## Historical society exhibit to feature local amusement nostalgia the exhibit, but Shanahan says the

To paraphrase Jeff Foxworthy, you just might be a "local" if you remember this jingle: "Any ride a quarter; six for a dollar."

That's what the commercial for Dispensa's Kiddie Kingdom was boasting to attract kids and families to the Oakbrook Terrace amusement park - which has a place in local history that the Oakbrook Terrace Historical Society will bring to life in an upcoming exhibit.

According to a history of Dispensa's Kiddie Kingdom and Castle of Toys, Italian immigrant Nicholas S. Dispensa worked for the railroad, then become a shoemaker and landfill hauler before going into the carnival business.

The history describes how Nicho-las, known as N.S., played in a circus band and noticed how people were lining up to ride the Ferris wheel.

He and his cousin Nick bought one in 1919 and would haul it from circus to circus in N.S.'s Mack truck.

The Dispensas ended up buying repossessed carnival rides to expand their carnival business, and in 1945 went into the tent and merchandise business to expand even further, the history relates, called Dispensa's Amusement Rides and Dispensa's Merchandising Company. The name changed to Dispensa and Sons Complete Carnivals in 1951.

It was truly a family business: Sons, wives and children worked for the family business in some capacity, among them being N.S.'s son John Dispensa Sr., grandson John Dispensa Jr., and great-grandsons John III, Randy and Bryce Dispensa.

Randy worked in the business, saying although it was fun, "We never had summers off," while working in the carnival business.

The history shows that N.S. retired, and the Dispensas, including John Jr.'s brother Nicholas, began selling merchandise from a building they owned in Hinsdale, and in 1953 moved their operations to Oakbrook Terrace where, according to John III, the family had owned 25 acres

of land -later taken by eminent domain for the construction of a Route 83 interchange between Roosevelt and Butterfield roads.

John. III said the business added on to its warehouse in 1956 to store merchandise.

Customers followed the Dispensas to their new location and the origins Dispensa's Castle of Toys began.

The toy store operated from 1967-85. The amusement park opened in 1975 (John said the carnival business closed in 1977) and closed in 1984.

Randy said by then, the land just north of Oakbrook Center mall had become worth more than the business, and operations closed for

Bob Shanahan, director of the Oakbrook Terrace Historical Society said he saw a recent exhibit about historic amusement parks at the Elmhurst Historical Museum and "They had a little section on Dispensa's

Kiddie Kingdom."
He said that sparked the idea for an exhibit featuring the iconic land-mark, although, "We've always had a small display" on the amusement park/toy store.

John III said the Oakbrook Terrace Park District also hosted a small exhibit as part of the village's 50th anniersary in 2008.

Shanahan said the Elmhurst Historical Society loaned a display case and some memorabilia, as well as connected the Oakbrook Terrace Historical Society with John III, who is "really going all out for us" to help organize the exhibit.

T've always been interested in history," said John III, adding that there is "so much memorabilia our family collected over the years."

When he found out the Oakbrook Terrace Historical Society was interested in creating the exhibit, "I was very impressed and excited that they

Randy said he knew that many of the amusement park's and toy store's items had been auctioned off, including a 1937 truck that is on display in an Iowa museum, and two trucks he said are "rotting away" in a field in



Dispensa's Kiddie Kingdom and Castle of Toys was what could be considered a destination location in Oakbrook Terrace, just north of Oakbrook Center mall. The toy store operated from 1967-85, and the

amusement park operated from 1975-84. Its jingle boasted: "Any ride a quarter; six for a dollar."

However, two of the six tall soldiers that stood guard in front of the store (John III said there were "spares") are still in the area, thanks to Villa Park resident Rocky Hayes, who related how his former boss found them at a gas station in northwest Indiana roughly 20 years ago, and displayed them at his home in Lake Zurich. Hayes said he bought them about 10 years ago for his parents, who in turn displayed them at their Winfield home. The fiberglass soldiers stand some 16 feet tall and come in three sections.

Hayes took them over last year and brought them out over the Christmas

Although he grew up not too far from Dispensa's, Hayes wasn't quite

sure at first what he had, but "My dad knew right away. He actually started looking them up," Hayes continued. However, "We weren't positive

until the Dispensas showed up last year," Hayes said with a chuckl

Randy remembers being told that someone in Villa Park had two of the soldiers, and when he found out where Hayes lived, he drove to Vil-la Park and "I knocked on the guy's

"He couldn't believe it," Randy added, with John III saying he, too, visited Hayes' home to verify the authenticity.

Although they have weathered with time, and needed some repairs, From far away they still look great, Hayes mentioned.

Hayes is loaning the soldiers for

exhibit goes beyond artifacts on display, because people who lived in the area like to share memories of the unique castle and amusement park.

Hearing the stories, the director said, just shows how "everybody's got a connection to this."

In talking with Shanahan, his tone of voice gets animated as he describes the upcoming exhibit, com-menting, "You can tell we're excited about this!"

We put a lot of time and effort into the business to make it successful," John III emphasized. "I'm just committed to trying to preserve the family business history ... [some] that people may not know [about]."

His family members, he said proudly, were "famous for being

pioneers in the [toy and amusement park] industry.

The exhibit will be on display at the Oakbrook Terrace Historical Society, 17W245 16th St., now through Nov. 16. Hours are Monday through Thursday, 3-7 p.m., and Saturdays from 1-3 p.m.

Admission is free but donations

will be accepted.
On Nov. 11, from 7:30-9 p.m., John III will speak about the Dispensa history at the Oakbrook Terrace City Council Chambers, 17W275 Butterfield Road.

He said there will be stories of tragedy, joy and humor, in honor of what would have been the 100th anniversary of his great-grandfather's carnival business.

## Bill to ban vaping in public places passes Senate

#### Measure would add e-cigarettes to Smoke Free Illinois Act

A bill looping electronic cigarettes into the Smoke Free Illinois Act passed the Senate on Oct. 29.

Sponsored by Îndian Creek Democratic Sen. Terry Link, the measure includes vapes, e-cigars, e-hookahs and other such devices in the existing ban on smoking inside and within 15 feet of the entrance to

"It's only fair that we treat these products the same way we treat cigarettes," Link said in a news release. It's still unclear what the health effects of these devices are and people shouldn't be forced to be exposed to them in public places if they don't want to."

According to the Illinois Department of Public

Health, more than 150 people have been sickened

with lung injuries resulting from the first-hand inhalation of chemicals from vaping. Two Illinois residents have died.

The legislation, Senate Bill 1864, passed by a vote of 41-11. It received bipartisan support.

Democratic Rep. Ann Williams, from Chicago, is

the House sponsor. It is unclear when it will receive a committee hearing or receive consideration by the full chamber.

Vicki Vasconcellos, president of the Smoke Free Alternatives Coalition of Illinois, said last week at a news event the findings in the current law apply only to smoking traditional cigarettes-not vaping.

"The Smoke Free Act has nothing to do with vaping, and it isn't that we do not believe it's rude to vape indoors, because I think most of us would agree that it is, but we would need finding," she said.

Vasconcellos questioned why vaping, which she said presents a lesser health risk than smoking traditional cigarettes, would be put in a bill "that's all about the dangers of smoking.

"It just doesn't make any sense," she said.

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## Warriors kick off playoffs with

## Three touchdowns apiece for Tumilty and Geanes; Warriors will play a second-round home game against Yorkville on Saturday

The Willowbrook football team opened the 2019 post-season with Friday's 48-21 victory over Moline in an IHSA Class 7A contest in Villa

The Warriors, who have won nine straight games, improved to 9-1. They will play another home playoff game this Saturday. Willowbrook will face Yorkville (8-2) in Villa Park. The kickoff is scheduled for 1 p.m. Yorkville advanced to the second round with a 37-0 victory over

Thornton Fractional South.

If the Warriors beat Yorkville, they will earn the program's fourth straight trip to the quarterfinal round of the playoffs. Willowbrook would face either Hersey or Lake Zurich in this year's quarterfinals.

"We came out and set the tone right away," said Willowbrook coach Nick Hildreth after the first-round win over the Maroons.

Senior quarterback Sam Tumilty and senior running back Ta'Vion Geanes each scored three touchdowns in the win over Moline (5-5). The Warriors held a 14-0 lead after one quarter. Their lead stood at 28-14 at halftime. Willowbrook scored the first two touchdowns of the second half to hike its lead to 41-14.

Tumilty piled up 222 rushing yards against Moline, Geanes picked up 138 rushing yards.

"Both of them ran well," said Hildreth of the two seniors, "Sam did a good job improvising when things break down, which he always does. Ta'Vion really came on strong and ran the ball hard as the game went

Geanes scored the Warriors' first touchdown on a 7-yard run. About two minutes later, Tumilty broke a 55-yard touchdown run. Sophomore kicker Izzy Manning, who made six of seven extra-point attempts during the game, added the conversion kick after Tumilty's long run to push the lead to 14-0.

Moline scored its first touchdown on an 85-yard pass in the second quarter; the extra-point kick cut the Warriors' lead to 14-7. Tumilty helped the Warriors regain the momentum by breaking his second 55yard touchdown run of the night.

Moline scored a touchdown with about two minutes left in the first half to cut Willowbrook's lead to 21-14. Tumilty broke a run of about 40 yards on the ensuing drive to set up his third touchdown run of the night-a 1-yard run with about 45 seconds left in the first half. Manning's extra-point kick gave the War-riors a 28-14 advantage.

Tumilty threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to senior Everett Stubblefield with less than five minutes left in the third quarter. Geanes scored on a 1-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter to increase the Warriors' lead to 41-14.

"I think it's great that we have both our run game and our pass game going," said Tumilty following the win. 'It all starts on the front line. We have some great linemen setting everything up for us."

Moline scored its third and final

touchdown of the night with about three minutes left in the game. Moments later, after senior Alessio Battaglia recovered Moline's onside kick. Geanes broke a 45-yard touchdown run down the middle of the field.

The Warrlors earned their ninth straight win with Friday's victory and improved their overall season record to 9-1. Willowbrook will play a second-round playoff game against Yorkville this Saturday in Villa Park.

Senior standout quarterback Sam Turnilty ran for 222 yards and three touchdowns and passed for 135 more yards and one touchdown. Senior Ta'Vion Geanes ran for 138 yards on 17 carries and scored three times. Willowbrook averaged 10.9 yards per carry against Moline.

Turnilty has now passed for 2,039 yards (21 TDs, 5 interceptions) and run for 1,146 yards (15 rushing touchdowns). Geanes is up to 631 yards and eight scores. Tumilty's two favorite receivers are seniors Everett Stubblefield III (46 catches, 934 yards, 11 TDs) and Deandre Holliday (33

catches, 649 yards, 7 TDs).

The Yorkville Foxes play out of the Southwest Prairie Conference West Division. The Foxes did not win the conference, finishing third behind champion Minooka and second-place Oswego. Of the Foxes' eight wins, five came against teams with regular-season winning records. In fact, their last five games have been against teams with winning records (3-2 record

Thornton Fractional South, Yorkville's first-round opponent, was 6-3, but had only played three teams with winning records during the regular

Up next: The winner of this game heads to the 7A quarterfinals against either No. 4 seed Hersey (9-1) or No. 20 seed Lake Zurich (7-3). Either way, if Willowbrook wins this contest, it will head to Arlington Heights or Lake Zurich in the quarterfinals. Hersey will have hosted only once and would be the higher seed (4 vs. 5) and Lake Zurich will have hosted only once compared to Willowbrook's two home playoff games. Lake Zurich upset No. 13 Andrew 14-7 in the first round. Hersey steamrolled No. 29 Rockford Auburn 49-0.

Mason also lauded the development of junior Grace Reckamp.



## Local youth take part in Sleep Out Saturday

#### County-wide event builds awareness of Bridge Communities

Drive past First United Methodist Church in Elmhurst Saturday evening, Nov. 2, and you will see approximately 20 cardboard boxes on its lawn at Church and York streets. Each box contains a teen or young adult participating in Sleep Out Saturday, a DuPage county-wide event that builds awareness and raises funds for the Bridge Communities transitional housing program. Approximately 1000 participants throughout DuPage County will spend this chilly November night sleeping outside to call awareness to homeless families.

Lisa Rodgers, Director of Youth Ministries at First Methodist Church, who has run her youth group's Sleep out Saturday for the past 11 years, feels it is one of their most impactful

"People don't realize there is a homeless problem in DuPage County - particularly here in Elmhurst where you don't see homeless people out on the street - the hidden homeless, said Rogers. "Our homeless education includes activities, games, and discussions, which help dispel preconceived notions about the homeless We learn why families are homeless, what the family may experience, and how Bridge helps homeless families in our communities, Hearing stories from Bridge graduates is a very valuable experience for the group."

#### Bridge resident tells her own story

One Bridge graduate, Markeeta, shared her personal story of homelessness and inspired the youth group, and all who hear her story, to donate funds to Bridge. Markeeta became homeless in 2011, after fleeing an abusive home with her two-year-old daughter. Though she

worked as a certified nurse assistant, Markeeta did not earn enough to rent an apartment. For two years, she and her daughter moved from couch to couch, living with friends, boyfriends, and relatives. In 2013, Markeeta's mom told her about Bridge Communities, located in Glen Ellyn.

"I had three interviews with Bridge to see if I qualified. In my first interview (February of 2014) I had to tell my whole life story," she

After telling her story, Markeeta realized she never had a childhood and had always had a hard, unstable life.

"During my second interview, I need to show I could manage a budget - a key factor in being successful in the program," she said. "This included paying my bills and credit card debt, and negotiating bills with my creditors.

Kartje is rector of the University of Saint Mary of the Lake, also known as Mundelein Seminary.





The Willowbrook football team finished off its third consecutive unblemished West Suburban Gold Conference season with Friday's 44-6 home victory over Proviso East. The decisive win in the regular-season finale gave the Warriors their third straight 6-0 campaign in conference

Three of the Pirates' forfeits came in conference games against Addison Trail, Leyden and Morton. The forfeits, which were announced a couple of days before the game against Willowbrook, flipped



Gov. J.B. Pritzker's Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity recently introduced a fivevear economic plan, focusing on six industries that can boost the state's economy and a variety of programs to build its workforce and encourage population growth.

It's the first such plan since former Democratic Gov. Pat Ouinn released his in July 2014, when he declared, "Illinois is in the midst of a resur-

"Over the past five years, the state has battled back from the worst financial crisis in seven decades to put the economy on a positive trajectory," Quinn said in his 2014 plan.

Pritzker had similar sentiments in this year's plan. He touted his first seven months in office and emphasized the passage of a \$45 billion capital infrastructure plan, legalized

recreational marijuana and sports gambling, and the passage of several pro-business reforms.

"For the first time in nearly two decades, we've seen simultaneous strong job growth in every region of the state," Pritzker wrote in the plan's executive summary. "Underlying my vision is the fundamental principle of equity. No matter their zip code, every Illinoisan deserves economic opportunity. Where in the past sus-tainable and inclusive economic development has been elusive, instead I am committed to reinvigorating the most important foundational element of Illinois' economy: our diverse and talented workforce.

The report, which serves as a loose guiding document rather than binding public policy, also listed challenges to overcome, including outmigration.

"Illinois has experienced a mild outbound migration of approximately 0.3 percent on average for the pas five years," according to the repor "This trend is driven particularly b migration among young people, mi

norities, and rural populations."

The Illinois Board of Higher Ed ucation reported this year that 48. percent of Illinois public high schoo graduates who enrolled in a four year institution in 2017 chose an out of-state institution.

Pritzker's plan calls for a 50 per cent funding increase for Monetar Award Program grants from 201 levels by fiscal year 2023. Thosgrants go to college students tha have a financial need and help then attend college in Illinois.

The report added: "New busines creation in communities of color an a downstate revitalization effort un dertaken since the beginning of 2019 are intended to reverse outmigration in communities that have historically suffered disinvestment.

## Vaping industry opposes flavored product ban

#### Conroy legislation scheduled for hearing Monday has stakeholder opposition

Vaping and other industry stake-holders opposing legislation banning flavored products said Oct. 24 the bill would have negative health and economic impacts.

Democratic Villa Park State Rep. Deb Conroy's Flavored Tobacco Ban Act would outlaw the sale or distribution of nicotine products with a "distinguishable taste or aroma.

It applies to cigarettes, cigars, hookahs, chewing tobacco, vape pods and other products. The bill was set for consideration when lawmakers returned to the statehouse Monday for the fall veto session.

natives Coalition and vape business owners said during a news event at the Capitol that prohibition would 'drive well over 100,000 Illinois adults back to smoking traditional cigarettes" and devastate their busi-

"We are not big tobacco. We started this business to keep adult smokers off combustible cigarettes, and flavored e-liquid makes up 98 percent of our business because adult smokers prefer flavors," said Tim Teml, co-owner of That 1 Vape in Joliet. 'Our biggest fear is that the temptation of easily-available cigarettes will drive them back to smoking without

When Gov. J.B. Pritzker signed a gambling expansion bill into law, it included language that enacted a 15 percent wholesale tax on e-cigarettes. It took effect July 1, and is the first time the state taxed the product. The revenue collected will be used to help fund a new capital infrastructure plan-

Also included in that law is a \$1 hike in the cigarette tax, to \$2.98 per pack. Josh Sharp, executive vice president of the Illinois Petroleum Marketers Association and Association of Convenience Stores, said the money Illinois collects from that tax increase is earmarked for the same improvement projects.

The Department of Public Health allocates other revenues collected from the tobacco usage tax toward a cessation program and Medicaid.

Banning flavored tobacco products, Sharp said, is a "tremendously bad deal financially" for the state.

He added this legislation is a product of lawmakers attempting to address the growing number of severe respiratory illnesses related to vap-

ing.
"I don't really think it fixes the problem it's intended to solve," Sharp said. "If you want to fix vaping, fix the vaping issue.

According to the Department of Public Health, 153 people in Illinois have been sickened with lung injuries resulting from the inhalation of chemicals from vaping. Forty-one others are being examined to see if their illnesses are related. Two Illi-

Each of them reported using either an e-cigarette or other product such as THC. There are more than 50 products and devices linked to the state's cases, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control.

Teml said he does not think lawmakers are "educated" on this issue.

"I think it's our job, and that's exactly why we're here today. ... It's not that they're overreaching-it's that a lot of them just don't know what's going on," Teml said. "They don't know our industry."

The Smoke Free Alternatives Coalition made its plea to lawmakers the same day U.S. Sen. Dick Durbin, a Democrat, called for an update from the Food and Drug Administration on its pending flavored e-cigarette product ban.

The administration issued a news release Sept. 11 about its plans to publish a compliance policy to "tackle the epidemic of youth e-cigarette use." It has not distributed an update

"Six weeks ago, FDA finally announced a ban on e-cigarette flavors, including mint and menthol-a move that I have called on the FDA to make for years," Durbin said in a news release. "It is past time for the FDA to put into effect what they announced weeks ago, and what they should have done years ago."
