Former student accused of threatening teacher at Addison's Lincoln Academy

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin and Addison Director of Police Bill Hayden announced last week that a former Lincoln Academy student has been accused of threatening a teacher at the Addison school. The juvenile appeared at a detention hearing last Thursday where Judge Anthony Coco ordered that he be placed on home detention.

It is alleged that on April 11, 2018, at approximately 7:55 a.m., the 14-year-old juvenile called the school and threatened to shoot one of the staff members stating, "He is going to get it today, right in the head."

Upon receiving the alleged call, authorities at the school contacted the Addison Police Department. Through their investigation, Addison police officers identified the juvenile as a suspect. He was taken into custody without incident from his home vectorally offermon.

"Any threat of violence aimed at a school will immediately be investigated and if found credible, will be charged accordingly," Berlin said. "Teachers can't teach and students can't learn if they are in fear for their safety while at school. I would like to thank authorities at Lincoln Academy for alerting law enforcement to this incident as well as the Addison Police Department for their quick re-

sponse and apprehension of the suspect in this case."

"The well-being of our children and those who teach them remains a top priority of my administration,"

Hayden said. "Because of this commitment, the Addison Police Department takes any threat, real or perceived, directed at our students and school personnel extremely serious-

ly. I would like to thank the officers who worked on this case for their efforts as well as the DuPage County State's Attorney's Office for their continued efforts in protecting our

schools from harm."

Members of the public are reminded that this complaint contains only charges and is not proof of the defendant's guilt.

Federal investigators subpoena records of Tom Cullerton

State Senator has not been accused of any wrongdoing

On Saturday, April 13, the Independent learned that the records of State Senator (IL-23) Tom Cullerton (D-Villa Park) are the subject of a subpoena by Federal investigators who are looking into alleged extortion charges against a former Teamsters union boss.

On Feb. 5, the U.S. attorney's office in Chicago subpoenaed Senate records for Cullerton's emails, legislative attendance records, personnel files and other documents related to reimbursements for travel including lodging, meals and vehicle allowance es from Feb. 1, 2013, through March 3 2016

Cullerton, 49, has served in the Senate since 2013 and has not been accused of wrongdoing. He declined to comment Thursday. His office directed all inquiries to the U.S. attorney's office. the popular NBC shows "Chicago Pire" and "Chicago P.D."

Records demanded to assist in indictment of Coli

The federal grand jury has indicted former Teamsters Joint Council 25 President John Coli Sr. on charges alleging he extorted a Chicago film studio of \$325,000 since 2014. Coli was indicted in 2017 on charges alleging he extorted the money by threatening labor unrest at Cinespace Chicago Film Studios, which films

Coli resigned from his union job when he was first indicted in July 2017. The former union boss was a high-profile supporter of Chicago Mayor Rahm Emmanual and also weighed in on national politics. Coli pleaded not guilty and the next hearing in his case is set for May 3. According to Federal records, plea negotiations in the case have been

Cullerton, who was a member of the Teamsters Union before becoming a State elected official, received

Softball teams with pitching tend to do good things.

Willowbrook's roster has plenty of pitching depth that has, indeed, done good things in the early going of the 2019 season.

Through the team's first seven games (Willowbrook was 4-3), sophomore Caroline Dooley had a win, while freshman Caldon Kulczyski had two wins against Schaumburg and Proviso West. She struck out 13 in her first game against Proviso West. Freshman Kayla Neff had a win against Schaumburg as well.

"With the exception of one game, pitching has been a strength of ours," said Willowbrook coach Rachel Karos. "Caitlyn has pitched really well for us. She has great movement on the ball, but more importantly she has a great attitude and leads by example on the field. She's also one of our leaders in batting average. Caroline Dooley has had to face some tough competition on the mound. She had a great first outing against Plainfield Central. She only gave up two hits and struck out nine. She also is consistent at bat and when she is

not pitching, she is doing a really nice job in the outfield,"

Karos also has seen her team's bats warm up throughout the first seven games, "We had a little slow start with our bats this year, but with each game we are getting more runners in scoring position and now we just have to execute to get those runs in," she said. "We only are seven games in and I think the more we play the better we will be at fine-tuning the things we need to be successful going into conference play. With playing so few games so far, it's hard to say what we have improved on the most. Areas we are looking to improve on currently are cuts and relays, and we always are hoping to be stronger on

"Our hope is to get better at all aspects of the game. I'm hoping to see our offense start getting us more runs to take a little pressure off the pitching staff. We are still young in some positions, so there will be times we make mistakes, but I'm hoping we can keep recovering and battling like we have been and get a little better each game."

Karos also had high praise for senior Amy Bussa, Neff and Annemarie Knudtson. "They have been consistent at the plate, providing us with either runs scored or RBI.

In recent action, Willowbrook dropped a 16-2 non-conference decision to Plainfield South Caroline Dooley, Kulczyski and Katie Pettinger each had a hit. Dooley had two RBI. Kulczyski pitched the final 5 2/3 innings and struck out 10.

In a 17-1 West Suburban Conference crossover win in four innings against Proviso West, Willowbrook scored 10 runs in the second inning and had 14 hits.

Knudtson went 2-for-2 with three runs scored and four RBI. Bussa was 2-for-2 with three runs scored and an RBI, while Emma Barrington went 2-for-2 with two runs scored and five RBI. Mikayla Tomaszewski had two hits as well. Knudtson, Samantha Mishlove, Barrington, Kulczyski and Tomaszewski each had a double. Bussa tripled, while Barrington homered. Knudtson stole two bases.

Kulczyski pitched two innings and struck out five, while Neff did the same thing in her two innings of

Senate OKs slightly different bill to raise minimum salary for teachers

A second bill raising the minimum annual salary for Illinois teachers to \$40,000 found legislative success this

Senate Bill 10, sponsored by Sen. Andy Manar (D-Bunker Hill), passed on a 45-11 vote April 11.

It would provide a five-year ramp to increasing Illinois' minimum teacher salary, from just more than \$32,000 in 2020-21 to \$40,000 in the 2023-2024 school year.

The substance of the bill is the same as a House bill—HB 2078, sponsored by Rep. Katie Stuart (D-Edwardsville)—that passed earlier in the week.

But Manar's bill was approved with an amendment the House version did not have, which directs a state review panel to figure out how Illinois' most underfunded school districts can get extra state aid to comply with the minimum salary law.

Manar said the state's school funding formula must be "slightly adjust-ed" to make up the difference for the to make up the difference for the

cost of the bill, so that underfunded school districts could pay the minimum salaries.

He said initial estimates are that "just under" \$20 million would have to be added to the funding formula to help the neediest school districts comply with the law.

According to SB 10's amendment, the Professional Review Panel's recommendations must be made by Jan. 31, 2020.

Manar said an ideal timeline is that the recommendations are adopted in time for the governor's budget pro-

posal in February 2020. When that budget passes in May of 2020, Manar said, the school funding formula will have already kicked out the extra money to underfunded school districts, in time for the start of the school year's classes in August and September.

"We want to have a more level entry point for teachers across the state, Manar said of the proposed teacher "Depending on where you teach, where you live, and which districts have openings, your entry level salary can fluctuate dramatically.

"A base rate would help reassure college students that when they grad-

uate, they'll have a decent wage."

Opponents of SB 10 voiced concerns similar to the bill's House counterpart.

This is a significant unfunded mandate," GOP Sen. Chuck Weaver, of Peoria, said. "School districts will be forced to lay people off.'

Sen. Kimberly Lightford, a Maywood Democrat, emphasized that the salary increase to \$40,000 is not immediate, but phased in over four -and still might not be enough.

"A \$40,000 starting salary for a teacher is not a lot of money," she said Thursday. "Yet, it would allow them the decency and respect to raise up our generations to come.

The state's current minimum teacher salary law of \$10,000 has been unchanged since the 1980s.

Manar said the first salary increase of SB 10-to just more than \$32,000 for the 2020-21 school year—is simply that same \$10,000 salary adjusted for inflation to the present day.

Jack Hines leads Willowbrook at plate, but biggest growth is his glovework at shortstop

Many times throughout his sophomore season, Willowbrook's Jack Hines wondered when he would grasp playing shortstop with more consistency.

At the time, Hines was thrust into the starting spot at one of the most difficult positions in the infield for a team with high expectations.

He struggled, like most underclassmen, finding the right balance between frustration and growth.

But the Warriors, loaded with experience and talent, needed Hines to adapt quickly to shortstop.

"Fielding was very hard," Hines recalled. "I made a lot of errors. There was a lot of pressure. But I needed that to get where I am today. I'm glad it happened. It made me stronger. I'm a lot more confident and really trust myself and my hands.

Hines, a senior, is a standout threeyear varsity player for the Warriors. He's leading the team in hits (18), extra-base hits (11) and has driven in 16 runs to go with a .429 batting average from the No. 2 spot in the lineup. He's also 10-for-10 on steals and has scored 11 runs.

The best part of his evolution from sophomore to senior starter: He's only committed two errors.

Willowbrook coach Vic Weisner said Hines' development is a central reason for his team winning 11 of their first 14 games. As a sophomore, Hines eventually settled down and helped guide the Warriors to a 26-9 record and a Class 4A regional title.

"It was tough for Jack at first," Weisner said. "You get a lot of plays at shortstop. I just assumed it was pretty easy, but halfway through that season. you could see the nerves. We put him at designated hitter, and he just started hammering the ball.'

Hines has become a major contributor for the Warriors, who won 20 games last season for the second year in a row. Hines opened the season with a two-run triple in Willowbrook's 16-0 win over Glenbard South. He drove in

two runs in an 8-5 win over Hinsdale South on April 2.

Hines, who also plays basketball, said he's a completely different player this season. He's one of five three-year senior starters.

Hines said the Warriors have lofty goals. Willowbrook returned eight starters and its entire rotation from last season. Senior hurler Trevor Jaloszynski is one of the Warriors' leading two-way contributors, batting .333 with eight RBIs and a 1-0 mark with three saves. Senior second baseman Ryan Mintz is batting .290 with 13 runs scored.

"My main focus this offseason was cutting back on errors," Hines said. "I wanted to get more confidence fielding the ball and with my fundamentals. I'm also more aggressive on the bases. I try and take a base every time I can to get us more runs and win games.

"The key for us is to keep pitching lights-out and hit the ball well. We have to keep on getting quality at-bats and rack them up and put some runs together.'

Board approves demolition of Lufkin Pool

Decision moved up two months from June tabling

During a contentious board meeti held on Monday, April 8, the Villa Park Board of Trustees voted 4-3 to approve a contract to demolish Lufkin Pool.

This vote sealed the fate of the near-ly 65-year-old south-side pool, which has been the subject of passionate de-bate for several years.

Just scheduling the vote proved ontroversial, and the "hot-topic" of Lufkin Pool's future prompted village staff to hold the meeting at the Iowa Community Center instead of Village Hall to better accommodate the large

Nearly 100 people were in the audience, many identifying themselves as part of the "Save Lufkin Pool" group.

The pool has sat dormant since 2017, and Lufkin was closed through swimming season of 2018. Trustees tabled a resolution to demolish the site in order to give proponents of saving the structure time to explore alterna-tives and raise money privately to fund

repairs.

A feasibility study encompassing all village park and recreation facilities was conducted. In order to get some guidance from the public, the board voted to add a question to the ballot for the April 2 election.

The Lufkin Pool advisory (non-binding) question, "Do you support the village of Villa Park, Illinois, spending up to \$1 million in new property taxes to fund repairs to Lufkin Pool, which would allow the village to safely re-open the pool?" was rejected by a vote of 1,059 (52.66 percent) to 952 (47.34 percent).

Once the advisory question lost at the polls, the question of demolishing Lufkin Pool was immediately added to

the formal agenda.

This didn't sit well with many residents, as the original vote to fund the dismantling of the pool was tabled un-til June 2019.

Moving up the vote to April 8 was seen as a way to get the pool demol-ished before two newly elected trustees

ished before two newly elected trustees were installed in May.

"This is classic Chicago politics," said one resident, who identified himself as a member of the "Save Lufkin Pool" group, "Using the misleading advisory question vote to justify this is 'back room politics' at its worst."

A common theme among the pro-Lufkin group was that the advisory question was misleading and designed to 'scare' voters into thinking it was a tax increase. The \$1 million repair figure was also derided as too high, with various estimates from \$200,000 to \$600,000 deemed more realistic by

one.

Not all residents agreed.

"The referendum question didn't

mislead me," said one resident who spoke against funding pool repairs. "I too grew up going to Lufkin. But the reality is we cannot continue to spend money on (this facility), which is why I voted 'no.'" Several other residents spoke in sup-

ort of demolishing the pool.
"If you have this vote today, you

"If you have tins vote today, you will be putting politics over good public policy," said a representative of the Citizen's Advocacy Center, a government watchdog group. "If you care about the public's trust, it is imperative you delay this vote."

New trustees-elect weigh in

While Villa Park voters rejected the advisory referendum question, they also voted in two new residents as trustees, along with incumbent Dave Cilella. Trustee Don Kase lost his bid

Cilella and Kase were on record as being against further funding of Lufkin repairs. Both new trustees, Kevin Patrick and Christine Murphy, have advo-cated for keeping Lufkin Pool open.

During the public input portion of the meeting, trustee-elect Kevin Patrick took the podium and turned around to address the crowd. He told the gathered residents to contact him

any time with concerns.

Turning back to the board, Patrick said, "I feel it is important to reset the Lufkin Pool question to zero. Christine Murphy and I have some ideas that will be beneficial to [this question]. Please consider delaying the vote to demolish.'

Murphy read a prepared statement decrying the decision to untable the

After residents and the two trustees-elect had their say, the board made

ees-elect had their say, the board made their comments.

"I can't ignore the results of the referendum," Trustee Cheryl Tucker said. "I agree the vote should stay tabled until June as originally promised. However, in June, I will be voting to demolish Lufkin."

Trustee Niele Chuma saberd Tuck

Trustee Nick Cuzzone echoed Tuck-

's reasoning.
"I didn't realize this was tabled until June," Cuzzone said. "For that reason, I'm voting against [un-tabling and demolition] tonight. I do think, though, that Lufkin Pool is beyond saving and will also vote to demolish in June."

Village President Al Bulthuis, who endured much criticism from the doz en or so residents who rose to speak during public comment, iterated his stance on funding Lufkin.

"Having two pools in town is nice," Bulthuis said, "but spending money to keep Lufkin open for three years, if we're lucky, is not fiscally responsible.



The Villa Park Village Board voted 4-3 during its April 8 meeting to authorize a proposal to demolish Lufkin Pool at a cost of about \$78,000. The pool, which is located at 1000 S. Ardmore Ave., has been closed since the end of the 2017 season. In February of 2018, the board rejected a resolution to authorize up to \$200,000 in repairs that would have allowed the pool to open for the season. The pool, which reportedly opened in 1954, is in need of several major repairs. Villa Park Village President Albert Bulthuis joined three trustees—Chris Aiello, David Cliella and Don Kase—In voting last week to authorize the proposal to demoilsh the pool. Trustees Nick Cuzzone, Cheryl Tucker and Robert Wagner voted against the proposal. Cuzzone and Tucker both sald the proposal to demolish the pool should remain tabled until June of this year. They said they would vote in June to demolish the pool. The vote to demolish the pool reportedly had been scheduled to take place in June, but was recently moved up to the April 8 meeting. Aiello and Kase will leave the board next month. Kevin Patrick, Christine Murphy and Cliella will be sworn in to four-year terms on the board at the May 13 meeting. According to the unofficial results, 1,059 people voted "No" to that question, while 952 people cast "Yes" votes. The wording of the first item was misconstrued, with Trustee Dave Cilella initially voting "no" and then switching to "yes" to untable. Hoots from the "Save Lufkin" members of the crowd could be heard. Even Trustee Bob Wagner, a staunch supporter of Lufkin Pool, was confused and voted ves" to "untable"

After clarification by the village attorney, the initial Motion to Take from the Table passed 4 votes to 3. Trust-ees Chris Aiello, Don Kase and Dave Cilella joined Village President Al Bul-thuis in that vote. The same four board members then voted for the Reso

to Demolish, with Trustees Chervl Tucker and Nick Cuzzone joining Bob Wagner in voting against demolition at

By not allowing the feasibility study to come back, and by demolishing Lufkin, we are erasing the potential option—that we don't even know what the feasibility study even knowill say."

When asked if he would have voted

"We should find a way to bridge the gap between now and when that new recreation building (can be built)."
On Tuesday, April 9, village crews were already at Lufkin Pool taking

According to the nonprofit online political encyclopedia Ballotpedia, 37 states have higher per capita spending rates than Illinois. Harmon said the alternatives to a graduated tax were 15 percent spending cuts to all state departments, or a 20 percent increase to the current flat tax rate of 4.95 percent to a 6.95 percent rate.

But opponents, including Orphe Divounguy, chief economist of the nonprofit conservative think tank Illinois Policy Institute, said the state has a spending problem, not

a revenue problem. He said Pritza revenue problem. He sau Fill-ker's estimates "don't add up," and in order to raise the revenue neces-sary to close budget gaps, the mid-dle class would have to pay higher rates if further measures such as pension reform are not enacted

"It's not addressing the root causes of our state's problems. We know what the state's problems are, they're on the spending side, and

no reforms have been introduced to deal with them," Divounguy said. But Deputy Gov. Dan Hynes said specific legislative counterpropos-als from elected Republicans have not been brought to the governor.








Bill would create Native American Advisory Council

Native Americans in Illinois will soon have a stronger voice in state government under a measure sponsored by State Sen. Suzy Glowiak.

Glowiak (D-Western Springs) supports Senate Bill 727, which creates the Native American Advisory Council to increase the number of Native American state employees. "The State of Illinois encompasses

"The State of Illinois encompasses land that generations ago was the ancestral home of American Indians," Glowiak said. "The Native American population of Illinois should have a seat at the table. This is about ensuring Illinois government reflects all Illinoisans."

Senate Bill 727 is an initiative of The Native American Chamber of Commerce of Illinois.

"We are truly grateful for the efforts of Senator Suzy Glowiak for her assistance and support in the introduction and passing of this bill," Andrew Johnson, Executive Director, Native American Chamber of Commerce of Illinois said. "It is an historic occasion for Indian Country in Illinois and we celebrate this accomplishment. This bill helps us address issues regarding employment and economic equality for the American Indians in our state and thus, improve our quality of life."

The Native American Advisory Council will publish a report on Feb. 1 every year detailing the involvement of Native American employees in state government. The Illinois Department of Central Management Services will update the existing minority employ-

ment program to include Native Americans as well.

"The American Indian population is a vibrant community in Illinois," said Tim Blanks, president of the Board of Directors of the Native American Chamber of Commerce of Illinois. "Our population is over 100,000 representing more than 125 tribes, making us the 15th most populous state in the Union in terms of Native Americans. This bill will provide greater opportunities statewide where we, as indigenous people, can add to and support the mission of all departments."
