Bond set at \$75,000 for suspect accused of threatening Glenbard East students

DuPage County State's Attorney Robert B. Berlin and Lombard Chief of Police Roy Newton announced on Friday, April 19, that bond had been set for a former Glenbard East High School Student accused of sending a threatening message to a current female Glenbard East High School student. Jaris McCullum, 18, appeared in Bond Court Thursday afternoon where Judge Brian Jacobs set bond at \$75,000 with 10% to apply. McCullum has been charged with one count of Disorderly Conduct, a Class 4 Felony and one count of Harassment through Electronic Communications, also a Class 4 Felony.

On April 15, 2019, the Lombard Police Department received information regarding a threatening message a female Glenbard East High School student received via FaceBook Messenger. It is alleged that McCullum sent a message to the student threatening to show up at the school and kill her boyfriend and harm her.

It is alleged that in the message, McCullum posted: "I really shoot," "pull up at east rn I still got my card," and "I got mfs who dnt like u that'll pay to get rid of u, And Im' takin that money, So u better hide mf be I promise I'll get you."

It is further alleged that the message contained a photo of McCullum wearing all black holding what appears to be a firearm. After receiving the message, the student alerted the Dean of Students at Glenbard East High School. The school then reported the alleged threat to the Lombard Police Student Resource Officer. An investigation into the matter led to McCullum who was taken into custody on Thursday, April 18.

"Tomorrow [April 20] marks the 20th anniversary of one of the most horrific events in American history, the Columbine school shootings, an anniversary that serves as a sad reminder to us all of us about the pos-

sible dangers that unfortunately, our children and school personnel must consider each day," Berlin said. "As I have said in the past, any threat or even the hint of a threat to our schools will be fully investigated and anyone suspected of such behavior will be held accountable. I would like to

thank the recipient of this threatening message for doing the right thing and alerting authorities and I urge all students to follow her lead - if you see or hear something, say something.

"I would like to thank the Lombard Police Department for their work in identifying the defendant in this case."

"Our educational facilities should be a place of learning and safety," Newton said. "It is unfortunate that some think they can disrupt fellow students' learning opportunity with threats to their safety while in school. I would like to thank our investigations unit for their many hours of in-

vestigative work."

McCullum's next court appearance is scheduled for May 13, 2019 in front of Judge John Kinsella.

Members of the public are reminded that this complaint contains only charges and is not proof of the defendant's guilt.

Addison Trail softball team defeats Morton

Blazers receiving contributions throughout roster; Pitching depth a key

Addison Trail softball coach Mark Olson has a varsity roster filled with players from all four grade levels.

And all four grade levels have been contributing to the early success of the Blazers, who checked in at 9-4 overall and 1-1 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division action through late last week.

"We're pretty happy," said Olson. "We're coming of age quickly so far. We start three freshmen and three sophomores. It's been a little baptism by fire. They have responded pretty well. We've done a pretty good job on the mound. We're not walking

a lot of batters. We've played pretty good defense and as cliché as it sounds we've also had timely hitting. We've had everything you can think of."

Addison Trail evened its conference mark at 1-1 with an 8-1 win against Morton recently. "It was 0-0 at one point going into the fourth. They have a good pitcher," said Olson. "We managed a couple of things and put the ball in play when we needed to and some good things happened."

The Blazers started the conference season with a tough 5-3 loss to Leyden. "That was a situation where we might have given one away," said Olson.

Olson noted the contributions have come from many sources. Sophomore shortstop Anna Ruffolo has been a key cog at the plate. "Anna is hitting the heck out of the ball," he said.

Sophomore Isabel Aramburu helps the Blazers at catcher, while sophomore Jessica Krause is playing well at third base after playing second as a freshman last season. "Those three, Anna, Izzy and Jessica have been anchoring the heart of our order," said Olson.

Junior Val Pentrelli has helped on offense and defense. "I have been really impressed with Val at the plate and defensively she has been great at first base," said Olson.

Olson added the team is deep at pitcher. "Our pitching has been pretty good," he said. "It's nice that we have both pitchers coming back from

last year in Dakota Zimmerman and Lizzy O'Brien."

Freshmen Madison Domek and Gia Napoli have further bolstered the pitching ranks for the Blazers. "We have that depth, which is nice," said Olson. "We're able to do things where we're not letting teams see some pitchers three and four times through the order."

Olson also cited strong play from freshman outfielder Taylor Gloms and seniors Maddie Biancalana, Bella Provinzino and McKenna Gayon. "Our seniors have stepped in and are leading the way by leading by example," he said. "They know the

intensity needed at the varsity level, especially in the conference games. These freshmen are talented, but they need to be led in terms of this is how we do things and how we need to do things. We have a great mix of kids here and we're getting contributions all around the team. This is a testament to our girls. It's kind of the next person up kind of thing. These girls are stepping up and all of them are doing a nice job."

Addison Trail had conference games scheduled this week against Hinsdale South, Downers Grove South and Friday against District 88 neighbor Willowbrook.

Fenton boys volleyball team records two wins

Bison up to 11 victories through late last week

The Fenton boys volleyball team continued its strong play with recent wins against Hinsdale South and Wheaton Academy.

The two victories pushed the Bison to 11-6 overall. The win against Wheaton Academy put Fenton at 1-0 in conference play.

Coach Heather Petersen noted middle blocker Adam Gebala had some big blocks in the win against Wheaton Academy, while libero Tony Galeana had 15 digs in the Wheaton Academy contest and setter Tyler Ford had three kills and 20 assists. Outside hitter Jacek Gebala had five kills and two aces against Wheaton Academy.

Through late last week, Jacek Gebala was leading the team in kills with 118, while Adam Gebala had

68 and Nicholas Hanusiak had 44. Adam Gebala was leading in blocks with 31, while Lucas Feddersen had 18 blocks and Ford had 17. Ford was tops on the team in aces with 23. Jacek Gebala had 20 aces, while Adam Gebala had 12. Galeana was leading the team in digs with 131. Ford had 69 and Hanusiak had 62.

Looking at the first 17 contests, Petersen pointed to team chemistry as a major key. "This team has great chemistry. We have a solid team all around," she said. "When the other team shuts down one of our guys, someone picks up the slack. Even the guys not on the floor help so much from the sideline. Our game continues to improve every game and we enjoy playing those competitive teams."

Fenton also has benefited from an improved block. "Our blocking has significantly improved," she said. "We struggled against a few teams where they had one strong player hurting us, but it motivated us to do something about it in practice."

Petersen said the team has benefited from the recent play of Adam Gebala, Galeana, Ford and Jacek Gebala. "Adam is dominating the middle," she said. "He knows the game well and helps us so much at the net. Tony is our libero and is the rock of our defense. He is vocal and a true leader for the team. Tyler is making plays that have come at critical moments. The team trusts him and he continues to contribute in any way he can. Jacek is our outside and rips quite the jump serve. He also is a key player in our offense."

In addition to having strong chemistry, Petersen added her group falls into the high-character column as well. "These boys are a great group on and off the court," she said. "They are competitive, work hard, want to improve and are just overall great kids. I also like how nothing has seemed to rattle them. They play to win."

Fenton has contests scheduled with Waukegan and St. Francis this week.

The Willowbrook baseball team continued its winning ways inside the West Suburban Conference Gold Division.

The Warriors were recent 11-5 winners over District 88 neighbor Addison Trail to run their conference record to a perfect 7-0. Willowbrook opened the WSC Gold season with 2-0, 8-5 and 16-3 wins against Hinsdale South, as well as 6-0, 12-5 and 3-2 wins against Morton.

Willowbrook was scheduled to play the middle game of the Addison Trail series earlier this week and will head to Addison for the finale on Friday while also playing a three-game WSC Gold set against Proviso East this week. Willowbrook concludes an extremely busy week Saturday at home against York.

In the Addison Trail opener, Willowbrook broke open an early 1-1 stalemate with six runs in the second. Willowbrook had nine hits in the game.

Sam Tumilty went 2-for-4 with a run scored and three RBI. Jack Hines went 3-for-4 with two runs scored and two RBI. Jeremy Conforti went 2-for-2 with a run scored and an RBI. Willowbrook also was active on the basepaths with 10 stolen bases and no caught stealings. Hines and Scott Tumilty each had three steals, while Isaac Gaines had two.

Strejc calls it a close call between horse and floor exercise for where the team has improved the most thus far. "The guys are continually making small improvements on the same horse rou-

ties they've had all year and are refining them," he said. "As for floor, two of our guys will be adding some difficulty to their routines so hopefully that will increase scores several tenths."

Strejc cited recent strong efforts from junior-varsity roster member Elkin Wells, as well as Ross. "Elkin is a JV guy who has stepped up recently," he said. "One of our varsity members was out the last two meets and Elkin filled in for him and did a great job making sure our scores didn't take much of a hit at all."

Katelynne Hart runs fastest 1,600 in nation

Katie Hohe gets dramatic victory in 3,200 for invite champion Glenbard West

GLEN ELLYN – Glenbard West junior Katelynne Hart posted the nation's fastest girls high school 1,600 meters this track season with a 4:45.33 showing April 20.

Senior teammate Katie Hohe enjoyed the most dramatic victory.

Behind by eight seconds with one lap remaining, Hohe closed in the final straightaway and won the 3,200 in 11:04.81 at her final home Sue Pariseau Invitational.

"I can't even put into words how it felt to be coming in hot that last 100 meters on my home track, my senior year, in first place," Hohe said. "It was just a really special moment and something I'll hold with me for a long time."

On April 22, Hohe attended the IHSA All-State Academic Team banquet.

"It's just been a good week," Hohe said.

The Hilltoppers, who scored 102 points, also had titles from freshman Audrey Allman (800 in 2:17.58) and the 1,600 relay of junior Aaliyah Collier, Hohe, junior Ava Powell and Hart (4:04.76).

Wheaton North (31 points), Hinsdale Central (28) and Willowbrook (21) were 10th, 12th and 13th in the team standings.

At last year's Pariseau Invite, Hart ran the fastest 3,200 in Illinois girls high school history (9:52.02). At the April 20 invite, she anchored the second-place 3,200 relay with Allman, junior Haley Yeager and Powell (9:38.27).

"Just because I was going to run the (3,200 relay) and have a lot of rest, I was definitely hoping to run fast," Hart said. "I wasn't sure exactly what that meant because of the wind, but I was super happy with 4:45."

Hinsdale Central junior Dior Nicholson won shot put (40-3/4) and discus (116-4). Wheaton North senior Mikayla Wassell was second in discus (103-11), Wheaton North's 800 relay of juniors Leeya Zander and Nicole Engstrom, senior Christie Marcus and freshman Taliyah Sims was third (1:46.25) and senior pole vaulters Sarah Stair and Jaime Schulz were fourth and fifth (10-6).

A two-time Class 3A state qualifier, Stair was 14th last year with an effort of 10-6. In less than two weeks, Schulz has cleared 10-3 and 10-6 for the first times.

"[The 10-6] was really, really exciting, too, because I feel like this is all happening really fast," Schulz said. "[Stair]

has been a huge inspiration, just trying to reach what she's going at."

Willowbrook senior Miani Blackwell and sophomore Aniyah Rushing were third (34-8 1/4) and fifth (33-10 1/2) in shot put. Blackwell was fourth in discus (102-7). The 3A state-qualifying standards are 38-5 and 118-5. Blackwell threw a lifetime-best 111-7 at sectionals last year. Sophomore Nicole DelSanto, who won the sophomore level with an invite-record 110-0, threw 116-7 April 6.

"I love seeing her throw," Blackwell said. "You just have to keep staying positive [to qualify] and pushing through with whatever is going on with your life, with school."

York junior Lydia Hickey anchored the fourth-place 1,600 relay with juniors Bella Walker and Marissa Chavez and sophomore Sydney Malaga (4:14.28) and fifth-place 3,200 relay with juniors Emma Kern and Abby Moriarty and senior Sarah Pinkowski (11:28.52). Senior Sarah May was fifth in the 3,200 (11:28.52). Hickey, Kern and

May return from last year's all-state ninth-place 3,200 relay.

"This is normally where we are at this meet [timewise]," Hickey said. "I've wanted to do better than I have been doing. But I'm still pushing."

For Class 2A Wheaton Academy, senior Alyssa Mantia was ninth in just her second 3,200 (11:51.19). The 2A state-qualifying standard is 11:44.25. A four-year volleyball player, Mantia joined track as a junior sprinter. She'll compete in track – and cross country for the first time – at Wheaton College.

"My friends were doing [track], so I was like, 'I'll try it,'" Mantia said. "Hopefully I can work hard and that'll pay off [with state]."

Glenbard West senior Huda Husaini (100 in 12.75) and junior Ashley Samuta (36-2 in triple jump) were second and on the second-place 800 relay (1:45.88) and third-place 400 relay (50.37) with sophomore Kate Morrison and freshman Kyrah Maas. Collier tied for second in high jump (5-1).

Hall of Fame Colts lineman Marchetti dies

BALTIMORE — Gino Marchetti, a Hall of Fame defensive end who helped the Baltimore Colts win consecutive NFL championships in the late 1950s, has died.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame said Marchetti was 93. He died Monday at Paoli Hospital in Paoli, Pa., hospital spokeswoman Mary Kate Coghlan said.

Marchetti was named to the Pro Bowl during 11 of his 14 NFL seasons. Though undersized for the position by today's standards — 6-foot-4, 244-pounds — Marchetti effectively tracked down quarterbacks and stuffed the run.

"I was small, but big guys never scared me," he once said. "I was quick and agile."

In terms of stature, Marchetti was enormous.

"They called him Gino the Giant because he was one of the biggest people in the league," former NFL general manager Ernie Accorsi said. "He was quick, he had great athleticism, and he would just throw you."

Gino John Marchetti was born in 1926 in Smithers, West Virginia. He broke into the NFL as an offensive lineman in 1952 with the Dallas Texans, who became the Colts in 1953.

After being moved to the other side of the line, Marchetti became a star.

With Marchetti charging from the left side, the Colts were NFL champions in 1958 and 1959. He broke his leg in the fourth quarter of the so-called "Greatest Game Ever Played" — the sudden-death duel between the Colts and New York Giants in 1958 — but refused to be taken into the locker room.

He watched from behind the end zone until agreeing to being taken to the locker room early in overtime, a concession to the freezing temperatures and fear that the crowd would rush onto the field at game's

end. Not long after that, Johnny Unitas guided the Colts to the winning touchdown to end a 23-17 duel that came to be known as "The Greatest Game Ever Played."

"Though sacks were not recognized as a statistic in those days, Marchetti brought fear to quarterbacks.

"I've been asked the most sacks I had in one game. I know I had nine," he once said. "It's a great feeling because it was a challenge, 1-on-1. You feel like, 'Man, I got him. I got him.'"

Marchetti was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1972 along with college teammate Ollie Matson.

"Rest in peace, Gino Marchetti," Colts owner Jim Irsay posted on Twitter. "The son of immigrants — and a veteran of the Battle of the Bulge against the Nazis — Marchetti was one of the greatest to play the game, Gino was a player who helped turn the nation's attention toward the 'new sport' on television."

Marchetti fought in the Battle of the Bulge in World War II before playing for the 1951 University of San Francisco team that went 9-0.
