treachings of many.

"I have had some different perspectives with coaching," she said. "My mom and her friends have helped me and I have had a lot of other coaches at every age level who have impacted

my career."

During a match, Ceh said there are few better feelings than bringing a

hard-hit ball up.
"It's the feeling of helping your team out when you get that ball up,

especially against a good team," she said. "It doesn't matter where it goes, as long as you get the ball up. It's a feeling of the passion I have for the sport and it's why I love the game so

Ceh would like to play the sport in college, and would like to study to be a nurse or something in the physical

therapy realm.
"I have always wanted to be in the medical field," she said, "Being able

to help people is a good feeling."


