a 225 in her fourth game.

Helsper stood in 53rd place among individuals at the end of Friday's play. She wound up in 77th place at the end of Saturday's six games with her two-day total of 2,385. Helsper bowled games of 195, 191 and 180 to begin Saturday's play. She consistently improved in her final three games of her Willowbrook career by finishing the meet her Willowbrook career by finishing the meet with games of 203, 224 and 258.

Galvin wound up in a tie for 54th place at the end of Saturday's play with her two-day score of 2,285—exactly 100 pins behind Helsper. She started Saturday with a 182, followed by games of 199 and 191. She bowled scores of 171 and 163 in her fourth and fifth games of the day before finishing the meet

Willowbrook and Glenbard East both advanced to the state meet with their perfor-mances at the Hinsdale South Sectional on Feb. 9. Willowbrook won the sectional title, while Glenbard East earned a fourth-place finish.

Last week's action included Willowbrook's final two games of the West Suburban Gold Conference season—home contests against Proviso East and Leyden. Willowbrook de-feated Proviso East 79-69 on Feb. 12. Three days later, the Warriors played their Senior Night game against Ley-

den. The visiting Eagles defeated Wil-lowbrook 67-66.

The Warriors' win over Proviso East avenged a 27-point loss to the Pirates on Jan. 15.

Willowbrook also split its season series with Leyden. The Warriors beat the Eagles 75-62 in their first meeting of the season on Feb. 2. Willowbrook held a 20-point lead after one quarter

Last Friday's loss to Leyden gave the Warriors a final 2018-19 conference record of 7-5. Willowbrook swept its two games against both Ad-dison Trail and Hinsdale South. The Warriors split their series with Morton, Proviso East and Leyden. They lost both of their games to Downers Grove South, Proviso East and Downers Grove South shared the conference title: each team finished with a 10-2 record. Proviso East won both meetings between the two teams.

Willowbrook opened the week with a 73-62 win at Elgin-Larkin on Feb. 11. The Warriors trailed the Royals by 19 points in the first half. They cut the deficit to 41-31 by halftime and grabbed a 51-49 lead by the end

of the third quarter.

The Warriors finished their week with a 68-50 loss to Marist at last Saturday's DeKalb Barbs Shootout at DeKalb High School. That loss ga the Warriors an overall record of 16-

Willowbrook will play a crossover game against a team from the West Suburban Silver Conference this week. The Warriors will open the this week. The warnors will open the HISA Class 4A post-season with a Feb. 25 game against Glenbard North at the Downers Grove South Re-gional. If the Warnors beat Glenbard North, they will face Downers Grove North in a regional semifinal game. A win over Downers Grove North would propel Willowbrook to the re-gional final. The Warriors could face Downers Grove South for the third time this season in that regional title

Last week's results showed the Warriors can be very tough to beat at times, and vulnerable at others

"We've been living on the edge," said Willowbrook coach Chris Perkins after the loss to Leyden. "We're trying to sharpen things up and build some momentum for the post-sea-

Senior Charlie Flak scored 21 points in the win over Elgin Larkin. Flak made eight of 12 attempts from the field and converted all five of his shots from the free-throw line. Junior Everett Stubblefield added 15 points. Senior Scott Tumilty made four shots from 3-point range and provided 14 points. Senior Matas Masys sank pair of 3-pointers and scored 10

Masys caught fire in the Feb. 12 conference game against Proviso East. He drained seven of 11 shots from 3-point territory on his way to a 27-point output. Masys made two 3-pointers in the first quarter, one apiece in the second and third quarters, and three during the fourth quarter. Masys also made all four of his free-throw attempts on the night. As a team, Willowbrook connected on 17

of 20 foul shots.

Stubblefield backed up Masys with Subbleheld backed up masys with 18 points, while Scott Turnilty provid-ed nine points. His brother—junior Sam Turnilty—scored seven points. The Warriors held a 54-44 lead

over Proviso East through three quarters. The lead grew to 68-53 with 5:10 left in the game. The Pirates trimmed the lead to 72-66 with less than two minutes to play, but senior Jack Hines

"It's never going to be easy to beat a program of that stature," said Perkins after the win over Proviso East. "That was a 32-minute grind. We were real pleased with our effort. We proved how good we can be." The Warriors had a much slower

start in Friday's Senior Night game against Leyden. Playing their final home contest of the season, Wil-lowbrook trailed the visiting Eagles 20-14 after one quarter and 38-27 at

halftime.
Willowbrook stormed back in the second half; Flak's 3-point shot mid-way through the third quarter cut Ley-den's lead to 44-43. A flying offensive rebound and dunk by Stubblefield cut the Eagles' lead to 53-49 with about one minute left in the period. Stubble-field's play also unleashed an eruption from Willowbrook's rowdy student section, whose members were dressed in orange.

Leyden held a 55-52 lead at the end of the third quarter. Willowbrook scored the first four points of the final quarter to take a 56-55 lead. The Warriors increased their lead to 61-57 with about 5:30 to play, but the Ea-gles did not fold. Leyden took a 62-

the Eagles, giving them a 66-61 advantage. The Warriors tied the score at 66-66 when Hines made a 3-pointer with just under a minute to play.

Leyden scored what turned out to

be the winning point on a free throw with 47.8 seconds remaining. The Warriors had a chance to take the lead in the closing seconds, but they couldn't convert.



hundreds of millions of dollars the bill would add to the state's expenditures as human service providers-especially nursing homes, 25 of which have closed since 2014 because of inadequate Medicaid reimbursements-universities and other departments request more funding to pay for the higher labor

But Rep. Will Guzzardi, Senate Bill 1's House sponsor, continued to point to data which shows no impact on job losses when communities see an "incremental" minimum wage increase, and spoke to the dignity of the worker.

"The only way to stop being poor is to have more money," he said, "And that's what this legislation is going to do. The working poor in our state are going to have more money. We will treat their la-bor with the dignity and respect it deserves, and we will allow them to provide a better standard of living for themselves and their families.

While Republicans continued to argue that the studies cited by Guz-zardi predict only an incremental increase - not an 82 percent spike in six years - many Democrats were convinced by the moral argu-

Rep. Emmanuel "Chris" Welch of Westchester was among them.

"People should not go to work 40 hours a week and still not be able to put food on the table," he said. "Dr. King said there is nothing but short-sightedness to prevent us from guaranteeing a livable income for every American. Let's not be shortsighted today."

Rep. Celina Villanueva, a Chica-

go Democrat, said further progress was necessary and the fight for 15 was only the "first step" toward worker dignity.

"What we're really talking about is the dignity and respect of our workers," she said. "I don't think 15 is enough. I've never thought 15 was enough.

Guzzardi said 41 percent of all workers in Illinois make less than \$15 per hour, and more of those workers are in their 40s, 50s and 60s than are younger than 25; and 48 percent of African Americans

Republicans also brought up the and 61 percent of Latinos make less than \$15 per hour.

Those minimum-wage workers ill begin seeing their increases in January 2020, when the minimum rate goes from \$8.25 to \$9.25 before increasing to \$10 on July 1, 2020, and \$11 on Jan. 1 2021. After that, it would increase by \$1 every January until it hits \$15 in 2025.

For Iashea Cross, a personal assistant and low-wage worker in the health care field who was in the gallery from Chicago, the bill means a brighter outlook in the future.
"I might be able to let go of

that second job in the future that I have just to make ends meet," she "For me, the passage of this bill means that finally we are being recognized as the working people of the state that help it continue to move forward.

The bill also maintains a tip credit, which allows employers to pay tipped workers 60 percent of the minimum wage if tips make up the other 40 percent.

A training wage for teen seasonal workers is also part of the bill, and that wage will top out at \$13 per hour.

A tax credit for businesses with less than 50 full-time equivalent employees is also part of the fi-nal bill, starting at 25 percent of the difference between the current minimum wage and an employee's wage in the final quarter of the previous calendar year. It would decrease by 4 percent each year until it hits 5 percent in the final two

"I just needed to hit that first shot to get me out of that slump," Struebing said.


