Dylan Moran has been named as Addison Trail's January recipient of 88's Best recognition for his stellar involvement in extracurricular activities. A senior, Moran was recog-nized during the Jan. 25 District 88

Board of Education meeting.

Moran's presence is well known at
Addison Trail. He is dedicated, kind and doesn't always like the atten tion he acquires through his talented performances on the cross-country

But his quiet, influential and commanding leadership in class and with his fellow athletes is more than worthy of this award.

He has been a member of the boys cross-country team and the boys track and field team at AT for four years. He also has managed a rigorous academic schedule, taking eight Advanced Placement (AP)/. college-level courses and six hon-ors courses - all with outstanding grades. Moran has competed at Sectionals in cross-country three years in a row, he qualified for the Illinois High School Association (IHSA) Boys Cross-Country State meet last year, and he broke the school's track

and field two-mile record as a sopno-more and then again as a junior.
"Moran joined our program as a talented freshman after partici-pating in our summer camp during pating in our summer camp during junior high," said Brad Donald cross-country coach. "He will leave AT as the most accomplished cross-country runner in program



history. He is a two-time All-Conference medalist (finishing 3rd in 2019 and 2020). He also is a four-time Regional team participant, a three-time Sectional qualifier and a State finalist in 2019 (there was no State meet in 2020 because of COVID-19), setting a school record with his State finals

The thing that really stands out about Moran is his drive and deter-mination to succeed. Not only did he have high expectations for himself, but he followed through on his plans to achieve them. Everyone wants to be elite - until it is time to be elite. Most athletes aren't willing to make the sacrifice of time and effort to achieve lofty goals. Moran was more

than willing.
"We had one of our best teams this past season (during the COVID-19 disruption), and I firmly believe our success was rooted in his leadership skills and abilities. He was able to or ganize and coordinate his teammates in the time that we could not be to-gether. When we were able to practice it was like we hadn't missed a beat. Throughout a season that saw us never run a common course from prior years or participate in an invitational meet, this year could have been a real challenge, but Moran's attitude and leadership kept the team in flow and culminated with us almost qualifying as a team for Sectionals (one spot removed)."

Boys track and field Head Coach Jim Ziebka agreed.

"As an elected team captain, Moran leads by example with his indomitable work ethic," he said. "In my 15 years at AT, I have not coached a student-athlete more committed to his craft than Moran. He has rewritten the AT records for distance running. His talents, leadership, presence and personality will be sorely missed by

many upon his graduation.
"Over the years, Moran also has volunteered with our team at Northern Illinois Food Bank, Kiwanis Peanut Days and at numerous concession stand events. He was always all in to help the track and field program.'

Moran said his biggest reward being a student-athlete is that he has truly changed the culture of

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Former Addison resident, boxer Spinks dies of cancer

Boxing career was marred by years of alcohol, drugs, partying

That's what boxer Leon Spinks had to say about world heavyweight champion Muhammad Ali, after he shocked the world in 1978 in Las Vegas by taking the title from the aging champion in what was only Spinks' eighth professional fight.

He was also unfortunately a classic example of a rags-to-riches star. who lost his fortune on years of alco-

Leon Spinks, a former resident of Addison, passed away from cancer on Saturday, Feb. 6, at the age of 67. He was born July 11, 1953, in St. Louis, Mo., one of eight children brought up by his mother Kay in the city's notorious Pruitt-Igoe housing project, a location riddled with drugs, crime and gangs. Spinks once recalled how his fa-

Spinks once recalled how his ra-ther had beaten him as a boy and taunted him by saying: "You'll nev-er be nothin." Those words would inspire Spinks in his quest for suc-cess as a boxer. He and his younger, wither Michael learned to hor at a brother Michael learned to box at a nearby recreation center. Michael would also go on to become a world heavyweight champion, beating Larry Holmes in 1985.

Both brothers enjoyed success at the amateur level, culminating with gold medals for the U.S. at the 1976 Olympic Games in Montreal

Leon, who had dropped out of school to join the U.S. Marines, wasa three-time Marines champion and won a bronze medal in the World Championship of 1974. He earned a silver the following year in the Pan American Games in Mexico, before his Olympic triumph as a light heavyweight, while Michael won the middleweight title.

Spinks' gap-toothed smile, which became famous across the world, came about during his mili-tary service.

"I got headbutted while sparring in the Marines, one or two got loose and they pulled them out," he said.

Lavish lifestyle doesn't help boxing career

"I had no control of myself outside of the ring," Spinks said. "All I cared about was going to the next party and who was I going to get high with? My life was cocaine, weed, cars and women. And I enjoyed it.

By the time of the agreed rematch with Ali in New Orleans, Spinks had acquired Mr. T as his personal body-

guard, who would go on to appear in the television show The A-Team and the movie Rocky III. While Spinks partied hard - often seen in a full-length fur coat reportedly worth \$45,000 — Ali prepared meticulously for the rematch.

At the New Orleans Superdome 63,350 people packed in for a fight that was broadcast to 80 countries across the world. This time Ali

emerged as a clear winner on points. It is believed Spinks earned less than \$300,000 from the first fight with Ali and \$3.5M for the rematch, but he was never destined to reach such heights again. He unsuccessfully challenged Holmes for the WBC title in 1981, when he was stopped in three rounds; and fought Dwight Muhammad Qawi for the WBA cruiserweight crown in 1986, which

Qawi won in the sixth. Spinks quit boxing in 1995 at age 42. In contrast to his brother, who retired on \$13.5M after losing his title to Mike Tyson in 1988, Leon became a peripheral figure earning relatively insignificant sums. His career record shows 26 wins, 17 losses and three

In the 1990s, Spinks lived in Addison during which time he was charged with DUI after causing a three-car accident in 1992, which netted him probation and community

Spinks was married three times and divorced twice. He found some order to his chaotic lifestyle with third wife Brenda Glur. They moved to Las Vegas, where Spinks made money selling autographs and photos to fans.

He is survived by Brenda and by

two sons, Cory and Darrell, from an early relationship with Zadie Mae Calvin, with whom he grew up in St. Louis. A third son with Zadie Mae, Leon Jr., was killed in a shooting in 1990. Both Cory and Darrell became boxers, with Cory holding world titles at welterweight and junior middleweight. His grandson Leon Spinks III was also a professional fighter.



Pritzker outlines \$41.6 billion budget with flat spending

Gov. JB Pritzker outlined a \$41.6 billion budget proposal last week that would hold most state agencies at flat funding levels but which relies heavily on changes to the state's corporate tax structure that lawmakers have not yet

The budget proposal, which is only the governor's request for lawmakers in the General Assembly, does not call for income tax increases. Over the next, four months, lawmakers will work on an operating budget of their own to send to the governor which may or may not address all of his requests.

It also does not rely on any feder-al funding increases that have not yet been passed into law, although a federal Medicaid reimbursement rate increase that is already in place does account for a \$638 million reduction to the state's expenditures.

It was Pritzker's third budget mes-sage since taking office in 2019, And unlike others that were delivered from

the House chamber in the Capitol, this year's message was delivered remotely through a prerecorded video due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The address was recorded at the Il-

linois State Fairgrounds, which now serves as a COVID-19 vaccination site.

In his speech, Pritzker had harsh rhetoric for "far right" Republicans at all levels of government, describing them as "carnival barkers," for lobbying against federal relief to states and for defying health guidelines. He also once again made note of the two-year budget impasse presided over by Republican former Gov. Bruce Rauner, calling it a "self-inflicted" period of suffering which saw the state's backlog of unpaid bills balloon to over \$16 billion.

He said in the past 20 years, as pension payments have become an increasing burden on state finances, Illinois' number of government em-ployees has shrunk by 30 percent, the Illinois State Police force has shrunk by 40 percent, and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency work force shrunk by 60 percent, he said.

Those include a reversal of previ-ous General Assembly action to repeal the corporate franchise tax, a cap on net operating losses for the fiscal year that would allow for \$314 million in savings and a cap on a retailer's dis-count to \$1,000 per month, and other

GOP, Illinois Chamber criticize proposed budget

But Republicans and business groups lambasted the governor's plan tax increase on businesses and a betrayal of a bipartisan compromise budget which members of both parties celebrated in Pritzker's first year.

Republican House Minority Leader Jim Durkin, of Western Springs, accused the governor of seeking "pay-back" in his effort to repeal some corporate tax incentives passed by lawmakers in 2019, alleging that it was in response to the November failure of the graduated income tax.

Senate Minority Leader Dan Mc-Conchie, R-Hawthorn Woods, called the budget an attempt to "move money around" and raise corporate taxes.

While the governor characterized his corporate tax changes of closing "corporate loopholes," Republicans characterized it as an elimination of important incentives aimed at keeping job creators in the state.

Illinois Chamber of Commerce

President and CEO Todd Maisch characterized the tax changes as "a massive

We understand that the state has fiscal problems to address, however, the

governor's plan will have a long-term negative impact on job creation and tax revenues for the state as it produces an revenues for me state as it produces an unfair increase on taxpayers after they resoundingly defeated the graduated income tax," Maisch said in an email statement. "This not only will expand what will get taxed, but will also reduce key tax credits for vital sectors of the economy.

Toll of pandemic on state finances

I had bolder plans for our state budget than what I am going to present to you today. It would be a lie to suggest otherwise," Pritzker said. "But as all our families have had to make hard choices over the last year, so too does state government."

Senior budget officials, in a briefing before the address was streamed, noted the governor will still seek to decouple the state tax code from changes allowed in the federal Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security, or CARES, Act. That change would keep revenues flat from a year ago by providing that the CARES Act cuts passed last year would not automatically reduce Illinois state tax burdens for businesses.

The measure failed in the lame duck session as Republicans blasted it as a more than \$500 million tax increase on businesses, but Democrats at the time said it was a way to prevent revenue loss by maintaining the status quo.

magazine, walked behind the counter and told the clerk to open two cash registers, which she did.

Williams allegedly took about \$1,033 from the registers. He ordered the clerk to lay on the ground, and he secured her hands behind her with a zip tie he brought with him. He then fled the store.

During the investigation, police learned a similar robbery took place Dec. 19 at a 7-Eleven at 28651 Lloyd Ave. in Lombard. In that incident, a man, later identified as Williams, allegedly entered the store at 3:05 a.m., went behind the sales counter and told the clerk "do what you're told and you won't get hurt" as he pulled out a gun won't get hurt" as he pulled out a gun with an extended magazine. Williams allegedly demanded ac-

cess to two cash registers and took about \$500 from the registers. He orabout 5000 from the registers. He or-dered the clerk to lay on his stomach, at which time Williams struck the clerk two times in the shoulder area before tying his arms behind his back. Williams then fled the store with the cash and 55 nacks of cigaratics, accordcash and 55 packs of cigarettes, according to the release.

The investigation into the Wood Dale incident revealed a similar robbery in Addison that took place Jan. 28. About 10 p.m., a man with dreadlocks, later identified as Wil-

liams, allegedly entered the Speedway gas station at 701 E. Lake St., poured himself a cup of coffee and approached the front counter. He allegedly walked behind the counter, displayed a gun and told the clerk to open the register.
As the clerk attempted to open the register, Williams allegedly shoved the gun into her waist and told her "Do open the drawer and you want to die? Open the drawer and

give me all the money."

After the clerk opened the register and gave Williams the money, he ordered her to open the safe. When the clerk told Williams she could not, he allegedly again put the gun to her waist and asked her multiple times if she wanted to die. Williams allegedly ordered the clerk to put cigarettes into a bag and then fled the store.

On Feb. 9, a search warrant executed at Williams' residence yielded a gun with an extended magazine, which appeared to be the same weapon used in the robberies, ammunition, zip ties, a dreadlock wig and clothing and shoes believed to be worn by the offender in the robberies.

"It is alleged that Mr. Williams' two-month violent crime spree terrorized DuPage County residents and businesses as he went from town to town committing armed robberies," DuPage County State's Attorney Robert Berlin said in the release. "The number of re-sources dedicated to the apprehension of Mr. Williams sends the message that we will use every tool at our disposal to

hold those who commit violent crimes, hold those who commit violent crimes, as alleged in this case, responsible for their actions. Mr. William's alleged crime spree was put to an end; however, thanks to the outstanding, cooperative efforts of the DuPage County. Sheriff's Office; the Addison, Wood Dale, Bensenville, Elmhurst and Schiler Park police departments; the DuPage County Metropolitan Emergency age County Metropolitan Emergency Response and Investigation Team; and the DuPage County Metropolitan En-

"From the date that this occurred to the day of the arrest they worked continuously, gathering enough evidence to put an end to Mr Williams' alleged crimes throughout the western suburbs.
