Willowbrook improved to 1-2 with Friday's win over Addison Trail. The Warriors dropped to 1-3 following Saturday afternoon's 58-47 loss at Proviso West. In its first game of last week, Willowbrook dropped a 68-34 decision at Glenbard West on Feb. 16. The talented Hilltoppers held a 19-9 lead after one quarter. The lead grew to 31-12 by halftime. Glenbard West held a 50-25 advantage at the end of the third quarter.

Senior Amaris Hughes scored a team-leading 11 points for the War-riors in the loss at Glenbard West. Junior Marquel Saleek scored seven points, while juniors Ryan Pegler and Alexander Simmons provided six and five points, respectively.
