

DuPage County reports nearly 5,900 confirmed cases of COVID-19, including 296 deaths

Villa Park residents STAFF REPORT

The DuPage County Health Department has recorded almost 5,900 confirmed COVID-19 cases in the county.

The health department's COVID-19 case map, also referred to as a dashboard, links data from the DuPage County Health Department into the GIS Data Systems from DuPage County to provide a greater level of under-standing into how the COVID-19 pan-

demic is unfolding across the county.

Updated daily, the dashboard includes the age range, gender and the community of residence of each identi-

agehealth.org.
As of May 17, the health department indicated 5,892 total confirmed cases of COVID-19 in DuPage Coun-

ty, including 296 deaths.

The May 17 data showed 155 con-The May 1 / data showed 155 con-frined cases of COVID-19 among Vil-la Park residents, along with 236 cas-es among Lombard residents, and 18 cases affecting residents of Oakbrook

The county's report from one week earlier—May 10—indicated 248 deaths related to COVID-19. The report from two weeks earlier-May indicated 192 deaths

According to the county health department's May 17 update, 187 of the county's 296 deaths related to COVID-19 have involved residents age 80 and older. Another 65 deaths related to COVID-19 have been reported in residents in the 70-79 age group.

About 85 percent (252) of the county's 296 deaths related to COVID-19, therefore, have affected residents age 70 and older

IDPH provides statewide COVID-19 statistics

According to the Illinois Depart-ment of Public Health (IDPH) report on May 17, there have been 4,177 deaths related to COVID-19 in the state. The IDPH's May 17 update also indicated more than 94,000 confirmed COVID-19 cases in the state, with more than 580,000 tests for the virus

Of the 4,177 deaths related to COVID-19 in Illinois as of May 17, 1,849 deaths have been among residents age 80 and older. Another 1,020 deaths have been in the 70-79 age group, with 729 deaths among resi-dents between the ages of 60-69. About 86 percent of the state's 4,177 deaths ed to COVID-19, therefore, have involved residents 60 and older. Nearly 69 percent of the COVID-19 related deaths in Illinois have taken place in residents 70 and older.

According to the IDPH, 2,839 of the state's 4.177 deaths related to COVID-19 have taken place in Cook County. About 68 percent of all of the ate's deaths related to COVID-19, therefore, have been in Cook County,

IDPH Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike has stated that all deaths of Illinois residents who tested positive for COVID-19 have been counted as COVID-19 deaths, even if the decedents died of alternate causes.

Closed for the season; Jefferson Pool will not open in 2020

Facility was supposed to open on June 6

The Village of Villa Park announced last week that Jefferson Pool would be for the entire 2020 season be-

cause of the COVID-19 pandemic. The pool, located at 341 N. Harvard Ave., was supposed to open for the 2020 season on Saturday, June 6. The pool would have been open through Labor Day—Monday, Sept. 7. "It's so sad; I feel heartbroken,"

said Suzanne Earl, the village's aquatic manager and athletic supervisor. "It's sad because I just can't imagine a summer without a pool, not just for our staff but for our whole community.

Earl said she had a staff of 32 part-Earl said she rad a stail of 22 partime employees—mostly lifeguards—who worked at the pool last year and had responded that they wanted to return to work during the 2020 season.

Harl added that the village's parks

and recreation department staff dis-cussed strategies to try to open the pool. Unfortunately, there are no via-

"You can't have people in a pool wearing masks," said Earl, who also referred to Gov. JB Pritzker's current restrictions, which ban non-essential gatherings and limit essential gatherigs-such as religious services-to

10 or fewer people.

Earl said the village did not sell any pool passes for the 2020 season, so it will not have to reimburse anyone. The Villa Park Village Board recently set rates for the 2020 season, and passes were supposed to go on sale on May 1. Earl said the parks and recreation de-partment decided to hold off on selling pool passes because of the uncertainty about this season.

A May 13 statement from the vil-lage noted that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) does not recommend visiting water parks, water playgrounds and/or spas at this time. The village's statement added that surrounding organizations, includ-ing the Elmhurst Park District and the Lombard Park District, have decided to close their facilities for the season. Additionally, the statement noted that the DuPage Swim and Dive Conference, which includes the Villa Park Mariners swim team, has canceled its 2020 season. The Mariners were supposed to hold their first practice at Jefferson Pool before the pool was scheduled to open to the public. The Mariners were scheduled to open their season with a home meet against Bartlett on June 6

These are unprecedented times this decision was not made without extensive thought and analysis," the village added in its statement. "It is hard to imagine a summer without going to the pool; however, ensuring the safety and well-being of the community, vis itors and staff must take priority. thank all of our residents, staff and visitors for their understanding as we face these uncharted waters, united in hope for a healthier future.

Willowbrook's badminton team was just about to begin the 2020 sea-son when the COVID-19 shutdown began at the end of regular classes on Friday, March 13.



Mariners' swim season canceled

DuPage Swim and Dive Conference won't conduct its 2020 season

The Villa Park Mariners won't be

swimming in 2020.

The Mariners, who compete in the DuPage Swim and Dive Conference (DSDC), recently learned that the 2020 season has been canceled because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The conference sent a recent letter to its members announcing the cancellation. The conference made the announcement after a meeting that included its members' park district executive directors and village recreation directors.

"Collectively, our top concerns Tollectively, our top concerns are the safety of our patrons and staff, and how to provide aquatic enjoyment this summer without compromising this safety," the letter stated.

The DSDC letter noted that neither the Illinois Department of Public

Health (IDPH) nor Gov. JB Pritzker had given direction on how pools will be impacted this summer. The IDPH and Pritzker have also not provided a timeline as to when to expect the lifting of current pool restrictions.

The May 5 letter also stated that two DSDC members—Carol Stream and Wood Dale-had already an-

Last week, the Village of Villa Park announced that Jefferson Pool, the Mariners' home pool, would not open for the 2020 season because of

tators, volunteers and staff," stated the conference's letter.

The letter noted that the summer swim season is one of the top high-lights for DSDC swimmers, especially those who are celebrating their "senior" seasons—their final seasons in the conference. Many of those senior swimmers-18-year-oldshave been involved with their programs for over a decade.
"After much discussion and delib-

eration, our agencies are in sad agree-ment to not host the 2020 DSDC season," stated the conference's letter.
"This decision does not come lightly, and we hope the DSDC Board will understand our decision to not host the 2020 season."

The Mariners were scheduled to open the 2020 season with a home meet against Battlett on June 6. The Mariners' regular season was sup-posed to include 10 regular-season meets, followed by a pair of post-sea son conference meets on July 18 and July 25.

Villa Park would have been a member of the conference's fourteam Blue Division in 2020.

Near the end of his message, Bulthuis added one last guideline—"We must stay informed." He directed residents toward websites; including the DuPage County Health Departm website—dupagehealth.org— which contains a dashboard with statistics of confirmed COVID-19 cases in the county. Bulthuis also referred to the websites of the Illinois Department of Public Health (dph.illinois.gov) and the Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention (cdc.gov).
"I have faith that our community will stand together and do what is nec-essary to help each other during these difficult times," said Bulthuis at the conclusion of his message to village residents. "Because we are Villa Park and that's what we do.'

The health department recently launched an interactive COVID-19 case map. Also referred to as a dashboard, the case map links data from the DuPage County Health Department into the GIS Data Systems from DuPage County to provide a greater level of understanding into how the COVID-19 pandemic is unfolding across the county.

The dashboard, which is updated daily, includes the age range, gender and the hometown of each identified case in DuPage County.

As of April 12, the data on the health department's dashboard indicated 1 165 total confirmed cases of COVID-19 in DuPage County, in-

cluding 48 deaths.

The April 12 data showed 47 confirmed cases of COVID-19 among Villa Park residents, along with 67 cases among Lombard residents and nine cases affecting residents of Oakbrook Terrace.

One week earlier, the dashboard's

confirmed COVID-19 cases in DuP-age County, including 22 deaths. The information from April 5 showed 20 cases among Villa Park residents, 41 cases in Lombard residents and nine cases among residents of Oakbrook

The April 12 update noted the 616 (nearly 53 percent) of the 1,165 confirmed cases affected women, while 546 cases (about 47 percent)

According to the dashboard, the first case of COVID-19 in DuPage County was confirmed on March 13. The dashboard indicates that the highest number of cases in a single day is April 4, when there were 95 confirmed cases. There were 52 cases one day earlier-April 3. Pollowing the 95 cases on April 4, the num-ber dropped to 41 on April 5, before rising to 72 cases on April 6. There were 47 cases on April 7, and 76 cases on April 8. The number of cases remained relatively steady in the fol-

64 on April 10, 66 on April 11 and 61 on April 12.

The age group breakdown in the county's April 12 update shows 215 of the 1,165 confirmed cases are in residents are between the ages of 50-59. There were 198 cases in the 60-69 age group, and 130 cases in the 80 and above age group. The data showed 118 cases in residents ages 70-79. There were 191 cases in the 40-49 age group, 161 cases among residents ages 30-39 and 136 cases in the 20-29 age group. The April 12 update indicated 11 cases in the county among the 10-19 group, and five confirmed cases in children 9 and under

In a March 30 statement announce ing the COVID-19 dashboard, the county health department related that the number of positive cases is likely much higher than listed because of unreported or untested cases in the community.
