Freshman Seth Skamra finished fourth at 195 pounds and is a sectional alternate.

"Seth is a freshman who was un-seeded," Rosengrant said, "What he did was very nice."

Rosengrant noted that Addison Trail brought 11 wrestlers out of a possible 14. "Giulian Frontier got hurt earlier in the week and couldn't come," he said. "We missed having a few guys and that hurt us with the team race a little bit."

Addison Trail finished fourth as a team in the regional. Only the re-gional champion advances to the dual-team sectional portion of the state

"The kids wrestled well and did what they were supposed to do," said Rosengrant. "They wrestled to

through everybody we expected to get through and having Seth as an alternate was a nice bonus.

Rosengrant said Addison Trail's competitive schedule has paid off for

his group.

The Willowbrook wrestling team had itself a double treat on Saturday.

Not only did the Warriors host a Class 3A regional on their home mats, but they ended up qualifying four wrestlers for this coming Sat-urday's Class 3A Conant Individual Sectional in Hoffman Estates.

The top three finishers in each of the regional's weight levels advanced to the individual sectional. The wrestlers who finish in the top four in their weight divisions at th sectional will qualify for the IHSA individual state meet in Champaign.

Junior Elijah Brockie finished second at 195 pounds at the regional, as did senior Zach Seymore at 132

Senior Gabe Yu took third at 113 pounds, while senior John Peterson placed third at 220 pounds. Brockie (34-8), Seymore (32-11), Yu (30-10) and Peterson (29-13) head to Conant, where berths in the state meet will be on the line.

Yu and Peterson both secured their sectional berths by scoring first-period pins over their opponents in the regional's third-place matches.

Junior David Kapica (23-13) placed fourth at 145 pounds and is a sectional alternate.

Willowbrook finished the regular season with a 16-10 overall mark in duals and went 3-3 in West Suburban Conference Gold Division action.

"We have been fighting hard and peaking at the right time," Willowbrook coach Tim Ortiz said. "The guys have wrestled well."

Ortiz noted that one wrestling media outlet ranked Willowbrook in the Class 3A honorable mention team rankings last week.

"That is a nice accomplishment for the team," he said. "They have been working hard and doing every-thing right. They work for each oth-er. It goes to show that all the work during the season and in the off-sea-

son is paying off."
Ortiz said Willowbrook was competitive in its WSC Gold duals. "In the conference we were two or three individual matches away from being 4-2 or 5-1," he said. "It was close. Every match we lost was close within a match or two that could have gone either way. It shows the growth we are having. We are starting to get to where we want to be as a program. We fell right in the middle and our goal is to be in the top two or three

ams. I'm happy.
"Now, we need to keep climbing in the right direction and keep climb-ing up the conference. Hopefully we can compete and win a conference title here soon."

In addition to Brockie, Seymore, Yu, Peterson and Kapica, Senior Wyatt Borri brought a 27-12 record into the regional at 170 pounds, while sophomore Nick Mabutas was 23-11 heading into the postseason at

152.
"The records our guys have are not had, especially the way we changed up the schedule this year," said Ortiz. "We were in tougher tournaments and the schedule as a whole was tougher. Those records let the kids realize how all that hard work does pay off and it is not going un-noticed. Guys are wrestling hard and learning to wrestle every position."

Brockie and Seymore went unde-

Brockie and Seymore went unde-feated in WSC Gold duals and will

be locks for all-conference accolades when that voting occurs. They also were honorable mentions in last week's Class 3A state rankings by

one wrestling media service.

"Elijah is consistently been a leader for us," said Ortiz. "He's a guy we can count on to get a win when we need it. Zach is the same thing. He's been in the varsity lineup for four years now and has taken on a lead-ership role. He's not wrestling for himself. He's wrestling for the team. He's always going out there and chasing bonus points, if not pins, for the team. Gabe Yu has been the same way. He's wrestled tough as a senior. He's been in the lineup for a few years now and he finds ways to

get bonus points for the team."
Ortiz pointed out Mabutas enjoyed a fine showing at this season's large tournament in Sycamore, where he recorded four pinfall victories and won his weight class there.

"He has his head on the right track," the coach said. "He puts pressure on himself to pick up big wins and bonus points for the team, which we love. At the same time, he's still young-he's only a sophomore. We are working on getting him to un-derstand he doesn't always have to chase team points and can wrestle more freely. He's understanding that and has been looking better.

Ortiz also had high praise for Ka-

They earned their sectional berths with their performances at

the Lake Park Regional on Feb. 5. The top five finishers in each regional event, including the allaround competition, automatically qualified for the sectional. Additional gymnasts earned at-large berths in each event,

Automatic qualifiers included Willowbrook sophomore Bella Naumovsky, who won the region-al title on the uneven bars with a 9.125. Naumovsky tied for fifth on the balance beam (8.575).

Sonhomore Tess Placek of Willowbrook earned an automatic sectional berth in the vault after plac-ing fifth at the regional with a 9.05.

Placek earned an at-large sectional berth in the all-around competition with her score of 32.7. Two Addison Trail gymnasts—junior Francesca Scarbaggio and freshman Maddie Muccianti-also earned at-large berths to the sectional's all-around competition. Scarbaggio turned in an all-around score of 32.325 at the regional, while Muccianti delivered an allaround total of 31.0.

The Willowbrook boys basketball team defeated Romeoville 70-55 on Saturday at The Ville Shootout at Lewis University in Romeoville.

Willowbrook was originally supposed to play Chicago Lincoln Park in the game but Lincoln Park High School suspended the boys basketball team's

season amid allegations of widespread misconduct.

Willowbrook moved to 10-16 overall with the win at

Senior Everett Stubblefield poured in a team-leading 32 points in the victory over Romeoville. Stubblefield made 12 field goals, including four shots from 3-point range. He connected on four of five free-throw attempts.

Senior Sam Tumilty, who made three 3-point shots, added 20 points. Tumilty also contributed seven rebounds and five assists.

The Warriors trailed Romeoville 33-28 at halftime, but a strong third quarter lifted Willowbrook to a 46-41 lead after three quarters. The Warriors outscored Romeoville 42-22 in the second half. The Warriors lost a 74-64 West Suburban Gold



Warriors seventh at Hinsdale South Sectional

The Willowbrook girls bowling team didn't earn a state-meet berth during Saturday's Hinsdale South Sectional, but senior Makaylah Jones qualified as an individual.

Jones will compete in the IHSA state meet, which begins this Friday at The Cherry Bowl in Rockford. She secured her state-meet berth by finishing among the top five individuals at the sectional who weren't members of qualifying teams.

The top four teams at the sectional advanced to the state meet's team competition. York won the Hinsdale South Sectional title with its to-tal score of 5,630. Downers Grove South (5,528) placed second, while Metea Valley (5,291) finished third. Hinsdale South (5,286) turned in a fourth-place showing to earn a state-meet berth. Willowbrook (4,863) placed seventh in the 12-team sectional.

Twenty-four teams-the top four teams from each of the state's six sectionals-advanced to the team competition of the state meet.

Willowbrook qualified for the state meet in each of the previous two seasons by winning sectional ti-tles. The Warriors won the Glenbard East Sectional in 2018. One year ago, Willowbrook won the Hinsdale South Sectional.

Jones led the Warriors in Satur-day's sectional with her six-game score of 1.127. Jones rolled scores of 189, 177 and 155 in her first three games of the day. She bowled a 195 in her fourth game and a 168 in her fifth game. Jones saved her best sectional performance for her final game, when she delivered a 243 to up her individual state-meet

Jones posted the seventh-best to-tal score among all individuals at the sectional.

Jones will participate in the state neet for the third straight year. She was a major contributor to Willow-brook's 2018 and 2019 section-al-championship teams. She won individual regional championships during her sophomore and junior seasons. On Feb. 8, she won her third straight individual regional title when she posted the top six-game score—a 1.256—at the Metea Valley Regional.


