Trail's March recipient of 88's Best recognition for his outstanding work in the performing arts/electives. White, a senior, was recognized during the March 18th District 88 Board of Education meeting.

For the past four years, the staff, students and community of Addison Trail have had the distinct pleasure of witnessing the famous characters of Danny Zuko, Don Lockwood, Jack Kelly and various leads from the works of Shakespeare come to life on stage through White's performances in a way that transports the audience to the places and experiences those characters encounter. White has a gift of showing the audience different perspectives through the characters he portrays, and he has raised the bar for Addison Trail Theatre and motivates his peers to do the same.

When White first came to Addison Trail, he had very little experience in theatre, and his only singing background was with popular songs on the radio. During his freshman year, White joined theatre and wondered how he was going to find his niche in this program he knew he wanted to be a part of and make a difference. He has participated in 13 shows and all of the major productions at Addison Trail and has been the lead in many of them. He was inducted as a Thespian his freshman year and is a

leader, mentor and model for many of the other students in theatre.

As White began to hone his acting and singing abilities, English teacher and Theatre Director Anna McSweeney encouraged him to audition for the All-State show. He snagged a part in the 2018 Illinois High School The-

atre Festival (IHSTF) All-State production of "Big Fish," which was then chosen to perform during the International Thespian Festival last June in Nebraska. White earned a part in this year's IHSTF All-State production of "In the Heights" as well.

White is by far one of the most talented students I have ever worked with - not only at Addison Trail, but within the state of Illinois," McSweeney said. "His achievements speak for themselves, but I would like to speak to his character. White is the hardest-working kid I know. His hunger for learning about theatre, acting, film, music, etc. astounds me, and I wish more students could have his dedication to education

White has a maturity that several teachers besides myself have noticed. He is so aware of his own limitations and abilities. He always takes responsibility for his actions and conducts himself with pure professionalism. He has taken everything I can teach him, and I feel like we've traded places; I am now learning from him. I am so excited to see what he does in the future, and I am sure we will hear from Connor White in the future."

Physical education teacher Sheri D'Ambrose agreed.
"White is one of the kindest and most talent-

ed Blazers I have seen in my 31 years here."

LeVonne Cescolini-Boyer, social studies teacher, Orchesis sponsor and musical cho-reographer, said White's enthusiasm is what makes him stand out.

"White is an amazing student, who I have had the pleasure of choreographing for over the last three years," she said. "His positive attitude is contagious, and he will be missed on the ATHS stage in the years to come. I see a very bright future for White on Broadway someday

White manages a rigorous course load on top of his commitment to theatre, and he also is a part of the ATtribute yearbook staff.

"There is no one like White," said Jessica Clark, English teacher and yearbook sponsor. "He has been a major creative contributor to our yearbook for the last two years. He uses his unassailable wit and positive energy to motivate others. One of his most reputable qualities is his ability to hold himself accountable if he makes a mistake. There are not too many teenagers who reflect on their actions as much as White does. He is a valuable member of our yearbook squad and is worthy of any honor that comes his way in the field of performing arts and electives. I am very proud of him.'

White plans to attend Chicago College of Performing Arts at Roosevelt University.





The Addison Trail baseball team turned in a combined no-hitter effort recently in a West Suburban Conference crossover game against a highly touted Lyons Township

Unfortunately, Addison Trail lost the game 3-1. "Even though we had the no-hitter we gave up a couple of unearned runs and that got us," said Addison Trail coach Mike Kennedy. "We had a couple errors and walked a couple guys and that's where they got us. It was a really good game and we played really good baseball. Lyons Township is ranked eighth in the state. We were able to keep them from hitting the baseball. We were in it until the end. It was just a great game.

Danny Zatos threw the first five

innings and Josh Meglio came in for their work at the plate, as was and pitched the sixth to close out

the no-hitter.
Addison Trail was 4-4 overall through its first eight games and split its first two West Suburban Conference Gold Division games with Downers Grove South.

"We've been doing well, but we've been bit by the injury bug," said Kennedy.

Addison Trail defeated Downers Grove South in its conference opener on a game-ending three-run double off the top of the wall. "We've won some big games so far," said Kennedy. "The first conference game against Downers South was big and then we lost to them in the second game and need to finish the third game. Right now, we're 4-4, which is pretty good. We're swinging the bats well and have pretty much been led by a lot of our se-

Nick Daudelin, Vince Daudelin, Michael Scali and AJ Carlson, the team's leadoff hitter, were lauded

Jimmy Zatos, who recently was injured. "We've definitely been bit by the injury bug," Kennedy noted.

On the pitching front, Josh Meglio has three of the team's four wins out of the bullpen. "He's done a great job for us," said Kennedy. "Overall with our pitching we are trying to find our way a little bit." Nick Daudelin, who logged 40

innings on the mound last year, has missed his last two starts due to injury, Kennedy noted. "We're waitng for Nick to get back, but until then we need other guys to step up and we are seeing that with Alex Conrad and Danny Zatos."

Scali is a three-year starter at shortstop for Addison Trail, while Carlson, Vince Daudelin and Nick Daudelin bring back veteran expe-

"We graduated a lot of innings," said Kennedy. "But we've had a lot of guys who have stepped up and done a nice job. We've had some bumps in the road a little bit, but

they are settling down and filling the zone with strikes and teams are putting it in play and we are playing good defense.

Kennedy expects to see even more progress in the upcoming weeks. "As the season goes on, we're going to continue to build on some of these early successes and continue to get better," he said. 

## Is the end near?

The fate of Lufkin Pool was on the agenda during this week's Villa Park Village Board meeting at the lowa Community Center. One item on the agenda at the April 8 meeting, which was held after this week's Villa Park Review went to press, asked trustees to authorize a proposal to demolish Lufkin Pool and related structures at a cost of \$77,800. The agenda noted that a non-binding referendum question in the April 2 election asked voters if they supported the village spending up to \$1 million in new property taxes to fund repairs to Lufkin Pool that would allow the village to safely reopen the pool. According to the unofficial results, 1,059 people cast "No" votes, while 952 voters cast "Yes" votes. The pool, which is about 65 years old, was not open during 2018. In February 2018, the village board rejected a resolution to authorize up to \$200,000 in repairs that would have allowed the pool to open for the season. Minutes after voting against that resolution, the board considered a resolution to authorize demolition of the pool. The board voted to table that resolution until November. In November the board voted to place the non-binding referendum question on the April 2 beliot. Two of the candidates who were just elected to the board—Kevin Patrick and Christine Murphy—sald the resolution was poorty written. "The referendum question was worded in such a way that it would fall," sald Patrick after the April 2 election. Murphy said she learned after the election that the issue to demolish the pool would be on the agenda during this week's meeting. Murphy, Patrick and current Villa Park Village Trustee David Clielia will be sworn in to four-year terms next month.

### Cullerton aims to ease blood draw anxieties for those with disabilities

Having blood drawn can be a very anxious thing for a child with autism.

Thanks to Sen. Tom Cullerton (D-Villa Park), medical professionals may soon have access to training to help ensure individuals and developmental disabilities are as comfortable as possible.

Cullerton recently advanced Senate Bill 1214, which requires the Department of Public Health to ensure that those who draw blood have the most current method of drawing blood from individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities available

"Health care professionals strive to provide the best possible care to all patients," Cullerton said. "This measure ensures that they receive training on the best practices to draw blood from patients that are living with intellectual and developmental disabilities such as extrement Designation. disabilities such as autism and Down syndrome have a good medical expe-

The Department of Public Health will be required to compile current methods of drawing blood from chil-dren and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Senate Bill 1214 was an initiative of Michael Baker, a parent advocate of a young adult son with a develop-

mental disability.

"Medical visits can be stressful for all of us, but especially for individ-uals who can often face extra chal-lenges," Cullerton said. "We need to ensure that communication and sensory issues are taken into account when medical professionals perform procedures such as blood draws.

Senate Bill 1214 passed the Senate's Committee on Public Health with bipartisan support and will move to the full Senate for consideration.

DOWNERS GROVE - Downers Grove South junior Erin Reidy fondly remembers breaking 5 minutes in the 1,600-meter run for the first time about a year ago.

"Incredible," Reidy said. "I wanted to be up there with the fantastic allstate runners and thinking about it, I was overwhelmed with emotion.'

On April 6, Reidy's 1,600 at Downers South's annual Mustang Invitational was just another tremendous time this season. Even after a hard training week, Reidy nearly won (4:59.54), but she was edged by Hinsdale Central junior Emma Watcke, a move-in this semester from Ohio (lifetime-best 4:59.47).

This season, Reidy set indoor school records for the 800 (2:11.47) and 1,600 (4:58.42) and with the 3,200 relay (9:20.49). Reidy and senior Becky Versaskas return from last year's allstate third-place 3,200 relay.

"I'm just so excited for the end of the season and what it has to hold," Reidy said.

Glenbard West remained undefeated since indoors by winning the invite for the first time since 2014 with 100 points, outscoring defending Class 3A state champion Naperville North (86). Lyons Township (82), the Mustangs (66) and Hinsdale Central (56) were third, fourth and seventh.

The Hilltoppers received titles from senior Huda Hussaini (12.93 in 100), juniors Ashley Samuta (16-6 3/4 in long jump) and Aaliyah Collier (4-10 in high jump) and the 1,600 relay of Collier, Hussaini, junior Ava Powell and sophomore Kate Morrison (4:03.99). Senior Dejah Hopkins (35-11 in shot put) and the 400 relay of Hussaini, Morrison, Samuta and freshman Kyrah Maas (49.99) were second.

Glenbard West competed without junior Katelynne Hart, the two-time defending 3,200 and 1,600 state champion. Hart won the 3,200 on April 6 at the Arcadia (California) Invitational in 9:59.57, this season's fastest U.S. girls high school time.

"I just wanted to prove that Katelynne is a great runner, but we have a team," Collier said. "She's so good, but we make her proud and she makes us proud.'

The 1,600 relay won by .06 with Morrison in Hart's anchor spot.

'We're just confident as a team and in each other," Morrison said. "I reopen his recruitment.

## Flanagan's Boston finish sets her up for even bigger things

Lindsay Flanagan is run-ning unattached, without a sponsor. After Monday that may change.

Achieving her goal of a top-10 finish to gain Olympic Trials qualification, the former Lake Park and University of Washington distance star placed ninth among women at the 123rd Boston Marathon.

Flanagan finished the winding, 26.2-mile course in 2 hours, 30 minutes, 7 seconds. The third American woman after Jordan Hasay and Desiree Linden, she crossed the finish line in Boston's Copley Square 6 minutes, 36 seconds behind the women's winner, Worknesh Degefa of

When the lead pack moved at the 3-mile mark Flanagan hung back, she said. The strategy saved energy to combat the hills down the road. Her first checkpoint among the top 10 runners was after the 21-mile mark.

"I made my move with about 10 miles to go, and that's when I was able to start picking people off," she said

Her younger sister, Kaylee, a former state champion at Lake Park herself, helped celebrate the moment.

"She was going crazy when She was going crazy when I was coming in, and she was right there when I finished," said Lindsay Flanagan, who encouraged her parents, Milton and Becky, to watch the race on television due to a lack

of good vantage points. Flanagan has rebounded from injury. She finished 11th in Boston in 2017 at 2:34.44. but stress fractures in her feet reflected a 37th-place finish at the World Championships in London four months later.

Once healed she returned to the 2018 Frankfurt Marathon in Germany, where she'd had success in 2016. Last year she set her personal record of 2:29.25.

"It was a pretty tough year (in 2017) and last year was



pretty big to be able to come back and have a big 'PR' when I ran Frankfurt. That was a good step in the right

direction, said Flana-gan, 28, who lives in Boul-

der, Colorado.

Along with coach Steve Magness and agent Josh Cox, Flanagan started the buildup to Boston in mid-December.

"I ran in Germany at the end of October, so this gave me plenty of time to recover and get ready for this one," she said. "That last one was more like a pace kind of race, but Boston is more like a championship race. It's tactical, it's not so much about time as it is

Flanagan said she and her team had focused on attaining qualifying position in Bos-ton and little beyond that. With the standard achieved she may run shorter events, half-marathons or 10-kilo-meter races, leading up to the Olympic Marathon Trials in Atlanta on Feb. 29, 2020.


"If I can get faster at the shorter stuff that helps with the marathon, for sure," Flanagan said.


