## Concerns linger over new ownership at Rivers Casir

Kentucky-based Churchill Downs Inc. has completed its \$326 million acquisition of a majority stake in Rivers Casino in Des Plaines despite state gambling regulators concerns that the new ownership group does not include enough women and minorities.

The Illinois Gaming Board gave its initial approval of the sale on March 1, pending the execution of final documents to seal the transaction. At the time, board members said they wanted Churchill Downs to make a 'good faith effort" to bring in more women and minority investors over the next 90 days so they would comprise up to 10 percent of the ownership interest.

Gaming board officials confirmed the transaction was finalized June 4. despite the fact that there had been no stock sales to women and minority investors, something that had been a statutory condition of granting the original license in 2008 to a consortium that included Midwest Gaming and Entertainment LLC, Rush Street Gaming LLC, and a Canadian private equity firm, Clairvest Group Inc.

During a June 13 meeting in Chicago, Illinois Gaming Board Chair-man Donald Tracy said that even though the deal had closed, he wanted the board to continue reviewing the transaction and to take up the issue again at the board's next meeting

Aug. 1.

"And at that board meeting, I hope and expect the board to determine whether or not the ... Churchill Downs effort to sell up to 10 percent to statutory investors was a good faith effort or not," Tracy said.

Tracy made that comment during what turned out to be his final meeting as a member of the board. He has since resigned and Gov. J.B. Pritzker has accepted his resignation.

But it also came about two weeks after the Illinois General Assembly passed legislation, which Pritzker is expected to sign, authorizing the development of six new land-based casinos in Illinois, along with the le-

galization of sports wagering. Rivers Casino is the state's largest and most profitable riverboat casino. In 2018, according to the Gaming Board's most recent annual report, it reported gross revenues of \$441 million, generating \$170 million in revenue for the state, plus another \$25 million in revenue for loca ernments. History of Rivers Casino

Rivers, however, is actually essor to one of the state's or 10 riverboat casinos. Silver Casino, which was located in Dubuque on the Mississippi : It closed in 1997, but its ov known at the time as HP Inc tained the license.

In 1999, amid heavy lobbyi HP. Illinois lawmakers passed lation authorizing the casino to cate to Cook County. That legis also required that women an nority shareholders make up at 20 percent of the ownership in in the enterprise.

Around that time, HP chang name to Emerald Casino Inc., began making plans to develop riverboat casino in Rosemont. In Emerald even began constructi the project before the Gaming 1 had approved it, which inv bringing in new investors, incl some that the Gaming Board

to have ties with organized crin As a result, the Gaming Boa voked Emerald's license in Ja 2001, a decision that was late held by the Illinois Supreme Co

Two years later, the Genera sembly passed a law authorizii Gaming Board to reissue a re license through a kind of bi process. Eventually, in Deca 2008, the board accepted a profrom Midwest Gaming, in larg because of its plan for bringi minority and female investors.

That decision came at the! of the Great Recession when t nancial industry in the United was on the brink of collapse
