Working with partner agencies, Gayon has also assisted with projects to enhance habitat for other endangered and threatened species, helped raise and release pollinators, including Monarch butterflies, and worked at a local wildlife rehabilitation facility helping care for injured and orphaned animals. Gayon is planning to attend Carthage College in Kenosha, Wisc.

Fenton boys track team fares well at MSC Red meet

Cabral, Herrerin and Deckert named all-conference

The Fenton boys track team enjoyed some top-notch individual performances at the recent Metro Suburban Conference Red Division meet.

Javier Cabral took second in the 400 at 52.81 and was seventh in the 200 at 23.94. Both were personal records. Cabral earned all-MSR Red honors.

Nick Herrerin was second in the 300 hurdles (43.5) and seventh in the 110 hurdles. His 300 time was a personal record. Herrerin also earned all-conference accolades.

Jimmy Deckert took second in the discus throw at 131-9 1/2 and was fourth in the shot put with a personal record of 42-10. He also was all-MSR Red.

Jimmy Palumbo earned a personal record in the 1,600 at 4:49.99 as did Liam McCaluley at 5:54.51.

"We competed well in our conference meet with some strong performances," said Fenton coach Clint Porter.

Porter also was encouraged by his team's performance at the frosh-soph level. "We also have some very good newcomers slash future stars at the frosh-soph level," he said.

Sophomore Quinn Wilcoxon won the shot put and the discus titles with marks of 37-7 1/2 in the shot and 102-11 in the discus. "Quinn is new to track and field this year," said Porter. "He is an athlete we look forward to watching develop in the next two years."

Sophomore Juan Carlos Sosa took third in the frosh-soph 400 at 57.62, which is just off his season best of 57.31. He also was a member of the varsity 400 relay team that took fifth.

Freshman Kasper Widlo was third in the frosh-soph 200 with a personal record of 25.34. He also anchored the 400 relay and was the lead off for the frosh-soph 800 relay team that took second.

Sophomore Matt Sisto won the frosh-soph 3,200 in 11:05.96 and took third in the frosh-soph 1,600 with a time of 5:03.94. "Matt was incredible," said Porter.

Freshman Ryan Rebolledo was fourth in the frosh-soph 400 in 59.34 and also was a member of several Fenton relays this year.

Addison Trail boys track team competes in WSC Gold meet

Blazers earn numerous first-place finishes at frosh-soph level

The Addison Trail boys track team has seen steady progress this season, according to coach Jim Ziebkka.

Heading into the recent West Suburban Conference Gold Division meet, Ziebkka noted the Blazers have set at least 20 personal records in every meet except one, and in that contest they had 18.

"Our team is comprised primarily of young guys so we had to have a lot of the young guys competing on the varsity level," he explained. "I have been very pleased with their progress throughout the season. Our upperclassmen have been pushed by the younger guys all year. Depth has proven to be a bit of an issue but we have been able to mitigate the ups and downs well. We have a solid core of team-first guys who show up to work hard every day in practice. The future

looks good if these guys can maintain the same level of drive that has carried them through this point in the season.

Senior Cesar Herrera has been a top performer in the 110 and 300 hurdles as well as the 1,600 relay. Junior Jonathan Ramos has competed well in the 3,200 and 1,600 relays as well as the 800.

Junior Quincy Gunnerson has been a key in the triple jump and the 800 and 1,600 relays, while junior Sulaimon Ahmed has starred in the triple and long jumps, as well as the 800 and 400 relays.

Sophomore Dylan Moran has set school records for the 3,200 both indoors and outdoors, and also has performed well in the 1,600.

Other key performers for the Blazers include sophomore Cole Greaves (3,200, 1,600 relays and 400), sophomore Horfanél Vivero (400), freshman Alex Martinez (3,200 and 1,600

runs), freshman John Taci (400 and 1,600 relay) and freshman Patrick Campbell (long and triple jumps).

At the recent WSC Gold meet at Hinsdale South, Sergio Serna took 12th in the 100 with a time of 12.52. He was seventh in the 200 at 24.46. Taci was sixth in the 400 at 55.83, while Ramos was sixth in the 800 at 2:07.17.

Moran was seventh in the 1,600 with a time of 4:49.38. He took fourth in the 3,200 at 10:05.88.

Herrera was fourth in the 110 hurdles in 16.87. He also was fourth in the 300 hurdles at 43.92. Addison Trail was sixth in the 400 relay in 49.54 with Eddy Espinoza, Jaden Wease, Gunnerson and Serna.

The 800 relay team of Ahmed, Wease, Gunnerson and Serna took sixth at 1:39.24 and the 1,600 relay team of Taci, Greaves, Gunnerson and Herrera was seventh in 3:49.25. The

3,200 relay team took fifth in 9:11.89 with Taci, Greaves, Ramos and Lukas Rodriguez.

Sal Napoli was 11th in the shot put at 34-1 1/2. He also was 10th in the discus with a throw of 97-0. Ahmed was 12th in the long jump at 17-4. He also was eighth in the triple jump at 37-1.

Frosh-soph conference meet highlights included Morri Bernardo taking fifth in the 400 at 59.62. Martinez was fourth in the 1,600 at 4:57.18.

Martinez won the frosh-soph 3,200 title in 10:39.92. His next closest competitor was 10:49.98.

Hanza Kittaneh won the 110 hurdles with a time of 17.59. He was second in the 300 hurdles at 45.76.

Raul Villarreal was second in the high jump at 5-4, while Robert Roszkiewicz was fourth at 5-2.

Campbell won the triple jump frosh-soph title at 39-4 1/2.

Warriors post 20 runs in two contests; Knudtson has 2 homers, 6 RBI against Taft

The Willowbrook softball team moved its overall mark to 15-8 on the season with a pair of recent wins against Chicago Taft and Fenton.

In a 12-0 win against Taft, Willowbrook scored eight runs in the bottom of the fourth and had 12 hits

in the game.

Annamarie Knudtson went 3-for-4 with two runs scored, a double, two home runs and six RBI. Amy Bussa went 2-for-3 with two runs scored.

Emma Barrington went 3-for-3 with two runs scored. Caitlyn Kulczynski went 1-for-1 with two runs scored, an RBI and two walks. Kayla Neff had a hit, a run scored and two RBI.

Shannon Knudtson went 1-for-2 with two runs scored and two RBI. Katie Pettinger had a hit, a run scored and an RBI.

Kulczynski had a double, while Barrington hit a triple. Kulczynski struck out five and allowed two hits over five innings to pick up the win. Willowbrook also downed Fenton 8-2. The Warriors had 10 hits. Bussa went 1-for-4 with a run scored and an RBI.

Barrington had a hit and a run scored. Kulczynski had two hits and three runs scored. Neff had two hits and an RBI, while Shannon Knudtson had two hits, a run scored and three RBI. Mikayla Tomaszewski had a hit and a run scored, while Perry had a hit and two RBI.

Barrington, Bussa and Knudtson each doubled. Perry had a triple.

Neff was the winning pitcher. She struck out nine over seven innings and allowed two hits.

Coach Rachel Karos lauded the recent work of Caroline Dooley, who was the winning pitcher in a game against Morton and came up big on defense with a diving catch against Leyden. "Caroline is hitting the ball hard," said Karos. "She homered against Addison Trail."

Kulczynski threw a no-hitter against Addison Trail recently

and a one-hitter against Leyden. Annamarie Knudtson hit .455 during a recent stretch with seven RBI that also included a home run against Addison Trail. Barrington hit .500 during a recent one-week timeframe.

Karos also was pleased with the pitching during a recent stretch of games where Dooley and Kulczynski didn't give up a run. She's also seen progress at the plate and in the field.

"We are hitting well and more importantly able to drive in runs at the right time," Karos said recently. "We definitely are playing better defense lately and doing a better job at getting outs when our pitchers do their jobs to get our defense grounders and popups. We have been playing much better all-around softball."

Through the first 16 games of the season, Bussa and Kulczynski were leading the team in hits with 23 each. Dooley and Barrington each had 19.

Dooley was tops with eight doubles, while Bussa had three triples and Kulczynski had two. Barrington and Annamarie Knudtson each had three home runs, while Dooley and Neff each had two. Annamarie Knudtson and Barrington each had 21 RBI.

Bussa was tops with 19 runs scored, while Samantha Mishlove had 17 runs scored.

Kulczynski was hitting .479, while Barrington was at .475, Annamarie Knudtson was at .451 and Dooley was at .442.

Kulczynski had a 1.63 ERA with 73 strikeouts in 43 1/3 innings of pitching work. Dooley had 56 strikeouts in 38 2/3 innings.

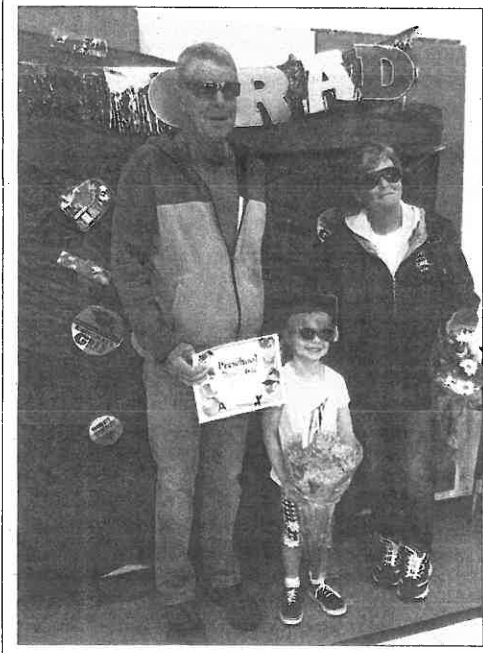

Developer drops plans for Route 83 and St. Charles Road 16-pump gas station-convenience center pulls out

After a group of residents in Elmhurst's Pick Subdivision came together to protest a development project being considered at the northwest corner of Route 83 and St. Charles Road—and after being handed a defeat from the Elmhurst Zoning & Planning Commission—developers of the Ambrose Design Group in Crystal Lake told the City of Elmhurst it was pulling out of the development.

The Pick Subdivision includes the area west of Route 83 to Villa Avenue in Villa Park. The site under consideration was most recently occupied by Back Alley Burger and Krave Restaurant; prior to that, the location had a Kentucky Fried Chicken and an independent restaurant called the Kopper Kettle.

Preliminary site plans were presented to the City's Zoning & Planning Commission (ZPC) by Ambrose Design Group for the site known as 601-609 St. Charles Road.

The Ambrose plan calls for a 16-pump service station, convenience shopping center and a carry-out restaurant, with plans for another drive-thru restaurant sometime in the future.

The Zoning Commission at that time unanimously rejected the plans by a vote of 7-0 (two Commissioners were absent).

Neighbors underscored the concerns that the project would negatively impact neighborhoods and parks, the local water main, storm drainage, Salt Creek, Salt Creek Trail, the Forest Preserve and what they refer to as "an unsafe, 'F' rated, dangerous intersection."

"Let them know that this development will be detrimental, endanger public safety, increase congestion on public streets, and does not stand behind their values," said Jennifer Veremis, who has now spearheaded a neighborhood clean-up of the area to take place some time in the upcoming weeks.

Rams' quest for a fourth straight regional title comes up short

Whitney Young edged Glenbard East 1-0 in a regional final

The Glenbard East girls soccer team felt the sting of a season-ending loss on Friday evening. Whitney Young defeated the Rams 1-0 in an IHSA Class 3A regional final in Lombard. Glenbard East completed the 2019 season with an overall record of 18-5-2.

The Rams had hoped to win a regional title for the fourth consecutive season and continue playing on its home field for another two matches. In addition to hosting a regional this season, Glenbard East is the host site for a sectional. Whitney Young will face York in one of this week's sectional semifinal matches. Lyons Township and Downers Grove South will square off in the other. The semifinal winners will meet in Saturday's sectional final.

Glenbard East's string of three straight regional titles and three straight conference championships both came to an end in 2019. That doesn't mean it wasn't a successful season. The Rams went 7-1-1 in the Upstate Eight Conference this season, finishing second to South Elgin.

Trying to win their fourth straight regional title, the Rams battled Whitney Young to a scoreless tie in the first half. The Dolphins, who improved to 17-6-1 with the win, scored the only goal of the match with about 29 minutes remaining in the second half. Whitney Young scored the goal on a close-range that became available shortly after a corner kick. The Dolphins, who had a strong defensive line in front of a talented goalkeeper, limited the Rams' scoring chances for the rest of the contest.

"It's heartbreaking, obviously, especially for these seniors," said Glenbard East coach Kent Overbey after the loss to Whitney Young. Despite the loss, Overbey said he could not be disappointed with the effort during the match, and the entire season.

"For all these freshmen and sophomores to step up in the way they did is awesome," said Overbey, whose lineup featured several underclass players, including six freshmen. "I can't say enough about the young kids and the senior leadership. I'm just very proud of everybody from top to bottom."

Friday's loss was especially painful for the Rams' three senior co-captains—Amy Chiero, Sam Johnson and Lindsey Novak. As freshmen, the three girls played on the 2016 Glenbard East team that won regional, sectional and super-sectional titles on its way to claiming the third-place trophy in the IHSA Class 3A state tournament. The three seniors, who had just completed

their careers as Rams, were emotional in their post-match comments. They were also gracious and eloquent.

"They [the Dolphins] came out with tons of energy; they wanted it," said Novak. "We really competed and tried to match that energy, which I think we did for a long time."

"I felt we were pretty matched up," said Johnson. "It was just one lucky goal they got. We gave it our all. They just came out really strong. It didn't go our way."

"This team has been so strong," said Chiero. "My past four years, I've been lucky to be a part of that, especially with all the amazing girls surrounding me. They've been great players, great teammates. They've helped me grow so much. They've helped all of us grow."

The three senior co-captains will all play soccer at the collegiate level. Novak will play at North Central College. Johnson will play at Elmhurst College, while Chiero will play at Denison University—Overbey's alma mater—in central Ohio.

"Although we didn't win conference or regionals this year, it's been my favorite year," said Novak. "Although it didn't go in our favor, I don't think I've ever grown as an individual and with a team so much in such a short season."

The Rams advanced to the regional final with a 6-0 win over Chicago-Curie in a regional semifinal match on May 14. Novak and junior Elaine Wesling each scored two goals for the Rams, who held a 3-0 halftime lead. Sophomore Maddie Weltin and freshman Sarah Conroy each provided one goal. Chiero assisted two of Glenbard East's goals. Novak, Weltin and freshman Maia Zatarski each had one assist.

Warriors' season ends with a regional loss

Three days before beating Glenbard East, Whitney Young advanced to the regional final with a 3-0 victory over Willowbrook. The Dolphins grabbed a quick 2-0 lead by scoring a pair of goals in the first four minutes of the match in Lombard. They added their third goal later in the first half.

Willowbrook finished its season with an overall record of 11-10-2.

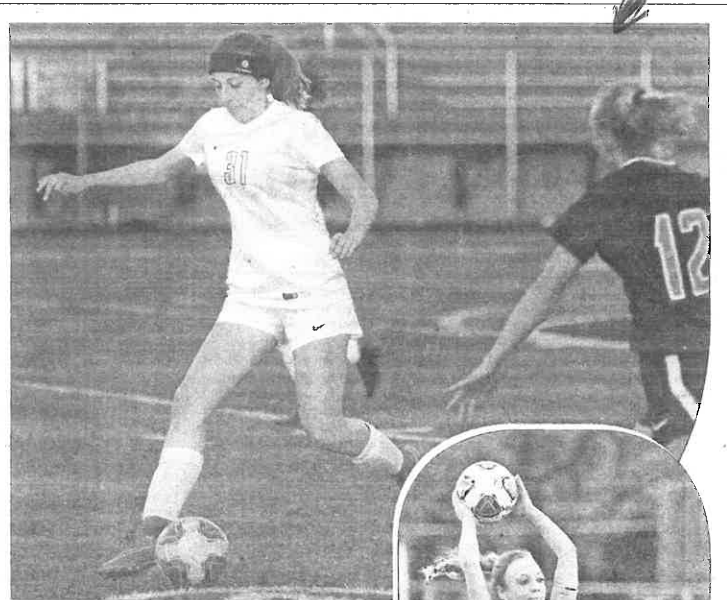
Broncos fall to Lisle in a sectional semifinal

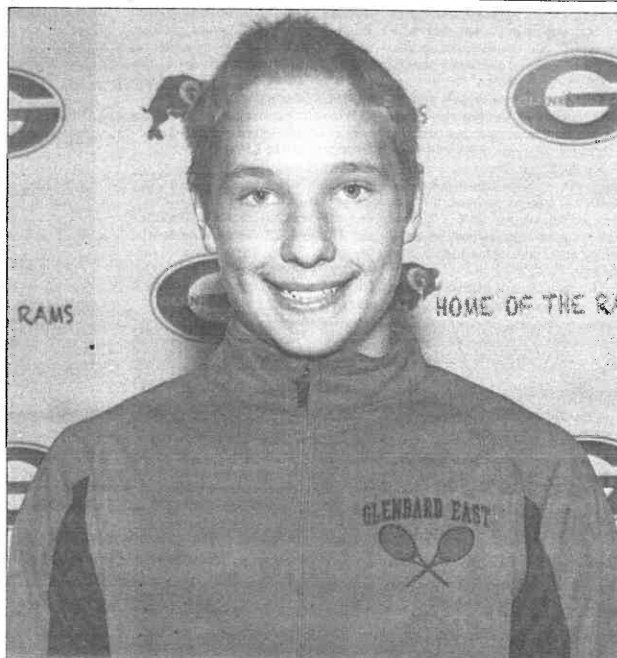
The top 12 runners in Friday's preliminaries advanced to Saturday's final. Palma finished outside of the top 12 and did not move on to

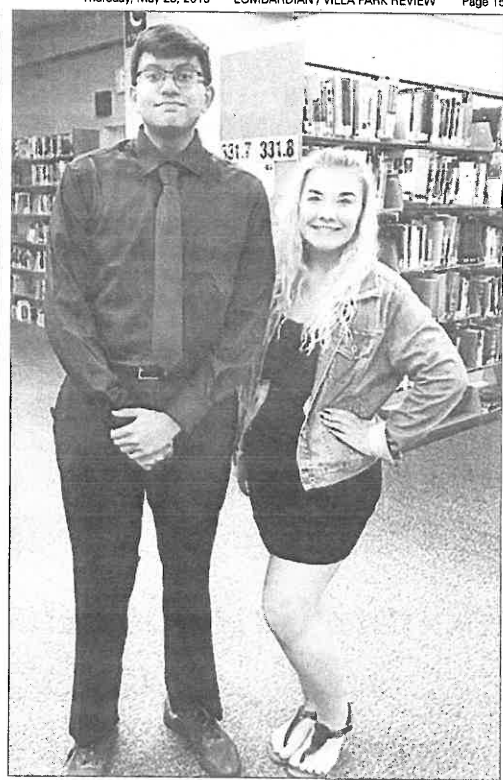

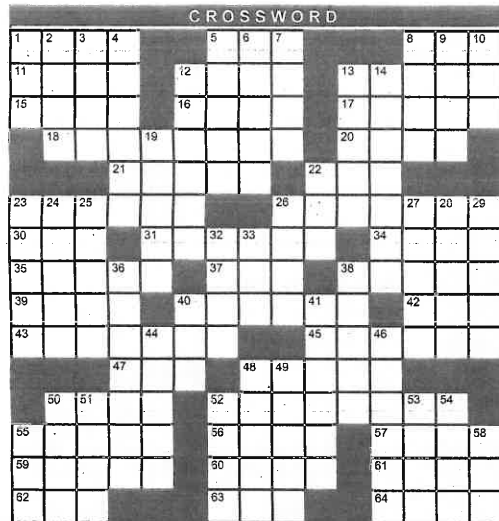
