### Isaac Gaines, Willowbrook ride fast start past Metea Valley

VILLA PARK – Playing fast doesn't necessarily mean playing clean.

As the boys basketball season progresses, though, Willowbrook aims for both.

On Dec. 10, the Warriors settled for one of the two – playing fast – in a 71-59 nonconference victory over Metea Valley in Villa Park.

"We like to play fast, get steals and get out and run," said Warriors guard Isaac Gaines, who scored eight of his 13 points in the first quarter. "We've been trying to figure each other out early in the season, but I feel like we're starting to get some chemistry together."

For now, Willowbrook (4-2) will accept 15 turnovers if it comes with 25 forced turnovers by Metea Valley (3-5). Thirteen in the first half allowed the Warriors to build a double-digit lead.

Once the Mustangs started taking better care of the ball in the opening minutes of the fourth quarter, they made a run. Three times they pulled to within six points, but a 13-2 Willowbrook burst put the outcome to rest.

Playing fast also means playing on the fly for Willowbrook football players Everett Stubblefield III, Sam Tumilty and others. Last week was their first full week of practice together and also marked the return of fellow football player Deandre Holliday, who missed the Thanksgiving tournament because of injury.

With 6-foot-7 sophomore Sean Paige growing accustomed to varsity speed, it's been a lot to take in for the Warriors early in the season.

Still, Stubblefield and Tumilty scored 17 points apiece and Paige had 14 points and seven rebounds. Myles Leavy led Metea Valley with 17 points and Tahj Morgan added 10 points for the Mustangs.

"We prefer to get in a track meet, but obviously you're more likely to turn over the bail when you're playing like that," Willowbrook coach Chris Perkins said. "As long as we're forcing other teams to do it at a higher rate, that gives us a better opportunity to pull out wins."

Warriors girls basketball team wins two games

The Willowbrook girls gymnas tics team dropped last week's 136.0-118.6 West Suburban Conference Gold Division meet to the Downers Grove co-op team.

At the varsity level of the Dec. 4 meet, sophomore Tess Placek took third on vault with an 8.95 score. Junior Riley Wieringa was seventh at 8.30

Placek took third on bars at 8.20, while Wieringa was sixth at 7.75. Placek was fifth on beam at 8.00, while junior Alexis Fitzgerald was seventh at 7.10.

Placek took second on floor at 8.25, while Fitzgerald was sixth at 7.35. Placek finished third in the allaround scoring at 33.4, while junior Maeve Costello was fourth at 28.8.

At the JV 1 level, Willowbrook freshman Molly Morris won the vault competition at 8.40. Freshman Hanna Mitrick was second at 8.00.

Freshman Sarah Ball won the bars competition with a score of 7.70. Ball also was fifth in the all-around scoring at 28.6.
In the JV 2 meet, Willowbrook

sophomore Alyssa Lorann was third on vault at 7.20.

#### Girls basketball

The Willowbrook girls basketball team concluded a busy week by going 2-1 in their first three West Suburban Conference Gold Division contests of the season. The Warriors' overall season record stood at 5-4 at the end of the week.

In a 60-42 loss to Proviso East on Dec. 3, Willowbrook trailed 19-10 after the first quarter and 37-18 at

"Connor has looked real strong," said Wahlgren. "We're excited to see what he will do."

### Hard work pays off for Warriors' Dasbach Junior putting up big numbers

Putting up double-digit numbers in points and rebounds is no easy feat in the game of basketball. For Willowbrook

junior Stephanie Dasbach, that feat is starting to become commonplace-her active nature around the basket helping make her a key cog for coach Terry Harrell's Warriors squad.

In a three-game stretch last week, Dasbach totaled 14 points and 15 rebounds in a game against Proviso East. She then provided 11 points and 11 rebounds in Friday's West Suburban Gold Conference win over Addison Trail. Dasbach completed the week with 12 points and 15 rebounds in Saturday's conference

win over Leyden. Those double-doubles came on the heels of some impressive outings at the Warriors' own Thanksgiving tournament, including an impressive 34-point, 22-rebound performance in a win over Plainfield

Dasbach scored 22 points and grabbed nine rebounds against East Aurora, 17 points and 12 rebounds against Lockport, 11 points and nine rebounds vs. Stevenson, and 10 points and 11 rebounds in the

Warriors' season-opening non-conference win against Glenbard North.
"I worked a lot in the offseason in practice and during the summer with my coaches," Dasbach said. "They really helped me develop new skills and work on old ones."

Dasbach also played this summer with the Illinois Rockets AAU team that practices out of Glenbard South.
"That helped me, too," she said.

When asked to assess the strongest part of her game, Dasbach replied: "My rebounding and my put-backs," she said. "My teammates shoot a lot, and I get the rebound and put it back up so we can get the points. I box out and jump toward the rebound. I try and get the ball as many times as I can. I try and get a body on someone and make sure I box out and go for the ball."

Dasbach said the crazy numbers she put up against Plainfield Central weren't completely her own doing.

"Against Plainfield Central my teammates helped me out with great passes and took good shots, which helped me get some rebounds and put-backs," she said. "We all played well that game. We played good defense and that helped us win, not just our offense. Defense matters."

Dasbach, who used to play three sports at Willowbrook but now concentrates on volleyball and basketball, likes basketball for a variety

"I think I have more of a future with basketball," she said. "I like it so much because I started at a younger age. I've been playing it all my life. It's fun and such a great feeling when you win a game or when you get a basket with your teammates."

Speaking of her teammates, Dasbach, who would like to play

basketball in college, is having a blast this season.

"We all are really close on and off the court and that helps give us good chemistry," she said. "We work well together, we are close and

we love each other. It's going to be a good year.

"We need to keep practicing hard, keep working on our skills and our communication on the court. We know if we work together, we can be really strong and win a lot of games. We have a lot of great talent

### Warriors open conference season by crushing Addison Trail Balanced scoring attack in decisive 65-42 victory

The Willowbrook boys basketball team began the West Suburban Gold Conference season with Friday's 65-42 win over Addison Trail in Villa

The Warriors, who improved their overall season record to 3-2, held a 20-7 advantage after one quarter. Willowbrook led the Blazers 32-20 at halftime. The lead grew to 52-30 by the end of the third quarter. The Warriors built a 65-34 lead by the middle of the fourth quarter. Addison Trail scored eight straight points to finish the game. Senior Isaac Gaines scored Wil-

lowbrook's first eight points of the night with four driving baskets. His fourth field goal gave the Warriors an 8-4 lead about three minutes into the game. Senior Everett Stubblefield's layup gave the Warriors a 10-4 lead.

Senior Sam Tumilty's offensive rebound and basket pushed the lead to 12-5. Senior Deandre Holliday sank a jump shot to extend the lead to 16-7. Senior Mike Hay's inside bas-ket gave the Warriors a 20-7 lead and closed out the first-quarter scoring.

Holliday's 3-point shot early in the second quarter gave the Warriors a 23-7 lead, but Addison Trail responded with a 10-0 burst to cut the lead to 23-17. Senior Sam Bruns of the Warriors ended the Blazers' scoring run by connecting on a 3-point shot that gave his team a 26-17 lead. Turnilty's steal and basket in the closing seconds of the quarter gave Willowbrook its 32-20 halftime lead.

"I think we came out pretty fast on defense," said Tumilty. "We've got a lot of quick guys out there, playing aggressive man-to-man half-court defense. I think that definitely helps

get our offense going."

Turnilty finished the game with a team-leading 14 points. Stubblefield scored 13 points on his 18th birthday, while Bruns delivered nine points by making three of five attempts from

Holliday did not play in St. Charles; he played his first game of the basketball season on Friday.

We only had one practice together," said Stubblefield of the preparation for the season-opening tournament. "We were a little rusty. We came out kind of slow and were getting gassed pretty fast. Now that we've had a full week of practice, we're able to play full games and

THE SIMS FACTOR Sen. Elgie Sims (D-Chicago) began expressing interest in becoming the next Senate President not long after the current occupant of that office, John Cullerton, announced his pending retirement.

Sims' name hasn't been mentioned very often lately in news accounts, but he continues to meet with fellow Senate Democrats to lay out his agenda. And it's possible that at least some of a loosely aligned group of a half dozen or so independent-minded, younger liberals may wind up backing him for the chamber's top job.

Six votes is far from the number required to win the election, of course, but combine that with Sen. Steve Landek's "X Caucus" votes that I told you about last week, and it might be enough to slow down or even stop the process. Whether the caucus' two wings can learn to fly together is a whole other story. But, one thing at a time.

Sims has only been a Senator since January of 2018, but he was on Senate staff for a decade, rising to the top of the appropriations staff before serving in the House for almost six years. He's a budget expert and knows the process back and forth. Even so, convincing Senators who have "paid their dues" for many years to support somebody who basically just got there for Senate President will be a big ask, no matter how talented Sims may be (and he most certainly is).

Meanwhile, some members with primaries and general elections are likely becoming antsy as the Senate President election process enters its second month this week. One way of calming those nerves is to demonstrate fundraising abilities. Sims has reported no contributions in the past month. As I've already told you, Assistant Majority Leader Don Harmon (D-Oak Park) reported raising \$340,000 earlier this month.

Harmon also transferred more than \$300,000 from other campaign committees he controls.

Majority Leader Kimberly Lightford (D-Maywood) held a fundraiser several days ago, but has not yet reported any contributions. I'm told a significant disclosure is scheduled for today.

Speaking of Lightford, you'd think with just 38 members (minus Senate President Cullerton and soon-to-be-history Martin Sandoval), the rumor mill would be kept to a low roar in that caucus. Think again.

A rumor has been going around for days that Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot is making calls on Leader Lightford's behalf. I checked with the mayor's team and Lightford's team and was given a very firm "No" by both camps.

Several Senate Democrats have also convinced themselves that they need to be quiet about their choices for the next chamber leader because Lightford could retaliate. Some are so worked up that they're even privately calling for a secret caucus ballot to determine the next Senate President, which would break decades of tradition and is highly unlikely to happen.

Much of this may just be in their own heads, but former Sen. Rickey Hendon (D-Chicago) played right into those fears when he posted a Facebook video after leaving a Lightford fundraiser insulting her rivals with pointed jabs at their integrity and blasting South Side African-American Senators for not supporting a West Sider. Lightford did not disavow Hendon's remarks (although I'm not sure if anyone even asked her to do so), which also didn't go unnoticed.

I dunno. Yes, Hendon was a cudgel for then-Senate President Emil Jones, who often ran his caucus with a firm and retributive hand. But Jones and Hendon are long gone and I don't think anyone currently in the SDem caucus fits Rickey's profile. Sen. Sandoval would've tried to fill that bully role if his ally Sen. Tony Munoz (D-Chicago) had been elected Senate President, but Marty is on his way out and Munoz isn't running for the top job and isn't personally that type.

Whether these fears are based in reality or not, however, Lightford should probably address it within her caucus because the feeling is pretty rampant - even though, oddly enough, nobody I've spoken with can point to any actual behavior to justify their suspicions.

MORE PRIMARIES AND GENERALS We finished the House last week, so let's start our look at Senate races, shall we?

1st Senate - Sen. Tony Munoz (D-Chicago) had been expected to pick up a primary challenge from Congressman Chuy Garcia's organization, but that didn't happen. Instead, Froy Jimenez, who announced his bid months ago, is Munoz's only Democratic challenger.

Jimenez is a CPS teacher. He has been allied with Chuy's organization in the past and is the co-chair of the Chicago Teachers' Union Political Action/Legislative committee. But he is, so far, on his own. Munoz has plenty of money and there's more where that came from. The question will be if the incumbent walks precincts. Munoz won his first Senate race partly because the incumbent (Chuy Garcia) was more focused on other campaigns. So, we'll see what Jimenez can do as we go along.

The question becomes whether Ald. George Cardenas plays a role here. Munoz and Cardenas are battling it out for ward committeeperson. Munoz won the first round 4 years ago, and Cardenas supported Chuy Garcia's candidates last year.

10th Senate - Sen. Rob Martwick (D-Chicago) was appointed to this seat in late June, which caused some hard feelings that linger to this day with other local power brokers. The district has lots of retired and active duty police, and one of their own, Danny O'Toole, is running against Martwick in the Democratic primary.

O'Toole hasn't raised much money yet. He started with about \$1,200 and has added \$3,000 since then, including \$1,000 from Donna More, a candidate in the crowded field for Cook County State's Attorney. Martwick has plenty of money and a field operation, although the director of that operation, Dave Feller, is now running for the House and for ward committeeperson. Martwick is reportedly expecting no problems and maybe even some help from the Fraternal Order of Police, which would be a very good thing in that district. O'Toole's people are talking a big game, but they've yet to show they can match their words with actions. Stay tuned.

Cassidy also is excited by the fact this is the first year in about a decade Fenton has been in a girls bowling conference.


