The Willowbrook football program then drove 70 yards for a touchdown locked up its fourth straight IHSA to take a 14-0 lead with 5:03 left in playoff berth with Friday's 35-21 victure for the first period. Turnilty scrambled tory over York in Villa Park.

The Warriors, who earned their sixth straight win, improved their overall season record to 6-1 with the victory over the Dukes of the West Suburban Silver Conference.

The Warriors will finish the regular season with a pair of West Suburban Gold Conference contests. Willowbrook, which holds a 4-0 conference mark, will play at Morton (0-7, 0-4) this Friday. The Warriors will complete the regular season with a home game against Proviso East.

Willowbrook won the 2017 and 2018 conference titles with perfect 6-0 records. Victories over Morton and Proviso East will give the Warriors their third straight unblemished conference season.

The Warriors began Friday's game against York with a flurry. Willow-brook received the opening kickoff and needed just four plays to drive 80 yards for a touchdown. Senior Deandre Holliday rushed for 18 yards on the game's

first play from scrimmage.
Senior quarterback Sam Turnilty connected with senior receiver Everett Stubblefield on a 55-yard pass on the next play. One play later, senior Ta'Vion Geanes ran six yards for a touch-down to give the Warriors a 6-0 lead barely one minute into the game, which took place in chilly and clear weather. Sophomore kicker Izzy Manning made the first of her five extra-point kicks to raise Willowbrook's lead to 7-0.

York (3-4) punted the ball away on its first offensive series. The Warriors and threw a 6-yard touchdown pass to senior Alessio Battaglia on a fourthdown play.

"We definitely started off fast," said Tumilty after the game, "We slowed down a little in the middle of the game. Our coaches always preach-start fast, finish fast."

Both teams turned the ball over on interceptions later in the opening quarter. Junior Mohammad Ayesh of the Warriors intercepted a York pass. Willowbrook failed to score on its subsequent drive.

The Warriors scored their third touchdown of the night with 3:34 left in the second quarter. Geanes scored on a short run across the goal line. A 33-yard pass from Turnilty to sophomore Nick Mabutas set up the touch-

The Dukes scored their first touchdown of the night with 32.8 seconds left in the first half. Willowbrook's halftime advantage stood at 21-7.

Geanes scored his third touchdown of the game late in the third quarter. His short burst helped the Warriors to a 28-7 lead with 1:47 left in the third period.

York kept battling in the final quarter, scoring a touchdown to cut Willowbrook's lead to 28-14 with 11:01 to play. The Dukes then intercepted a pass, which helped them begin a drive at the Warriors' 39-yard line. The drive ended when Ayesh broke up a pass near the goal line on a fourth-and-goal play from the 16-yard line.

On offense, Tumilty, a senior, is leading a high-octane group with his pass-

ing and running.
The Warriors have scored at least 32 points in their last five games, including a 35-21 triumph over York on Oct. 11. In total, Willowbrook is averaging a robust 30.1 points heading into this weekend's road contest against winless Morton.

Besides his duties on offense, Tumilty is a game-changing player in the secondary. The Warriors' defense is allowing just 10.7 points per game.

Tumilty added another job to his

workload against York - receiver.

Tumilty hauled in a 65-yard touchdown pass from Everett Stubblefield. He finished with 195 yards passing and 105 yards rushing.

Stubblefield leads the receiving corps with 32 receptions for 645 yards and six touchdowns.

The Warriors (6-1) have won six straight games since losing their opener to Providence. Turnilty said the Warriors, a team not reliant on depth or size, are a tough group with quality players.

"We just have fun and work hard," he said. "We don't have crazy size or a Division I star or any crazy five-star recruits. The biggest thing is we hustle and play fast and execute.'

Turnilty said. "I played some receiver in are also definitely overlooked. Our offensive line is having a great season. They do a great job of holding the pressure and also run blocking. The defensive line flies around and makes stops."

night.

The Warriors held an overall record of 18-15 at the end of Saturday's play.


